If time permits and you are more ambitious, organize a block party, a cookout or barbeque, or just serve cookies and lemonade. The purpose of NNO is to be visible, to get to know your neighbors and to become aware of what is happening where you live. A safer neighborhood starts with you!




Home & Garden Tour – President Santos reported that the committee is looking for a chair for the 2003 Tour.



Underfoot Greenery

One of our neighbors has put their house up for sale. It's a sad feeling because someone you have come to know and appreciate is leaving. The real estate sign out front, the lock box on the front door, the absence of their car bring home the thought that we wish we had known them better. This August 6th is National Neighbors Night Out. Get your street together and have some fun. The ebbs and flows of life bring us all together for but a brief moment and then like a monarch butterfly sampling a bloom, we move on. Get to know your neighbor.

I like rain, but with the amount we saw mid-July, and that of the coming months, the incidence of brown patch goes up. The high humidity and warm nights encourage this fungal disease most commonly identified by brown circular areas in the lawn. Brown patch usually affects the grass blades only, so once the fungus disappears during dry weather the grass will return. I had this fungal disease in the yard in places it has never been. It can be transported into your lawn simply by walking over an affected spot in another lawn or brought to you compliments of your lawn service. Brown patch is easily treated. Several fungicides are available at your local garden centers. Just follow the instructions.

Along with excessive rain comes the possibility of chlorosis. This is evident with the discoloration of your lawn or plants. This can be remedied with an application of iron available in pellet or liquid form. Follow the label. I usually spread some Ironite when needed. It helps things green up.

When the heat and dry weather resume, have your lawn service, or you yourself, cut your grass at the highest possible setting on the lawn mower. First, the longer grass blades will aid in conserving moisture and shading the roots. A closely cropped lawn loses moisture quickly as well as allows the sun to heat up the ground enabling weed seeds to germinate and begin their pernicious invasion. Speaking of weeds in the grass, I have one that resembles a wandering jew that has been an insufferable challenge. As much as I detest using herbicides, none that I have tried has proven itself as its nemesis. The only defense has been to painstakingly expunge it manually and put down a layer of topsoil so that the grass can take possession of the lost ground.

As far as feeding your lawn goes, mulching the clippings returns nutrients to the soil. A regular cutting schedule, usually once a week will allow your lawn to fill in and become dense. A feeding schedule that consists of a good balanced fertilizer, e.g., 13-13-13 once every season will ensure a healthy lawn. The exception I follow is a 3-1-2 ratio in spring when the lawn begins to green up. If you cut your lawn yourself, doing so after heavy rains is not the optimal time. The ground is too saturated and as you step across the lawn you will compact the dirt forcing out oxygen. If you can bear it, wait a day or two and then cut. Have your lawn service observe this practice as well. You will avoid creating a sloppy muddy

Well, I hear a storm coming again. Time to check on the dog.

Nothing puts kitty in the proverbial doghouse like a urine spot on the carpet so this month we discuss the ideal litter box. Fall Migration is upon us so fill up those bird feeders.

He lives in the 800 block of LaMonte with his family, Joan, Gary and Stephanie, as well as two cats, Boomerang and Candy Cookie. Nickelodeon was born a "tailgater." His favorite spot is in the back of his dad's pick-up. He is not harnessed in any way and it doesn't matter if the truck is in the front yard, the back yard, or the parking lot of Home Depot. He will only leave his spot to eat, or take a nap indoors on really hot days, but the rest of the time he is quite content to watch the world from the bed of his Chevy. Keep on Truckin' Nick!

Critters 101: Outside the Box, Inappropriate Elimination

Inappropriate elimination can drive even the most loving pet owner crazy. It's the number one reason cats are surrendered to shelters or pounds. The good news is house soiling problems can be prevented. Cat preferences for a desirable toilet are not unlike our own. It must be clean, private and easily accessible. They also have some requirements that are based on their survival instincts: It must contain an easily raked substrate and it must offer escape potential. This survival know-how is pre-programmed into your cat's brain. Always base your decisions on what is most natural from the cat's point of view. If kitty were to use the great outdoors, he would look for a soft, diggable substrate such as garden soil. There would be no artificial fragrance and, of course, no plastic liners. He would have plenty of room to sniff, dig, squat, and turn around. A clean spot would be selected each time – at least six inches from the last spot he used.

How do we meet these requirements indoors? Select a box that is at least 16 inches by 22 inches. Hooded or covered litter boxes are popular with consumers, but if cats did the shopping, they would be left on the shelves. Humans do not want to see or smell what kitty leaves behind and neither does kitty. The hooded litter box forces him to enter a cramped, cave-like structure that concentrates odors, creating an outhouse effect. Since the cat's sense of smell is at least 14 times more sensitive than ours, this may be all it takes to send kitty in search of a fresher smelling toilet area.



Summer Meals to Keep You Thin

Most of us do not want to spend our summers in the kitchen slaving over the stove. However, you don't want to fall prey to fast food or that hamburger and fries by the pool either. Your local supermarket offers aisles and aisles of fresh and fresh-packaged produce as well as ready-to-eat foods. Combine these together and you have a healthy meal in minutes with little or no cooking. Here are a few ideas to help make dinners quick, easy and healthy. If they go over well in your household, you can use them for meals on the run during the school year too.

Chicken Black Bean Mexi Wrap

4 large whole wheat tortillas

8 Tbsp. black bean dip (Guiltless Gourmet)

2 packages of Louis Rich pre cooked chicken strips (12 oz total)

1 red bell pepper (sliced)

1/2 c. roughly chopped cilantro

1/4 c. low fat shredded Sargento Mexican Style cheese

Spread 2 Tbsp. black bean dip on each tortilla. Add 3 oz of chicken (1/2 package) to each tortilla. Top with bell pepper, cilantro and cheese and wrap up. Can be heated in the oven or microwave if desired.

Yield: 4 servings

Serve with a can of Mexi corn.

Chunky Shrimp Gazpacho

3 c. water

1 pound peeled and deveined medium-size fresh shrimp (can buy precooked shrimp)

1/2 medium-size purple onion

1 small yellow squash

1 medium-size green pepper

3 (14 oz) cans no-salt-added diced tomatoes

1/2 tsp dried thyme

1/2 tsp dried tarragon

3 T. picante sauce

Bring 3 cups water to a boil in a medium saucepan. Add shrimp; cook 3-5 minutes or until shrimp turn pink. Drain and rinse under cold water. While shrimp cook, chop onion, squash, and pepper; place in a large bowl. Add cooked shrimp, tomatoes, herbs, and picante sauce to vegetable mixture, stirring well. Cover and chill.

Yield: 4(13/4 c.) servings

Serve with bagged salad with Naturally Fresh Fat Free Balsamic Vinaigrette and foccacia bread. Boost the nutrition of the salad by adding raw vegetables from the salad bar.

If you don't even have time for that, check out the frozen food section of the

grocery store. Not only has the cooking been done for you, but there are many low fat options to choose from. Here are some of my favorites.

Amy's Organic Vegetable Lasagna. There is plenty of spinach and cheese in this generous portion. Some of my clients claim that they can not eat restaurant lasagna anymore because it is not as good as Amy's. Serve with a bag of low fat Caesar salad mix.

Ortega Skillet Fajitas. Not only has the meat been seasoned, cooked and sliced, but also have the onions and peppers. Add whole wheat, fat free flour or corn tortillas and salsa and you are finished. Serve with fat free refried beans.

Boston Market's Turkey Breast Medallions with Mashed Potatoes and Gravy. If you are looking for that home cooked meal, here you have it. This national restaurant chain offers frozen dinners too. Serve with Mann's Broccoly Wokly. This is a bag of broccoli florets found near the bagged salad that you can throw in the microwave for 4-5 minutes and have steamed broccoli.

Cats are genetically inclined to seek out an easily raked substrate in which to eliminate. If kitty is not selecting the litter box as his preferred area, then something is wrong. Perhaps he has a urinary tract or intestinal disorder that makes elimination uncontrollable or painful. He may be associating the litter box with his discomfort and is avoiding it. So, always rule out any health considerations by taking kitty to the veterinarian. All cats six months or older should be spayed or neutered to prevent urine marking. If the problem is not kitty's health or hormones, then perhaps the litter box is the problem. Is he eliminating near the litter box but not in it? If so, this may indicate that he intended to use the box, but for some reason he just couldn't bring himself to get into it. Usually this is because it is too dirty. Cats are not going to voluntarily step into moist or dirty litter that they will later have to clean off their paws or fur. A box that seems clean to you may not be clean enough for your cat. What is not offensive to us may be unbearable to them. Remember it is kitty's preferences, not yours, that count when it comes to the litter box.

Dear Mau Mau: Are tortoiseshell cats always female? B. Duncan

Tortoiseshell and related colors like Calico are the result of a sex-linked gene and require two X chromosomes to appear. Generally speaking, these colors will only appear in females. Very rarely, these colors may appear in male cats, but these males are genetically abnormal (they have XXY instead of the normal XY) and are almost always infertile. Just another fascinating feline fact. *Mau Mau*

Migratory Report: The Fall Migration starts mid to late summer so clean and fill those feeders. Put your binoculars and field guide near the window. You may have already noticed the burnt orange and black Orchard Orioles filling our trees.

Casey's Comments: Run, romp, and play daily.
