If you are a member of the Yahoo List Serve, you may be aware of a reported series of vehicle break-ins in Garden Oaks and Shepherd Park Plaza at the end of November. I was very surprised when I checked and then rechecked the HPD web site and only found one crime listed in the neighborhood for November. I hope the parties involved filed reports through the constable's office if they chose not to contact HPD.

Based on this information we have had 48 crimes reported on the HPD web site through November 2010. Last year 59 crimes had been reported through November.



GAZETTE DELIVERY COORDINATORS NEEDED

One coordinator for each section by Dian Austin

If you are reading your *Gazette*, it was delivered by one of the current 42 block captains who hand delivers them door-to-door each month. Each captain gets his/her bundle of *Gazettes* delivered to his/her door and volunteers the time to deliver them to the residents on their routes.

Sue Schmidt and I currently deliver each of these 42 bundles of *Gazettes* to the block captains every month. We are looking for others to help us on a routine basis. If we could get five *Gazette* Delivery coordinators (one for each section), it would allow us to spread the workload.

Each of the *Gazette* section coordinators would be responsible for delivering the bundled *Gazettes timely* (timely is very important!) to the block captains in their section of Garden Oaks.

For example, Section 1 and 1A together have 14 block captains. Section 1 *Gazette* delivery coordinator would have 14 bundles delivered to his/her home, and then he/she would deliver them to the block captains in Section 1/1A. Each bundle is labeled with a cover sheet that shows the name and address of the block captain as well as the route.

Each of the other sections has between six and eight block captains. Section 4 neighbor, Linda Sparks, has volunteered to coordinate delivery to the block captains of Section 4.

We try to get the *Gazettes* delivered to residents prior to the civic club meeting on the first Tuesday of the month and that only works if we give each of the block captains time to

get them delivered. The *Gazettes* usually are received from the printer, neighbor Oscar Ochoa, of OD's Printing, before the last weekend of the month.

This could be a family activity. An adult could drive to each of the designated block captain's homes in their section, and age-appropriate younger family members could put the bundle of *Gazettes* on the porches.



GAZEBO UPDATE

What Happened to our Beautiful Gazebo?

Our beautiful gazebo is no longer standing. Time and our humid environment took its toll on the western red cedar structure. A workday in November was scheduled and Ed de Alba, Jason Cunningham and Kip Noser, made plans to replace rotted wood and reinforce the structure. They discovered the lumber supporting the gazebo had completely rotted, and all it took was a strong push for the entire structure to topple down. I'm very thankful the damage was discovered before someone was iniured.

History of the Gazebo

In 1995, a long-time GO resident, Earl Dragics, approached the civic club about wanting to do something for the neighborhood in memory of his wife, son and grandson who all had died from illness or accidents within a very short timeframe. The idea of a gazebo, purchased as a panelized kit from Vixen Hill, was proposed and Mr. Dragics funded the cost (in excess of \$8000). Harry James, of Harry James Building & Design, donated the labor to assemble the gazebo and through the years has donated the labor and materials to power wash and restain the wood. The gazebo was dedicated in November 1995.

In 1997 Mr. Dragics paid to have additional landscaping installed near the gazebo. Another donation, through a neighborhood family, was made to install electricity to the park in 1998 and since then the park and the gazebo have been decorated with lights during the Christmas holidays in anticipation of Santa's visit. Mr. Dragics died in late 1999 and his surviving son added a memorial granite marker to the others encircling the gazebo and an engraved plaque in the center of the gazebo's floor with his father's name.

Since it was built, this iconic neighborhood structure has hosted weddings and been the focal point for many family photos.

What happens next?

I hope the civic club will fund replacing the gazebo. Harry James has offered to design and supervise the building of a new, improved gazebo using more durable materials and construction methods. He has offered materials and labor at his cost. If any other neighborhood builders would like to join Harry and participate with this project, please contact Mark Klein.

How can you help?

MONTESSORI EDUCATION

A transition for Garden Oaks Elementary

In October 2010, HISD School Board Trustees voted to accept the Federal Magnet School Program Assistance Grant which will provide funding to transition Garden Oaks Elementary to an allschool Montessori Magnet with an emphasis on environmental sciences. As we transition, all 2011-2012 PK and Kindergarten classes will be Montessori.

The availability of Montessori education in a public school setting is a unique opportunity as the majority of Montessori programs are private schools! Only 200 public school Montessori campuses exist in the United Stated, and three are in the Houston Independent School District.

What makes Montessori different than a traditional school setting?

Multi-age settings. Montessori classrooms are characterized by children in a three-year span, three to six year olds (PK - Kindergarten), six to nine year olds (1st – 3rd grade) , and nine to 12 year olds $(4^{th} - 6^{th})$ grade). The students stay with the teacher for all three years providing the children, families and teachers an opportunity to develop lasting relationships and deeper understandings around ability levels and learning styles. By the third year, the older children serve as teaching guides and role to the younger children. This enhances the child's sense of responsibility and mastery in the learning environment.

AIR CONDITIONING TIPS FOR THE WINTER

Tip No. 10: My New Year's Resolution Suggestion: Change Your A/C Air Filter Regularly

I know, I know, you're saying, "What? Air filters again? Talk about something else, Mitch. What else is there to say about air filters?"

What else can I say about air filters? Plenty.

First, a quiz. What are the two most expensive mechanical devices most people own? A car and their home's air conditioning system. Despite being very complex machines, both are remarkably self sufficient and require minimal maintenance. Change the car's oil here, replace the A/C's air filter there, it's really

quite simple. But it must be done.

Change your A/C's air filter once a month. This simple action will pay big dividends including better indoor air quality, lower electrical costs and optimizing the life of your system to its fullest.

Just like when you get in your car, turn the key and expect the engine to start up immediately, you go to your home's thermostat, press the button to lower the temperature and expect the A/C to comply. And it will, if you change the filter.

If you have trouble remembering to do this, connect it with another monthly function such as paying bills. Pay the electrical bill, replace the air filter. While replacing it, reward yourself with a generous pat on the back for not having to make the check's amount as big as

it would be if you had not changed the filter. Or get an ice cream cone, that's a good reward too!

GO CIVIC CLUB MEETING MINUTES

December 7, 2010

Welcome

President Mark Klein called the meeting to order at 7:26 p.m., at the home of Brian O'Leary and George Appling.

A motion was made and carried to accept the November minutes as published in the *Gazette*.

President's Announcements

President Klein thanked Brian O'Leary and George Appling for, once again, generously offering their home and hospitality for the Garden Oak Civic Club's annual holiday meeting and pot luck party. President Klein recognized Scott Easterly, Brenda de Alba and Ed de Alba for their contributions to the Garden Oaks Civic Club. The civic

club is actively seeking a new vice president and beautification chair for 2011.

President Klein introduced Angela Winston, a volunteer with the GO cookbook project – designed to raise funds for the constable program. Ms. Winston reminded everyone how GO Cook: A Neighborly Collection of Recipes makes a great gift, with proceeds going directly to fund neighborhood security. Treasurer's Report

Treasurer Phil Ramirez reported that the constable program goal for 2010 have been achieved. In addition, \$16,000 toward 2011 costs have been collected. Recognition was given to those who coordinated the Wine Walk, GO Cookbook, and Home Tour. An emergency reserve fund has been created from the Home Tour proceeds. If all of the GO Cookbooks are sold in December,

it will create an additional \$9,000 to benefit the constable program. There will <u>not</u> be a home tour in 2011 so continued support from the community is needed.

2011 Budget: The cost of the constable contract has increased for 2011. The investment in GOCC technology and communications initiative is another key addition. The proposed budget was reviewed; a motion was made and carried to accept the proposed 2011 budget.

Standing Committee Reports

GO Citizens Patrol: Carl Waters reported one crime in November, as per the HPD report. However, there may have been thefts too close to the end of the month, which may not have made the report.

Constable Program: Terry Jeanes commented that there were several car break-ins and garage thefts on November 30 in the area. She encouraged everyone to remove

any visible valuables from the car, park close to the house and in welllit areas, if possible.

Membership: Dian Austin reported that there are approximately 140 GOCC members to date for 2011.

Beautification: Brenda de Alba reported that everything is in good shape to be handed off to a new beautification chair. A large clean-up effort occurred in October. Brenda reported that the mowing crew is very reliable. In 2010, several large projects should not need to be repeated in 2011 – e.g. tree pruning and the park gates. The gazebo has been removed as a hazard. Ed de Alba discovered that the column bases were rotten and not safe. It was recommended that the 15-year-old gazebo be rebuilt.

Gazette: Jessica Jarvis reported that 19 new advertisers were supporting the *Gazette* this year. She

needs assistance with some of the production during certain months in 2011. The *Gazette* has produced \$7,000 in GOCC income over the past two years. In the past, the *Gazette* was an expense. Dian Austin requested volunteers who can serve as primary coordination points, per neighborhood section, for *Gazette* delivery.

2011 Board Candidates:

Current candidates announced for the GOCC Board included: President – Mark Klein; Treasurer – Phil Ramirez; Secretary – Heather Leverett; Vice-President – open.

Although not a complete slate, a motion was made and carried to accept the candidates as listed for the 2011 board.

President Mark Klein adjourned the meeting at 7:57 p.m.



The theme for this year's event is Around the Block, Around the World.



CRITTER CORNER

Happy 2011! Now that the holidays are over we have a couple of months of winter to get through. A lot of us become couch potatoes in the winter months so this month we finish our series on dog play personalities with the canine couch potato.

Critters 101: Canine Couch Potato

This dog play personality gives you a "Do we have to?" look when you try to take him for a run and probably won't forfeit his rightful position on the sofa. These dogs usually are affectionate and loving and will accommodate your need to be lazy. They like to play a little and go to the park but will settle right down afterwards.

Top activities for this dog include walking – long leisurely ones or multiple short ones. Even couch potatoes need exercise. Prepare Your Pets for Winter

As temperatures lower, remember to keep your beloved pets happy and healthy. Don't leave pets outside when the temperature drops. People think dogs enjoy the cold but most dogs want to be with people.

If your dog is outside, the dog house should have just enough room for the dog to stand up and turn around, but no more. They should face away from the wind and be elevated a few inches off the ground. Don't keep towels on the floor of the dog house or anything that might draw their body heat away. Cedar shavings or straw are good choices. The doorway should be covered with waterproof burlap or heavy plastic. Pets that spend a lot of time outside need more food in the winter because keeping warm depletes energy. Use

plastic or ceramic food and water bowls instead of metal.

Especially at risk during colder months are very young or very old animals, animals with chronic conditions, animals with short hair and outdoor pets.

Antifreeze is a deadly poison, but it has a sweet taste that may attract animals and children. When using antifreeze wipe up spills and store out of reach.
