

With patriotism running at such a fever pitch, what could be more fitting than reviving the Garden Oaks 4th of July Bicycle Parade to show support for our troops in the Middle East? Putting political opinions aside, this is a wonderful opportunity to show our pride in being Americans and for honoring those who serve our country.

Watch for more detailed information regarding this summer neighborhood event in the June Gazette. Currently, we are planning to have at least four entry categories: strollers, tricycles, youth bicycles, and adult bicycles. A shorter parade route is planned for strollers and tricycles than for bicycles. Prizes will be awarded for different categories of decorations.

The short parade route will begin at the Garden Oaks Elementary Spark Park, proceed north on Sue Barnett, circle the Gazebo Park from the east, and return south on Sue Barnett back to the Spark Park. The longer parade route will duplicate the shorter route, except the route will continue west on the 800 block of W 41st St instead of returning to the Spark Park, turn right on Alba, turn right and continue east on the 800 block of W. 42nd St., turn right on Sue Barnett and then back to the Spark Park. If you live along the parade route, please pull up a chair in your front yard and cheer for the bikers.

Beautification – Chair Rick Grochoske reported there were 2 good workdays in March, including a cleanup along Yale street. Thanks to all who participated! Workdays are scheduled for 4/5/03 at the Gazebo park and 5/3/03 for the boulevard. Both begin about 9:00 a.m. Trees of Houston donated the trees being planted along the soundwall. TxDOT has donated the labor to plant the trees and will take care of watering the trees for the first 2 years. The Civic Club may need to consider future maintenance if we want the trees to continue to look good for the neighborhood. There is no update on the park at 30th and Durham. Craig Lee suggested that the committee consider planting trees or shrubs along the back of the warehouses that back up to the section 1 railroad. Citizens on Patrol

For those of you who are not part of the Garden Oaks List Serve., here are two crime-related items that were on it last month. A window peeper was reported on Tuesday, March 25, in the 1000 block of Lamonte Ln. The victim stated that she heard a rustling sound outside her bedroom window, and later found that the hedges outside her window had been mashed down. The second item appears to be related to an ongoing problem concerning a former resident of Garden Oaks. The individual is described as a white male about 40 years old, with brown hair and brown eyes, between 5' 6" and 5' 9". He has been going door-to-door in sections 4 and 5 asking for money (usually \$10 to \$20). Since he knows the neighborhood, he has been able to get money by using the names of other neighbors.

Our patroller of the month is **Lewis Goodkouski**. Lewis has lived in Garden Oaks for twenty years. Prior to becoming a patroller, Lewis served as a docent on Home Tour, helped with recycling, and currently delivers the Gazette on his block. He reported that side benefits of patrolling include checking out the latest construction and landscaping in the neighborhood, and listening to CDs. Lewis has worked for SBC (formerly Southwestern Bell) for thirty years. He is a member of the Second Baptist Church on Woodway where he sings tenor in the choir and in two smaller groups. He received a B.A. in music last December from the University of Houston. Lewis reported that his current challenge has been organizing his annual family reunion of 130 relatives, a task he has been doing for the last seven years. Lewis also reported that he earned a black belt in Karate in 1994.

In addition to getting their names in the Gazette, our Patrollers of the Month receive a \$25 gift certificate to the location of their choice. Our patrollers last month, the Carlins, have instructed me to use their certificate to buy a gas card to be given to the next party who signs up to become a patroller. In order to get the card, the party must complete all orientation meetings, and begin patrolling. OK, who out there is interested in \$25 worth of free gas?


Constable Report June 1 Deadline

Our constable program is still suspended, although draft enrollment forms are trickling in. Currently, *June 1* is the deadline for reinstating the program. We need a total of 225 commitments for the \$20 per month draft program, to ensure that Garden Oaks will have a private constable on patrol for 40 hours per week. The constable program will allow Garden Oaks residents benefits such as: vacation watches, security evaluations (which also help reduce homeowners insurance), calls to the constable's office made by your alarm company if necessary, and overall faster response time for calls made to the constable's office. But we are still falling short of commitments to the draft program. There is an insert in this Gazette that you can fill out and send in. There is also a form on the Garden Oaks Website (www.gardenoaks.org) that you can fill out. The task is at hand, and the clock is ticking.

The beds were also mulched with pine straw.

In Memoriam: Christine Winkelmann

Garden Oaks lost a treasured neighbor on April 7 with the passing of Section 1 resident, Christine Winkelmann. Christine was the last remaining member of the neighborhood's original Garden Club, and served as the Garden Club Treasurer for many consecutive years. She also, along with several other Section 1 ladies, helped establish Friendship Garden, located at Lawrence and W. 30th St. These women lovingly planned, planted, and maintained the garden's flowerbeds for many years, even hauling gallons of water in the trunks of their cars to provide water to the plants. They became lifelong friends, bonded through their love of gardening and the partnership they forged maintaining the lovely green space they later named "Friendship Garden" in 1987. Christine moved to Garden Oaks in 1945 and is survived by her son, Tom, three grandsons, and two great-grandsons.

Christine was 87 years young and a very practical, "hands on" gardener. A number of us learned a great deal from Christine's no-nonsense approach to gardening. She freely and generously shared her knowledge and plants with others. She will be greatly missed, although she is surely tending Heaven's gardens with the same enthusiasm she did during her stay on Earth.

Yesterday, Today, Tomorrow

Sounds a little Victorian, right? But this is the common name for *Brunfelsia calycina floribunda*. I have mentioned this shrub in the past, but have never emphasized its place in the landscape. I have not seen many in the neighborhood front yards, but perhaps they are hiding in the back like mine.

The name "Yesterday, Today, Tomorrow" (Y.T.T.), comes from the way in which its flowers change from deep violet-blue, to lavender, and lastly to white, in about three day's time. Y.T.T. is an evergreen shrub that blooms a few weeks after the colorful shock from the azaleas has faded from our yards and the amaryllis are in their final throes of displaying their gorgeous and tenuous jewels.

Y.T.T. likes a warm but sheltered landscape area, but also benefits from morning sun. Mine lives on the east side of the garage where it receives a bit of water from my leaky hose; it does not like soggy soil, though. Afternoon sun protection is a must, as is protection from the cold. However, I have never covered my Y.T.T. in the winter, and it has never suffered. It will need a light pruning after it flowers, which will also help return some shape to the shrub. Later in the season, I will take some time to pluck as many seed pods from its branches that I can find, so that it can dedicate its energy to revitalizing itself.

Y.T.T. can reach a size of about six feet tall by four feet wide and is not a difficult plant to grow. Mine has been going for years, becoming more florally prolific as it has aged. Y.T.T likes a fertile soil and about three yearly applications of a balanced fertilizer, the availability of which is best in the spring.

I like to increase my plant holdings through propagation, though I have never attempted it with my Y.T.T. Propagation is possible through the use of hardwood cuttings taken in the summer, or by rooting the tips. Ground layering would work just as well for Y.T.T. as it does with azaleas. The ground layering process is simple: Slice off about an inch length of bark from the underside of a limb that is close enough to touch the ground, and dust it with a rooting hormone. Cut a shallow trench in the soil and place the prepared portion of the branch in the trench. Cover this with dirt and place a brick or a similar weight over the area to keep the branch from coming free. In a few months, roots will have formed. Cut the branch from the main plant, and carefully dig it up and place it in an appropriate location in your landscape.

Recently, while weeding under my Y.T.T., I came across several small plants

sheltered by their mom. At first I thought that some unseen seeds had fallen and germinated. When I went to dig them out to use in other areas of the back yard, I was very surprised to find that these youngsters had sprouted from their mother's roots! I have yet to find any literature that explains this particular occurrence, but I carefully removed the small plants, along with their nicely developed root systems, and gave them a new home. (Maybe some are available to those who want some.) Happy Mothers Day to all the mothers in our collective garden.

Garden Things for May

- Get a jump on protecting your lawns against chinch bugs. A well-watered lawn is the key.
- Brown patch can be caused by too much water, so be observant of the tell-tale mark of an ever growing patch of brown grass. Consult your local nursery, and keep a fungicide on hand for prompt treatment in the event your lawn is affected. Early detection of brown patch will minimize its spread.
- Continue setting in your warm weather plants, which now out in full force in garden centers and specialized nurseries.
- To mention a few warm weather plants, look for cuphea, buddleia, coreopsis, gazania (this has performed very well for me in the past), lambs ear, cleome, yarrow, hummingbird bush, ice plant, etc. We have some great nurseries nearby. Take advantage of their often unique offerings.
- Fruits and veggies? Tomatoes, peppers, cantaloupe, cucumbers, squash—you name it!
- Start or add to your herb gardens: Basil, of course, thyme, oregano, potted mints, rosemary, and so many more.
- There is so much to do and so many varieties available that you will have no problem with selection.



When Your Cravings Hit

- During the mid-afternoon slump (from about 3-6 p.m.). During this time, our blood glucose drops, making us feel sluggish and in need of a lift. Solution: Eat a planned, healthy, afternoon snack.
- When we're stressed out, upset, or bored. We think we will feel better if we eat a cookie or candy bar. Carbohydrates increase the secretion of the brain chemical serotonin, which, in turn, can improve our mood. Remember, however, that this improvement is only short term.
- Before a menstrual period. Women actually need more calories premenstrually, and raising serotonin levels can help to counter PMS.
- When it's cold or dark outside, to help us feel better.
- When we're accustomed to eating. One study found that we often crave foods with associations to happy times we've had in the past.

How to Manage Your Cravings

- Balance. Eat carbohydrates, protein and a little fat at every meal and snack. If your meal or snack is balanced, you are less likely to crave what you are missing. Eating a varied diet will help you feel better, and give you an increase in energy and concentration. When meals are monotonous you are more likely to have cravings.
- **Don't skip meals.** If you skip breakfast or lunch you are almost guaranteed to have a craving later in the day. Think ahead and plan a healthy breakfast, lunch, and dinner, as well as snacks.
- Crave-proof your home and office. Ban craveworthy foods from your environment. If you buy snack foods like chips or cookies, buy them in individually-wrapped portions to avoid going overboard.

- Address your stress!! If food cravings hit when you're anxious or stressed, seek consolation in other ways. What is it that you really need?
- Get moving! Exercise releases the same feelgood endorphins that sugar does. Studies show that people who work out regularly binge less and have fewer cravings, because they get their endorphin rush through exercise.
- **Give in sometimes.** If the craving is persistent, denying yourself that cookie or bag of chips will only make the urge more intense. Allow yourself a moderate portion of the food you crave, but decide on the amount before you dig in.

Critter Corner

Casey and Mau Mau Farris

May is here and no doubt you are barefoot or wearing sandals. Did you know that the average person walks the equivalent of four and-a-half times around the earth in a lifetime? It's a good time to step up your foot care, and while you are at it, jump in with both feet and take a look at your pet's paws too. This month we give "step-by-step" instructions on how to clip those nails whether your pet likes it or not. Our pet of the month never has cold feet because her name is Shoes. And speaking of under foot, Mau Mau explains why cats always land on their feet. Our backyard report focuses on an insect with some pretty fancy footwork.

Critters 101: Foot Notes

The pads on dogs' feet are very sensitive. This is one of the few areas on the dog that actually sweats, and it is also an area that is prone to injury. If your pet frequently moves across a rough surface, the pads may get worn down or cut. Pads will bleed profusely – and hurt. As a general rule, any time there is any kind of swelling of your dog's toes or feet, it is important to visit your veterinarian. Swelling can be indicative of bacterial or fungal infection, broken bones, foreign bodies, allergies, and even tumors.

Nails that are not kept short will grow too long and become irritating and painful to the dog. Long nails can also cause

the feet to splay, or spread, and can actually curl around and grow into a dog's pads. When you hear the telltale "click-click" as your dog walks across the floor, you know it's that time again – time to trim the toenails. If your pet is not used to having his nails trimmed, start slowly and work up to it gradually

Another really common foot problem that our poor dogs are subjected to is injury from improper toenail trimming. Before you start trimming, determine how much needs to be trimmed. The basic rule of thumb is that the nail, which curls downward, should be even with the paw pad. Anything longer must be clipped. For medium and large dogs, use guillotine-type nail clippers. For small dogs and puppies, use the scissor-type nail clippers. Hold your dog's foot and gently push down with your thumb at the base of each nail. This will cause the nail to extend slightly, making it easier for you to see the nail. Trim each nail at a 45-degree angle away from the dog so that the newly cut nail is flush with the floor when they walk.

There is a blood vessel, called the quick, in each nail. Do not cut into the quick or it will bleed and could be painful. If this happens, apply a dab of styptic powder (available at pet stores), or use cornstarch. The pinkish color of the quick is easy to see in dogs with light-colored nails. However, it is almost impossible to see the quick on dark nails. Try to locate the quick from the underside of each nail before you begin cutting. Cut each nail just a little at a time until you get close, but not right up to, the quick. The good news is that the more diligent you are about trimming, the more the quick will regress into the nail, allowing you to cut shorter each time.

Even though they sometimes stink, remember that feet serve a serious purpose in all animals and may be more important than you think. The condition of an animal's feet can often tell you how healthy it is.

Pet of the Month

"Ms. May" is a Snowshoe cat named Shoes. A Snowshoe is a variant from Siamese parents. Shoes is basically a Siamese with four white feet. Like most Siamese, Shoes is a talker. Dear Mau Mau: Why do cats land on their feet? D. Thomasson

Cats have exceptional coordination, balance, and flexibility, and we are not afraid of heights like some people I know. But contrary to popular belief, we do not always land on our feet and can sustain serious injuries. However, we have the ability to right ourselves in midair thanks to the vestibular apparatus deep in our inner ears. This righting reflex appears in kittens at three to four weeks and is perfected by seven weeks. We are such marvelous creatures! *Mau Mau*

Backyard Report

Bees are of inestimable value as agents of cross-pollination, and many plants are entirely dependent on particular kinds of bees for their reproduction. Bee venom has also been found to have medicinal properties. Bees need to pollinate to keep flower population high so they can have nectar to create honey. Bees suck up nectar with their tongues, and while they are drinking, the nectar pollen sticks to the hair on their bodies and legs. The bees then fly to other flowers, and the pollen rubs off of the bees and onto the flowers' pistils. Then the flowers are pollinated with pollen from other flowers. All bees do not collect pollen, however. Only worker bees live out their three-month life span collecting pollen. If the bees are male drones, they spend their time mating and getting in the way. If the bees are queen bees they lay eggs to keep up the hive population.
