ANNUAL GOES PANCAKE BREAKFAST & SILENT AUCTION By Devin Hunter

On Saturday, February 9, volunteer dads and granddads will flip thousands of free pancakes, serve up Katz's hot coffee, and auction off thousands of dollars worth of merchandise in continuation of a 19-year tradition that has helped set Garden Oaks Elementary School (GOES) stand apart as an exceptional and diverse learning community.

This year's event will take place from 8:00-11:00 a.m. at Garden Oaks Elementary School, 901 Sue Barnett, Houston, Texas 77018. Golden brown pancakes, warm syrup, sausage, coffee, and juice are free to the community.

In 2010, GOES won the U.S. Department of Education Magnet Schools Assistance Program grant for approximately \$3 million. The grant helped establish GOES as a Montessori Magnet School with Environmental Sciences. Enrollment has since increased by more than 30 percent.

For those of you not on the listserv* there were a couple of incidents reported there in January regarding door to door sales people. In one case two males approached a home and when the occupants asked what they wanted via an intercom system the males ran off. In a second incident, a fast talking male approached the home owner and left when told by the home owner he was not interested in what the male had to offer. The home owner was suspicious of the man and followed him noting he did not stop at many other houses as he went down the street. A Houston Police Officer happened to drive by and when the man saw the police car, he ran across N. Shepherd to a van in the parking lot near the Subway store and drove off northbound on Shepherd.

Please folks, when anyone approaches your door, be courteous to them and if you are not interested in what they offer, tell them so. All persons selling door to door in the City of Houston are required to have a peddler's license from the city. If they don't have one I would not do business with them and I would report them to the Houston Police Department. You can report the situation to the Constable as well, but since it is a city ordinance the person is violating, the Constable cannot enforce it.



GARDEN OAKS CIVIC CLUB MEETING MINUTES

January 2, 2013

Location: Garden Oaks Elementary School

Welcome: After pizza was served (courtesy of Brother's Pizzeria, 3820 North Shepherd Dr.), President Mark Klein called the meeting to order at approximately 7:05 p.m. A motion was made and carried to accept the December 2012 minutes as published in the December Gazette.

President's Announcements: In

a discussion on pedestrian safety, President Klein recommended that neighbors notify 311 if they notice any crosswalks that need repainting. A request President Klein made to the City to repaint the school / pedestrian crossing at Sue Barnett and 43rd was completed in less than 2 weeks. President Klein also discussed the upcoming deadline to submit an annual SNAP grant as part of the City's Super Neighborhood program, asking for suggestions. The GOCC members present expressed interest in seeking funds to plant trees in area pocket parks.

Pedestrian Safety: GOCC members then discussed pedestrian safety concerns around the Garden Oaks Elementary School. There was interest in exploring if more speed bumps could be installed to help slow down traffic. One other suggestion was to replace speed bumps that had been deteriorating with the newer rubber ones that seem to slow traffic more effectively.

Santa at the Gazebo: President Klein recognized GO residents Terry Jeanes, Georgia Lister and Tina Sabuco for their outstanding efforts to success-

fully reinstate a long-time GOCC tradition, Santa at the Gazebo. The festive, two-day event was a success, drawing a host of families who visited Santa and enjoyed beverages and a table full of cookies, donated by several neighbors. (The annual event was the primary driver behind the GOCC voting to rebuild the Gazebo with builder Harry James.)

Garden Oaks Elementary School (GOES) Magnet Funding: The GOCC members discussed the status of Magnet grant funding for GOES – now in its third year of transition to an all-Montessori / Environmental Sciences Magnet campus. The transition was supported by a \$3 million federal Magnet School Assistance Program grant that ends this year. However, HISD has yet to commit the Magnet funding needed to sustain the program.

The GOES conversion, established in 2010, has proved to be in high demand among families, with full enrollment this year (650 students) and a waiting list that continues to grow. GOES is moving forward to expand its Montessori classrooms to 8th grade. In order to meet the student demand for this unique public education program, HISD Magnet funding is needed.

Several concerned GOCC members asked how they could advocate for HISD Magnet funding. Two other HISD Montessori programs receive operating funds from HISD amounting to approximately \$250,000. Zero dollars have been budgeted for the GOES Magnet program. Meanwhile, Magnet Schools of America – a consulting group hired to perform the last HISD Magnet school audit – recommended that GOES receive funding.

The federal grant that ends this

year enabled GOES to move from 6 Montessori classrooms in 2009 to 24 in 2012-13. The grant funded needed educational materials, training for new teachers and environmental sciences components. It also funded five full-time teaching assistants and the magnet coordinator, responsible for implementing the Magnet educational programs and associated teacher training. Funding will support a continuing, authentic Montessori choice for public school students in the area.

Standing Committee Reports:

Membership: Dian Austin reported that the annual GOCC membership and Constable Patrol drive is in full swing. Ms. Austin encouraged neighbors to support the GOCC and its efforts to provide safety and beautification for the neighborhood. Donation forms were in the December Gazette. Residents can also download the forms or pay online at gardenoaks.org. GOCC members also discussed ways to increase membership and how to make it easier to pay annual dues. Brenda de Alba won the monthly GOCC Membership drawing, taking home a Lowe's Gift card.

GO Citizens Patrol: Carl Waters said 6 crimes were reported on the Houston Police Department (HPD) website for December (1 assault, 4 burglaries and 1 Auto Theft). Crimes continue to trend toward early mornings. For 2012, total crimes reported were 83 (up from 70 in 2011), approximately a 19% increase. Additional GOCOP patrollers are welcome. Patrollers must be a Garden Oaks Resident, 18 years of age, and able to pass a criminal background by HPD.

Constable Program: Terry Jeanes noted that Alan Rosen, newly elected Constable for Precinct One, was sworn into office January 1. Ms. Jeanes said she expects changes on the horizon for Constable, Precinct One. The GOCC Constable Patrol contract was extended through February 2014. In neighborhood crime news, Ms. Jeanes said criminal activity had been relatively quiet during December.

Beautification: No update.

Gazette: New Gazette Delivery Coordinator Lori Kennedy said one or two people are needed to deliver Gazettes in the 200-300 blocks of W. 31st and the 400-500 blocks of W. 31st. If interested in volunteering, please send Lori a message at gazettedelivery@gardenoaks.org.

Garden Oaks Elementary School:

GOES Principal Lindsey Pollock updated the GOCC on the HISD building project that will expand the school through 8th grade. The project was part of the HISD bond election that passed November 2012, providing new building construction to replace or repair 40 schools. Ms. Pollock reported that the first design meeting was held recently; attendees heard from students and others about what they considered to be the ideal school. Project completion is slated for 2017.

President Klein adjourned the meeting at 8 pm.


We welcome anyone to join us, be it for a single meeting or on a regular basis.

LET THERE BE PEACE ON EARTH

One pillar of Montessori education is peace. Having lived through two world wars, Maria Montessori was painfully aware of the destruction of war and worked tirelessly to promote her message of peace through her teaching methodology. She felt that by developing a method of education that valued and honored every human being from the beginning of their lives, we could avoid the strife of war not only as countries, but as a planet. Lofty goals some might say, but a philosophy upon which Montessorians build daily lessons and implement learning communities on campus!

Some of the core components of this peace curriculum are creating a caring community through multiage classrooms. Children start with a teacher and stay with the teacher for three years. As the entering class ages, these student assume leadership roles and responsibilities as mentors to younger children. Teachers, students and parents form bonds over this time and are committed to the success of the children.

Another Montessori component focuses on lessons in grace and courtesy. Children enter the classroom in the morning greeted by the teacher and are expected to exemplify care and compassion for one another through out the day. When strife does inevitably arise, children are assigned to the peace table to work through their differences and develop a plan for action. Children are also taught to monitor their physical space and to restore their working environment before moving to another activity. This care in monitoring their environment promotes citizenship and responsibility.

Finally, at the end of each day, students and teacher part by shaking hands and wishing one another well until the next day. These simple lessons can be integrated into the routines of your home and are designed to honor the purpose and value of every child. Dr. Maria Montessori was nominated four times for her devotion to world peace; she would be glad to know her legacy lives on in the light of every child!

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GOES TO HOST PUBLIC MONTESSORI EDUCATORS OF TEXAS (PMET) CONFERENCE

Public Montessori Educators of Texas (PMET) announced today that this year's conference theme is Montessori: Surviving and Thriving in the Public School Setting. The 7th annual conference is sponsored by Friends of Montessori and will be held Friday, March 1 through Sunday, March 3, 2013 at Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet school, in Houston, TX.

The keynote speakers for the conference are Alfie Kohn and Dennis Schapiro. Mr. Kohn is a well-known author and lecturer on topics in education, parenting, and human behavior. He is the author of twelve books, including FEEL BAD EDUCATION and other Contrarian Essays on Children and Schooling (2011), and numerous articles. Kohn is considered a leader in progressive education and his assessments of many aspects of traditional education have been widely discussed and debated. Time magazine has described him as "perhaps the country's most outspoken critic of education's fixation on grades [and] test scores."

Mr. Schapiro is the editor and publisher of the Public School Montessorian newspaper. A former member of the Minneapolis school board, he currently serves on the boards of the Twin Cities Media Alliance and Bright Water Montessori School.

PMET has grown since its inception and has become a resource for educators and parents alike. Marie Pousson, Children's House teacher

at Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet states, "What Montessori teachers do in a public setting can be a huge paradigm shift for people like me. Being able to network with others in public schools who are trying to implement an authentic Montessori program, and still ensure that students meet district standards is so fulfilling for me. Like any conference, learning from colleagues is both informative and often inspiring."

The conference will begin on Friday, March 1st with check-in, registration, and a tour of Houston's three public Montessori schools. Saturday, March 2nd includes a lecture by renowned author and speaker Alfie Kohn, as well as breakout workshops that focus on elevating and sustaining Montessori education within the classroom and the community. Saturday's events will conclude with speaker Dennis Schapiro. Festivities can be extended to Sunday, March 3rd with the Wilson Montessori PTO Gala which will be held at the Saint Arnold's Brewery, Houston, TX. The PMET conference is hosted this year by Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet and Houston Independent School District (HISD).

Materials should not be placed for Heavy Trash pickup any sooner than 6 pm on the Friday before the scheduled pick up date.







Here we are once again in the midst of what we in Southwest Texas refer to as winter and as messy and uncomfortable as it may be, it's not all bad, because it is prime time for getting your full quota of greens. Our farmers will continue to have all your favorites: broccoli, cauliflower, kale, chard, various lettuces, cabbage and of course collard greens. We are still in good supply of free range eggs and chickens, local honey, pastured pork sausages and olive oil. And as always our artisan vendors will be bringing their jams, jellies, bread and Indian foods, along with handcrafted wood utensils, pottery and jewelry.

This time of year also brings us the bi-annual legislative session in Austin and there are quite a few bills that will make a huge difference in the lives of small Texas farmers and ranchers that need our support or opposition. Without going into exhaustive detail, I encourage you to go to the Farm and Ranch Freedom Alliance website (farmandranchfreedom. org) to look over upcoming issues, such as ensuring that urban farms and community gardens can qualify for agricultural property valuations. Contact your District 15 Senator John Whitmire and District 148 Representative Jessica Farrar to show your support.

Try this simple recipe for **Greens** with Garlic, Oil & Hot Pepper

Ingredients

Olive oil
Garlic, thinly sliced
Pinch of Crushed red pepper
Optional: lemon juice, cider vinegar, wine vinegar, balsamic vinegar
Salt, to taste
Pepper, to taste



Wash and cook a pound of greens (beet greens, collards, kale, mustard greens, spinach, Swiss chard) in lightly salted water just until wilted, 5 to 10 minutes. Drain; press with the back of a spoon to release excess moisture. Heat some olive oil and thinly sliced garlic in a skillet over low heat until the garlic begins to sizzle. Add a pinch of crushed red pepper and cook, stirring, until the garlic is tender and light golden, 1 to 2 minutes. Add greens and toss with the hot oil until heated through, 1 to 2 minutes. Season with a splash of lemon juice or vinegar (cider vinegar, wine vinegar or balsamic), and salt and pepper to taste.

Critters 101: What is Holistic Dog Food?

As pet owners become more informed as to contents of their dog's food, more owners are turning to holistic dog food. What is Holistic Dog Food? Holistic dog foods are foods that have been created with balance in mind. All ingredients in the food have been balanced to provide dogs with optimal nutrition. Ingredients are selected with their unique pur-

pose in mind whether it is to provide high levels of fatty acids or to include more digestible proteins. Since every individual dog has different nutritional needs, there is a significant degree of variation among types of holistic dog food blends. In contrast many lower quality dog food options focus on low cost production costs which result in lower quality ingredients.

Holistic foods generally are a better choice for most dogs. Just as with people, when poor quality food is consumed, overall nutrition is poor and general health suffers. Dogs are exactly the same way and when they are fed diets filled with poor quality ingredients and excessive fillers, the results will soon begin to show. However, some dogs have allergies or health conditions that can be better controlled with other feeding options.

There are a number of different kibble options out there for dog owners to choose from and things can soon become confusing. Not all holistic foods are grain free foods and not all grain free foods are holistic foods. Many people are under the assumption that all grains are bad for their dogs; this is not the case. Grains simply do not make up a significant portion of the wild canine's diet; this does not mean that they are not beneficial in limited quantities. The exception to this rule is dogs with grain allergies, in which case grain free foods are the best option. Many types of different grains are used in dog foods but grain free foods are, for the most point, foods that do not contain wheat or corn. Wheat and corn are the two most popular allergens for dogs with grain induced allergies. Other common grains include: oats, barley and rice.

While there are a great many varia-

tions in brand, ingredients and pricing among holistic dog foods, holistic foods are more expensive. Just like human food, you get what you pay for in most circumstances. Holistic foods are made up of higher quality, and more often than not, human grade ingredients which makes them more expensive.

A modern furnace typically uses only half the gas to heat your home as a model built in 2003 plus does it much more efficiently, in about half the time. More importantly, the new furnace's blower motor uses only one-tenth the electricity as the one found in a decade-old furnace. During the summer, this blower motor is also used by your air conditioning system to distribute cool air throughout your

home. Its greater efficiency means greater savings throughout the year. Your new furnace will create comfortable heating throughout your home, improved humidity balance and reduced sound level while it operates. The cost savings will be impressive too.


