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CITIZENS' PATROL PROGRAM

The Civic Club invited the Houston Police Department (HPD) and the Constable's office to the February Meeting to discuss neighborhood crime. HPD acknowledged non-violent crime in the area (burglary, robbery, theft and auto theft) is up 28% from 2010 to 2011. They also reported violent crimes (murder, rape and assaults) were down 29% for the same time period. Constable Berry and Sergeant Escobedo, who represented HPD, stated both departments were concerned about the rise in non-violent crime and were dedicating additional man power to the area in an attempt to catch the persons responsible for it.

HPD reported the arrest of one the black males driving the black Toyota Camry in area burglaries and had leads on his partner whom they expected to arrest soon. All of this seems to be of no avail as through the middle of February home burglaries continued to be reported with some frequency. Three occurred in the 200 block of W 31st in just one afternoon.



GO CIVIC CLUB MEETING MINUTES

Garden Oaks Elementary School February 7, 2012

Welcome: President Mark Klein called the meeting to order at 7:05 p.m. President's Announcements **Garden Oaks Elementary School Annual Community Pancake** Breakfast: A tremendous success with some 850 plates of pancakes served. Thank you to all of the volunteers. Houston/Galveston Regional Plan for Sustainable Development: On the city website, there are notices about three upcoming meetings that welcome public input for a plan to successfully manage an increase of four million people expected over the next three decades in our area.

Home Tour: The logo is completed. An auction chair is still needed. Ed and Brenda de Alba's garden was nominated as a tour addition by President Klein in early January.

Special Guests

Carl Walters introduced Constable Berry, Sergeant Escobedo and Officers Bertels and Johnson from HPD's North Division. The officers were here to speak about neighborhood and personal safety.

Constable Kenneth Berry came out of retirement in January 2012 to replace ex-Constable Abercia. Constable Berry reported that Precinct One is alive and well despite recent budget cuts and the issues surrounding Abercia. The Constables are successfully and consistently serving the community, Berry said. He encouraged residents to call the constable to report crimes and suspicious activities.

Sergeant Escobedo explained that the North Division covers over 300,000 people across 52 square miles. Recent burglaries are primarily between the hours of 6am to 5pm. Wednesday is the most common day. He reported that one of the suspects in the recent burglaries in Garden Oaks had been arrested and they expected to have the second suspect arrested soon. Sgt. Escobedo also reviewed crime statistics across 2010 and 2011 which reflected a decrease in violent crimes but an increase in non-violent crimes.

Sgt. Escobedo also highlighted the importance of supporting the Citizens Patrol program. Started over 20 years ago, the program in HPD's North Division area now has 400-500 volunteers and covers over 22 neighborhoods.

Officer Bertels gave a presentation on personal safety and identity theft. Key themes included awareness of surroundings, acknowledging strangers at your door but NOT opening the door, and calling the constable or HPD when suspicious of anyone in the neighborhood.

Officer Johnson spoke about preventing vehicle burglaries by removing the opportunity. Nothing should be in sight in your car, including gym bags, loose change, or a GPS. All belongings should be taken in the house, even if the car is in your driveway.

Additional discussion included recent crimes in the area, including an assault, participating in groups to get more information about crimes, and how to log vacation watches to protect your home.

Garden Oaks 2012 Home Tour

Brenda de Alba reported that the tour will include six homes and two gardens. Tickets are for sale at \$17.00 in advance and \$20.00 on the day of the tour. A fee of \$6.00 will be charged for entry to a single home. The logo is completed and publicity has started. There is already \$13,750 in sponsorships. Suggestions have included food trucks. The Garden Oaks Shopping Center will be the site for the command center. Babysitting services are being investigated. The preview party is on April 21st and individual tickets are \$100/ticket. This year there will not be an online auction and there will not be an after-tour party for volunteers. Needs include an auction chair, donations for the auction, docents,

and people to help with set up on tour day. We also need volunteers to help put out posters.

Standing Committee Reports

The official committee reports were tabled until the March meeting given the time. Dian Austin (membership) announced that Francisco Diaz won the door prize, a \$25 Starbucks gift card.

The minutes for January 2012 were tabled until the March meeting.

Additional Announcement/Discussion

Alex Martinez (Section One) brought up a concern about the gas station at the corner of Yale and 30th selling alcohol and being in violation of deed restrictions. The issue was identified in December and there was concern about GOMO addressing the violation. Mark Saranie (VP of GOMO) responded that legal counsel was looking into the violation and the GOMO has contacted station management to discuss their policy. It was noted that Exxon Mobil used to own the station and did not sell beer or wine, but new owner TimeWise now manages the station. Lindsey Pollock, Principal of Garden Oaks Elementary School, announced that the school – as part of the MSAP (Magnet Schools Assistance Program) Award – is looking at ways to partner to expand the scope of its environmental curriculum and renewable programs. Neighbors are welcome to participate in the Site Based Decision Making Committee (SDMC) to help with decisions.

Terry Jeanes reminded everyone to support the new Farmers Market near the Petrol Station at Golf and Wakefield.

Vice President Seghers adjourned the meeting at 8:25 p.m.

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LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Cathy Wahren's note, in the "A Bit of History" section indicates that Garden Oaks was a "country club" community, and boasted a "nine hole golf course" located "east of Shepherd".

I have heard the "golf course in the neighborhood" story before, but without confirmation.

What is known is that Pine Forest Country Club, which was founded by returning WWII veterans who wanted a club, but did not see themselves gaining membership to River Oaks, Houston, or Lakeside Country Clubs, was indeed established at the location of the current Pine Forest industrial park, behind the strip centers (and Sears) that line the east side of Shepherd between the railroad and Crosstimbers. In that the Country Club was a post-war development, and Garden Oaks was established pre-war, it casts doubt on the concept that Garden Oaks was founded as a "country club" community.

Pine Forest was a high quality 18 hole course, and in fact hosted the Houston Open in 1949, which was won by Palmer – no, not Arnold, but John Palmer. By the early 1970s, development pressure in the area was strong, and Pine Forest finally succumbed to temptation and accepted an offer for the purchase of the property, leaving Garden Oaks with industrial warehouses with only the "Pine Forest" name surviving. (The very old members of Pine Forest can point out a couple of places within the industrial park where a tee box, or green mound, still exist, however.)

The club then moved to its current location on Clay Road (which is actually West 43rd Street, extended many miles west) between Highway 6 and Barker-Cypress Road. With the sales proceeds, the Club was able to build 27 golf holes, a large modern clubhouse, swimming pool, and arched wooden beam tennis dome – and open debt free. Aerial photos show the old course layout. If interested, go check out <u>www.historicaerials.com</u> and enter a Garden Oaks address in the search, then select the 1957 photo option.

But interesting questions remain. Was there indeed a 9 hole course in the neighborhood at any point? The most likely scenario, if the answer is yes, is that the veterans bought it, and expanded it to 18 holes when Pine Forest was built. But I have no evidence for that. There is nothing on the 1957 photo, the oldest one of the area on that website, that would hint of such a course at any other location in or near the neighborhood.

Just thought I would give you and Cathy a follow-up on the golf mysteries of Garden Oaks.





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WET AND WONDERFUL GOES PANCAKE BREAKFAST

A flash flood watch on Saturday morning, February 4 was not enough to keep hundreds of parents, students, and dignitaries away from the 18th Annual Pancake Breakfast & Silent Auction at Garden Oaks Elementary School (GOES).

Event chairman Steve Pittman said that the volunteer dads and granddads flipping pancakes in the kitchen served nearly 850 breakfasts, and that residents turned out like ducks to purchase classroom art projects and thousands of dollars in merchandise and services.

"What inspired us most was the number of new parents that came to visit," said Pittman. "We were well over capacity at the parent orientation and had to quickly schedule a second session to accommodate all the people wanting to learn more about the school. It tells me that our principal, Ms. Pollock, her exceptional teaching staff, and thousands of parent volunteer hours over the years have created a very special learning environment here."

Among the notable attendees were Harris County Sheriff Adrian Garcia; HISD School Board Trustees Anna Eastman, Mike Lunceford, and Rhonda Skillern-Jones; Houston City Council Member (District C) Ellen Cohen; and former Houston City Council Member (District A) Toni Lawrence.

This year's event theme, "Growing Up Together" was a nod toward significant changes on campus resulting from the award of a U.S. Department of Education Magnet Schools Assistance Program grant for approximately \$2 million last year. The grant helped establish GOES as a Montessori Magnet School with Environmental Sciences. Enrollment has since increased by more than 20 percent in the 2011-2012 school year alone. The number of applications for next Fall has more than doubled the number received last year.

Sponsored by the GOES Parent Teacher

Organization (PTO), the annual breakfast helps cover funding gaps that the grant and other public agencies cannot. Key among the school's funding needs are enhanced technology in the classroom, student field trips, and ancillary arts and enrichment programs.



AIR CONDITIONING TIPS FOR THE SPRING

Tip No. 22: Preventative Maintenance is the Key

Preventative care check-ups are the key. That's why we go to the dentist on a regular basis so small problems can be located and handled before they become big, expensive, painful ones.

It's that ounce of prevention

The same is true for your home's air conditioning system. Preventative maintenance is the way to make sure that the system continues to function the way it's supposed to. As a homeowner, how do you know that your heating and cooling equipment is operating correctly and efficiently? Obviously, if the temperature inside your home is too hot or too cold or unusual noises emanate from your A/C in the middle of the night, you would know something's wrong. But what if the amperage draw (amount of electricity in wire) is too high on one of the system's motors? Or your compressor is running low on freon which would lead to overheating? Or worst of all, how would you know if your

HEALTHY HABITS TO SAVE OUR HOME

Garden Oaks Elementary is home to our Montessori Magnet program emphasizing Environmental Sciences. This dynamic program not only offers children the opportunity to thrive in a Montessori school, but also to learn about and practice habits that will save our planet. Environmental Sciences focus on ways in which we can remediate and reduce the impact that we humans have on our home planet and ensure a sustainable future. Dr. Maria Montessori realized the importance of this aspect of education long before it was evident to the general public that we would someday face many of the challenges we have today. As part of the \$3 million federal Magnet School Assistance Program grant, Garden Oaks Elementary will benefit from the installation of the following renewable and sustainable features on campus to help educate our children and improve the sustainability features on campus:

Wind Turbine - Approximately 60 feet tall with the feature to fold down in severe weather. The Wind turbine's 11 foot wind blades will generate power into the electrical grid at the school. This natural and renewable energy source will reduce the electrical load of school.

Water catchment system - Installed

in two locations on campus to irrigate the gardens and maintain the level of the water in the school's wildlife area pond

- Solar panels to reduce the electrical load at the school
- Solar panels and wind feature in the pond to provide aeration
- Ornithology observation deck on campus for nature observation
- Outdoor classroom

These features, together with the tireless efforts of parent volunteers on the campus, create an inviting and exciting outdoor learning environment for our children and families. Today, the U.S. leads the world in waste generation (245 million tons annually) with a record 4.5 pounds per day. These installations and efforts on our campus are a step in the direction of saving our planet, our home. By investing our time and efforts in reducing our human footprint on the world, together we can make a difference for our children's future!

HOMELESS CHILDREN DESERVE TO READ

A 12 year old boy is in the fourth grade here in Houston. He has learning disabilities and has failed multiple times. He has experienced harsh environments while living with various relatives, in foster homes and even in a car. This boy cannot read and does not have direct access to books. This boy has me thinking about homelessness beyond the homeless man on the corner.

I am a 13 year old 8th grader at Alexander Hamilton Middle School. I have grown up in Garden Oaks and am a Cadette Girl Scout. I am only one year older than the homeless boy. What started out as a school research project for me has grown into a community service project. I originally expressed my interest in the homeless by requesting money, instead of gifts, for my 8th birthday. I collected enough money to make 47 full meals which I delivered to homeless men and women around Houston. My friends and I witnessed firsthand how grateful the homeless are for the simple things in life. From this initial project I have worked events helping the homeless like the Big Feast and annual Girl Scout service projects.

This issue of homelessness became more important to me when my cousins found themselves having to live in a homeless shelter in Minnesota. This caused my cousins' education to be interrupted resulting in my oldest cousin having to be retained in school. As a result of this ordeal, reading is still quite difficult for this child.

In my research, I have found that for every 135 children in the United States, three will become homeless.

According to The National Center on Family Homelessness, 1.6 million children are living with relatives, in homeless shelters, motels or on the streets as defined by the McKinney Act Definition of homelessness. The Harris and Fort Bend counties accounted for 11,000 of these children. Nationwide, this is a 33% increase from 2007. Among these children, the number of preschool children has increased 43%. Homeless children in public schools increased 41% between 2008 and 2009. Locally, as of January 2011, the number of homeless in Harris and Fort Bend counties had

increased by 25% in a year's time. These statistics show there are a reported 3,904 homeless students attending HISD schools this year alone.

Stress, aggressive behavior, and depression are twice as likely to occur with homeless children compared to their peers with homes. Many homeless children face physical, emotional, social and behavioral problems in addition to educational problems. Homeless children are at higher risk of having poor health and

even lead poisoning due to the environments in which they live with no health care. Many of these children experience stressful events for which they are too young to understand. At least one quarter of homeless children have seen or been victims of violence. Educationally, homeless children fall behind four times the rate than their peers. Their test scores are often below grade level and they suffer from undiagnosed learning disabilities. All of this only helps to contribute to the continuation of the circle of homelessness in their future.



Emily Roberts, a13 year old 8th grader at Alexander Hamilton Middle School, Garden Oaks Resident and Cadette Girl Scout, is collecting new or gently used children's and young adult books to help establish or improve a library for children at one of the local area homeless shelters.

I have personally toured local homeless facilities. I visited The Covenant House and SEARCH where I interviewed the directors. I also conducted a telephone interview with a representative from The Star of Hope. I plan to visit IMPACT soon to interview its director and assess its needs. With the exception of The Star of Hope, I have found there is a great need for books and better equipped libraries. The books in these facilities are often out of date or in poor condition.

I have also worked in a very low income elementary school reading to children. This is where I learned of the 12 year old 4th grader who lived in a car. I have learned firsthand these children do not own books.

The State of America's Children states that "poverty impacts education." With books, the homeless children will have better equipped learning abilities which will improve their test scores. With these accomplishments, more will be able to find jobs and possibly go to college. One of these children may very well be the next great inventor. Greater access to books may make all the difference.

I want to make an impact. I am currently collecting new or gently used children's and young adult books to help establish or improve a library at one of the shelters I have visited. I hope to collect enough books to also create book bags to give to individual children. Now is the time for our community to care and help by making donations because these children deserve to read.

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CRITTER CORNER

Forty one million Americans claim Irish as their primary ethnicity. That is the second largest ethnic group in America and more than eight times the population of Ireland itself. So this month get your Irish on! If you go looking for four leaf clovers you will surely notice the joys of a clover patch; the smell, the coolness, the thickness. This month Dorothy and I talk about clover lawns as an alternative to grass – less water, less mowing, and no fertilization. Our pet of the month family are of German descent (the largest ethnic group in America) but we can teach them to be a little Irish with a toast -Sláinte (pronounced 'slawn-cha') and means "Health" in Gaelic.

Critters 101: Coming Up Clover

Clover is a better lawn than grass is. It requires less water, requires less mowing, and it requires no fertilization; ever. It fixes nitrogen in the soil and is beautiful. It also aerates and enriches heavy soils. It will not urine scald when dogs urinate on it. A heavy over planting of a clover suitable for your area will gradually choke out any and all weeds. You can mow your clover lawn, or let it bloom. Mowing will favor the clover over grass, as it encourages it to spread out instead of up. In the deepest drought, a clover lawn will be fresh and cool and green, while all around, the grass is brown and parched. Clover is NOT a weed. Most American lawns used to be full of, or even primarily, clover. The only reason we now consider it a "weed" is that so-called "weed and feed" products require the narrow blade of a grass plant to function.

In the book **Redesigning the American** Lawn, the authors challenge gardeners to abandon what they call the "Industrial Lawn," with its enormous chemical dependency and its waterhogging ways. Clover in particular, when seeded into a new or existing lawn, will help fix nitrogen in the soil and eliminate the need for most fertilization.

The simple act of cutting a bit more often, but cutting less of the plant, and leaving the mulched clippings on the lawn, can literally supply all the food your lawn needs. This is a valuable consideration, as home lawn

DAY OF THE HOME TOUR, FOR KIDS OF VOLUNTEERS ONLY


