The cars have been left on cinder blocks with all the tires gone. It was also mentioned in some instances the tires were still on the vehicle but the lug nuts had been loosened. If you own a car with 20 inch rims, please check your vehicle to be sure your lug nuts are tight before you leave home.

BIN THERE, STILL DOING IT

Several times in the *Gazette* I have shared about compost and its virtues. I will not pull any punches here; compost can be hard work, but man is it rewarding! The materials that go into making compost are free and currently, highly available. Just take a look up and down your street. On any day, mostly before trash day, yards are lined with bags full of organic material. Yes, the city will pick it up, give it to a company who eventually will bag it and ship to the gardening stores for us to buy, but why not make your own?

Your system does not have to be elaborate. It can range from a single pile to a multi-bin system. I have the latter, composed of three bins, and have used it ever since moving to G.O.

Preferably, select an area in the back of your yard that is out of the way, gets some sun and will benefit from rain. This is how I put mine together.

Each bin is three feet wide by five feet deep, (I make a lot of compost). I have used 12 posts that have the tabs into which the fencing can be clipped to form the outside walls and the two interior divisions. Four posts are used for the back, four for the middle, and four posts for the front. The sides can be normal chicken wire but I find it a bit flimsy, so instead I

used a thicker gauge fencing wire. The interior divisions are two lengths of the fencing. Presto, you have compost bins at a low cost.

And now for the fun. Use the first bin or the last as the bin into which you will first place all the raw ingredients. When that material has reached a mid decomposition point, after four months or so,



shovel all that into the middle bin. This will allow a good loosening up and will reverse new additions to the bottom and put all the really nice dark stuff on top. Start a new pile in the first bin. Several months later you will shovel the middle bin into the third bin, shovel the first into the middle and start building yet a third new pile. Continued on pg 16



TO BAG OR NOT TO BAG?

Changes required for city yard trash pick up

The City of Houston plans to start up their collection of yard trimmings in compostable bags on **April 5, 2010.**

As of that date, City of Houston crews will ONLY pick up bagged yard trimmings placed at the curbside in city-approved compostable bags. Yard trimmings placed in the wheeled garbage cart or in any other type of container (such as the old black trash bags) will not be collected.

City Council approved this change to the City's Code of Ordinances in September 2009. The start-up date was to be January 1; then it was moved to February 1. As we go to press, the date has been pushed back to April 5, 2010.

By diverting this material from the landfills, the City estimates at least \$1.5 million in savings annually, while also preserving the environment and landfill

space. The cost savings also should allow more Houstonians to be added to the curbside recycling program.

The City is encouraging folks to "let it lay or take it away." Each of us has the alternatives of letting grass clippings remain on the lawn, using mulching mowers for "grasscycling," or starting a compost bin if we do not want to purchase the new bags.

The city-approved compostable bags are available at Kroger and Wal-Mart; other retailers will be stocking these as well. The bags can be identified by a logo on the box specifying "City Approved" and "City of Houston Biodegradable/ Compostable Bag." I found some at Kroger on W. 43rd for \$6.39 for a box of ten 33-gallon bags; another resident found some at Wal-Mart, but they were slightly more expensive.

for those attending the party and volunteering during the home tour from 5 to 7 p.m. on April 24.







GO CIVIC CLUB MEETING MINUTES

January 5, 2010 The Bell Tower on 34th

President Mark Klein called the meeting to order at 7:07 p.m. at the Bell Tower on 34th Street.

The December 2009 minutes were approved as published in the Gazette, January 2010.

Treasurer Phil Ramirez presented and gave an overview of the budget in a new and more complete format and also gave an update on the Constable Patrol. Our need to cover the Constable Patrol is \$37,000 shy of our \$71,000 goal for 2010. We have received approximately \$34,000 as of January 5. GOMO gave the Civic Club a check for about \$18,000 to reimburse 2009 park maintenance expenses the Civic Club incurred keeping up the parks it is responsible for in the neighborhood.

Carl Waters Jr., Citizen Patrol Chair, said four December crimes were reported to HPD. The HPD web site shows a 24 percent decrease in crime rate from last year.

For the Constable Program, the club was reminded that all constable supporters need to complete a new annual profile each year. Terry Jeanes reported that upcoming issues of the Gazette will be updated with contributors. Also a new afternoon patrol will be assigned; however, Deputy Vest temporarily is covering the shift until a replacement is available.

Carl Waters requested the help of three to five neighborhood volunteers to call GO residents to encourage participation in the constable program. Interested volunteers can contact Carl at gocop@gardenoaks.org or 713.864.1992.

For Beautification, Committee Chair Brenda de Alba reported that replacement parts for the Gazebo repairs are in; Mark Saranie and Ed de Alba will help with the repair. Dian Austin, Membership Chair, reported that GO Civic Club membership is currently 252 residents. Last year's total was 351.

During the monthly GO Civic Club drawing, Lewis Goodkouski from Section 3 won a \$25 gift card to Home Depot.

Jessica Jarvis, Gazette Editor, announced that Tim Merritt, Advertising Manager, has resigned to accept a new job in California and will be missed greatly. For the Garden Oaks Maintenance Organization report, Ed de Alba announced that GOMO meetings will be held 6:30 p.m. the first Tuesday of each month, prior to the Civic Club meetings at Garden Oaks Elementary cafeteria. GOMO's second monthly meeting is held in the GOMO offices on the third Wednesday of the month.

The 2010 Garden Oaks Home and Garden Tour is taking shape, Sue Schmidt reported, as volunteers meet regularly to produce the event. More services, events, and items are needed for the auctions held during the 2010 Home and Garden Tour Preview Party, reported Dian Austin. Also, the Auction Team is growing but can use more volunteers. President Klein thanked the 2009 Civic Club Officers and Committee Chairs for their service and presented past President Scott Easterly with a gift card to Tony's Mexican Restaurant.

The Bell Tour on 34th Street is an impressive and welcome addition to our neighborhood.

Tony Knauth, President, Garden Oaks Chapter-Friends of Montessori, gave a presentation on the history, scope, and purpose of the Montessori program at Garden Oaks Elementary School. 

The ingredients are simple. Any organic material from your yard and kitchen, except for meat and grease will do. Layer everything and water it in as you go. One layer of dried or brown material, about 6-8 inches thick, a similar layer of green stuff, (grass clippings, leaves trimmings, etc.) and finally a layer of dirt from forgotten pots or leftover compost, (if available). Repeat including necessary watering with every addition as moisture is a key element here. Aeration is also critical so every week or so, grab a pitchfork, dig into the pile and turn it. This speeds up the cooking process. For more detailed information on making compost and more complex systems, there is a plethora of information online.

Making the final product does take time, so I can understand purchasing ready made compost. I just like the satisfaction of making it. Be sure to join the Garden Club for other great gardening tips and advice.

CRITTER CORNER

February is National Pet Dental Health Month so this month we talk about tips for home dental care for your pets. Also, Sunday, February 14 is the Krewe of Barkus and Meow Pet Mardi Gras parade in Galveston on the seawall at 1:00 p.m. This is a fun, fun, family event that benefits the Galveston Island Humane Society.

Many of the Cat Catchers remember her as a tiny, sick kitten. She is prissy, vocal, and very fast. Somehow or another she has managed to completely dominate our household and our hearts. Happy Valentine's to my sweet baby girl and to all our precious pets.

Critters 101: Eight Tips and Tools for Home Dental Care for Pets
Start with your vet. First, schedule a dental exam for your pet. Your vet will examine your pet's teeth, gums, and oral cavity.

Ask your vet for a tooth care demonstration. Your vet can demonstrate the proper techniques for your particular pet and any special needs your pet may have. They can recommend toothpastes and brushes that are suited for your pet's dental health and temperament.

Shop for appropriate toothpaste. Do not use human toothpaste! Besides not being tasty for pets, human toothpaste is sudsy and is to be rinsed out, not swallowed. Most pets prefer meatflavored toothpastes over mint flavors. If possible, start with a small sample to find a flavor your pet likes.

Shop for an appropriate toothbrush or cleaning tool. Several pet specific are toothbrushes available. Select a brush size with soft bristles that is appropriate for your pet's mouth. If this will not work for your pet, consider a fingertip brush, a tissue, cloth or, as a last resort, a mouth spray.

Introduce brushing and dental care slowly. The most important things to be aware of when starting a home dental care program are to not get bitten and not harm your pet's mouth. Go slowly. Start with a small amount of toothpaste


and let your pet smell and taste it, praising and encouraging your pet. Add the brush or other tool once you feel comfortable and your pet knows what to expect. Brush gently, stroking from the gums downward. Do not worry about brushing the inside of the teeth by the tongue as they are cleansed by saliva.

Brush daily. Realistically though, once or twice a week is great. Setting up a routine and getting into the habit will help.

Bones or chew toys to help keep teeth clean. I like rope toys and the Kong dental toys, as they are durable and not consumable. Choose a toy appropriately sized for your pet.

Foods or Treats to Keep Teeth and Gums Healthy. A variety of biscuits are on the market labeled as tartar control. Ask your vet if this is an option for your pet for daily care. As with all treats and special diets be mindful of the calories and your pet's overall weight.

RECYCLING...BOOKS

If there are any other non-Kindle users in the world besides me, and you like to read a lot but don't want to spend the money on brand new books, here are some sites I use weekly to trade books:

www.bookmooch.com

You get a point for every book that someone "mooches" from you. Each point allows you to "mooch" a book from someone else.

www.paperbackswap.com

You get a point for every book that you send to someone once they have received it. Each point allows you to receive a book from another member.

www.swaptree.com

This is my favorite trading site. You can trade books, CDs, DVDs, and games. You

don't have to trade like for like. Often the trades are three-way: you send a book to someone in NY. The NY person sends a DVD to someone in Iowa and the Iowa person sends you a CD that you want.

Almost all of the things I have received have been in great condition. Some have looked brand new. Most people ship very quickly. I have been very pleased with all three of these sites.

Both the paperbackswap and swaptree sites allow you to print the prepaid postage labels (you pay thru credit card or Paypal), and then you don't have to stand in line at the post office to mail your package.

For all sites, you pay the postage when you ship (and all can go by USPS Media Mail which is generally cheaper than first class), but you do not pay postage on anything received.
