Randy Pace, Preservation Officer, City of Houston, was the guest speaker at the October Civic Club meeting. His presentation brought enthusiasm and education about the rich history of Garden Oaks to a room full of homeowners. Randy's discovery that the famous landscape design firm of Hare & Hare designed the Garden Oaks landscape for developer E.L. Crain nourished a sense of pride and appreciation for our beautiful community. The landscape architectural firm of Hare & Hare was a nationally recognized landscape design company based in Chicago, IL and was important in shaping Houston's public image. Hare and Hare worked with Houston's Parks Department and City Planning Department resulting in most of the city's parks including Memorial Park and Hermann Park. The firm also designed and assisted with plat formations in River Oaks, campuses for the University of Houston (1937-1950); University of Texas at Austin (1932-1939); Woodland Park, Cherryhurst and many other well-known Houston locations. 
GO Elementary a school we can all be proud of.

Butterflies are Free

A butterfly garden is an easy way to both see more butterflies and to contribute towards their conservation. since many natural butterfly habitats have been lost to urbanization and other development. It is easy to increase the number and variety of butterflies in your yard. Simply grow the plants the caterpillars like to eat, and plants that adult butterflies feed on! Many websites provide comprehensive charts of plants that butterflies are attracted to and larval food plants. Several books are available at your local bookstore with butterfly plant lists and garden plans. Plants with varying blooming cycles can be placed together to keep your garden full of activity throughout the growing season. Glen Graves will be our final guest speaker of the year when we convene on Thursday, November 11th, at 412 W 34th St. Glen is a Master Gardner who will share his knowledge of how to attract butterflies to the garden and identify the species common to our area.

Butterfly gardens can be any size – a window box, part of your landscaped yard, or even a wild untended area on your property. When planning your butterfly garden, include both adult butterfly nectar plants and caterpillar food plants. Adult butterflies will visit for a longer period if they find plants to lay their eggs on. Patches of plants that flower at the same time are more attractive to butterflies than a single plant with a few flowers. Try to avoid or minimize the use of insecticides and herbicides. Plant your flowers in sunny places and provide some rocks or stone walls where butterflies can "bask" in the morning to warm up. Also provide a few sheltered areas, like shrubbery or brush piles to protect them from wind and rain, and to provide caterpillars a nice place to pupate. Butterfly Houses have slots the ideal size for keeping birds out while giving butterflies protection from the wind and weather.

By having a nectar source close by, butterflies may be more likely to visit your butterfly house and garden. Maintaining a damp, slightly salty area in the yard may also help attract groups of butterflies. You can prolong the butterfly's stay in your garden and draw in others by providing both the food and shelter they need.

Butterflies are easy and fun to watch, so make sure you also plan a good place to watch them. After a rain, you might see butterflies "puddling," or sucking fluids from wet soil to obtain water and salts. On cool sunny mornings, they may bask on a rock to warm their bodies before flight. Males can be territorial and chase other males away. Females often have elaborate routines for choosing where to lay their eggs. If during your observation you notice you are missing a species you'd really like to see, include its favorite plant in your garden next year! By creating a butterfly garden, you will not only create a natural habitat for butterflies but also for birds and other wild animals. which contributes to preserving our natural heritage.

Garden Club meetings are open to all residents and friends of Garden Oaks. If you would like to become a member of the Garden Club, annual dues are only \$10. For more information about the Garden Oak's Garden Club you may call me at (713) 686-6012. We meet the 2nd Thursday of every month at 7:00 pm. Most meetings feature a guest speaker followed by a brief business meeting. In addition, the Garden Club is responsible for the maintenance of Friendship Garden and we conduct 2 workdays (spring and fall) when we add new plantings, replace the mulch and tidy up the beds. We had a pretty good turn out, even if we did quickly lose folks as the Presidential debate started.

As most of you know, we had our first Funds Disbursement vote during this meeting. From the list of projects submitted by members of GOMO and the Directors, we had each Member vote on the various items by rank.

Out of a total of 79 ballots received, either before or at the Annual Meeting, the voting came up as follows:


16 ballots voting to keep the funds in the GOMO account

6 ballots to give the entire fund amount to the Garden Oaks Civic Club for distribution

57 ballots voting 'No' to both of the above choices

Rankings of the remaining 57 ballots

- Suggestion #2: Assist with funding for the Garden Oaks Constable program
- 2 Suggestion #5: Donate surplus funds to update/improve GO parks
- 3 Suggestion #6: Donate funds to plant and care for various trees throughout the neighborhood
- 4 Suggestion #7: Donate surplus



- funds to upgrade GO signage and street signs
- 5 Suggestion #8: Donate surplus funds to the GO spay/neuter pro gram
- 6 Suggestion #9: Give any leftover funds to the GO CC/other GO org.
- 7 Suggestion #3: Donate surplus funds to the GO Elementary School
- 8 Suggestion #4: Donate surplus funds to the GO Garden Club
- 9 Suggestion #1: Establish a schol arship fund for (a) deserving GO student(s)

The first place Constable Program received more than twice the rankings as the second place suggestion. We will be funding these, based on our year-end financials as of October 31st, 2004. Any funds in excess of \$150,000.00 will be considered surplus, and will fund the above suggestions, in descending order, until the surplus funds are gone. I'll go into more detail in next month's Gazette, when I should have the final figures.

A reminder: GOMO will hold its Directors elections immediately after the November 2, 2004 GO Civic Club meeting. We still are looking for volunteers to stand for election in Sections 1, 2, 3, and 5. If you would like to run, please obtain a Nomination form (on the GO list server and the GO website), fill it in, and get it to one of the current Directors before the November 2nd, 2004 meeting.

Civic Club Meeting Minutes, October 5, 2004

President Trey Wood called the meeting to order at 7:08 p.m. Minutes of the September meeting were corrected as follows:

Citizens on Patrol Report: The north division storefront police station is not training citizens-on-patrol at this time.

Minutes were approved as corrected.

Special Announcement: Betty Heacker, representing the Shepherd Oaks Civic Association Members and Neighbors, made an appeal to Garden Oaks residents to protest to the mayor and city council the proposed 500-foot tower that the City of Houston would erect at the Houston Emergency Center at 5320 N. Shepherd. The protesting citizens charge that it is less than 300 feet from single-family residences and an apartment complex, that no one knew about it before the first of October, and that the tower does not need to be that tall to accomplish its objectives. She supplied a copy of the formal protest that the Shepherd Oaks Civic Association members presented to the city.

Treasurer's Report. Mike Dishberger, treasurer, presented a YTD income statement and a balance sheet as of September 30, 2004. The total of balances in all accounts was \$61.577.85.

Secretary's Report on Heavy Trash. Diane King reported that she and Sheila Briones attended a one-day conference for neighborhood leaders September 11, 2004, sponsored by the City of Houston's Department of Planning and Development. The mayor addressed the conferees and announced a new no tolerance policy for illegal dumping, including illegal timing of placing items curbside for heavy trash. Diane and Sheila obtained signs for the neighborhood that announce the heavy trash pick-up days. Diane requested volunteers to be responsible for posting signs at the appropriate time for their section to announce upcoming heavy trash pickup days. Each month, Garden Oaks has three different heavy trash pick-up days. Diane has contacted Thomas Buchanan, Director of Solid Waste, by email, to request reducing the number of different days for heavy trash pickup in Garden Oaks.

Standing Committee Reports

A. Beautification. Rick Grochoske announced three upcoming workdays and an invitation to participate:

October 16, at 8:00 am, for carpentry work (to replace rotten wood) on the gazebo at the triangle formed by Sue Barnett, W. 41st and W. 42nd Streets. Homebuilder and Garden Oaks resident Harry Bridges is providing replacement wood and tools to do the work;

October 23, from 8:00 till noon, to clean up the esplanade on Garden Oaks Blvd.,

October 30, at 8:00 am, to restain the gazebo.

- B. Citizens on Patrol. Carl Waters, Jr. Seventy-five criminal incidents in Garden Oaks have been reported to year-to-date to HPD. That compares to 71 by the same time in 2003. HPD reported a shooting in early August as a robbery.
- C. GardenOaks.org. No report.
- D. Gazette. No report.
- E. Membership. Chris Lindsay. There are 418 club members to date for 2004, ten more than last month. Four more new members joined at the beginning of the meeting. There will be no more expenditures for a monthly door prize for those who attend club meetings. Donations for door prizes will be wel come, however.
- F. Home Tour. No report. Trey made a call again for a possible chair of the 2006 Tour.

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Civic Club Meeting Minutes, October 05, 2004

Ad Hoc Committee Reports

Railroad. No report.

Other Reports

- A. Garden Club. Ed DeAlba announced the next meeting's speaker would be addressing the ABCs of garden design. The meeting will be Thursday, October 14, 2004, at 507 W. 33rd.
- B. GOMO Sam Stengler invited everyone to remain for the annual meeting of the GOMO following tonight's civic club meeting.

Speaker: Randy Pace, Historical Preservation Officer, City of Houston. In his capacity, Randy Pace administers the city's historic preservation ordinance, passed in 1995. The Randy discussed the history of the ordinance, saying the city has designated seven areas as historic districts in Houston since its inception. He explained the process and steps a neighborhood takes to obtain city of Houston historic designation, and answered questions about the implications of designation on individual owners and properties. He shared that Hare and Hare, the nationally prominent urban landscape design firm during the first half of the twentieth century that had been a principle designer of Hermann Park, had designed Garden Oaks.

Unfinished (Old) Business

Security program. Terry Jeanes announced that a neighborhood sign-up campaign for the constable program would take place Saturday morning, October 9, from 9:00 am to noon, at Spark Park and at the rose garden by Graham Park. She asked for volunteers to be block walkers that morning. Seventy people had signed up as of the beginning of the meeting, and she said she received another stack of completed forms at the meeting.

New Business

Executive Committee Recommendation. Diane King reported that there had been two meetings of the executive committee since the last civic club. The committee voted to create an ad hoc committee for exploring the feasibility of Garden Oaks becoming a City of Houston historic district. Due to the practice of some standing for members to vote on the creation of ad hoc committees, the authority of the president notwithstanding, the committee met again and rescinded the creation of the committee. It passed the following motion:

The executive committee recommends the creation of an ad hoc committee to explore the feasibility/desirability of historic designation for Garden Oaks. The committee is charged with studying the pros and cons of historic designation, including the positive and negative experiences of other neighborhoods in Houston regarding acceptance or rejection. The committee will be known as the Garden Oaks historic district committee. In keeping with the usual procedures of the GOCC, no civic club funds may be allocated to the committee until such time that a vote of the GOCC members has approved the expenditure.

A motion passed to accept the executive committee's recommendation.

Announcements

The next civic club meeting is November 2 at 7:00 p.m., at Garden Oaks Elementary.

Trey adjourned the meeting at 8:20.

If you leash up your dog or cat and stroll through the neighborhood, more than likely someone will talk to you. Studies show that people walking with a dog talk to new people far more often than if the dog wasn't with them.

Physical contact – Studies show that cuddling and stroking your pet is good for you. It makes you calmer and can even lower your heart rate and your blood pressure.

Someone to Talk to – Talking things out relieves a lot of internal pressure. Talk about anything – your pet will listen. Even better, he won't disagree, interrupt, or tell anyone your secrets

Motivation to exercise – Most pets need exercise every day. Whether it's walking your dog, riding your horse or playing with your cat, you will be getting exercise too. Physical exercise helps you to deal with stress and sometimes gives you the opportunity to get outside and breathe some fresh air.

Security – Some pets promote a feeling of safety. Your dog barks when he hears or smells something out of the ordinary, and your cat wakes you if there is smoke in the house. Sometimes just having your pet nearby is enough to make you feel less anxious and more secure.

Portion Control is the Key

Contrary to popular belief, the answer to weight control is not how many carbs you take in or how many fat grams you consume. The key is total calorie intake. Even if you are eating your fruits and vegetables and heart healthy fish high in omega 3s, if you are eating more calories than you burn off in a day, then you will gain weight. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, Americans are taking in more than 300 additional calories per day. This is about 20 percent more than we did in the '70s and can contribute to a weight gain of over thirty pounds in one year. One of the reasons that we are eating larger portions is because we are served larger portions at restaurants. The portion sizes are three to eight times larger than they were 30 years ago. Most of us grew up having to clean our plates and we still do, whether the portion is for one or four. We then translate these large portion sizes into our homes at dinnertime. Here are some tips on how to gain control of your portions:

First, become aware of what an appropriate portion size is. One serving of meat or fish is the size of a deck of cards or a woman's palm of her hand. This is equivalent to three ounces. Most restaurants serve ten to twelve ounces at the evening meal. A serving of starch, such as rice or pasta, is ½ cup or a ½ of a baseball. One serving of raw fruits and vegetables is one cup or a four ounce piece of fruit. To familiarize yourself with portion sizes, weigh and measure your food. This is not something you have to do daily, but it is good to check yourself from time to time. You can also go to http://www.quakeroatmeal.com/ StriveforFive/Week4/Index.cfm# and click on "portion distortion". Once you know the portion size you are eating check the caloric content.

You can do this by going to www.calorieking.com. Eating the correct portion sizes at home can aid you when you are dining out.

Since most restaurants serve portions that could feed two to four people, sharing an entrée with a friend or family member can cut down your portion size and save you money. If no one will share with you, order a doggie bag. Put the food in the doggie bag before you start eating your meal so you are not as tempted to eat the other half. Then you can have that delicious meal again the next day. Ordering two appetizers or choosing something off the lunch menu can also cut down on your portion size.

Finally, eat prepackaged, single-serving entrees and snacks can also teach you what a reasonable portion size is. New research shows that women who ate two portion-controlled entrees a day lost more weight than a control group that was told to eat the same number of calories per day. The key is you do not have to guess how much you can eat. It is done for you. Do beware that not all foods come in single servings. Be sure to read the food label on the back. Although, it may seem like a single serving to you, it could be two or three.

The beauty in eating the correct portions is that you don't have to worry about counting carbs or fat grams, just watch your portion. All foods can fit into a healthy diet in moderation.
