Five reasons to reject historic status for Garden Oaks

- 1. Homeowners will have to live with a 22 page ordinance any time they repair, alter or expand their home. (Visit: http://www.cihouston.tx.us/codes//codes33-7and8.pdf)
- 2. The ordinance is written broadly. City Hall can prohibit any ordinary maintenance and repairs that "change the design, character, texture, or material of any exterior feature." (Sec. 33-201)
- 3. Fines can be as high as \$500 <u>a day</u> per violation. Homeowners in violation can be sued by the city for damages, sued to enjoin construction, and required to reconstruct or restore any altered structure. (Sec. 33-203)
- 4. No properties are "grandfathered" or exempt including churches.
- 5. The ordinance today has a "90 day waiver", which means that city hall <u>must</u> grant a homeowner's request for a permit to alter or demolish a structure 90 days after a request is submitted. **Unfortunately, preservation activists want to remove the 90 day waiver from the law and make the restrictions permanently binding.**

- The Houston preservation code -

Criminal prosecutions...**fines up to \$500 a day <u>per violation</u>**. Homeowners can also be ordered to *reverse* repairs, pushing the cost far higher than any fines assessed.

Do you really want to worry about how the city might punish you if you make what you believe are minor repairs to your home but city inspectors think exceed what the ordinance allows? (The information below was prepared by attorney Alex Liber-Alessie, a G.O. resident at 428 W. 33rd St.)

HISTORIC PRESERVATION STATUTORY CONTROLS

-Enforcement actions against homeowners for alleged prohibited actions are deemed "offense[s]", subject to criminal "prosecution[s]" – See: Sections 33-203 & 33-236

-Prosecution includes prosecuting homeowners:

- for <u>each alleged violation</u> homeowner "shall be guilty of a misdemeanor [a crime] and upon <u>conviction</u> shall be <u>punished</u> by a fine of ... \$500.00. The <u>fines</u> are imposed <u>each day</u> ... any violation continues [and] shall constitute a separate offense".
- to "enjoin or otherwise cause abatement of any violations".
- for "damages"
- mandatory injunctive orders "require[ing] restoration or reconstruction", i.e. "mandatory repairs" See: Sections 33-203

<u>-Prosecution of alleged violations includes "presumption" of law in favor of government</u> that any "alteration, rehabilitation, restoration, construction, relocation or demolition of a building, structure, object, or site ... without a certificate of appropriateness ... adversely affects the structural, physical or visual integrity of the building, structure, object or site. See: 33-203

- -Micro-Controls Over Homeowners "shall include, but is not limited to":
- "changing ... kind, type or size of roofing"
- "changing ... kind, type or size of siding"
- "changing ... or adding exterior doors, door frames"
- "changing ... or adding windows, window frames"
- "changing ... or adding fences"
- "changing ... or adding railings, columns, beams"
- "changing ... or adding porches, steps"
- "changing ... or adding balconies"
- "dismantling, moving or removing any exterior feature" See: Section 33-20
- **-90 Day Waiver can be removed by amendment.** Amendments or changes to the ordinance can be made without a petition, but rather; by application initiated by HAHC, the Planning Commission, with the final action resting with the city council. <u>See</u>: 33-227
- -"Violators" can be ordered to make "Mandatory Repairs". Even with a mandatory repair order resulting from a citation and court order, repairs cannot be undertaken by the homeowner until he or she first obtains a "Certificate of Appropriateness" from the Planning Official. See: 33-249
- -Prior to issuance of 90 Day Waiver Certificate, homeowner is required to "consult with Department staff to explore alternatives to the actions proposed by the applicant". In other words, no consultation, no waiver certificate. See 33-250
- -90 Day Waiver Period does not begin until homeowner has first filed a properly completed application for a Certificate of Appropriateness with the building official. See 33-238
- -The Act of initiating an application for Historic District subjects proposed area to requirements of Certificate of Appropriateness and Mandatory Controls, See: 33-223



Garden Oaks Boulevard Esplanade workday to reclaim and improve the crushed granite path is scheduled for SATURDAY, AU-GUST 6 at 8:00AM. The goal is to have the path restored before school begins in mid-August. We'll be laying down about 70 tons of crushed granite and we'll really need your help along with your wheelbarrows and shovels. A number of options were researched to keep the path from degrading so quickly (like steel edging & concrete curbing, stones, etc.). The decision was made to go with concrete curbing and the installation began Monday, July 11th. Another reason for having some type of edge was to make maintenance easier for mowing & edging.

Art Park: Attendance at the workday on May 21st was, to say the least, dismal. Only one volunteer besides us (Ed and Brenda) made an appearance (an appreciative thanks to Todd Prince). Plans before year end include mapping the park (in process), installing an irrigation system (currently in planning and bidding stage), planting a variety of trees along W. 43rd, and upgrading the plantings.

Gazebo Park: With deep sadness, we mourn the loss of the magnificent post oak in the Gazebo Park. There was no evidence that the tree was diseased but the speculation is that with its large bent over trunk, the tree could no longer support the weight of the branches. Since the 1930s, hundreds of Garden Oaks children and adults have enjoyed climbing this tree. It was one of the larger trees, and possibly the largest post oak in Garden Oaks.

Sprinkler Heads: I keep fixing sprinkler heads in our parks that get broken when people repeatedly drive over them or park on them. Please, if you live adjacent to one of our green spaces, ask your friends not to park in the park.

Tuesday, August 2nd has been designated as National Night Out for this year. This is a good way to get to know your new neighbors and get reacquainted with those you have fallen out of touch with during the past year.

National Night Out, 'America's Night Out Against Crime,' was introduced by the National Association of Town Watch in 1984. The program was the brainchild of Executive Director Matt A. Peskin. In an effort to heighten awareness and strengthen participation in local anticrime efforts, Peskin felt that a high-profile, high-impact type of crime prevention event was needed nationally. At that time, he noted that in a typical 'crime watch community', only 5 to 7% of the residents were participating actively. Due to the growth and success of these programs, he felt this percentage was too low. Subsequently, he proposed a national program which would be coordinated by local crime prevention agencies and organizations - but that would involve entire communities at one time. The first National Night Out was introduced early in 1984 - with the event culminating on the first Tuesday in August. That first year, 400 communities in 23 states participated in National Night Out. Nationwide, 2.5 million Americans took part in 1984. The event has since grown to involve more than 34 million people in over 10,000 communities from all 50 states, U.S. territories, Canadian cities, and military bases worldwide.

The National Night Out program suggests a 7:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. time frame, but you can adjust the start or end times to meet the needs of your block. If you are interested in hosting a party, please call me at 713-864-1992 (evenings please) or email me with your information.


