Critter Corner

Happy 2009! Are you a good pet parent? This New Year, take a minute and evaluate your pets' care and resolve to include this list of basics that Mau Mau and I put together. The City mandates that minimum pet care is food, shelter and medical care, but for a truly happy and healthy pet there is a little bit more you should be offering. Doesn't your pet deserve the best?! Our Pet of the Month is the sweetest, and I mean the sweetest, cat in Texas.

Pet of the Month: "Miss. January" is a thirteen year old Tuxedo (black/white fur looks like wearing a tuxedo) cat named Lily Adkins. She lives in Section 1A with her parents Susan and Gary. Critters 101: Resolutions for Healthier Pets

Resolution #1 Spay or neuter your pet. By doing so, not only do you not add to the horrible problem of pet overpopulation (five to twelve million animals are euthanized each year in US shelters), but you also decrease the odds of certain health problems.

Resolution #2 Get tags. Hello. Get on the internet or pop into a pet store and make id tags right there and get them on your pet right now. This is the easiest and cheapest way to keep track of your pet. Microchipping is also a great idea.

Resolution #3 Keep your pets on heartworm preventative all year long. Heartworm disease is transmitted by mosquitoes and we have mosquitoes all year long. It is the female mosquito, tiny enough to easily slip through cracks around windows, doors or screens, which bites and transmits the infection so every dog is at risk, indoors or out.

Adult dogs find stimulation through taking advanced classes, many trainers offer classes in areas such as agility, fetching or coming when called. Such classes will benefit your dog by surrounding him with friends, engaging his mind, and strengthening his bond to you.

Resolution #8 Resolve to spend lots of quality time with your pet. Your love and affection will make your pet happier – and thus healthier in the New Year and in many years to follow.

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




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Gazette Block Captains of the Month

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Educational Gem Seeks Donors, Underwriters for Community-wide Pancake Breakfast & Silent Auction Fundraiser February 7th

It's become a neighborhood tradition, that Saturday morning in February when volunteer dads and granddads flip thousands of free pancakes. Katz's hot coffee is served to a crowd browsing auction items, eager to help a unique public school program benefiting children from all walks of life.

A call for donors and underwriters is underway to keep the community tradition going as Garden Oaks Elementary School and Friends of Montessori get set to host the 15th Annual Community-wide Pancake Breakfast and Silent Auction, Saturday, February 7, 2009 from 8:00-10:30 a.m.

"This year's theme, 'Ready, Set, Grow!' is all about growth—the growth of our children, our programs, and our community," said Tonya Knauth, co-chair of the event.

"The Pancake Breakfast helps keep the Montessori classrooms thriving at Garden Oaks Elementary," said Knauth. "It's an incredible neighborhood asset that has doubled in size since its inception. In the last three years we successfully opened two new classrooms for ages 3-5, and are looking forward to adding another classroom next year. But, without fundraisers and underwriters, this public school Montessori program would cease to exist."

While HISD provides limited funding to support the program, private revenue raised by parents and community partners makes up the bulk of the program's annual budget. Underwriters are needed to support the free breakfast, and donors are needed for silent auction items, a favorite tradition of local pancake eaters.


First developed in the early 1900s by Italian educator Maria Montessori for

the mentally challenged, the teaching method has proven extremely successful for children of all socioeconomic, learning, and ethnic backgrounds.

Today, students at all four HISD Montessori campuses regularly outscore their peers on standardized tests across all academic subjects, and the program has drawn scores of parents back to the public school system who might otherwise choose private school for their children.

Last year's event raised more than \$22,000, despite the fact that the golden brown pancakes, warm syrup, and sausage were free to the community.




