

Randall Park Workday

Garden Oaks had a great workday at Randall Park on Saturday, May 17. More than 20 neighbors showed up to help get the park ready for September planting! Together, we accomplished the following tasks:

- Tilled the original soil next to 30th St.—four tillers were running most of day.
- Spread 35 cubic yards of compost mix (about four inches deep) on the entire area. Imagine how many wheel barrels that is!
- Tilled the compost into the existing soil. We now have a great planting bed waiting for planting day
- Installed a "dry creek" next to the sidewalk
- Set five boulders totaling more than 6,500 pounds—that's 31/2 tons! The large rocks will serve as focal points in the park and discourage folks from driving around the berm.
- Cleaned the park to get ready to install a water sprinkler system.

We also received an unexpected visit by Horizon Landscaping. One of the owners, also a Houston Fire fighter, had stopped at the Sonic for a cold drink, and came by and asked if we needed any help. He volunteered to donate the water sprinkler materials (excluding the controller) to the Civic Club. This donation is valued at approximately \$1,000!

This project is open to all neighborhood volunteers, whether they want to help fund the project, or volunteer their sweat and labor at the workday.

Neighborhood Forum

We are happy to announce a new feature of the Garden Oaks web site that we have been working on for awhile: the neighborhood discussion boards, or forums. Accessible through the "Involvement" section of the Garden Oaks web site, these web-based forums are available for residents to post messages and have discussions about any number of topics. I have already posted information about the forum setup in a "Welcome" forum, but will reiterate a few points here for those residents not yet familiar with the forum.

Those interested in joining the neighborhood forum must first register and be approved by an administrator in order to post messages. Anyone can read what is posted, however, without going through the initial registration process. We will approve anyone who is a Garden Oaks resident or property owner. All others will be considered on a case-by-case basis.

Forum usernames must be clearly based on the user's real name. For example, my username is simply Joe Muscara, and the other moderator's username is Robert De Veau. No one should be anonymous in a neighborhood forum, as anonymity just allows for cowardice and crass remarks. Besides, we have to know who you are in order to approve you!

Your personal information will only be used to set up your account. You will determine what other users can see in your profile when you register, and you can update your profile at any time once your registration has been approved.

During the registration process, users will be asked to supply a location for themselves. All we ask that anyone provide here is his or her section number. When entering the information, simply type the word "section" and the number. For example, my Location says "Section 2". We don't need anything more specific than that, as we feel it is unnecessary to post your exact street address anywhere on the forum.



Minutes of the May 6, 2003 Civic Club Meeting

President Kenneth Santos called the meeting to order at 7:08 p.m. The March minutes were accepted as published.

Officer Reports

Treasurer – Treasurer Margie Dalton reported the account balances are fine. Membership revenue and *Gazette* advertising income has still been good this month.

Standing Committee Reports

Beautification – Chair Rick Grochoske reported there were two good workdays last month - a BIG thanks to all who helped! Craig Kraemer and Matt Rasher presented a landscape plan for the park at 30th and Durham. The plan was designed with a landscape architect and utilizes native plants. Section 1 has already begun fundraising efforts to raise money for purchasing the plants. Kelly Mathews hosted a fundraising party at her house and raised \$1565 for the park. Sean and Beth Jez have agreed to donate the other half of the cost for the water tap fees. The committee will contact Trees of Houston to discuss possible donations. They are working on a neighborhood phone directory and Jane Hamilton is organizing the cookbook project. Tina Sabuco won the door prize.

Ad Hoc Committee Reports

4th of July Bike Parade - Sheila Briones reported that Brenda de Alba still needs volunteers to help with the parade (staffing tables, getting prizes, coordinating entries, etc.). The parade will start at the Spark Park and refreshments will be provided. Contact Brenda at 713-694-5934 for more

Home Tour - Sheila Briones announced that she has volunteered to chair the committee for the 2004 home tour. The tour will be Sunday April 18, 2004, from 12:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. She has recruited many volunteers but others are still needed. The home/garden selection process will begin around September. This coming year the home tour and the Garden Club will partner with the GO Elementary School to involve the school kids in gardening projects; the school will be a scheduled stop on the tour. Terry Jeanes moved to allot \$2700 to the home tour committee to use as start up funds for the 2004 tour. The motion was seconded and passed.

Other Reports

Constable – Terry Jeanes announced that June 1 is still the "drop dead" date to restart the program. There is an insert in the May Gazette listing commitments received to date; if you are not listed, then your commitment hasn't been recorded.

Garden Club – Vice President Robert De Veau announced the Garden Club had a workday at Friendship Park and planted 2 camellias in memory of Christine Winkleman, a founding member. On May 17, they are having a neighborhood garden tour in lieu of their regular monthly meeting. The Garden Club is also creating a long-term partnership with GO Elementary School to encourage gardening for the kids, and it will include participation in the home tour next year. GOMO - President Sam Stengler announced they have approved 20-30 plans over the last couple of months. Home Tour Partners with Garden Club and Garden Oaks Elementary

Across the country, schoolyard gardens have become compelling centerpieces for integrating gardening and science, nurturing creativity and providing raw materials for a host of projects. I am very proud that the 2004 Tour will be a part of *Achieving the Best in our Children (ABC's)*.

To open young eyes to the wonders of Mother Nature, the 2004 Home & Garden Tour Committee has partnered with the Garden Club to help cultivate and revive the gardens at Garden Oaks Elementary. The school's gardens have been selected as a stop on the 2004 Home and Garden Tour, scheduled for Sunday, April 18, from 12 noon to 6 p.m. The Garden club plans to revive and possibly begin new cultivation of the nine gardens scattered throughout the school grounds.

Garden Club vice president, Robert DeVeau, will serve as the liaison between the Home Tour committee and the elementary school, and has committed to researching and applying for grant money toward the development and expansion of the school gardens.

"It is our hope that these gardens will cultivate student creativity and open up their minds to the wonders that Mother Nature has to offer," says Robert.

This program will allow students to study the gardens and observe the amazing insect world, the migration of birds and butterflies, and the seasonal changes of plants. Through all of the excitement, students will find that learning is both fun and rewarding.

This outdoor classroom will become a vehicle for learning about not only science, but history, math, fine arts, social studies, and language arts as well. Working with the gardens will give the students opportunites to observe, predict, and analyze. These activities will also provide a springboard for creative writing, poetry, and art.

Garden Oaks Elementary principal, Jeff Amerson states, "Without question, the gardens not only provide a means for *what* is taught, but also for *how* concepts are taught through hands-on experience. Our job as educators is to teach concepts, as well as a love of learning. These garden-related learning experiences will help many of our students develop a love for nature and a thirst for knowledge that will last a lifetime."

The 2004 Tour currently needs volunteers to serve on the Executive Committee. There are also Chair openings in the following committees:

- **Graphics Committee** in charge of developing all printed materials including posters, day-of-tour tickets, and pre-sale tickets.
- **Set Up Committee** in charge of working with Tour home and garden owners with crowd flow and control.
- **Pre-sale Tickets & Poster Distribution Committee** in charge of securing pre-sale ticket locations and distributing Tour posters to neighboring businesses.
- Staffing/Volunteers Committee in charge of recruiting 100-125 volunteers to act as guides, ticket takers, and greeters at each Tour home and garden.
- Concessions Committee in charge of securing ice chests, water, ice, and soft drinks for sale at each Tour Stop and Command Center
- Communications Committee in charge of calling/emailing reminders of upcoming Executive Committee meetings and is also in charge of "Tour Hotline" number.



Fifty Rings

Several weeks ago, I came home and found it impossible to park inside our gate. An old ash tree on the other side lost a rather large limb during a storm that had swept through earlier in the day. The next morning, I went outside to survey the situation and remove the limb as best I could manage. The ash tree was rendered horribly lopsided, and a very long branch was left arching over the house next door. Images of destruction loomed in my mind, as well as the difficulty our neighbor and we would experience waltzing around with our respective insurance companies. We had the ash removed a week later, impacting our bank account and the general look of the back yard. Before the stump was ground out, I counted fifty rings. I felt sick. Six days later, a major limb from the oak tree in the front yard fell across our driveway. (Thanks to the neighbors who attempted to move it so that we could enter the property. Talk about dead weight.) The tree removal crew from the week before came out to remove it and the stump. Events occurring in threes loomed large in my mind, and I remain fearful of loosing more limbs. To aggravate my premonitions, a large cherry laurel collapsed over the fence at the intersection of the 610 loop and Ashland. Most of you in Section One who use that exit have probably seen it.

The sight of that cherry laurel and other limbs that began adorning the curbs of our neighborhood in May reminded me of an admonition from the tree expert we have used for years: "Trees in developed areas live far less than out in the open. At some point decline will set in."

The tree service we have used since moving to Garden Oaks specializes in saving trees—removal being the last course of action. However, they will not hesitate to suggest removal when it becomes necessary. Every year, they evaluate our trees, clean out mistletoe, trim up damage from over the year, and feed the oak. This collective grove we all live in needs our constant attention if our trees are going to flourish to their fullest, healthiest potential.

One of the biggest problems we confront with our trees is insufficient watering, especially now that the hot summer is setting in. Watering in the morning yields the best results because doing so allows time for the water to seep into the soil instead of evaporating. Our tree service has suggested digging eighteen-inch deep weep holes in the ground under our trees' drip zones. These are then filled with gravel and topped off with topsoil. Once the holes are filled, the grass is replaced on top. When the lawn is watered, moisture will be able to further penetrate the ground and be of more use to the tree rather than the lawn alone. Before digging this deep however, contact Texas One Call at 1-800-545-6005 at least 48 hours prior to any dig-

ging. Crews will come out to locate and mark where all manner of utility, gas, water, and sewer lines run to help avoid a terrible accident.

Caring for our trees will preserve the coveted uniqueness of our neighborhood. Nothing alters the appearance of our properties as quickly as the loss of a tree. The visual impact is as bad as missing a front tooth. Water smart, and water well.

Garden Things for June

- Last chance to prune and feed those azaleas. Finish this task before the middle of the month. Buds for next spring's show begin to slowly set.
- Fertilize your color beds.
- If you still have summer color waiting for a home in your garden, get these placed as soon as possible. A well-established plant will have better odds of surviving once the summer heat sets in.
- Late into the month, fertilize trees and shrubs. Any fertilizer with a 1:1:1 ratio will do.
- Start cutting your grass higher. This will keep moisture in the ground and shade the roots. Mulch those clippings and leaves—it is always a shame to see all the free grass food discarded on the side of the road.
- Be safe in your gardening. Hydrate yourself before going out to work in the heat, and drink water whenever you are thirsty. Don't forget about sunscreen, either.



Ginger Can Spice up the Garden

Beth Galiano, member and past president (several times) of the Shepherd Park Plaza Garden Club has volunteered at Mercer Arboretum and Botanic Gardens for thirteen years, where she grew and managed gingers for the annual Mercer March Mart. During this stint, she authored a booklet, "The Gingers of Mercer," and aptly earned the nickname, "The Ginger Lady."

On Thursday, June 12, Beth will share her love and knowledge of all things ginger. These plants enjoy a special position in the botanical kingdom, due to their elegant form and texture, sparkling color, and amazing symmetry. The word "ginger" conjures up images of an exotic oriental food flavoring. However, edible ginger is only one of approximately 1,300 species of the very diverse Zingiberacae family.

Classed as an herbaceous perennial, gingers have enjoyed popularity as an ornamental plant in Asia and the Far East for centuries. Only recently have they become known as outstanding ornamentals in the U.S. As a group, gingers add outstanding exotic foliage and flowers to the landscape. Depending on the type of plant, gingers can thrive in partial shade, full sun, or full shade. Many also perform very well in containers, and are finding favor as interior landscape plants.

On Saturday, May 17, Garden Club members and their guests spent the morning touring six member gardens. Everyone had a great time and agreed that this would become an annual Garden Club event. Amidst a relaxed atmosphere, everyone was free to roam the yards of the six participants. Members and guests asked questions, shared cuttings, and expanded their knowledge base. Notes from GOMO

We thought we would take some time this month to provide some information regarding items about which we are frequently asked.

Fence Regulations

The Garden Oaks deed restrictions do not regulate the type of fence, or the height of a fence. The restrictions only state, under "Architectural Restrictions" that "No fence, wall, hedge, nor any pergola, nor any detached structure for ornamental purposes shall be erected, grown, or maintained forward of the front building line of said lot without the consent of the Company."

How does GOMO relate to the Garden Oaks Company and/or the former Board of Trustees?

This is often confusing, as there are numerous references to "the Company" throughout the deed restrictions. "The Company" referred to in the restrictions is the old Garden Oaks Company, owned by Mr. E. L. Crain, the original developer of Garden Oaks and several other neighborhoods in Houston. **GOMO is not the Garden Oaks Company, nor is it the Board of Trustees.** GOMO does not have the powers that are listed in the original deed restrictions as given to "the Company." GOMO's ability to enforce deed restrictions and assess the Transfer Assessment was given to it through the vote in favor of the Amendment A to the original restrictions. In addition, there are powers that the Texas Property Statutes give to GOMO, from sections 204, 201, and others, such as the ability to form an architectural control committee.

This means, among other things, that GOMO cannot grant variances, even in the specific instances mentioned in the restrictions where the original Company could grant them, such as with 'unusual or irregular shaped lots', or in the case of outbuildings being taller or having a greater number of stories than the residence.

Remember also, that GOMO can enforce deed restrictions in Sections One, Two, Three, and Five only. Though Section Four does have deed restrictions, the homeowners must be their own enforcement group until such time as they vote differently. GOMO will answer questions and give advice about building or remodeling plans for Section Four, but the organization can not pass or reject these plans.

Tree Removal

Trees are not a part of Garden Oaks deed restrictions, but there is a new city policy regarding reforestation. If you have questions, call 311 for the City's information department, and they will send you to the correct city department. As we learn more about this new city policy, we'll report any information in the *Gazette*.

Backyard Report

Tax-Deductible Fees for Obese Americans

The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) released the Revenue Ruling 2002-19 last spring, stating that "weight loss programs may be tax-deductible when prescribed by a physician for the treatment of disease."

Americans diagnosed as obese by a physician may deduct health club fees as medical expenses on their income tax returns. Membership fees can also be paid through a "health flexible spending arrangement" offered through your employer. Under this plan, members are allowed to spend part of their salary, tax-free, on medical expenses.

The IRS will review a number of factors to determine whether of not a health club offering a weight loss program is automatically a provider. Factors include location of the club, types of activities offered, services included in the membership fee, and whether or not the taxpayer would be able to safely fulfill their exercise needs without having to join a facility. Expenses such as nutrition counseling and other healthcare services are also covered if a doctor assigns services for the treatment of a medical condition, including obesity. The IRS uses clinical guidelines to determine if a person is obese. According to the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute's clinical guidelines, people with a Body Mass Index (BMI) of 30 or greater are considered obese. Physicians calculate the BMI to determine a person's total fat content by dividing an individual's body weight, in kilograms, by the square of his or her height in meters.

Summer is the perfect time to start up an exercise program. Due to the hot weather in Houston, an air-conditioned gym is a great place to be. Studies show that people eat better when they are exercising regularly. You will think twice about eating that doughnut when you know that it will take 30 minutes on the treadmill to burn it off.
