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## Don't Become a Holiday Statistic

The holidays are quickly approaching. With this time of year come company parties, holiday goodies as well as the traditional family feast. When January 1<sup>st</sup> rolls around we often find ourselves with a few unwanted post-holiday pounds. Research has shown that the average person gains nearly 7 pounds between Halloween and New Year's Day.

Not only does overindulgence add extra pounds, but also recent research suggests that it can trigger heart attacks in people with cardiovascular disease. A report from the American Heart Association shows that the risk of having a heart attack is four times greater after eating a large meal that is high in fat and calories. Unfortunately, this happens all too often during the holiday season. Here are some tactics to keep you from being a statistic!

- Don't go into a party or holiday meal starving. Eat a snack before you go and make sure it contains some protein: 1/2 a turkey sandwich, yogurt and piece of fruit or a can of water packed tuna.
- At a buffet, fill up on healthier foods such as turkey, lean cuts of beef, vegetables and fruit. And only go through the buffet line once!
- Ask the host or hostess if you can bring a dish or dessert. Then, bring one that is healthy.
- Instead of eating everything at Thanksgiving, choose the foods that are special to that holiday. For instance, eat some dressing, but pass on the mashed potatoes and rolls, which you can have anytime of year.
- Don't be overly concerned about losing weight during the holidays, if you can maintain, you will be ahead of the game.
- Plan some healthy family activities, such as a game of touch football, ice-skating or an evening walk.
- At parties, mingle and converse, rather than sticking by the food table.
- Wait for 20 minutes after a meal before deciding to eat dessert.
- Don't neglect your regular healthy routines, such as going to the gym.

### Critters 101: Giving and Receiving – The Four-Legged Way

What gifts has your pet given you lately? Maybe the goofy face it makes during a good scratch gave you the best laugh of your day. Maybe a nudge from its wet nose and furry head comforted you at just the right time. Or perhaps a bright-eyed invitation got you out of bed or away from the TV and out on a healthy walk. Our pets give us loyalty, joy and comfort year-round and no doubt your pet is listed on your holiday shopping list. There are many toys, beds and accessories on the market but the best gifts you can give are the intangible ones.

First on the list is keeping your home safe for your pet during the season's festivities. Beware of bread dough. If a dog eats unbaked dough, the dough continues to rise inside its stomach and could cause severe problems. Do not put bowls of grapes, raisins and macadamia nuts on coffee tables or other surfaces your pet can access. Also put potpourri and candles out of reach. Never put gifts containing food or other temptingly aromatic items under the tree. Don't leave alcoholic

drinks unattended. An ounce of alcohol can poison small pets. Keep holly and mistletoe up high. These plants, along with poinsettia and Christmas cactus are poisonous. Keep holiday chocolates in the refrigerator or inside a closed pantry. Skip the table scraps and tidy up all the ribbons and bows and wrappings. Prevent the tree water from becoming an auxiliary water bowl. Pinesap and fertilizers may make the water poisonous. Stagnant tree water can also harbor bacteria. Pick pet safe ornaments. One tail swipe against the Christmas tree can cause glass ornaments to fall and shatter, leaving glass shards on the floor. Avoid using tinsel and never use edible ornaments that might tempt a hungry pet.

Another great gift is preventative healthcare including a thorough veterinary exam, heartworm protection and a consistent regimen of dental care. Or you could schedule extra grooming time each week. A bath with a quality pet shampoo and a good brushing to distribute natural oils, ear cleaning, and a few minutes of gentle massage are simple ways to help your pet feel its best.

Other winning gifts for canines are new activities like agility, freestyle obedience, becoming a therapy dog, fly ball, and mastering new tricks. The simplest gift of all is to take your dog hiking in the woods or to a park or run at the beach. Anything that involves physical activity and more time with you is sure to be a great gift for your dog.

The tree is the absolute best thing about the holidays. When I was young I loved to climb it and then all that wonderful crinkly paper, ribbons, bows, bags and tape underneath it. Over the years, I've trained my family to get our tree and set it up in a heavy base and we don't decorate it for a few days. Then we only decorate the top two thirds and we never use tinsel. **Backyard Report:** If you hadn't noticed Garden Oaks is full of opossums. They live in stumps, attics, garages, road culverts, hollow trees, rock piles, crannies, and under buildings. They are non-aggressive and non-destructive. They will not harm people or pets. They are quiet and reclusive. They eat insects, snails and slugs. They are clean and always grooming. They are nocturnal and they do not hibernate. The opossum is the only North American marsupial meaning it carries its young in a pouch. If an opossum is 7-8 inches long (not counting the tail) it is old enough to be on its own. When cornered the opossum feigns dead or "plays possum" until the predator loses interest and then it goes on about its opossum business.

Since it was already getting dark, I wore reflective clothing, and had working front and back lights. Naturally, I prefer these quiet neighborhood side streets over busy intersections on the main roads during rush hour traffic. However, caution still had to be exercised since a lot of walkers with and without dogs were out and about.

While riding West on 42nd I closed in on a lady walking 2 big black dogs, and gave them a wide berth expecting the unexpected from dogs. What I did **not** expect, was that the dogs were **not** on a leash and very obviously **not** under the control of the owner, since both charged at me, and one of them ran right into my front wheel. Needless to say I lost control quickly, narrowly managed to avoid a concrete driveway, and crashed into somebody's front yard. And no, I was **not** O.K., as the dog owner inquired/hoped for, but instead felt a very uncomfortable pain at my right side. I managed to continue my ride, rather uncomfortably.

The next day, my worst fears were confirmed when X-rays showed a fractured rib, which is a painful condition that takes several weeks to heal completely. Add medical expenses, minor bike damage, and some torn bicycle clothing, and it turned out to be a very expensive and painful experience, all because one irresponsible area resident decided to let her dogs run free on public roads. Considering that my injuries could have been significantly worse had I hit the raised

concrete portion of the driveway (despite wearing a helmet), I think the message to dog owners is clear: You are responsible for your dogs, and all damage or injury they cause, and it could be a costly walk with the dog(s) for you, apart from having to live with the knowledge that your carelessness caused considerable discomfort, pain and expense.

### W. 43<sup>rd</sup> St. Truck Route (a/k/a Boom Box Drive)

When I was purchasing my home last year, I was in the real estate office and another customer asked where I was buying. I told her that the house was on W. 43<sup>rd</sup> St. She said, "who would want to live on 43<sup>rd</sup>?" I didn't realize what she was saying at the time, but I certainly do now. Garden Oaks is one of the neatest areas in Houston. But 43<sup>rd</sup> Street definitely has big problems.

#### Truck Route

W. 43<sup>rd</sup> Street between N. Shepherd and 290 only has a few blocks of commercial development. There are zero reasons that thru truck traffic should be allowed to shortcut through our subdivision. Since most of you don't live on W. 43<sup>rd</sup> it's probably not noticeable to you. Huge trucks of all kinds barrel along all day and all night. We need to put a stop to this by (1) having the city or highway department put up signs that say "No Thru Trucks" and (2) stay after the law enforcement agencies to enforce the rule. There are "No Thru Trucks" signs all over Houston in the better subdivisions. By doing this the noise level would be drastically reduced.

#### Boom Boxes

When I was a kid, I remember that you could get into trouble for having glass pacs as mufflers on your car because they were too noisy. Loud mufflers pale in comparison to the noise intensity of the latest huge custom sound systems in cars these days. If you haven't ever seen one up close, some of them are about the size of a medium TV set. They are designed to blow music out the windows, I suppose to "entertain" the masses. I am surprised that they are allowed to sell them. The noise level is so intense that the driver of the car has to keep both front windows down or I assume he would blow up. There is a city ordinance that prohibits loud noises like this but unfortunately it is not being enforced. I have asked several HPD officers if they had ever given anyone a ticket for the boom box noise. None of the officers had. If somehow we could get the police officers to stake out at night on W.43<sup>rd</sup> not only would they get a lot of loud noise ordinance violators but get a few 70 mph speeders as well. I have made several calls to the retail cop shop over by the Walgreen's to no avail.

This is our part of Houston; we need to do whatever is necessary to remedy these problems. Remember, if the property value of the homes on 43<sup>rd</sup> street go down it affects the appraisal value of your home as well.

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


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## Minutes of the November 5, 2002 Civic Club Meeting

President Kenneth Santos called the meeting to order at 7:11 p.m. The October minutes were accepted as published.

### Officer Reports

*Treasurer* – Treasurer Margie Dalton reported that *Gazette* and membership revenue increased last month. The proposed 2003 budget was submitted and will be published in the December *Gazette* and voted on at the December meeting. There are no breakdowns for home tour (not expected to happen), constable (will be self-funding) or Deed Restrictions/GOMO (*ad hoc* committee work is completed) in next year's budget and overall the budget has an approximate \$2800 deficit. There was discussion re expenditures for individual committees. It was moved to amend the beautification budget to include a specific line item of a maximum of \$5000 budgeted for the park at 30<sup>th</sup>/Durham/Randal subject to applying for matching City of Houston funds, which if not approved then \$1500 would be removed from the beautification budget, and subject to finding a project manager to lead the project. The motion was seconded and passed.

### Standing Committee Reports

*Beautification* – Chair Rick Grochoske reported that we are using a new lawn care service to care for our parks. Last month there was a work day at the Rose Garden. He is obtaining pricing estimates for refurbishing the existing neighborhood signs. Contact Rick 713.864.8164 for more information or to volunteer.

*GOCOP* - Chair Carl Waters reported the September crime statistics. Four new patrollers have signed up in the last couple of months, but 2 patrollers also left the program. Contact Carl at 713.864.1992 for more information or to volunteer.

*GardenOaks.org* – Co-Chair Joe Muscara reported that the website is up but it can still use more content.

*Gazette* – Chair Joe Muscara reminded everyone that the deadline for submissions is the 15<sup>th</sup> of every month. The *Gazette* is looking for a new editor and new ad director. *Membership* – Chair Cherry Wolfarth announced that they are about 14 homes short of their 25% goal for the year. It was moved to accept the new membership levels as proposed by the membership committee: Crepe Myrtle, basic household membership, \$25.00 (\$5.00 for seniors); The Magnolia, intermediate level, \$50.00 (\$10.00 for seniors); and The Golden Oak, patron level, \$75.00 (\$15.00 for seniors). The motion was seconded and passed with the modification that seniors are defined as 65 and older. Brenda de Alba won the door prize.

### Ad Hoc Committee Reports

*Fall Festival* – Margie Dalton reported that the Fall Festival was rescheduled and held on 11/3 because of the weather. Since it was still raining, the festival was

held under the school awnings and those who attended had a great time. Thanks to all of the corporate sponsors.

## Other Reports

*Constable Program* – Terry Jeanes reported that the constable patrol was suspended as of 10/4. The constable program will now be a draft program and the new forms are ready. They will begin the program again once 225 supporters have committed and are anticipating reinstating the program at the beginning of the year. They will contact former supports first. *Garden Club* – Robert De Veau reported the next meeting is at 1010 LaMonte and will be on sego palms. Ed de Alba reported that a truck ran into the oak tree in Friendship Garden and the Garden Club has spent about \$250 in evaluation and repair of the tree so far. ## Old Business

President Santos reported that it does not appear that there will be a home tour in 2003 since no one has volunteered to chair the committee and the idea of an event organizer was not well received. It is now almost too late to begin planning for the tour.

## New Business

Shellye Arnold will act as a liaison with the City of Houston to monitor the Buffalo Bayou Project and report back to the Civic Club.

The Nominating Committee for the 2003 officers consisted of David Bell, Craig Lee, Terry Jeanes, and Sheila Briones. The Nominating Committee proposes the following slate of officers: President – Kenneth Santos; Vice President – Josh Hamilton; Treasurer – Margie Dalton; and Secretary – Lori Kennedy. It was moved, seconded and passed to list this slate of officers for the December meeting. It appears that past committee chairs will remain in position except that Chris Lindsay will take over Membership and the *Gazette* is looking for a new editor.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:00 p.m.


