SPARK Park Update Sue Schmidt

Last Spring the play equipment located in Rick Englert SPARK Park was taken down due to safety issues. Originally installed in the early 1980's, it certainly met the needs of Garden Oaks Elementary and the neighborhood over the past two decades. Ms. Emily Thomas, principal of Garden Oaks Elementary, announced at the February Civic Club meeting the need for a design and new equipment for the park. She raised a friendly challenge to the neighborhood to work to fund \$5,000 of the minimum \$75,000 budget needed for new equipment.

Owned by the Houston Independent School District, Rick Englert SPARK Park has always been a wonderful part of the Garden Oaks that is shared by both the school and community. Any improvements to the park need to take into consideration the needs of both. For this reason, a committee representing the school, PTA, and the neighborhood has joined forces to come up with plans for the best use of the park and means to finance the development.

The original architect, Lauren Griffin, will also work with the group to incorporate features that are important to the community. Already many ideas and suggestion have been put forth, and a wish list is being developed. As with any large project, funds are needed to make this happen. The committee will be reaching out to the Civic Club, area businesses and residents for funding. Other fundraising ideas were proposed that would include the students of Garden Oaks Elementary since this park is such an integral part of their school.

In order to let the neighborhood know the progress of the plans and the timeline of the development, a brief overview of the project will be discussed at the PTA meeting, September 12th, 7:00 p.m. in the Garden Oaks Elementary School Cafeteria. Kathleen Ownby, Director of the SPARK Park Program for the City of Houston, will discuss the proposed improvements. The committee hopes to see many supporters interested in the redevelopment of Rick Englert SPARK Park at the meeting, September 12th.




We are happy to report progress with the removal of several violations in the neighborhood. This list does not include the many violations being removed by the new construction in the neighborhood.

Did you know that there are five oceans, we have five senses, and there are five petals on a rose? Critters 101: The Canine Good Citizen: With a Little Practice Every Dog Can Be One

Socializing and training your dog takes practice. The more you practice the better you get and the better you get the more you practice. How can your dog learn to behave around other dogs if he doesn't get any practice? How can you expect him to walk nicely on a leash if he doesn't get any practice? Socializing and training are just as important as food and water for your pet. So, with a little practice your pet will behave better and get to be around you more and go more places and the more he is around you and the more places he goes, the better he will behave.

If you want your dog to be a good citizen, make sure these things are true:

- My dog is friendly to strangers.
- My dog can sit politely while being petted.

• My dog is groomed and healthy looking.

- My dog can walk nicely on a leash.
- My dog can behave and walk nicely through a crowded area.
- My dog will sit, lie down and stay when I tell him to.
- My dog will come when I call him.
- My dog behaves nicely around other dogs.
- My dog is comfortable around distractions and noises.
- My dog can be away from me without getting upset and nervous.

If your pet is lacking in one or more of these areas then you should consider training. A good training class is a fun, social activity that helps your dog become a well-behaved, safe, and valued family member. You are already training your dog whether you realize it or not. Your canine friend is always learning – and this is true not only for puppies but also for older, adult dogs. If you do not teach your pet your rules, he will invent his own.

Although puppyhood is the best time to train and socialize dogs, older dogs can learn new tricks too. In fact, dogs of all ages can benefit from training. Dogs between 8 and 16 weeks should be enrolled in puppy classes. Regular classes are appropriate for dogs six months or older.

Dogs are living creatures, not robots. They have good days and not-sogood days, just as people do. Sometimes they concentrate better than other times. Do not expect a dog of any age to obey every command every single time.



Security Watch Kathryn Tewson and Steve Riley

Setting up a wireless network is incredibly easy. There's no cable to pull, no holes to drill; just plug in your wireless access point (AP), let your wireless connection manager autoassociate, and you're online. Unfortunately, so is every other person who happens to be within broadcast range of your AP, and that's where your trouble starts.

Every business has information that must be kept private. Trade secrets, source code, or even the company's accounting books can find their way into nefarious hands all too easily. If vou have customer data stored on your network, it's even more imperative to lock down access. A few credit card numbers escaping into the wild can permanently damage your customers' trust; just the possibility of credit card number theft can trigger regulatory disclosure procedures in some states. And wireless network access doesn't stop at your business's walls; if your network is open, anyone can squat in your parking lot and hop online.

The Threat

Know your enemy! There are three basic types of bad guys you need to guard your network against: thrillseekers and wardrivers, bandwidth thieves, and knowledgeable attackers.

Thrillseekers and casual wardrivers are the folks who drive around with a laptop, looking for wireless networks to hop on to. They often don't do any damage; they're motivated by the thrill of trespassing electronically. The simplest of security measures is usually enough to deter them, particularly if there are other open networks around.

Bandwidth thieves know exactly what they want. Maybe they're sending bucketsful of spam, maybe they're downloading pirated movies or porn. Whatever they're doing, there's a reason they want to do it on your network instead of their own—they don't have to worry about being traced, they don't have to bear liability for their actions, and they don't have to pay for the bandwidth they use. Because they profit from intrusion, they're more willing to crack their way into your network, but just like the thrillseekers, they're looking for the easiest option available.

Serious, knowledgeable attackers are rare, but scary. Either they want the data on your network or they're looking to cause you harm. They won't be deterred by casual security measures because they aren't looking for easy targets. They want valuable information that only you have, they expect it to be at least lightly guarded, and they're prepared to work hard to gain access or even to break your network completely.

It's easy for bad guys to become even more evil in a hurry, and network security is only as strong as its weakest link. In a recent case that got a lot of publicity, three wardrivers discovered that a national retail chain store in the Midwest was using wireless pricing scanners. There was no human client access, just automated data transfer from the point of sale system. However, the transactions weren't encrypted, and the AP used the default administration password, so the attackers were able to access the store's general network. They installed a small program on one of the corporate servers that would capture credit card numbers to a text file, which they could easily retrieve from the parking lot. The three thieves were eventually caught and sentenced for fraud, but you don't want your business to gain this kind of publicity.

The Basics

Wireless network security isn't a onesize-fits-all proposition. Before you can even think of implementing a security design, you have to consider several questions....

Who are your users?

Why are you installing a wireless network? What are you trying to protect?


