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CITIZENS' PATROL PROGRAM

According to the statistics on the Houston Police Department website, 52 crimes were reported in Garden Oaks last year. This makes the third consecutive year reported crime in Garden Oaks is down.

I looked at the numbers from 2007 through 2010. We had 102 crimes reported in 2007, and last year we had 52. By my somewhat limited math skill that is a 51 percent reduction in crime since 2007.

Let's not stop there. If you have some time to give, the patrol program can use more patrollers. Requirements are you must be 18 years of age or older, a resident of Garden Oaks and able to pass a criminal background check by the





GOMO UPDATE

Members of the Garden Oaks Maintenance Organization (GOMO) passed a ballot measure at its annual meeting in October to continue funding two full-time constables to patrol our neighborhood. The annual cost of the two patrols is approximately \$150,000.

Currently three 40-hour constable patrols provided dedicated security for the neighborhood. One of the patrols is funded by direct donations of residents as well as fundraising activities such as the Wine Walk and new neighborhood cookbook. The other two patrols were initiated by and have been funded for the past several years by GOMO. The constable measure for use of surplus funds passed with 95 percent of the votes cast, with ballot responses being 185 in favor to 9 against.

GOMO also is providing \$20,000 in 2011 for maintenance of neighborhood green spaces under a previously approved measure.

Director elections were held at the GOMO annual meeting in October. Four directors were elected to terms that end in 2013: Section One, Melissa Haselden Zepeda; Section Two, Ed de Alba; Section Three, Kelly Mathews; and Section Five, Teresa Coleman. Thanks go to those neighbors for agreeing to serve.

Three directors are elected from each represented section of the neighborhood. They compose a 12-member board of directors. The terms of board members are staggered so that each section elects at least one director annually (occasionally more depending on resignations by directors.) The board has a monthly business meeting

on the third Wednesday of the month in Suite 216 of the Garden Oaks Professional Building, 4001 N. Shepherd. An informal plan review session at 6:30p.m. precedes the monthly civic club meetings on the first Tuesday of the month.

At its monthly business meeting in November, the GOMO board of directors elected new offices for the year: Tim Weltin, president; Mark Saranie, vice president; Adrian Berry, secretary; and, Kelly Matthews, treasurer. A list of current directors is included in this publication.

Special thanks go to Ed de Alba who completed his fifth consecutive term as president. Ed has volunteered a tremendous of time and effort over the past five years in that capacity. He will continue serving Garden Oaks as a GOMO director and in many other volunteer roles but you are encouraged to give him a pat on the back for his half-decade of service to our community in his role as head of the property owners association.

For plan review, bring two copies of the plans to a scheduled GOMO meeting, including a site plan and elevation with full dimensions; a survey of the property; and, if the construction includes changes to a detached garage, elevations of the residence.


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

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OUR NEIGHBORHOOD – THE SUBTLE QUALITY

Many times we get caught up in our own lives, with our own routines, only occasionally reach out to others. We sometimes forget the power of kindness. My family is fortunate to live in a neighborhood that quietly excels in practicing neighborly kindness.

In 2001, my family moved my dad, Mr. Sims, to Garden Oaks from the Rio Grande valley to live a couple of blocks from us. He hated to leave the area he lived for 60 years but knew it was time to move closer to family after my mother died.

Dad loved his garden and dogs and was amazed at the number of walkers, runners and bicyclists that passed his house. Many of the neighbors waved and talked with Dad.

As the years passed, his eyesight got worse, but he still enjoyed pleasantries with his neighbors. He identified the neighbors by the barks of their dogs and Dad's dogs that patrolled his yard added to the conversation.

Dad's plants are unusual. How many yards can boast mesquite, papaya and grapefruit trees planted next to oak and pine trees? He frequently would share his crop of papayas and grapefruits, plant cuttings and seeds.

At 92, he was fiercely independent. Fortunately, his neighbors looked out for him. I can't remember the number of times I was called through the years to let me know he was on the roof trying to get the pine needles out of the gutters, even at his age and with his

limited vision.

Unfortunately Dad's health recently declined rapidly, due to his failing heart condition. Dad loved to sit in the sun and fell when trying to walk the few feet back to the door. The postal carrier found him right away, and several walking neighbors who knew him came to his aid. While in the hospital, he commented on the great neighborhood we live in, and the outpouring of genuine concern for each other. Dad didn't make it back to his house, but he did make it Home the day after Christmas.

I offer a very heart-felt thank you to the neighbors who warmed his heart with kindness through the years and to the neighbors who stopped to help him that Saturday in December. My Dad was an amazing man, and he had kind and gracious neighbors.

GO CIVIC CLUB MEETING **MINUTES**

January 4, 2011

Garden Oaks Elementary School by Heather Leverett, Secretary

Welcome: President Mark Klein called the meeting to order at 7:10 p.m.

A motion was made and carried to accept the December minutes as published in the Gazette.

President's Announcements:

Vice President Opening: President Klein reported that the civic club has identified a new vice president candidate, who could be voted on at the February meeting.

Gazebo: A line item has been added to the membership form to support donations for the replacing the gazebo. Additional discussion covered potential ways to fund the

cost of the gazebo replacement and the need to obtain a cost estimate for the materials.

SNAP (Super Neighborhood Action Plan) Funding Requests:

President Klein explained the difference between projects covered under SNAP and CIP (Capital Improvement Projects). The city's SNAP program facilitates smaller projects that can be done to improve a neighborhood such as signs, mulch and park barbecue pits. Mark is gathering a list of items to be submitted prior to the deadline on the 14th. Garden Oaks parks may not qualify for some SNAP improvements as the majority of the parks in the area are adopted.

Technology Project Initiative:

At the February meeting there will be an update on progress and estimated costs.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Phil Ramirez reported that the Constable Program cost will be closer to \$75,000, based on the updated contract for 2011. More people are sending in automatic payments. The December financial numbers for the Gazette are slightly misleading as they do not yet reflect the December printing payment due to the cash-based accounting rules. The revenue from the GO Cookbooks is not reflected in the numbers. The surplus from the Wine Walk and Home Tour is in the reserve account. There is no material impact in financials as compared with the same timeframe in 2010.

Standing Committee Reports:

GO Citizens Patrol: Carl Waters reported four crimes in December. There were 52 crimes in 2010 compared with 59 in 2009.

Constable Program: Terry Jeanes reported that a recent resident's concern regarding ticketing at a stop sign was reported to the

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captain. There was additional commentary about the physical descriptions in describing crime suspects. It was noted that any neighborhood alerts online use the same information as provided by the authorities. Please keep in mind that the constables are cognizant of crimes in nearby areas and work diligently to keep our neighborhood safe. If you have any issues or concerns, call your constables.

Membership: No update.

GARDEN OAKS ELEMENTARY PUBLIC SCHOOL MONTESSORI MAGNET

Garden Oaks Elementary is in its first year as an H.I.S.D. magnet program thanks to funding provided by a federal magnet school program assistance grant. This grant provides a three-year revenue cycle during which the campus will transition to an all-Montessori campus with an emphasis on environmental sciences, the branch of biology concerned with the relations between organisms and their environment.



TEA Recognized School

2008, 2009, 2010

Dr. Maria Montessori recognized the importance of teaching children this as an integral concept. She included this in her philosophy of education in what she described as "cosmic" education. In other words, the Montessori curriculum not only focuses on the important academic subjects of reading and writing, but also finds value in helping children achieve their individual potential in their life's work in context of a place in the universe. Montessori believed that when we recognize the importance of each individual's contribution and our inter-relatedness to one another, we can impact positive change in the world. In recognition of her endeavors, Montessori was nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize three times prior to her death in 1953.

This focus on environmental sciences is a timely subject as we face the daunting task as a society of practicing responsible stewardship of our natural resources. Recycling, reusing and reducing are key concepts in examining our relationship with our environment. This year, we are focusing on the implementation of our environmental science initiatives including alternative energy displays, community gardens, bird-watching platforms and integrating more hands-on lessons for our students to experience composting and rainwater harvesting.

As one of the three public school Montessori campuses in H.I.S.D. and one of only 70 public school Montessori campuses in the nation, I invite you to stop by and see the excitement as we continue the tradition of academic excellence in a socially responsible context.

Join us at our Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten Round-up. All entering students at these levels will be enrolled in Montessori classes for the 2011-12 school year. With more than 250 applications received, I encourage our neighbors to register now to secure your spot for next year.

RENEWAL AT FRANK BLACK MIDDLE SCHOOL

We are fortunate to live in a community with access to a wide variety of options for our children's education. Several outstanding examples of established and emerging schools show what is possible when parental involvement, community support, administrative focus, adequate resources, excellent faculty and eager students are combined on the same campus.

One school, though, which most of the kids in our area are zoned to, has not enjoyed that same combination of fortunate circumstances in recent times. Frank Black Middle School has fallen out of favor as a middle school of choice for many families in our area. In fact, enrollment at the 6th, 7th and 8th grade institution is only around 560 students, considerably smaller than the enrollment at Oak Forest Elementary, which is in the same block.

In addition to Oak Forest Elementary, four elementaries are designated feeder schools for Black Middle School: Garden Oaks, Durham, Sinclair and Stevens. The Frank Black campus is designed to accommodate more than three times it current enrollment. Demographic changes in the surrounding neighborhoods, most notably a wave of young children, make this an opportune time to join together to help create a change for the better. It is time for renewal at Frank Black Middle School, Working together as a community we can make it a vibrant, thriving institution that offers a viable middle school option to area parents and students.

Frank Black Middle School is scheduled for physical upgrades

in the coming months and contemporary efforts by faculty and staff to improve the institution already are yielding tangible results. A workgroup of parents, teachers and community members has been meeting in recent months to help foster long-term renewal and improvement at the school.

As part of that effort, community tours of the school will be held on four nights beginning in February. The project has been dubbed Le Tour De Black, and you, fellow parents and community members are invited to attend. The tours will start in the school library at 6:30 p.m. Childcare will be available. A short informational session, followed by a school tour, will take about an hour. For interested participants who are able to stay longer, a question and answer session will follow the tours.

Each of the four nights is dedicated to a specific feeder elementary school but people are welcome to attend on any of the evenings. Monday, February 7 is Garden Oaks night; Tuesday, February 15 for Durham; Wednesday, February 23 is for Oak Forest; Thursday, March 3 is for Sinclair and Stevens.

In the United States, 64 percent of men do not make plans in advance for a romantic Valentine's Day with their sweethearts.


In Victorian times it was considered bad luck to sign a Valentine's Day card.



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HEAVY TRASH

What can I set out, and when? by Dian Austin

Are you confused about what you can set out for heavy trash pick up and when? Well, you're not alone. After the city revamped the heavy trash program a year or so ago, we all may be confused. The city no longer picks up both tree waste and junk waste every month.

The year starts off with tree waste being picked up in January and then alternates each month from tree waste to junk waste.

The tree waste months are January, March, May, July, September and November. During these months, any tree waste that is picked up will be recycled/composted, thus diverting it from the landfills. Tree waste is defined as tree branches, stumps, limbs and other foliage-related materials.

Junk waste is picked up only in the alternate months: February, April, June, August, October and December. Junk waste includes furniture, appliances and other bulky materials.

Junk waste will not be picked up during tree waste months. However, tree waste will be picked up during junk waste months but will not be recycled or composted.

Also, per the city's website:

 The Solid Waste Management Department is not allowed to collect any material that was generated by contractors who were retained by a resident to perform work on residential property. It is the responsibility of the contractor to remove all debris that may arise from the contractor's activities. These contractor-related activities include, but are not limited to: trimming and removal of trees, remodeling, new construction and roofing.

- If authorized items placed for collection are mixed with unauthorized items, city crews are not be obligated to sort the materials and may refuse the entire load.
- Tree or junk waste should be placed adjacent to the front curb (or street side for most of Garden Oaks) between the hours of 6 p.m. the Friday before, and 7 a.m. on the scheduled collection day, not days or weeks ahead of time.

of the month: All of Section 1A, the 700 block of Sue Barnett and the south side of the 700 block of W. 38th.

2nd Tuesday of the month: All of Section 1 and any residences between W. 43rd and W. 38th. This includes the south side of all blocks of W. 43rd and the north side of the 700 block of W. 38th.

3rd Tuesday of the month: All residents in any sections living north of W. 43rd, including the north side of W. 43rd St.

So when is heavy trash scheduled to be picked up? It is on our regularly scheduled day of the week for regular trash pick up, Tuesday, but whether it's the 1st, 2nd or 3rd Tuesday of the month, depends on where you live.

Generally, for Garden Oaks, heavy trash will be picked up:

Don't forget to join us for our monthly steak night with live entertainment Friday, February 18 where \$14 buys you a 16-oz. ribeye with sides.

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

In between holidays here are some tips to get your picky canine to eat.

Critters 101: Canine Picky Eaters

Loss of appetite or losing interest in food choices is a frustrating and worrisome situation for dog owners. Owners often will switch foods or offer tempting choices to help entice their pet's appetite. My first suggestion when a dog loses interest in food is to get an examination by a veterinarian to rule out physical reasons. Many health issues can cause loss of appetite and those need to be ruled out first.

Whenever you have a dog that is a picky eater, regardless of what food you may feed or are trying to switch them to,







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remember some important points. Do not hover over the dog anxiously, to see if he or she will eat. This often is more fretful for the dog who may become averse to eating because it makes you appear so anxious. Try to act nonchalant and put the bowl down and turn away or go to another room. If the dog won't eat it, put it up and try again for the next meal. Sometimes we unwittingly teach our dogs 'not to eat' with this behavior.

Try to feed the dog on a regular schedule, and stick to it so the dog automatically will become hungry at those times and anticipate the meal. Act happy while preparing the meal, and act like this is an exciting event. If you have another dog that eats heartily, so much the better. If the dog still won't eat, pick up the bowl casually after ten minutes and put it away. Act like this is no big deal. Do not get upset if your dog won't eat.

Give your dog a regular exercise program to promote appetite hunger. This could be a daily walk, throwing a ball or taking your dog to the park. Exercise will help build an appetite, as well as provide mental stimulation.

Remember, some puppies go through periods of fast growth and then have slow down times. The slow down time can cause decrease appetite. Also teething can cause loss of appetite due to sore gums.

Hormonal changes in intact females can cause loss of appetite changes, as well for males if a female in heat is within scenting range.

Always be aware of any changes in your dog when appetite decreases. Stress can cause loss of appetite, which can include moving, changes in their owner's mood, weather changes and grief. Be aware of changes in the environment as well as your dog's health. These can all offer clues to loss of appetite changes and help in resolving the problem.
