The Garden Oaks Civic Club Board of Director's and Committee Chairmen met on October 17th to consider the Nominating Committee's recommended slate for the 2006 Board of Directors. Upon unanimous approval by the Board, the announced slate of candidates are: President - Sheila Briones. Vice President - Chris Schmidt, Treasurer - Mike Dishberger, and Secretary - Gale Gorman. As prescribed by our by-laws these nominations must be printed in the November issue of the Gazette. Election of officers will take place at the December 6 Civic Club meeting. Thank you to Nominating Committee members Craig Lee, Chairman and Terry Jeanes and Shelley Rodgers.

The Board also considered the proposed 2006 Budget for the Civic Club at the same meeting. Printed on the back cover of the Gazette is the proposed budget for 2006. A more detailed budget showing line items of general expenditures and income will be available at the November 1st Civic Club meeting. As also prescribed by our by-laws the year's budget must be published in the November Gazette before a vote by Civic Club members at the December meeting.

The Board also considered the revisions to our by-laws as drafted and presented by Ms. Lori Kennedy who agreed to undertake this task earlier this year. The Board will study the revisions before bringing them to the members of the Civic Club for discus-

sion and approval. The Board wishes to express their thanks to Lori for undertaking this assignment and for submitting a very thorough set of revisions in a very timely manner.

The last item I would like to make note of is that Ms. Tina Rowe has agreed to be Sign Coordinator for the Civic Club. Tina will be in charge of keeping a database of those residents who have a GOCC meeting sign or a Heavy Trash Pick Up sign. Please phone or email Tina with your name. address, email, and telephone number and which signs you currently have. Also please tell her where you post the signs, this will help her assess where she needs additional volunteers to post the reminder signs in areas of the neighborhood that don't get these helpful reminders. If you are willing to help put up and take down a Civic Club meeting sign or Heavy Trash Pick-up sign—please contact Tina. She will arrange to get you the type and number of signs you want. All you do is place the sign out a few days or the weekend before the Civic Club meeting or Heavy Trash day in your section and then remove it and store until the next time. Civic Club Meeting Minutes October, 2005

Meeting was convened in the cafeteria at Garden Oaks Elementary School.

President Chris Lindsay opened the meeting a few minutes after 7pm. There was a good turnout, approximately fifty people attended.

- Minutes of the September meeting were approved as published in the Gazette.
- 2) Mike Dishberger gave our financial report.
- 3) Chris Lindsay opened the President's report with:
 - a) Thanks for the generosity in Katrina relief efforts
 - b) Reminder that the Nominating Committee is in the process of developing a slate for next year's Board. Volunteers may contact Terry Jeanes or Craig Lee or Chris Lindsay with nominees.
 - Darian Hall was introduced from City Council member Toni Lawrence's office:
 - He announced that recycling in Houston is suspended indefinitely until Hurricane Rita debris is removed. The program may not come back at all due to the fact that it is not a cost-effective program for the city.
 - Trash pickup is a problem after hurricane Rita.
 - Power outages were and are a problem. Civic Club will work with CM Lawrence on getting someone from Reliant Energy to come to a Civic Club meeting in the near future to discuss.
 - A Town hall meeting will be held at Spring Woods High School on October 19th at 6:30 pm. On gangs and graffiti.
- 4) Terry Jeanes introduced the constable, Deputy Smith, who gave a report on his activities.
 - a) Deputy Smith demonstrated gun locks and offered them to everyone free of charge.
 - b) The constable program will be fingerprinting children one hour prior to our next meeting as well as at the Fall Festival.

Letter to the Editor

Garden Oaks was founded in 1939 and has been evolving ever since creating a community that is cohesive and nostalgic. Houston has grown and changed around Garden Oaks. Loop 610 was not there, 290 moved from old Hempstead east to its present location, Shepherd was expanded from 2 to 6 lanes, and 43rd was changed from a tree lined, two lane black top where neighborhood children played to a four lane thoroughfare with bus service.

When 43rd was expanded much of the charm was lost. Homeowners on 43rd lost a buffer of up to 25 feet of front lawn and the city added sidewalks on residents' property. Now 43rd street is a major conduit through our beautiful oasis.

We owe it to ourselves to be mindful of the design and explicit principles that guide and preserve our community. Garden Oaks prohibits fences, walls, or hedges beyond the front of the house. But residents along Shepherd and 43^{rd} are impacted daily by the bustling of the city streets. These homeowners provide other residents on interior lots with a "buffer" from various undesirable factors. It is routine for Shepherd and 43rd homeowners to be reluctant to answer the front door; they are rarely seen outside due to the enormous volume of pedestrians and traffic. Until someone surprises you at your front porch, or cuts across your lawn, sleeps in your bushes, urinates in your front yard, or wakes you at 3am to ask for bus fare, you cannot imagine the absolute necessity for some variance. Shepherd and 43rd residents should have a unique privacy "buffer" to shield them from the busy streets.

Security issues, noise, and constant traffic impact River Oaks residents, too. By making slight variances for those homeowners along the busiest thoroughfares, River Oaks created a solution for the same problems.

Using the variances created for River Oaks residents along Kirby and San Felipe as a guideline, I suggest the following:

- 1. Fences would be of brick, stone or masonry columns and wrought iron or totally wrought iron construction.
- 2. Front fences must be set back behind the public sidewalk.
- 3. Fencing in front of the housing along thoroughfares shall not exceed six feet as measured from the existing ground. GOMO may select the top of curb or sidewalk level as the base grade for determining this height of the fence.
- 4. All fence variance plans must be submitted for written GOMO approval.

This variance is necessarily restrictive to maintain the charm and grandeur of Garden Oaks while providing safety and quality of life for families. Metro operates commercially along 43rd St. and Shepherd everyday, and the deed restrictions do not appear to allow this variance.

Please consider supporting a petition of the Garden Oaks Maintenance Organization to allow fencing "buffers" for residents along our busiest thoroughfares so that we may all continue to enjoy Garden Oaks as it evolves. Hi Neighbors! Cooler weather is finally upon us and our pets are just as happy about it as we are. Two great ways to enjoy the cooler weather also happens to be canine favorites — parks and howling at dusk. This month we want to encourage you to get out and take your dog to a park There are several fine parks right here in Garden Oaks and Houston boasts the No. 1 dog park in the nation — Millie Bush Bark Park. After a day in the park you will feel so good you will want to howl. Our pet of the month duo are renowned howlers.

Pet News: There is nothing like a day in the park and Houston's Millie Bush Bark Park ranks No. 1 in the nation according to the editors of *Dog Fancy* magazine. The 13-acre dog park was acclaimed for its creative amenities, including three ponds – one just for small dogs – and fake fire hydrants. Pet of the Month: November's dynamic duo is Rusty and Lola Murillo. Rusty is a two year old Beagle and Lola is a three year old Jack Russell mix. Critters 101: Howl if You're Happy

Howling is a form of communication in

dogs. It is a way for dogs to signal their presence to other dogs that are often located far away. It is common in wolves and coyotes, both relatives of today's domestic dog.

Domestic dogs that howl, especially those that howl excessively are usually doing this because they are bored and lonely. Getting extra toys and giving your dog more attention and exercise will help to stimulate your dog and reduce excessive howling. If you make your dog sleep outside all night, it's no wonder the dog howls a lot. Bring the dog inside!

Sometimes dogs will howl when they hear sirens or other loud higher pitched sounds like clarinets and flutes. These sounds may even come from a television set. Dogs do this as an instinctive response to hearing what they interpret to be another howl (dog in the distance). They are not doing this because it hurts their ears.

Have you noticed that your dog likes to howl at dusk? This is their way of locating their pack and the position of other packs. Go ahead and howl with your dog – they love it and you may too.



When Shopping:

- Stay alert to your surroundings
- Avoid trips after dark when possible. Go with friends or other family members (remember there is safety in numbers). Park in well lit areas as close to the entrance as possible.
- Use checks, debit cards or credit cards to avoid carrying large amounts of cash when you shop. Ladies keep your purses close to your body and gentlemen put your wallets in your front pocket to make them harder to steal.
- Keep an eye on your purchases when you stop to eat.
- Avoid carrying large numbers of packages; use a package pickup service when you can.
- Have your keys out before you leaving the store. Place packages in the trunk of the car or in other hidden areas as you leave the mall or return to make more purchases.


Beautification Update




