



August 12: Houston Heights **

The Heights was developed in 1892 as an independent city just northwest of downtown Houston. With more than 10,000 lots designated for residential, commercial and industrial development as well as utilities, schools and an electric streetcar line, the Heights was one of Texas' earliest planned communities. Today, it remains a fascinating historic neighborhood, from the grand Victorian homes along Heights Boulevard to the cottages and bungalows on the side streets. Our tour covers a section of the neighborhood, focusing on the evolution of residential architecture in the 20th century and fascinating stories about life n Houston in the early 1900s.

Tickets will be sold beginning at 5:30 p.m. in the median of Heights

Boulevard on the north side of 11th Street. Admission is \$10 per person (\$7 for students with valid ID and Preservation Houston members). Children 11 and under are admitted free, and tour participants who walk, bike or ride public transit to the tour will receive a \$2 discount on admission. Free street parking is available nearby; be sure to observe posted parking regulations.

Please note that this is an exterior walking tour only. The tour will not visit the interiors of any buildings.

August 25: Glenwood Cemetery *

Located on rolling land near Buffalo Bayou with glorious trees and landscaping, as well as elaborate Victorian monuments and statuary, historic Glenwood Cemetery, established in 1871, is one of the most beautiful outdoor spaces in Houston. It is also the resting place of some of Houston's most famous citizens, including philanthropist George Hermann; Texas Governor and Humble Oil co-founder Ross Sterling; oil wildcatter Glenn McCarthy; movie star Gene Tierney; and eccentric billionaire Howard Hughes. Our tour explores the unforgettable stories of the men and women buried here as well as Glenwood's beautiful landscape and elaborate monuments.

Love Matters

Summarized by Lindsey Pollack, Principal of Garden Oaks Elementary, from the book Why Love Matters: How affection shapes a baby's brain, by Sue Gerhardt.

The importance of love and affection for a child's physical development and mental health are the subject of much current research among educators, neuroscientists and psychologists. Over 100 years ago, Maria Montessori recognized love and affection as important elements in a child's education and implemented multiage classrooms and the element of peace education in her educational philosophy. She wrote, "Every work which is done according to the laws of nature and creates a harmony among beings attains consciousness under a form of love" (1942).


Montessori environments are designed to have uncluttered rooms with beautiful materials in the classroom and outdoor spaces for connections to nature. The classrooms are structured with three

age groups with a teacher (guide) who stays with them for three years. For example, a Lower Elementary classroom has first, second and third grade students in the same room. A child who enters as a first grader stays with this teacher and the cohort of children for three consecutive years. This stability in the classroom builds loving relationships among the children and a bond between the teacher and the family as they work together to ensure a child's success in school. Additionally, children who enter as a first grader are mentored and nurtured by the "upper classmen" in the room who are the leaders in the class. By the time the child is a third grader, they have become the experts in the room and welcome the incoming first graders. This cycle of classroom life in each level of Montessori education provides children and families longterm, lasting relationships with their school family and extends into the community!

As parents and guides in Montessori classrooms, it is of utmost importance



to recognize the trust and love children give to the adults in their lives. Children crave constant reassurance from adults throughout the day. Montessori suggested that even the child who has tantrums and misbehaves is struggling to balance his inner needs and ideas against demands of adults who cannot understand his needs. This does not imply that the adult acquiesce to the child, but rather it emphasizes the importance of adults recognizing the obstacles that may be in the path of childhood so we may guide children to control their bodies and vocalize their thoughts through an



understanding that the adults are to be trusted and relied upon!

As any parent can attest, bedtimes can be one of those prolonged periods in which a child's attachment to an adult must be handled with love and consistency so the child feels safe, supported and secure that the morning will bring the reunion of parent and child. That early morning pitter-patter of feet down the hall to the parents' bedroom and jump into the parents' bed is the child's joyous celebration of finding the adults whom they love and adore! Through our words and actions, adults model for the child who they can become. Our examples, as parents and teachers, are the most important influences in a child's life. As we work together to create a world for our children, we must examine our personal paradigms and provide our children with examples of selflove and love toward one another as examples to model.

Today, many of the hypotheses and observations that were the

foundation of Montessori's work, have been verified by breakthroughs in neuroscience that have focused on brain development and the long-term effects of relationships on developing minds. The book outlines the lasting impact of love and affection on a child's developing nervous system and provides clues as to why adults behave as related to early childhood experiences! Critical formative experiences included safety, stability, consistency and unconditional acceptance of the child. As Margaret Stephenson, past president of the American Montessori Pedagogical Committee in America stated, "It is only the power of love that can enable the adult to come close enough to the child to understand him."

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AIR CONDITIONING TIPS **FOR THE SUMMER** by Mitch

Tip No. 27: Why Indoor Air Quality is Important - Part Three My favorite air filter ever

So, which is my favorite air filter for your home's central air conditioning system and the one I recommend most often? It is the dust lock integration or DLI filter. Most importantly, the DLI filter allows air to flow freely through it. As I have mentioned many, many times in previous columns, good air flow is absolutely essential to a properly functioning A/C system. It prevents the coil from freezing or the heat exchanger from overheating. The DLI filter can also trap up to 90% of airborne particles beginning at 7-10 microns* in size. For example, mold spores are 10-30 microns.

Different is better

DLI filters are made of an antimicrobial, polyester media which effectively

controls the growth of mold, mildew, algae and fungi within it. What makes a DLI filter different and better is that the surface of the individual fibers are uniformly coated with a nontoxic, environmentally safe adhesive. Additionally, it will not migrate or dry out. As your A/C system pulls air through the DLI filter, it removes the airborne particles. Trapped by the adhesive, they are held within the filter permanently. I have personally witnessed a demonstration where an entire cup of dirt was poured into a DLI *Micron - One micron is one-millionth of filter and not one speck came out the other side. Dust, pollen and pet hair don't stand a chance.

DLI filters are approximately one-inch thick and custom cut to fit your A/C system. They are held in place with a wire grid which A/C technicians can install. The filters are very reasonably priced and come in a box of 12. You can replace them yourself.

Simple is good and so is change

While simple in design (no complex pleating here), a DLI filter does its job

very well and lasts at least one month, sometimes longer, depending on the amount of airborne particles you have indoors. Children, pets and carpeting produce a lot of dust, dander and hair. With them in the house, I would replace the filter monthly. If you have no children or pets and have hardwood floors, it may last two to three months. A great rule of thumb is if you see dust on the white side of your DLI filter, it's time to replace it.

a meter. There are 25,400 microns in one inch. Airborne particles that you can see start at about 40 microns.

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ERCOT URGES CONSERVATION AS TEMPERATURES CONTINUE HIGH

With temperatures in Texas expected to reach the mid 90's and higher for much of the summer, the Electric Reliability Council of Texas, Inc. (ERCOT) system operator for the state's bulk transmission grid, is asking consumers and businesses to reduce their electricity use during peak electricity hours from 3 to 7 pm daily.

Peak electric demand exceeded 65,000 megawatts (MW) several times in June, and ERCOT expects to have adequate electric generation resources available to serve that load without issuing an Energy Emergency Alert. This takes into account current outages and the possibility of losing additional resources in the first heat wave of summer. One MW is enough power to serve about 200 homes during peak demand. ERCOT's record peak was 68,379 MW on Aug. 3, 2011.

ERCOT will use a variety of channels to keep the public informed this summer. ERCOT Energy Saver, a new mobile app now available for Apple and Android devices, will provide real-time alerts when conservation is most critical in the ERCOT region. Users of the free app need to enable push notifications to receive these messages. ERCOT also will provide information through the news media, Facebook, Twitter and ERCOT's new subscription-based EmergencyAlerts list (http://lists.ercot.com).

Consumers can help by shutting off unnecessary lights and electrical appliances between 3 and 7 p.m., and delaying laundry and other activities requiring electrical appliances until later in the evening. Other conservation tips from the *Public Utility Commission's "Powerful Advice"* include:

 Turn off all unnecessary lights, appliances and electronic equipment.

- When at home, close blinds and drapes that get direct sun, set air conditioning thermostats to 78 degrees or higher, and use fans in occupied rooms to feel cooler.
- When away from home, set air conditioning thermostats to 85 degrees and turn all fans off before you leave. Block the sun by closing blinds or drapes on windows that will get direct sun.
- Do not use your dishwasher, laundry equipment, hair dryers, coffee makers or other home appliances during the peak hours of 3 to 7 p.m.
- Avoid opening refrigerators or freezers more than necessary.
- Use microwaves for cooking instead of an electric range or oven.
- Set your pool pump to run in the early morning or evening instead of the afternoon.



Procedures background

The Energy Emergency Alert procedures are a progressive series of steps that allow ERCOT to bring on power from other grids if available, beginning with a **Power Watch** (Energy Emergency Alert Level 1).

If the situation does not improve, ERCOT escalates to a **Power Warning** (Energy Emergency Alert Level 2), allowing operators to drop large commercial/industrial load resources under contract to be interrupted during an emergency.

If the contract demand response does not relieve the capacity shortage, ERCOT escalates to a **Power Emergency** (Energy Emergency Alert Level 3) and will instruct utilities to reduce demand on the grid by conducting temporary outages at the local distribution level. These controlled temporary interruptions of electrical service - or rotating outages – typically last 15-

45 minutes before being rotated to a different neighborhood.

Consumers should contact the utility company/transmission provider listed on their electric bill for information about power outages at their homes or business, or about rotating outage procedures for their area.


ERCOT region


The ERCOT region includes Houston, Dallas, Fort Worth, San Antonio, Austin, Corpus Christi, Abilene and the Rio Grande Valley. It does not include the El Paso area, the Texas Panhandle, northeast Texas (Longview, Marshall and Texarkana) and southeast Texas (Beaumont, Port Arthur and The Woodlands).



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


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CRITTER CORNER

Are you singing "Rain, Rain, Go Away?" I'll bet your pets are! Some dogs still need to be walked even if it is raining. If that is the case, look for trees, bushes, awnings, homes or buildings to block some of the rain and wind in order for your dog to "do his business." You can also hold an umbrella over your dog to stop the rain from falling on her back and face. There's still the issue of wet ground, but keeping the rain off is half the battle. Our Pet of the Month family is a pair of Chihuahuas. This is the smallest breed of dog but a breed with very large personalities, so this month Dorothy and I discuss the breed.

Pet of the Month: "Misses August" are Misti and Chili Larson. They live in Section IV with their family, Erik, Diana and Cade Larson. Misti and Chili are eight year old spunky Chihuahuas. Misti is blue and fawn and Chili is a tri-color (she's white, fawn and black). Although they don't have the same coloring, they are sisters and show their sisterly love – from kisses to growls. Misti is smaller but is definitely the dominant one. She keeps Chili in line. Misti may be the ruler, but Chili is the acrobat as she loves to walk on the back of the couches and jump to all heights. Misti and Chili were adopted on a chilly and misty day, hence the names. Misti and Chili spend the majority of their time taking naps and lounging around the house. They are great guard dogs and let everyone know if anyone comes near the house. Diana grew up with big dogs, but Erik never had dogs growing up (Misti and Chili think that is very sad), so Chihuahuas were a compromise and one that they would not change for the world. Misti and Chili are happiest on their parent's lap under a blanket. The

saying goes, "If you want the best seat in the house, you've got to move the Chihuahua."

Critters 101: Chihua – what?!

The Chihuahua is the smallest breed of dog and is named for the state of Chihuahua in Mexico.

Chihuahuas come in a wide variety of sizes, head shapes, colors, and coat lengths. Chihuahuas are commonly referred to as either Apple or Deer heads, the former having short noses and rounded heads similar to that of an apple, and the latter having longer noses and more elongated heads. Generally, the height ranges between six and ten inches and breed standards state that a Chihuahua must not weigh more than 6 pounds for conformation. Chihuahuas come in virtually any color combination, from solid to marked or splashed, allowing for colors from solid black to solid white, spotted, sabled, or a variety of other colors and patterns.

Chihuahuas have a tendency to tremble but it is not a health issue. Instead, it occurs mainly when the dog is stressed, excited or cold. Cold can also present a problem for these small animals. They often enjoy wearing coats or sweaters when outside and enjoy digging and snuggling in blankets when sleeping.

A Chihuahua must be chosen with care, as the temperament of its owner can make a difference in the temperament of the pup. The breed tends to be fiercely loyal to one particular owner and in some cases may become over protective of the person, especially around other people or animals. Chihuahuas love their dens and will often burrow themselves in pillows, clothes hampers, and blankets. They are often found under the covers or at the bottom of the bed, deep in the

dark and safety of what they believe is their den.

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
