Above and Beyond the Call of "Doo-dy"

We wanted to let other *Gazette* readers know what a gem of a resource we have right here in Garden Oaks. It is **Bone Voyage**, a pet- and house-sitting service run by Casey Farris, serving Garden Oaks and surrounding areas. While we have been very pleased with the service that Casey and her crew, including Dody Davis and Anna Kinton, provide on a regular basis (including dog walking, taking our pets to the vet if we are unable, and giving our pets medicine if we are out of town), one specific incident compelled us to write this article.

We were out of the country recently, and our burglar alarm sounded in the middle of the night. Prior to the police arrival, our alarm company began calling people on our emergency contact list. When the police arrived, they found our door wide open and saw our list of house sitters on our kitchen table. Casey's name was first on the list since Bone Voyage helps care for our animals.

Casey worked with the police officer on the phone to ensure that all of our animals were accounted for and safe. Then, going above and beyond the call of duty (or "doo-dy" as the case may be), Casey got out of her warm bed, trudged over to our house on a cold winter's night, and sat with our frightened dog and three cats for

A recap of the crime reports for last year reflects the following:

There was a total of 103 crimes reported--an increase of 15 from 2001. I have divided them into three subsets: crimes against persons, property crimes, and victimless crimes. There were 10 crimes against persons (6 robberies and 4 assaults), 89 property crimes (46 burglaries, 28 burglaries of motor vehicles, and 15 auto thefts), and four victimless crimes (1 narcotics arrest and 3 driving while intoxicated arrests).

"Queen of the Tropics" Feature Presentation of Garden Club Robert De Veau, Garden Club Vice President

What do rose-of-sharon, okra, cotton, the Confederate rose, hollyhock and tropical hibiscus all have in common? They all belong to the Malvaceae or mallow family. On Thursday, March 13th at 7:00 P.M, the Garden Oaks Garden Club invites you to join us for an informative slide show and lecture presented by Roswell and Patricia Merritt when we will learn more about *Hibiscus rosa-sinensis*, or more commonly, the tropical hibiscus.

Originating in Asia and the Pacific islands, the "Queen of the Tropics" is Hawaii's state flower and the national flower of Malaysia. With thousands of colors and combinations of colors (no true blue or black), some varieties have blossoms as dainty as 2" in diameter while others can reach proportions of 10-12". Some varieties will only grow a foot in several years while others may grow to 15 feet if undisturbed. Singles, doubles, some blooming almost every day — the variation in the tropical hibiscus family is astounding!

Roswell currently serves as President of the American Hibiscus Society (AHS) headquartered in Florida. He has previously served as both its 1st Vice President and Chairman of the Board of Directors. Roz is also the immediate Past President of Houston's Lone Star chapter. His wife Pat is also a Past President of the chapter, and currently serves as the Membership Chairman. She is also the National Secretary of the AHS.

Both Roz and Pat are retired and, strictly as hobbyists, devote a great deal of time to growing approximately 600 varieties of tropical hibiscus. In their spare time, they also grow about 75 roses and play duplicate bridge at least twice a week. They live on a regular corner lot in the Meyerland area of southwest Houston.

In February, club members and guests were treated to a very informative presentation with Bob and Lana Beyer. These avid gardeners and "collectors" have over 400 different plants in their backyard garden. A collection of that size poses many challenges, but this husband and wife team is undaunted. One secret to their successful collection is "plant insurance." Whenever they acquire a new and rare plant, they share a cutting with a friend. That way, if something should happen to the original plant, they can get a replacement cutting. They shared not only their knowledge but also came prepared to give away six door prizes of *agave univittata*. 
Our own Deputy is still suspended. What can change this? YOU and only YOU! For many years, the constable program has run with the support of many of our neighbors, but now it is on hold. Until we have 225 commitments for the draft program (see the enclosed insert), we cannot proceed. The cost is only \$20 per month, and this draft format will only begin when we have the needed commitments. The program has fallen short in the past because many forget to send in their contributions, and others wonder why they should pay when they have seen a constable driving our streets. Therefore, the program payment option is to draft. The program is on hold until the citizens of Garden Oaks step up to the plate. This means you! If you have already sent your form, we thank you. Please encourage your neighbors to do so as well. Simply take the enclosed form, jot a note, and encourage others to help.

Remember: We can have our own professional law enforcement officer for 40 hrs per week, for only \$20 per month. This includes vacation watches, alarm response calls, and home security checks for insurance discounts.

Recent research has found that inflammation is linked to the diseases that are killing millions of Americans: heart disease, diabetes and cancer. Inflammation is thought to weaken the fatty deposits, which could cause them to enter the blood stream leading to a heart attack or stroke. Inflammation can be measured with a test that checks for C-reactive protein (CRP). CRP is a chemical that is necessary for fighting injury and infection.

Diet and exercise can lower CRP levels dramatically, as well as cholesterollowering drugs called statins. Here are a few of the inflammation stoppers that you can incorporate in your lifestyle today.

Eat more of the good fats. Not all fats are created equal. Monounsaturated fats can actually help to fight inflammation. Foods high in monounsaturated fat include salmon, flaxseed, walnuts, avocados and olive oil. Remember the extra calories from these fats should be balanced with a cut in fat elsewhere such as less salad dressing or oil used during cooking.

Skip trans fats. Look for hydrogenated or partially hydrogenated on the food label or try some of the products below.



Critter Corner

Casey and Mau Mau Farris

Happy March everybody! My household is nearing the finish line of our remodeling project and it looks like we will survive with just the one injury (mine). Mau Mau has become a pro at sleeping through the construction noises and has a recommendation this month for feline relaxation. And how many times have you heard "We can't get a dog until we get a place with a yard"? Putting a dog in a yard does not guarantee the dog's happiness. In fact, the opposite is often true. This month we will discuss the fallacies of leaving your dog in the back yard, as well as tips to prevent squirrels from raiding your bird feeders. Our Pet of the Month is a real philanthropist and was mentioned three times on public radio last month, I swear!

Critters 101: Backyard Blues

Many people think of a back yard as a cure-all for dogs. In reality, the yard can be a cause-all, leading to all sorts of behavior problems.

Dogs confined to fenced yards for long periods of time, especially when kept chained, can develop behavior problems known collectively as "fenced yard syndrome." Basically, this means the pet is miserable. Hyperactivity, insecurity, aggression and panic are some of the traits common to dogs in confinement. These traits may manifest themselves in habits that can be as annoying for your neighbors as they are for you, such as excessive barking, digging, or threatening anyone who comes near your property.

Another fallacy of back yard believers: a canine left loose in a fenced area will exercise itself. The dangerous irony in having a back yard is that it can lead to "lazy owner syndrome," wherein the person imagines the yard to be some kind of automatic aerobics arena. Perhaps you've heard someone say, "I don't have time to take Rover for a walk, but that's okay. He's got the whole yard to run around in." It's not as if dogs know they're supposed to run laps to burn off excess energy. No, canines need company and exercise, and providing both is the job of a

responsible pet owner.

Dogs are extremely social animals, and they crave contact with humans and other dogs. A dog deprived of companionship and activity becomes bored, frustrated and stressed. Not only does the dog feel lonely when everyone leaves the house, but when people are gone the dog's territorial instinct tells him to protect the property. He does the best he can to act on his feelings of responsibility by barking incessantly, or by lunging aggressively at anyone who comes near.

A dog that is chained up feels even more stress because his ability to defend his turf is so limited. Being vulnerable in this way makes him doubly reactive: he'll bark, dig, chew, and even eat faeces. And the bad habits that the dog develops in this situation end up cruelly perpetuating his banishment to the back yard.

Used as a safe retreat where your dog can burn off some calories, entertain company (you), and bask in outdoor sights and smells, a yard can be a paradise for a dog. But it can become a prison for your pet if it takes the place of regular walks through the neighborhood, socializing with other dogs, or time spent indoors with family members.

Pet of the Month

"Ms. March" is Murphy Austin (aka Murphy the Wonder Dog). She is a five-year-old American white dog with a brown spot. Backyard Report

If the squirrels are raiding your bird feeders and you don't want them to, here are a couple of suggestions. Distract them away from feeders by setting aside a few dried corncobs just for them. If your bird feeder is on a pole, run your feeder pole lengthwise through the cen-

ter of a slinky. Attach the slinky to the top of the pole and let the rest of it hang. Squirrels will try to climb up the slinky, but will get dumped back down to the ground. You can also mount your feeder on top of a length of PVC pipe. Squirrels won't get any traction when they try to climb it, and will slide off. If you have a hanging feeder, you can buy a clear plastic dome and place it directly above the feeder. Squirrels planning a raid from the top of your feeder will slip right off. Also, try switching from sunflower seeds to safflower seeds. This diet is popular with cardinals, house finches, chickadees, nuthatches and mourning doves, but the safflower doesn't appeal to squirrels.

Dear Mau Mau: Is catnip safe for cats? C. Allen Catnip is an herb belonging to the mint family, which has been used by cats for hundreds of years. It is stimulating and relaxing at the same time. All species of cats react to Catnip, even lions, but not every individual cat reacts to it. The deciding factor is genetic. Scientists assert that it does no lasting damage and has no ill effects. Hey, it's safe, non-fattening, and they sell it at Walgreen's. I even like catnip on my pizza! Mau Mau
