

GO CIVIC CLUB MEETING MINUTES July 6, 2010

Welcome: President Mark Klein called the meeting to order at 7:10 p.m. at Garden Oaks Elementary School. A motion was made and carried to accept the June minutes as published in the *Gazette*.


Treasurer's Report: Phil Ramirez was not present. Mark Klein reported that the Constable Patrol is \$14,400 short of its annual goal. The Home Tour has made a significant positive revenue impact but without the proceeds from the Home Tour the overall budget would run a slight deficit. In August, the civic club will discuss 2011 fundraising initiatives for the Constable Program. Ticket sales for the Wine Walk will cover one month of Constable Program cost. Additional discussion covered ways to improve notifications regarding dues. 2011 Annual GOCC Budget: Vice President Scott Easterly will lead the August discussion on the 2011 budget.

Treasurer Ramirez has drafted a 2011 budget based on the 2010 guidelines. The civic club may want to increase contributions to some areas. Everyone should bring a list of needs/wants/ costs to the August meeting. The 2011 budget will be finalized in September and published in the November *Gazette*, prior to a December vote.

Announcements:

4th of July Parade: President Mark Klein thanked parade sponsor Deanna Zugheri and the volunteers who helped run the 4th of July Bicycle Parade. **Spark Park Columns:** The columns and sidewalks are installed. Progress is being made on the park improvements and the fence company should continue work shortly. The columns will be decorated with tiles created by Garden Oaks Elementary School students. **Quiet Zone:** No update.

Carter's Grove Apartments: The complex west of Shepherd near 34th has had numerous complaints. The gates appear to be secure but a door and window have been seen open. Investors improved some units, but work stopped some time ago and the final outcome of the property remains in limbo. There *Continued on pg 10*



AIR CONDITIONING TIPS FOR THE SUMMER

Tip No. 5: What does SEER actually mean?

SEER, Seasonal Energy Efficiency Ratio, is calculated by dividing the amount of cooling supplied by an A/C system with the electricity consumed by the system under specific seasonal conditions.

SEER ratings are determined in a laboratory with specific indoor and outdoor conditions as determined by the U.S. Department of Energy. Because A/C systems are evaluated using the same conditions, they can be compared to each other using the SEER rating; the higher the number, the better the efficiency.

Higher SEER ratings usually are achieved by manufacturers using the latest technology in their equipment. That, in turn, can have a big influence on equipment costs. You may pay

more for the latest and greatest, but you'll get increased efficiency and therefore lowered electricity bills in return.

According to American Standard, one of the leading A/C manufacturers in the U.S., most systems installed prior to 2006 are 10 SEER or lower. Installing a new 13 SEER system with its superior technology can save you 38 percent on your electricity bill, a 14 SEER can save you 43 percent and a 15 SEER can save you 47 percent.

As stated in a previous column, invest in the highest quality equipment you can afford. In the long run, this saves you money in operational costs, repairs and premature replacement.

Definitions

BTU: British Thermal Unit. In scientific terms, it represents the amount of energy required to raise one pound

of water one degree Fahrenheit. One BTU is the equivalent of the heat given off by a single wooden kitchen match. For your home, it represents the measure of heat given off when fuel is burned for heating or the measure of heat extracted from your home for cooling.

Ton: A unit of measurement used for determining cooling capacity. One ton is the equivalent of 12,000 BTUs per hour. A 2,000 square-foot house typically requires a five-ton system.



This year's theme is Below the Belt, and table hosts will feature their favorite wines from the southern hemisphere. It should be easy to find a great wine under the \$20 per bottle limit. Each hosting group should provide at least one case of wine and no more than two different wines.

Hosting a table is easy and a lot of fun. Requirements are simple: The civic club furnishes a table and two chairs. Hosts furnish a case of wine, optional palate cleansers or munchies and table decorations. In addition to the eternal gratitude of your friends and neighbors, the benefits include two tickets to the event per host table and priority ticket ordering. The apartments technically are not part of Garden Oaks but are adjacent to the neighborhood.

Garden Oaks Good Neighbor Award: Carl Waters received the quarterly Good Neighbor award. For 13 years, Waters has been a dedicated volunteer working to make the neighborhood safer. His long-term leadership of the GO Citizens on Patrol program has trained and kept local residents patrolling our streets for potential criminal activity.

Wine Walk: The Garden Oaks Wine Walk is scheduled for Saturday, October 16 with a rain date of November 6. Table sponsorships are important for the event's success. Donations from businesses are encouraged. Tickets are \$35 per person, and 200 tickets are available. Additional expenses being incurred this year are for port-o-lets and washing stations.

Standing Committee Reports:

GO Citizens Patrol: Carl Waters reported four crimes in June. All were thefts. Total crimes are down two for the year. The neighborhood needs an extra patroller for GOCOP. Interested residents should contact Waters.

Constable Program: Terry Jeanes reminded everyone enrolled in the Constable Program to use the Vacation Watch Form. If there is an issue with traffic or stop signs during a particular time in a particular area, please let her know so she can get the Constable involved.

Membership: No update. Beautification: No update. Gazette: Mark Klein noted that Jessica Jarvis needs temporary help with the Gazette in August for the September addition. If anyone can help, it would be greatly appreciated.

GardenOaks.org Website: No update.

Garden Oaks Maintenance Organization (GOMO): No update. Garden Oaks Elementary School Update: Principal Lindsey Pollock announced that summer school is over. Teachers will return for the regular school year on August 9 with school starting on August 23. She reported that additional information regarding the HISD application for a significant federal grant to support GOES should be available the end of August.

Presentation: President Mark Klein introduced April Tone from the Harris County Dispute Resolution Center. The DRC provides free mediation services to assist people with resolving many family and civil issues outside the courtroom. The mediators are a trained, neutral third party. Black Middle School: Concern was expressed over families leaving the area if they cannot afford a private middle school. General discussion indicated that parents needed to get involved to understand what, if any, issues the school has and how the community could become better involved to help.

Adjournment: President Mark Klein adjourned the meeting at 8:05 p.m.

CONNECTING MIND, BRAIN, HEALTH AND EDUCATION

Ever wonder how the brain works and what you can do to improve your (and your child's) brain functioning? This summer I attended a class at Harvard University to study just that! The institute was made up of 74 people from all over the world and many different disciplines to study the neuroscience of the brain.

Speakers shared cutting-edge studies regarding advances in the study of the brain including imaging techniques and the importance of healthy nutrition and exercise for brains of all ages and stages. The following information represents simple ways for you and your child(ren) to engage in activities to grow your brain power and get into shape for this coming school year and beyond!

Exercise together as a family. Exercise increases oxygen and blood flow to the brain. Research shows that people who exercise have improved memory and higher

levels of creativity. Walk together in the neighborhood or share in an exercise video or DVD. Yoga and stretching are great ways to oxygenate the brain and work the body at the same time.

Nutrition is key for optimal brain functioning. Food is the power for our bodies and children literally are what they eat. As we feed our bodies, the products we put into our bodies become the bones and tissues that make up our structures. Fruits, vegetables and complex carbohydrates are key to healthy brain function. Choose healthy foods and be a good example to your children. Be sure your child gets enough water. Our bodies primarily are water and the brain needs proper hydration to be alert. Be sure your child eats breakfast, which starts the brain and body working.

Your senses are pathways to the brain and help anchor information. Olfactory (sense of smell) often is overlooked. Use aromas to boost attention and learning. Does a sniff of a familiar scent trigger a memory? Use smell to set the stage for learning or transitions. Scented markers or crayons create positive associations. Allow children to make their own potpourri with cloves and cinnamon. Make scratch-and-sniff pictures by mixing gelatin with half the amount of water and use it as paint. Add cooking extract to tempra or watercolor paint. Grow an herb garden and encourage your child to clip leaves for cooking. A dab of lavender or chamomile on a pillow case can create a peaceful mood and help a child create a positive association with napping or bedtime.

Emotions and learning are intertwined in the brain. You are more likely to remember events and information that are linked to an emotion. Therefore, discuss emotions with your child. Sing songs with them throughout the day because music generates positive connection in the brain. Tell children often how much they mean to you. Teach stress-relaxation strategies and tap into positive feelings.

These are just a few tips to help you and your child build brain power. For further reading, check out Pam Schiller's, *Start Smart: Building Brain Power in the Early Years*, which contains many of these ideas!

CRITTER CORNER

Most dogs don't get enough exercise, so this month we talk about how much is enough. Play with your dog every day and make sure he has plenty of water and be alert to signs of heat stress such as glassy eyes and heavy panting.

Critters 101: How Much Exercise is Enough?

We often think of exercise only as a health issue, but it has significant dayto-day effects on a dog's behavior as well. If dogs, especially puppies and young dogs, don't get the chance to burn off energy the result often is destructive behavior. If you are annoyed at the holes your dog has dug, have headaches from his barking, and have to replace pillows shredded into expensive fluff, your dog probably is not getting enough exercise.

These behavior issues cause many people to give up their dogs, even though they are completely preventable. Unfortunately some people don't think enough about exercise when selecting a dog and choose one who needs more exercise than they are willing or have time to provide.

How much exercise is enough depends on your dog's age, breed and health. A sight hound needs short bursts of exercise and guarding dogs don't need as much as sporting breeds who like to hunt all day. While a leashed walk around the block is a great place to start, it usually is not enough. Most dogs need 30 to 60 minutes of exercise a day, and active breeds need a minimum of 30 minutes of hard aerobic exercise most days of the week. Like people, most dogs like both familiarity and a little variety in their exercise routines. Many dogs get to know the neighborhood during walks and enjoy checking on their favorite spots. Dog parks are popular for off-leash romping with other dogs, which is what most dogs need. However, if your dog does not play well with other dogs, this is not the place for him. Doggie day care can exercise both his mind and body, and he should come home worn out and happy.

In future issues we will talk about specific activities and games for every dog, like the ball hound, the nose and the couch potato. Live by the philosophy that a tired dog is a good dog.
