Roland Altinger, HCAD representative, will be our featured speaker. Mr. Altinger will cover the appraisal process, equalization phase, assessment phase, collection phase and exemptions based on qualifications.

CENTERPOINT ENERGY TO ADDRESS POWER CONCERNS

Have you ever wondered what future plans CenterPoint Energy has for our area in regards to electrical distribution? Tired of transformers "exploding or popping" on a regular basis for no reason at all? How many power outage calls from Garden Oaks have been received by CenterPoint Energy during the last year? How does that compare to other subdivisions? What have been the causes to those power outages?

How is CenterPoint Energy preparing for the start of the new hurricane season, which runs June 1 through November 30? Remember the 2005 Atlantic hurricane season was the most active in the 154 years records have been kept..........27 most named storms (beating 1933's total of 21), the most hurricanes (14, beating 1969's total of 12), and the most Category 5 storms (3). Seven storms were major hurricanes—category 3 or higher—of which a record 4 hit the U.S.

Answers to all these questions will be covered at the June 6th Civic Club meeting by CenterPoint Energy Service Consultants Donice Shilling and Shelton Mitchell. Make plans to attend!

SPARK PARK UPDATE

If you've driven by the SPARK Park located next to Garden Oaks Elementary, you've noticed that the playground equipment is gone. City inspectors found the equipment, originally built in 1990, to be unsafe and ordered its immediate removal.

Not to worry, the equipment will be replaced by the City under a grant, being funded September 2006. Plans are to have the new playground "up and running" by Spring 2007.

I'm not sure of the total cost of the "rebuild," but Garden Oaks' contribution is \$5000, which will be raised through the combined fundraising efforts of the Civic Club, Garden Oaks

The meeting was convened in the cafeteria of the Garden Oaks Elementary School. President Sheila Briones opened the meeting at 7:00 p.m.

APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES

Carl Waters moved to approve the minutes of the March meeting as printed in the April Gazette. The motion was seconded by Terry Jeanes and the minutes were approved by the members in attendance.

TREASURER'S REPORT

A Profit & Loss Statement dated January 1, 2006 through March 31, 2006 was made available to the members in attendance.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Beautification Committee Co-Chair Brenda de Alba reported the recent workdays were severely under attended. Volunteers are greatly needed to keep our green spaces looking their best. Even an hour or two from each volunteer makes a real difference. Upcoming capital improvement projects are to be announced.

Constable Program Chair Terry Jeanes made the following announcements: Stickers with the Constable's phone number are available at the Civic Club meetings. These stickers are very useful to have by the phone when an emergency arises; Year 2005 supporters who have not yet paid for 2006 will receive an email message to remind them to renew their commitment. Terry Jeanes also presented a Certificate of Appreciation to Deputy Smith for his first year of service to our neighborhood.

President Briones made the announcement for the Garden Club since Garden Club President, Chris Lindsay, was not in attendance. Next Garden Club meeting will be held at the Garden Expo at 1221 West 20th Street on Thursday, April 13, 7:00 p.m.

Home and Garden Tour Chair Sue Schmidt made the following announcements: Advertisement posters are displayed at various establishments around the area; Over 1,000 advertisement postcards have been mailed; The Preview Party is scheduled for Saturday, April 22nd from 5-7 p.m. at the Indian Summer Lodge (605 Columbia Street); Over 103 items are to be auctioned off. 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

Community Service in Action

Through the dedicated work of the Boy Scouts of America under direction of Chris Roberts, Troop 20... the Orchard at Garden Oaks Elementary School has been planted. This Lamar HS Junior chose the GEOS Orchard as his Eagle Scout project because he attended the elementary school and wanted to give back to his school. Chris was one of the first students to start in the acclaimed Montessori program, a neighborhood public school program his parents Jane Ann and Marc helped create. At school and at home, Chris was introduced to community service and benefits of giving to others. Chris has grown up in Section One of Garden Oaks and has taken community service to heart all his life. Among many contributions. Chris and his brother Steven have been delivering the Gazette for years. Sister Emily is now helping them out.

Reaching Eagle Scout rank is an honor few in Scouting realize. Support from many helped Chris reach this goal. As part of the campus-wide beautification project, Saturday, March 25, Chris' group of volunteers planted 13 different fruit bearing trees, built two vine arbors along the entry path and cleaned up the existing habitat. Volunteers for this project came not only from fellow Scouts in his own troop but from other troops as well. Over 50 volunteers, including the scouts, school parents, family, friends, neighbors, and community businesses all pitched in under Chris' leadership to have this phase of the school's Wildlife Habitat completed.

The National Wildlife Federation Schoolyard Habitat at Garden Oaks Elementary School was started in 2002 by a team of five teachers. From this small few grew a dedicated group of more teachers, students, parents, and community members all wanting to realize the same vision. This habitat provides a low-cost living laboratory that gives children an understanding and appreciation of local Texas plants and animals while providing a safe haven for local wildlife. Hands on opportunities provided in the Habitat have proven results for learning at GOES.

Urban Harvest and the Garden Oaks Garden Club gave much direction to the selection and planned preparation of the Orchard. The Habitat encompasses a Pond with many varieties of wildlife such as Rough Leaf Dogwood, American Beauty Berry, Milkweed, Turk's Cap, Cardinal Flower, Salvia, and Yaupon Holly and an observation deck where you might

catch many students journaling about caterpillars on the Milkweed plants currently growing around the pond. Logs for the outdoor classroom and a new Pond Shed housing tools and supplies were completed last fall. The orchard will provide students with examples of varying fruit all suited to our climate. The next phases for the Habitat will be to install an irrigation system, a Vegetable Garden and Wildlife field followed by a Butterfly Garden. The Gardens will be adopted by the classrooms to maintain, teaching children not only about nature but the responsibilities we all have in its' survival. As these plans grow and mature, so will the young minds of GOES students. As Chris Roberts so generously demonstrated with his Eagle Scout project and leadership, he has upheld the Scout Oath to... On my honor I will do my best... To help other people at all times...



Chris Roberts is 17 yrs. Old and a IB student at Lamar High School. He was born and raised in Garden Oaks and is considering pursuing a Business Degree. He is the goalie on the Ice Hockey team, Award Winning Debater, and Senior Patrol Leader for Boy Scout Troop #20.

The last several months have been busy with many new plans submitted, the defining and adoption of several processes, and the beginnings of our efforts to computerize.

Help Wanted

With all this work we've come to realize that we need help. Most organizations like ours have maintenance companies that do most, if not all, of the work done by homeowners associations. We don't believe in that. We believe that a homeowners association should be run by the homeowners themselves. That said, there is still a lot to do and we'd like to take some of the burden off of ourselves and make it the responsibility of a part-time contract employee.

Some of the duties of this position are:

- Attend Civic Club and mid-month GOMO meeting (4-6 hours)
- Preparation for both of those meetings
- Take meeting minutes, type them, and have the Secretary approve
- Spend 4 hours/week, driving neighborhood looking for potential issues, taking photos, make a data base etc (GPS?)
- File documents/plans
- Run permit report each week to check for new permits
- Ensure GOMO has a monthly input into the Gazette
- Organize the office and documents
- Write letters to homeowners when a board member is not available Track closings in the neighborhood and confirm with Treasurer that money has been collected



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Beautification Update Ed and Brenda de Alba

Saturday, April 1st saw two groups working away on the Triangle Park at Alba & Azalea and on the Garden Oaks Boulevard Esplanade. Tina Nieto did the lion's share of the work at the Triangle Park with Jim Summers helping out in the afternoon. We had a fairly good turnout at the Esplanade with Kerri Epstein, Jay and Shawna Tatum, Sheila Briones, Shelley Rogers, Brenda and me, and one or two others that escape me, (my apologies to them!), working away on this very large greenspace. Additional work was also done by David Bartula's Lawn Service in the following week. We've contracted out the heavy weeding and maintenance work on the Boulevard to David Bartula to keep the beds in shape and mulched. This was something Brenda and I bid out and awarded several years ago but when we stepped down from chairing the beautification committee the contract was not implemented by our successor.

All of our parks with the exception of the Art Park at W.43rd and Sue Barnett are looking pretty good. The Art Park is the only park that has not been adopted by the neighborhood and that park gets very rough maintenance from the City of Houston.

The drought we've suffered these last two years has me thinking that improving the sprinkler systems in several of our greenspaces may be a good use of resources for the balance of the year. I'd like to automate and slightly modify the Esplanade's irrigation system, slightly modify the Triangle Park's system, add a zone around the (currently missing) sign in the Rose Garden and do a major revamp of the system in the Gazebo Park. With the addition of the Gazebo, several new beds, and damage done by people parking their vehicles major work is needed.



It's a good time to step up your foot care, and while you are at it jump in with both feet and take a look at your pet's paws too. This month we give "step by step" instructions on how to clip those nails whether your pet likes it or not. Our pet of the month is a quartet of fabulous felines.

Pet of the Month: This month our pet of the month is a blended family of felines belonging to Patty Walters and Frank Cupal in Section III. Every pet has its own personality, likes, dislikes and even guirks. At the Walters-Cupal home there is never a dull moment. Critters 101: Foot Notes

The pads on dogs' feet are very sensitive. This is one of the few areas on the dog that actually sweats, and it is also an area that is prone to injury. If your pet frequently moves across a rough surface, the pads may get worn down or cut. Pads will bleed profusely – and hurt. As a general rule, any time there is any kind of swelling of your dog's toes or feet, it is important to visit your veterinarian. Swelling can be secondary to bacterial or fungal infection, broken bones, foreign bodies, allergies, and even tumors. Nails that are not kept short will grow too

long and become irritating and painful to the dog. It can also cause the feet to splay, or spread, and nails can actually curl around and grow into a dog's pads. When you hear the telltale "click-click-click" as your dog walks across the floor, you know it's that time again – time to trim the toenails. If your pet is not used to having his nails trimmed, start slowly and work up to it gradually

Another really common foot problem that our poor dogs are subjected to is injury from improper toenail trimming. Before you start trimming, determine how much needs to be trimmed. The basic rule of thumb is that the nail, which curls downward, should be even with the paw pad. Whatever hangs over must be clipped. For medium to large dogs, use guillotinetype nail clippers. For small dogs and puppies, use the scissor-type nail clippers. Hold your dog's foot and gently push down with your thumb at the base of each nail. This will cause the nail to extend slightly, making it easier for you to see the nail. Trim each nail at a 45-degree angle away from the dog so that the newly cut nail is flush with the floor when they walk.

There is a blood vessel, called the quick, in each nail. Do not cut into the quick or it will bleed and could be painful. If this happens, apply a dab of styptic powder, which is available at pet stores, or use cornstarch. The pinkish color of the quick is easy to see in dogs with light-colored nails. However, it is almost impossible to see the guick on dark nails. Try to locate the quick from the underside of each nail before you begin cutting. Cut each nail just a little at a time until you get close, but not right up to, the quick. The good news is that the more diligent you are about trimming, the more the quick will regress into the nail, allowing you to cut shorter each time.

Even though they sometimes stink, remember that feet serve a serious purpose in all animals and may be more important than you think. The condition of an animal's feet may even tell you just how healthy it is.

Computer to Slow?

Do you know that the more programs you have running in the background, the slower your computer will become? Of course you do but what most folks don't know is that every time you boot your computer several unnecessary programs can boot as well, sucking up precious resources and significantly increasing the probability for a crash.

It seems like every time we buy a roll of t-paper these days we get a free cd-rom with some trial version of some something or other we might like. Most of us take it home and just pop it in without realizing that one to three other programs are being hidden during the install. We find ourselves wondering what the heck this purple talking gorilla is doing skateboarding onto our desktop or why Real Player is now the default media center.

Well, next to uninstalling unwanted applications there is something that you can do to ensure that your computer boots faster and crashes less. A function called MSCONFIG is a utility in 98, 98SE, ME and XP that allows you to quickly turn off unwanted applications that are running in the background and at boot up

Simply click on START

Then click on RUN

Type MSCONFIG in the box

Last click OK

Now look for the STARTUP TAB and turn off items that you don't need running all the time. Carefully look at the descriptions and note that most which fall under "Program files" should be turned off (except for your virus software). Remember that you still have full access to these programs by clicking on their icons or links but you just don't want them running all the time. Applications like Office, Real Player, AOL, Acrobat, Kazaa, plus printing and cd burning software are all a complete waist of system resources and should not be allowed to run until of course the time comes to use them. Keep it clean and lean.

For those of you who are running 95, NT, or 2000, this might take a little more effort. You can also download and install the XP version of MSCONFIG for use with NT or 2000.
