

mention their desire of service to other and to feed their friends. They have obviously passed that philosophy on to their staff.

Some of the diners selected items from the specials such as Beef Osso Bucco with garlic mashed potatoes, Lobster Ravioli, Filet Mignon, and a wonderful salad filled with greens, walnuts, bleu cheese and gala apples. It seemed to be the beef that won over hearts and stomachs on this adventure. The Osso Bucco was so tender you really could eat it with a fork (just as the waitress said). The Filet Mignon was also tender and done to perfection.

Others chose menu items that came highly recommended. The Basil Shrimp with fettucine was seasoned well but the shrimp was a bit tough. This was not the case on a previous visit. The spinach ravioli with butter and caper sauce got rave reviews from the table. All in all, the menu includes seafood, chicken, beef, vegetarian items, creative salads and nightly specials. The wine selection is good, reasonably priced *and* served in the correct glasses.

With so much wonderful food and wine at the table, there was not much demand for dessert, but a dish of cinnamon ice cream was ordered and shared that was to die for. I know I will return if for no other reason than that dessert! Dharma Café offered the perfect atmosphere to relax and enjoy the company of friends and good food.

I think we all agreed that the food, service and atmosphere at Dharma Café met every expectation. The website,

www.dharmacafehouston.com, is worth a visit on its own. It's clever, imaginative and fun...come to think of it, just as the restaurant they have developed!


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#### Dear Garden Oaks,



#### Diary of a Garden Oaks Garden Club Junkie Janna Alsobrook

I started crashing garden club meetings sometime back in 2004 because a neighbor told me about the annual plant swap. That's an event where everyone brings a plant or cutting from their garden to "swap" with others. It's a great way to get "free" plants, especially ones you have wanted to try but just haven't gotten around to buying.

Then in 2005 I attended a meeting about ponds. I promptly went out to the water garden store and still manage to maintain a decent whiskey barrel pond on my back deck. I've only had to restart it twice. Then in 2006 I officially joined the Garden Oaks Garden Club. Gardening, or as I like to call it "messing around in my yard", is the one thing in my life that I do for myself and no one else.

The topic of the first meeting I attended in 2006 was on African Violets, something which I thought I was the absolute expert on. I walked into a lovely woman's home thinking I knew everything there was to know about African Violets because mine bloomed on a regular basis. Little did I know mine were starving for light. I thought they were supposed to have their leaves reaching for the sky, that it meant they were happy, not praying for sun! At the meeting I learned that it was really quite by accident that they were indeed alive at all. The speaker was the nicest man from Teas Nursery who brought handouts and an amazing wealth of knowledge on African Violets. The plants he brought for demonstrating where then raffled off as door prizes. I walked out of there thinking "Wow, I really learned a lot tonight" and I had a lot of fun. As an added bonus our hostess provided a wonderful assortment of snacks so I did not have to make dinner.

Over the course of the next year I learned what I had secretly suspected for the last 20 years that I have lived in Garden Oaks, almost every thing alive in my yard is alive by accident. Or as they used to say in them olden days "only the strong will survive". At each and every Garden Club meeting I have attended I have learned something which I can put to good use toward improving my garden. I especially enjoyed the guest speaker on the topic of bamboo. I always thought bamboo was something that would take over your entire yard and then some. Now I know which species to plant that won't be invasive. There are a couple of varieties that I can choose from that will grow tall enough along my back fence line to hide the ugly warehouse that replaced the old house behind me a few years ago. And, as an added bonus, I can harvest the bamboo and make my own patio furniture.

At another meeting I learned about planting a garden to attract butterflies. I've actually done a very decent job of this on my own but what I learned new was that certain herbs are the big thing that attracts the caterpillars that make the butterflies. So this year I put some herbs in pots on my back patio to attract more caterpillars. I don't know if I will have more butterflies but my rabbit likes the fresh herbs and, if I feel like cooking, then I have fresh herbs too.

Other topics that have been covered this past year were on citrus trees, flower arrangements, propagation and succulents. The speaker on propagation was a Master Gardener. I found her talk very informative. I had no idea you could take the leaves from a Begonia, cut them into little pie shaped pieces, put them into a mixture of soil and vermiculite and voila! You would be growing new plants from pieces of leaves before you knew it. Her power point presentation was fantastic.

One of the most fun meetings we have is the annual Christmas party. It gives us all a chance to socialize more and get to know each other a little bit better. In addition, we do a garden themed gift exchange! I have found everyone in the club to be so much fun and they just love to talk about plants and gardening and neighborhood news. I now feel like I am addicted to the club. If I miss a meeting I feel a little panicked. like I may have missed out on some important information that I need to know. When I first started going to the Garden Club meetings I wondered how in the world some of these people knew absolutely every single plant and shrub and tree that




could possibly be mentioned. Now I know – they've been at it for awhile.

Honoree of the Month: "Ms. January" is Maria Lawson, from Section II for her constant work and devotion to animals. Maria has trapped and neutered many stray cats in our neighborhood. She has tamed some, nursed some, fostered some, found homes for some, and taken so many to the vet for healthcare using her own money most of the time. Maria watched this one particular tomcat, Blue, for awhile and befriended him. Blue was part Siamese and had the bluest eyes. He was so handsome that all who knew him called him "the gorgeous one." She did get him to trust her and she took him to the vet to be neutered. After that she found him a good home. At his new home, Blue had a cat companion named Frida and a human mom named Sheri. Sheri and Frida adored Blue whose name changed to Diego. Diego/Blue never wanted to go outside again and had his own website. #### Critters 101: Dec 2007 City Ordinance – Mandatory to Sterilize Stray Cats

If you are feeding any outside cats you must get them sterilized according to the ordinance passed in December by the City of Houston. According to BARC, about 250,000 stray cats live in the city. A female cat can start reproducing at four months; they have 3-4 kittens in each litter and can have three litters each year. Do the math, in a matter of months the numbers can get out of control.

Unwanted cat litters create the feral colonies of cats. Feral cats are simply unwanted, abandoned, domesticated house cats once owned by human beings. Some people assume if they move off their pets will survive. This is not true; many die ugly deaths from starvation, disease, abuse, and dog attacks. Other people just don't get around to spaying/neutering their pets and allow them to roam outside, no doubt breeding. Shelters spend \$50 million dollars (mostly your tax dollars) each year to euthanize 15 million dogs and cats. All because people don't spay and neuter their pets. Every single spay/ neuter helps stamp out this problem. In fact, city councilman, Michael Berry says we can reduce the stray cat population by several hundred thousand in just a few years using the trap, neuter, release program. Sean Hawkins, founder of Saving Animals Across Borders, is dedicated to making Houston a "no kill" city and has opened several low-cost spay/neuter clinics around town, including the new clinic at BARC. Please check out the "Fix Houston" campaign at www.savingsanimals.org. We can be a "no kill" city but the key is spay/ neuter.

It is your responsibility to have your pets spayed/neutered. Besides helping the overpopulation problem it also makes your pets healthier. If you are feeding an "outside cat" then it is your responsibility and now it is the law to get it spayed/neutered.
