Mr. Davis will also bring along a few sample plants and some blooms for display. Having grown and shown camellias since 1970, Mr. Davis has been actively involved with the Houston Camellia Society, including several terms as President. In addition, he is also Past President of the American Camellia Society and is active in both the Gulf Coast Camellia Society and the International Camellia Society.

Did you know...?

- These gorgeous shrubs are natives of Japan and China.
- Red camellias symbolize intrinsic worth and white blossoms mean loveliness.
- Displayed at Korean weddings as far back as 1200 BC, camellias represent longevity and faithfulness.
- Camellias produce large, elegant, rose-like blossoms that range in color from pale ivory to shell pink to glistening crimson. The flowers come in a variety of shapes and sizes.

The camellia is one of the few shrubs that blooms in the winter months, from about October through April, depending on the species and variety. Throughout the South, they have been highly prized for over 200 years for their lustrous evergreen foliage and exquisite flowers, many of which open to show golden stamens.

The next board meeting of the Friends of Montessori at Garden Oaks, guardians of the Garden Oaks Elementary School Montessori program, will be Tuesday, January 7th at 6:00pm in the school library.

This meeting will include elections for three board positions, President, VP Program Development, and VP Communications. The Communications position will be for only one year as the current holder is retiring when his last child leaves Garden Oaks in June.

It is important for new parents to serve in order to get new ideas on keeping the program going. Please come and participate. Learn what issues are before the Montessori program. Give your opinion and volunteer your time and expertise to benefit our program.

The board of the Friends of Montessori at Garden Oaks Elementary School is made up of program parents and other concerned people who support the functioning of the program and make sure the classrooms and teachers have what they need that is above and beyond the requirements of a conventional HISD classroom. The board members are elected to two year terms by the members of Friends of Montessori at Garden Oaks. The membership is made up of the parents of the children in the program and the Montessori staff at the school.

In its first five years as a pilot program, admissions was based on a first come, first serve basis. There were no preferences given to siblings. Now that the program is no longer a pilot, the admissions policies have been revised to reflect the needs of the community while adhering to current HISD admissions policies. At the request of the current school administration, we considered alternatives to the "camp out" that has characterized the first come, first serve policy. In line with this, the board has settled on a lottery system that will include a sibling preference and a required parent meeting before signing-up for the program. Come to the board meeting to find out more details.

Officer Reports

Treasurer – Treasurer Margie Dalton reported the Constable balance is about \$520 negative because of payment of a final invoice. There have been expenses in the past month for beautification (signs) and the final GOMO/deed restriction committee bill for attorney fees. The overall account balances are still in good shape.

Standing Committee Reports

It was moved, seconded, and passed to accept the budget as published.

Election of 2003 Officers – The nominations committee slate was presented by David Bell. The slate, as previously published, recommended Kenneth Santos for President; Josh Hamilton for Vice-President; Margie Dalton for Treasurer; and Lori Kennedy for Secretary. There were no nominations from the floor. It was moved and seconded to accept the slate as presented; the motion passed.

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
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

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Ladybugs

A few weeks ago my office manager came rushing excitedly into the store. "Mark, Mark, you have got to come outside to see this!" She turned and was back outside in a rush. When I got to the back door she and another associate were out in the sun looking up. Far above us in a corner of the building what seemed like hundreds of ladybugs were crawling all over the walls. They extended from that point clear around the east side of the building. Never have I seen this amount of ladybugs in this setting. I have seen them many times at one of our local nurseries for sale in mesh bags, but never in a swarm. There also seemed to be a nest up in the corner from which they were crawling.

I wasted no time in finding a lidded plastic container, punching holes in it, putting some foliage in the container, and scooping as many ladybugs as possible into it. When I got home that evening I opened the container and let them go in our back yard. The next day at work ladybugs still crawled about so I repeated my actions from the previous day and released them once more at home. A few days ago while moseying about the backyard and beds I spied several of the bugs on the hummingbird bush.

This event brought to mind a time long ago when I lived in Costa Rica. My dad and I were up in one of many mountainside neighborhood developments he surveyed. It was a breezy afternoon and the low moan of the wind rushing through the pine trees gave the then undeveloped terrain a haunting personality. One could almost expect to see a leprechaun come strolling casually out from among the many trees. Then, a ladybug the size of a nickel landed on my shoulder. It looked like a pin and was deep red with black polka dots. It was a fleeting moment as it took wing almost as quickly as it had adorned my life. I have never seen a ladybug of that size since.

If you are interested in biological means for controlling garden pests, ladybugs are an excellent choice to control aphids and leafhoppers. Pesticides are an easy fix and kill beneficial and bad bugs alike. When the bug population ratio gets out of balance, problems may follow. The clouds of mosquitoes we all endured last year are evidence of this.

Among the ranks of good bugs are lacewings, trichogramma wasps, praying mantes, assassin bugs, and spiders. These usually migrate when the food supply is gone or gets very low, so identifying these will guard you from poisoning them. Other control measures are bats, birds, frogs, and lizards; yard beasties that can also be killed by over use of pesticides. Be kind to your surroundings and use pesticides responsibly and sparingly; the bug you eradicate may be the bug you need.

Garden Things for January

- Mulch. This is a year round activity and through the month our plethora of trees give up plenty.
- Hold off on pruning any freeze damage. It is best to wait until the last frost so that you do not encourage any early growth that can be damaged by a late frost.
- I have seen many incidences of brown patch in the neighborhood. Consult your local nursery for a fungicide.
- If you still have any refrigerated tulips put them in early in the month. This is also a great time to plant spring-blooming bulbs.
- Have a great January.

Submitting Plans to GOMO

The Garden Oaks Maintenance Organization, Inc., (or, more popularly, GOMO) is your organization, made up of your neighbors and friends, to help you and your neighbors comply with our neighborhood's deed restrictions.

One of the most important services that GOMO provides to you is a consistent, knowledgeable process for determining deed restrictions compliance. This service, currently free of charge, allows a property owner of any section of Garden Oaks to submit their building plans to GOMO, and have GOMO check the plans for compliance with the Garden Oaks Deed Restrictions. The property owner will then receive a letter, either congratulating the owner for complying with the DRs, or, if there appears to be a potential violation, describing the violation in detail so that the owner can rework the design of the structure in order to be in compliance.

You *must* submit plans to GOMO if your property is in Sections One, Two, Three, or Five and you are

- erecting a new residence or outbuilding of any kind, even for ornamental purposes;
- expanding the 'footprint' (usually means adding on to your existing foundation, whether concrete slab or 'pier-and-beam'/crawlspace) of any existing residence or outbuilding;
- extending the vertical height of your existing residence or outbuildings;
- rebuilding a residence or outbuilding after the original residence or outbuilding has been destroyed/removed/relocated.

Submitting plans to GOMO is strictly voluntary if your property is in Section Four.

You do *not* have to submit plans to GOMO if your construction involves only interior changes to either the residence or outbuilding(s).

Remember, though, that even if you are simply replacing windows, remodeling your kitchen, re-doing electrical/plumbing, etc., you will likely need to get one or more City of Houston building permits of some type, even if you do not have to submit your plans to GOMO. In no case will GOMO acquire City of Houston permits for a property in Garden Oaks, nor does the approval of plans by GOMO imply approval by the City of Houston.

So, if you are looking to finally build that second bedroom at the back of the house, or adding a detached garage, or are rebuilding your residence, contact any of the GOMO Directors listed below, and make arrangements to deliver a non-returnable copy of your plans for approval.

Another important service that GOMO provides to Garden Oaks is the handling of deed restrictions violations.

First, let's understand that there are no paid GOMO managers nor any full-time staff. GOMO is an all-volunteer organization. So, while we do, as part of our volunteer 'job,' try to keep our ears to the ground and our eyes open, we must also rely on you and your neighbors to notice remodeling or new construction, as well as any potential violations.

To that end, GOMO has a process in place to let you and your neighbors keep us informed of construction, remodeling, etc. in the neighborhood. And, like all good processes, we also have a nice form to fill out. This form is available on the GO website, as well as on the Garden Oaks Yahoo! List server (in the 'Files' section). In addition, any of your GOMO Directors will be able to provide a copy of the form to you upon request.

Fill out the form with as much information as you can, and please include your name and contact method (phone, cell, email, etc.), especially if you would like for us to keep you advised of any action/resolution.

In addition, you may also contact one of the GOMO Directors by phone or email (listed below) to leave your information. Again, give as much information as you can, and include a contact method for yourself.

Once we have the information on the form, GOMO will investigate the complaint, and take any action that may be needed.

The identity of the person(s) making the complaint will be kept confidential.

I know this is a lot, but, as with everything else dealing with Garden Oaks Deed Restrictions, if you have any questions, please feel free to contact any GOMO Director listed below.

However, Mr. January is so purrfect he doesn't need any stinking resolutions. Mau Mau says he's got a great resolution. Why does that make me nervous? In the winter it is harder for birds to find food in their natural habitat. As a result, winter is a great time to set up a bird feeder and to enjoy getting to know different birds!

Pet of the Month: "Mr. January" is Henry Points, a one-year-old white Maine Coon cat. Henry lives with his family in Section Two. Henry shares his territory with his parents, Chad and Jenifer, and a yellow Lab named Summer. One day, a cousin George (Orange Tabby) came to visit. Stryder Davis (Doberman) is gaining weight and showing lots of personality. Stryder was a very sick dog a couple of months ago and strayed into the neighborhood. He literally knocked on the Davis door and collapsed. Dodie and Randy took him in, got him vet care, and have spent lots of time nursing him back to health. He is not out of the woods yet but we are hopeful.

Critters 101: Resolutions for Healthier Pets

Resolution #1 Spay or neuter your pet. By doing so, not only do you not add to the horrible problem of pet overpopulation

(five to twelve million animals are euthanized each year in US shelters), but you also decrease the odds of certain health problems.

Resolution #2 Get your pet on a good diet. The quality of your pet's diet has impact on his or her health, and once you switch from a supermarket brand to a premium brand, you will see the difference in your pet's coat.

Resolution #3 Keep your pet well groomed. Keep up with brushing as necessary for your breed and don't let it get away from you. Grooming can be an excellent opportunity to bond with your pet. Healthy cats usually do an adequate job keeping themselves clean, but dogs should be bathed every month or two with a good quality pet shampoo.

Resolution #4 Conduct periodic at home checks on your pet. This is in no way meant to replace his annual exam with a vet. However, take a few minutes every month to nip some potential problems in the bud. First, run your fingers through the coat, against the grain. Does it feel greasy? Is there dandruff? Are there little black specks? Is the skin a normal gray-white, or is it pink (indicating irritation)? After touching the coat, do your fingers smell rancid or fishy? Have there been any changes in stool, water intake, or urination? Do you see wax inside the ears? Do they look oily? Check gums for a red line along the roots (sign of potential disease). Are the teeth brown? Contact your vet if you discover anything unusual.

Resolution #5 Exercise your pet every day. If you have a yard, don't put the dog out to amuse himself, play fetch with him. Take him for walks. If you're out all day, take your dog to doggie daycare or hire a dog walker to exercise him. Not only will these things keep him in shape, but also they'll make him calmer in the house. Likewise, cats need to be exercised. Turn your cat's favorite playthings (ping pong balls, bread bag ties, crumpled paper) into prey by tossing them around and away from your cat. Cats who love to watch birds might be more stimulated trying to catch things in the air. Tie the toy to a piece of string and make it fly above your cat but let him catch it every so often to keep it fun.

Resolution #6 Stimulate your dog through training. Even if your dog has been through puppy kindergarten and knows basic commands, there is more to be learned. Adult dogs find stimulation through taking advanced classes, many trainers offer classes in areas such as agility, fetching, or coming when called. Such classes will benefit your dog by surrounding him with friends, engaging his mind, and strengthening his bond to you.

Resolution #7 Resolve to spend lots of quality time with your pet. Your love and affection will make your pet happier – and thus healthier in the New Year, and all those that follow.

Backyard Report: One of the best ways to get to know birds is to feed them! Put bird feeders where you can see them from a window – hanging from a tree branch, on the ground, or on a deck. (Remember cats can hide in bushes, so place feeders a safe distance from shrubs and bushes). If a bird finds a backyard feeder in Houston that it likes, it may stay for the winter and even may return to the same spot next year! Provide a variety of foods to attract different kinds of birds. Peanut butter is a favorite of Chickadees and Woodpeckers. Cardinals and Blue Jays like sunflower seeds. Goldfinches enjoy Niger seed. Suet is a good, high-energy food for a number of different birds in the winter. Experiment to find out which foods your backyard birds prefer.
