

GO CIVIC CLUB MEETING MINUTES

Location: Garden Oaks Elementary School August 7, 2012

Welcome: President Mark Klein called the meeting to order at 7:04 p.m., proclaiming it **Joe Muscara Night.**

A big thank you to **Brother's Pizzeria** (shopping center at Shepherd & 38th) for providing delicious New York style pizza for everyone attending the meeting!

A motion was made and carried to accept the June minutes as published in the *Gazette*, as the July meeting was cancelled.

President's Announcements:
Candidate Forum: President Klein is planning a candidate forum for the September meeting. Drought Plan: The City of Houston has proposed changes with regards to the drought plan. Details are available online at www.publicworks.houstontx.gov.

Gazette Delivery Coordinator: The neighborhood needs someone to take over the coordination of the Gazette delivery, a project vitally important to the GOCC. Responsibilities include delivering the Gazettes to the Gazette block captains of each section once a month

Houston Council Member Ellen Cohen attended the meeting. She spoke about multiple topics. Highlights included:

take place prior to Civic Club meetings at 6:30p.m. on the first Tuesday of the month and and on the third Wednesday of the month.

Meetings are open to anyone interested in attending. Additional information about the Garden Oaks Maintenance Organization is online at GardenOaks.org. Property owners in Sections 1, 2, 3 and 5 are all members of the Garden Oaks Maintenance Organization.

311: If you are not getting feedback on progress call her office directly with the 311 case number that was assigned to you. Water Line Replacement: All work will be completed by October 2012. The City will be touring the area to ensure that everything is returned to the original condition. City Council **Meetings**: Please attend or watch on TV to understand what is going on in the City. Cohen Ambassador Program: Council Member Cohen has created an ambassador program to improve communication between her office and the neighborhoods in District C. President Klein has volunteered to be the representative for Garden Oaks.. 2012 Wine Walk: Council Member Cohen concluded her visit by stepping up to be a silver sponsor for the 2012 Wine Walk.

Standing Committee Reports: GO Citizens Patrol: Carl Waters reported seven crimes in June and seven in July. Residential crimes are still occurring between early morning to mid afternoon. While the main days are Tuesdays and Thursdays, recently there is no defined pattern. The number of patrollers has increased, but more are always welcome. Overall, crime is up this year compared to the same time last year. Constable Program: No update. **Membership:** Betsy Stein won a Lowe's gift card. Dian Austin reminded everyone that 2012 Wine Walk tickets go on sale September 1. The Wine Walk is scheduled for October 20th from 4-6 pm in the generously donated backyard of Ed and Brenda de Alba. Proceeds benefit the Garden Oaks Constable Program. Sponsors will receive their logo/name on a sign and free tickets, depending upon the size of sponsorship. The Wine Walk is currently being promoted and is expected to sell out. All the table sponsors have been identified, but a backup or two is needed. **Beautification:** No update. Gazette: An assistant editor is still needed to support publication efforts. If interested, or know someone who could help, please email gazette@gardenoaks. org.

GardenOaks.org Website: No update.

GOMO Update: GOMO's annual meeting is in October. Funds may be available to be allocated toward specific neighborhood projects and will be discussed at the meeting. Additional discussion occurred about deed restrictions and what could be done to manage violations in Section 4.

Garden Oaks Elementary: Principal Lindsey Pollock made a number of announcements. Highlights include: **Real Men Read:** The school needs men to volunteer to be role models for this program. The time commitment is minimal. The payoff to children is high. **Stephen Covey Grant:** The school has received a grant from the Stephen Covey foundation and is implementing "The Leader in Me" program based on Covey's book. **HISD Bond Proposal:** Garden Oaks is included on a bond proposal which would convert the school to Pre-K through 8th grade focused on Montessori. As a result, the school could receive \$30MM in funding to invest in a school with outdated infrastructure, technology and traffic

flow. The tax impact to homeowners would be about \$100/year. Discussion about traffic, investment, and the impact to the school occurred. There is a link on the HISD website with additional information, and the board can be contacted to share your opinion for or against the bond. Spark Park Shade Cover: Bids for the shade cover are \$5-7K. The PTO does not have that amount of money so they are working on a grant for the funds. In addition, the 2012 GO Home Tour Committee previously voted to donate five percent of the proceeds of the tour to the shade cover project. The shade cover is to help replace the tree shade lost at the park during the drought.

GODAT Update: Secretary Heather Leverett reported that GODAT has three of the financial reports created in the database. The Website has not been moved to a new provider, but this should be completed before the next meeting.

Treasurer's Update: Treasurer Phil Ramirez reported that the financials are status quo for this time of year. The Constable is fully funded through next month. Additional donations are needed.

A representative from a local organization, the Houston Sports and Social Club, attended the meeting and announced that he is coordinating support and working with the City to get improvements in our local parks.

President Klein adjourned the meeting at 8:04 pm. More about the Candidates for September 4th meeting on page 6.

GAZETTE DELIVERY COORDINATOR NEEDED

If you are reading your hard copy of the Gazette, it was delivered to your door by one of our 41 block captains. Block captains are neighborhood volunteers that each month deliver newsletters door to door to at least one, sometimes two, blocks of Garden Oaks. This saves the civic club the cost of mailing 1400+ newsletters monthly.

The Gazettes are printed by our neighbor Oscar Ochoa (OD's Printing). Each month Oscar's team bundles the Gazettes for each of the routes and delivers the bundles to my front door; each bundle has a cover letter on it denoting the block captain, route delivered, and the number of Gazettes on that route. Then, I sort the bundles by each of the five sections of Garden Oaks and deliver them to the section coordinators:

Section 1/1A -Lynda Spinks Section 2 - Mel Johnson Section 3 - Jim Willburn Section 4 - Linda Sparks Section 5 – Sheree' Peoples

Each of the coordinators above then quickly delivers the bundled Gazettes to each of the block captains in their respective sections, so that hopefully all residents can receive them prior to the Civic Club meeting on the first Tuesday of each month.

But...I've done the job of Gazette Delivery Coordinator for almost 4 years. It's time for someone else to take over the role.

The Gazette Delivery Coordinator job description includes:

- Maintaining a cadre of block captains and finding replacements when one is out of town, moves from the neighborhood, etc.
- Keeping up-to-date block captain cover letters to reflect the correct name/address of the block captain and the number of newsletters needed on that route.
- Providing correct sets of block captain cover letters to the printer.
- Sorting the bundled Gazettes by section and delivering them promptly to the section coordinators.
- Finding back-ups for the delivery coordinators as needed, (or else delivering the bundles yourself).
- Maintaining some kind of recognition for the block captain team.

I will work with any interested person(s) to ensure a simple and easy transition, but I absolutely will retire as of the end of this year, replacement or not.

Having a covered porch would be a definite plus, as the Gazettes are delivered around the last weekend of the month, and it has been known to rain at delivery time.

The Requirements of the Positions

- Must be 18 years or older.
- Must own property and live within the Garden Oaks Section for the Director's position for which you are volunteering.
- All property owned in Garden Oaks must be in compliance with the Garden Oaks Deed Restrictions, excluding violations that existed before your ownership of the property.
- If no Member residing in the Section stands for election, then a Member who is an owner in that Section but lives in another Section may stand for election as a "Non-Section Director" whose term is one year.

Surplus Funds

GOMO traditionally uses surplus funds to support neighborhood

projects that are endorsed by a majority vote of its membership. GOMO has surplus funds available for disbursement for the upcoming fiscal year.

> GOMO currently supports two Constable Patrols in Garden Oaks as well as maintenance of neighborhood green spaces. A ballot with this year's proposed disbursement will be mailed to all GOMO members prior to the annual meeting.



During the week of August 13-16 sixty-five participants met with national trainers from the Covey Institute to collaborate on the vision for the school and the individual work around the Seven Habits. In September, the campus Implementation Day will formally mark the campus-wide dedication to the children's version of the Seven Habits through the Leader in Me.

The skills that will be embedded in the daily lives of the school community include:

Habit 1 Be Proactive—You're in Charge

Habit 2 Begin with the End in Mind—Have a Plan

2012 HISD BOND PROPOSAL **GOES TO THE VOTERS**

The HISD School Board Trustees voted this month to put a school bond to the voters this November. Garden Oaks Elementary is part of the HISD bond proposal that would include new facilities for our school. While the average taxpayer's financial commitment would amount to approximately \$75/year, the investment at Garden Oaks would support the campus' capacity to accommodate PreKindergarten to 8th grade classes. In addition to space, what improvements could our children receive from the bond proposal?

- Classrooms with consistently working air conditioning and heating
- Adequate restrooms (we currently have 3 for 675 students) Functional traffic flow and access

to the campus, alleviating congestion and improving safety

- Handicap parking access Adequate internet and electrical access in the computer lab and classrooms
- Cafeteria and library facility upgrades

Autumn is hummingbird season in Texas, as thousands of these tiny creatures move through the state on their southward migration to Mexico and Central America. Nature enthusiasts welcome them with old-fashioned Texas hospitality, readying their gardens of nectar-producing plants and putting up special feeders filled with fresh sugar water.

Essentially, all the Ruby-throated Hummingbirds that breed in the eastern half of the United States and Canada—estimated at 7.3 million—migrate along the shores of the Gulf of Mexico each fall," says John Arvin, the Observatory's Research Coordinator. The male hummers grab your attention with their striking throat feathers, which act like a prism to bend light into a shimmering red spectrum. Females and juveniles lack the scarlet throat - though juvenile males often show red dots on the throat. But they all have one purpose - engorging enough nectar to bulk up their body fat so they'll have enough fuel for their migratory flight.

Many Ruby-throats will travel 600 miles straight across the Gulf to the Yucatan Peninsula, and some will fly around the edges of the Gulf to points in Mexico. All will ultimately wind up in southern Mexico and Central America, as far south as Costa Rica, for the winter.

You can watch the thumb-sized hummers at the Observatory dart in and out of nectar-producing flowers like (Continued on Page 19)

CRITTER CORNER

Wow, I can't believe school has started! Hot weather is still with us this month so keep those pets hydrated. Does your dog burrow in the covers? Some dogs are more prone to burrowing than others so this month Dorothy and I explore the act of burrowing. Our pet of the month earned her nickname, "Wiggle Worm," from her burrowing ritual.

Pet of the Month: "Miss September" is Zoey Gibson-Leventhal (Sheltie) who is 12 years old and lives with her parents, Katie and Seth, in Section V. Zoey was adopted from the Houston Sheltie Sanctuary seven years ago. Zoey and her parents lived in several apartments before settling in Garden Oaks and she enjoys her big yard and dog-friendly neighborhood despite being afraid of grass. She often sits just outside



her front door, sunning herself while watching the world go by or sniffing the air when there is a breeze.

Zoey, who is often mistaken for a puppy, loves so many things like egg whites for breakfast, running full speed to the closest human lap, or digging and wiggling in her bedding like Curly from the *Three Stooges*. She loves all animals, big and small, dog or cat, but really loves meeting new humans the most. At dog parks she bounces from person to person for head scratches and she makes friends easily with her infectious snaggletooth smile and her bright eyes, one of which is blue while the other is brown.

Katie and Seth are grateful for Zoey's antics each day, even when she gets up extra early. Each day is the best day she has ever known. Critters 101: The Burrowing Epidemic

Most of us dog lovers enjoy seeing our dogs digging around in the covers looking for that perfect place to crawl into and go to sleep or having a cuddle buddy in bed at night right under the blankets with you. Other dog owners prefer to keep their pups out of the blankets and can't figure out why burrowing

is such a habit. For everyone out there, here is the answer!

Dogs are den animals which means their instinct is to sleep or relax in a small, covered space such as a cave or other type of den that wild canines make into their homes. Even though Rover is now domesticated and probably would look confused if put into a real den, he still has those instincts. Small, tight spaces help to make your dog feel safe and secure. You may find he does this more when he's scared such as during a thunderstorm. Being hidden by the blankets gives him that extra sense of security.

Other dogs burrow to sleep, to hide their toys and bones or just for fun. Smaller dogs are usually prone to burrow more such as the Terriers, Chihuahuas and Hounds. But bigger dogs are known to burrow as well, especially Huskies. For Huskies, this is probably more instinct than anything else. Having been used to work and live in bitterly cold temperatures for years and years, Huskies learned to burrow under the snow to help keep warm and go undetected by predators while they slept.

If your dog is known to burrow and you're trying to keep your blankets free of his hair, try getting him his own large sized bed with his own blanket. This will help to keep him off of yours but still give him a nice, comfortable, warm and safe place to cuddle up and blow some Z's.



AIR CONDITIONING TIPS FOR THE FALL

Tip No. 28: Heads up on Hurricane Season

Preparing for hurricane season means stocking up on supplies such as batteries, canned goods and gasoline. You'll also need to secure your home by boarding up windows with plywood and removing outdoor items such as patio furniture. Along with these usual precautions, don't forget to protect one of your home's most valuable assets, your air conditioning equipment. Here are some easy steps to follow to protect it from hurricanes and other extremes in weather:

- -- Turn the A/C system off. This sounds like a no-brainer but make sure it's completely off during the storm, both at the thermostat and the circuit breaker in your electric panel. In the event of flooding, power to the A/C can create a fire hazard or electrical shock.
- -- Secure your A/C system's **condenser** (that's the A/C system's

outside unit). Powerful hurricane gusts can move loose equipment and cause significant damage. Make sure the condenser is completely secured to its base or your home by using hurricane straps, bolts or strong rope. All of these can be purchased at your local home improvement store.

- -- Remove loose items near the **condenser**. Just as important as removing patio furniture, eliminate any other items that can potentially become airborne and cause damage. This includes flower pots, toys and bicycles.
- -- Once the hurricane is over and electrical power has been properly restored, be sure to **clear all trash**, leaves and limbs which have gathered around the condenser. In addition, use a garden hose to remove accumulated debris from its

How to handle a flooded A/C system

If flooding occurs in any part of the A/C system inside or outside of your home, call your A/C service technician

to perform a thorough inspection. NEVER restore power or turn on the thermostat until you are absolutely sure it's safe to do so.

Finally, hurricane or no hurricane, be sure to schedule regular maintenance for your A/C system to make sure it's running at peak efficiency!

Hurricane Trivia: When does the Atlantic hurricane season begin and end? The hurricane season for the Atlantic Ocean (source of our hurricanes) officially runs from June 1st – November 30th. Since the Pacific Ocean is larger and warmer, its season is longer and more intense. However, some areas in the world are so active, there is no official season. Storms here can sprout up virtually year-round!
