Once you have signed up you will need to complete a one hour training class and pass a criminal background check conducted by the Houston Police Department. The program is open to all Garden Oaks residents 18 years of age or older.

FREEZE DAMAGE CLEANUP: RESTRAIN YOURSELF by Mark Saranie

When I got home from work the evening after the snow and freezing temperatures, the green smell of thawing plants hung in the air. The next morning our front and back garden beds looked as if a flamethrower had burned amok. It looked even worse the next day.

I heard, then, the siren song of my garden tools urging me to prune, prune, prune! I unloaded the garage of the potted plants I placed there before the freeze so I could get to my tools.

Next came cleanup, but in a restrained way. The colony of gingers growing around our pecan looked like patches of dried up corn stalks. The run of cardamom gingers became a cascade of unhealthy looking green waves spilling into and completely blocking the path to my compost bins. Other plants looked freeze dried, and the ferns throughout both yards were toast.

I cleaned up the gingers because that was the largest job and they really looked bad. The rhizomes from which they spring are protected by a nice deep layer of leaves from previous seasons so I have no fear that a future freeze this year will harm them, except for the young stalks on their way up now. The elephant ears, ferns, crinums, and other crispy items will have to wait. My compost grew very large after the work was done.

After a freeze do not give into the urge to totally prune of your damaged plants. The dead tissue from the first freeze protects from further damage. When you prematurely cut the damage away on woody plants and snip into living tissue, the new growth that will appear will get burned by a possible next freeze. Worse yet, that new damage can reach deep into the plant and kill it. As far as fleshy plants and succulents are concerned, most probably froze to the ground and slimed out during the thaw. I try not to do much to those other than mulch them. If they come back, fine; if not, oh well. The ideal situation for plant life to come through our winter is a gradual cool down. This signals plants to prepare for cold weather by sending sap down into its root system, thus assuring its return next year. We've had the cold thing in fits and starts so far. The cold, then warm, then cold messes with vegetative cycles. So when we get the freezing temps, well, you can see the results in your yards.

In Houston, spring normally gets here in early March. Wait and watch. Your best, "prune here, not there," clues will come when new growth appears. Then is when you should prune.

As unsightly as your landscape may look, you run the risk of losing some important, if not prized specimens, in your garden by pruning too soon. Instead, pull off the dead and hanging bat-like leaves and leave the bare limbs intact. This way the yard will look presentable.

Pick your clean-up battles with care and accept these facts: all of our yards are in the same wheelbarrow. Plants will do their best to protect themselves during a freeze, and most will rise like phoenixes the following season.

Enjoy winter, and rest up. Spring will be here soon enough.

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GARDEN OAKS CHRISTMAS WINERS AND DINERS

The Winers and Diners tried a neighborhood venue in the Spring Branch area that has gotten rave revues. The Hollister Grill, at Hollister and Long Point, can be described as a hidden oasis. Owner Chuck Pritchett and Saundra, waitress extraordinaire, joined forces to pull off a Christmas dinner not to be forgotten.

We called the restaurant for a reservation, never dreaming that this quaint residential restaurant may not open on a Tuesday. The owner was willing to open to accommodate our third annual Christmas dinner and white elephant foodie exchange! Wow, they had gotten my attention already. One of our diners suggested we preorder, which pleased the owner. Our table was waiting, hot grilled garlic bread was delivered, and, because it is BYOB, several wines were uncorked and ready to be served. Saundra proved to be a one-woman wonder seeing to the

needs of our table.

We started with tomato bisque, the soup de jour, which was rich and wonderfully flavored. Appetizers of Italian-style fried eggplant and fried mozzarella were shared and were very tasty. Several of the diners decided on apple and arugula salad with pink lady apples, candied pecans, dried cherries, and blue cheese tossed with apple-honey vinaigrette. It was so good as was the spinach salad, also with candied pecans.

The shrimp and scallop risotto entrée was a hit, and a wonderful presentation of the pan seared snapper made it almost too pretty to eat but all agreed it was scrumptious. The filet was cooked to perfection, and the braised lamb shank was fabulous. Also a crowd pleaser was the country fried rib eye with jalapeño gravy. The gravy was not quite as spicy as some thought it might be, but the overall opinion was the lightly breaded rib eye was wonderful. "The roasted chicken was succulent, the fingerling potatoes were perfectly cooked," were the raves of one diner. "Everything on that dish was made a star with the broth. It had a depth of flavor that satisfied every taste bud." By this time, the Winers and Diners were bursting at the seams, but crepes with fresh berries and fruit, bananas foster, and house special bread pudding could not be resisted. The owner remained throughout our fun-filled evening even. The chef visited our table at dinner's end to make sure all had gone as anticipated.

It was truly a rare dining experience and required an attention to detail second to none. Some of our best dining experiences have been of the "mom and pop" restaurant variety. The Winers and Diners highly recommend venturing over to The Hollister Grill in 2010 for any occasion.

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

GOES REAL MEN READ by Catharine Perry

The Houston Real Men Read program is made possible through a grant that Garden Oaks Elementary was selected to receive in a competitive process. The program allows the school, after it recruits its "real men" from the community, to receive free books for all the 2nd and 5th graders in the school five times during the school year. It is modeled after a very successful program in Chicago. A community volunteer, a "real man," reads the book to "his" class and enriches the material using both a mentor guide which is supplied by the grant and his own personal knowledge. The volunteers are encouraged to stray from the story if the children ask questions - it is the relationship that is important. The five sessions allows a real



relationship to develop. It gives the children an opportunity to interact with the larger community, and brings the community into the school. Feedback from the "real men" has been very positive, and the kids really look forward to their visits.

Featured in the photos are two of our own neighborhood "real men" Ed deAlba and Chad Modad reading to students through the Houston Real Men Read program grant. They have read twice and will read three more times to the same 2nd or 5th grade class during the school year, each time giving the students a copy of the book they read, and developing a close relationship with the students as they interact with them. 



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CRITTER CORNER

Happy 2010! Now that the holidays are over we have a couple of months of winter to get through. I know we have mild winters but with the wind chill and humidity factors it is still cold: too cold for our pets. This month we talk about preparing your pets for winter.

Critters 101: Preparing Your Pets for Winter

As temperatures lower, our instincts are just to curl up by the fire, but we need to remember to keep our beloved pets happy and healthy too.

Don't leave pets outside when the temperature drops. People put dogs outside in winter because they think dogs enjoy themselves, but most dogs want to spend time with people. If your dog is outside, keep old towels by the door so every time you bring your animal in, you can rub him with a towel to dry off.

Dog houses should have just enough

room for the dog to stand up and turn around, but no more. They should face away from the wind and be elevated a few inches off the ground. Don't keep towels on the floor of the dog house or anything you think the dog might want to lie on that could draw their body heat away from them; cedar shavings or straw are good choices. The doorway should be covered with waterproof burlap or heavy plastic. Pets that spend a lot of time outside need more food in the winter because keeping warm depletes energy. Use plastic or ceramic food and water bowls instead of metal.

Even indoors, provide a comfy old blanket for your pet to burrow in and snuggle. Tile and hardwood floors get cold!

Unless your pet was bred for cold weather, consider coats or booties in extreme weather. Especially at risk during colder months are very young or very old animals, animals with chronic conditions, animals with short hair, and outdoor pets.



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Staying active with pets can be challenging in cold weather, but there are substitutes for running, like pet day care, play dates, or long rides in the car. If you run with your dog, make sure he is in condition. Dogs will try to keep up with you so it is important not to overdo it. If you are uncomfortable, chances are your dog is going to be uncomfortable.

If you wouldn't leave a child in the car, don't leave a pet there either. Warm engines in parked cars attract cats and small wildlife that may crawl up under the hood. To avoid injuring any animals honk the horn to wake up any sleeping animals or look under the hood.

Be aware that antifreeze is a deadly poison but has a sweet taste that may attract animals and children. When using antifreeze, wipe up spills and store out of reach. As for cats, they are safest kept indoors, and winter is the perfect time to train an outdoor cat to be an indoor one. This is done by moving the cat's food bowl further and further from the door each time he comes inside. Once the cat is used to an indoor environment, entertainment is crucial. Bird feeders are like kitty TV.
