GARDEN OAKS CIVIC CLUB MEETING MINUTES

Location: Garden Oaks Elementary June 4, 2013

Welcome: President Mark Klein called the meeting to order at 7:12 pm.

A thank you to Brother's Pizzeria who once again showed their support of the neighborhood by donating pizzas to keep everyone attending the Civic Club meeting well fed.

A motion was made and carried to accept the May minutes as published in the *Gazette*.

President's Announcements: OurBlok Rewards Program: OurBlok is a rewards program where up to 5% of the proceeds of participating retailers go to Garden Oaks Civic Club when the card is presented with a purchase. The cards should have been included in the Gazette. Please encourage every household to support the program. Upcoming GOCC Speakers: In July, we plan to have a speaker to discuss the roadside ditches and water circulation techniques. In September, Mayor Annise Parker will speak at the GOCC meeting. Beautification Chair: We need a GO resident willing to assume the responsibilities of the beautification chair! Please contact president@ gardenoaks.org to volunteer or recommend someone for the position. Local Government Affairs: President Klein attended a meeting with Councilwoman Cohen with regards to issues impacting our area. More information to come in future meetings. Wine Walk: The Wine Walk is in its 5th year. The cost is \$50/ per person and limited to 200 tickets. Last year it raised \$14,000. It is

planned for Saturday, October 19 and tickets will go on sale September 1st. **July 4th Bike Parade:** Please come out July 4 and support the neighborhood. **GOCC Office Nominations:** A nominating committee will be named soon. Nominations will be presented in November to prepare for voting in December.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Phil Ramirez reported that the financials are status quo for this time of year. We are \$24,000 short of the Constable Program needs and will need to begin addressing this shortage soon.

Standing Committee Reports: Membership: Brenda de Alba drew a \$25 Lowe's gift card for a lucky neighbor at the meeting.

GO Citizens Patrol: Carl Waters reported seven crimes in May: One assault, five thefts, and one auto theft. The assault may have been near the Chase bank at 34th. The crimes are occurring at both day and night times. The neighborhood has six crimes less this year than at the same time last year. Please encourage your neighbors to join the voluntary patrol program. You only need to be eighteen years old and able to pass a background check, Report anything suspicious in the neighborhood to the Constables or call 911 if you see an emergency.

Constable Program: Terry Jeanes reported that the deputies have been fairly quiet. There was one alarm in Section One. It was not dispatched as the alarm was not permitted. If you hear an alarm, please contact the Constable as they will come regardless of permitting. Please also be vigilant about solicitors and panhandlers. If you see anyone following you home from the grocery or a store, heading to the fire station is an option as the firemen will come out and assist citizens.

Beautification: Please consider volunteering to be the beautification chair.

Gazette: President Klein thanked Lori Kennedy, Gazette Delivery Coordinator, and the Gazette delivery volunteers for handling the OurBlok Gazette distribution.

GardenOaks.org Website: Joe Muscara reported that the website has been updated to add the means to setup recurring payment for neighborhood donations. It is a less expensive alternative to the GOCC than bank drafting and allows neighbors to choose the frequency of the recurring charge.

Garden Oaks Home Tour 2014:

Brenda de Alba noted that prior year Home Tours have raised over \$30,000. The Home Tour takes over 200 volunteers to be successful. Some of the leadership positions have been filled. Home Tour home nominations are in progress. The goal is to have selections completed by mid-August.

Garden Oaks Elementary School:

Principal Pollock announced that the school is the first Envoy-certified Montessori school in the world. Envoy is a system of non-verbal communication that is used in the classrooms. It has taken over two years to prepare for the accreditation, and the school had to pass with a score of over 90%. Summer camps will be ongoing at the school. Shred day is September 21st so please bring anything to the school you need shredded. Magnet status is expected to be announced by July 1. President Klein adjourned the meet-

ing at 7:58 pm.



CIVIC CLUB PRESENTATION, July 2, 2103 - Looking Back on Low-tech Drainage and Circulation Techniques of the Future

As most Gazette readers already know, Garden Oaks is an almost purely residential subdivision of about 1,400 homes located just "outside the loop" north of downtown Houston. This thensuburban development was begun in the late 1930s, when N. Shepherd was a 2-lane highway spur, and the 610 "Defense Loop" was nothing more than a gleam in the Transportation Commission's eye.

Now, as it did then, Garden Oaks boasts narrow, two-lane asphalt streets laid out in graceful curves that intersect in a smattering of triangular, green open spaces. There are no curbs, roadside parking and sidewalks are off-pavement, and drainage is accommodated in shallow, grass-lined swales.

As it turns out, these design parameters are currently under consideration in Texas and nationwide as means to control local circulation speeds, prevent the spread of West Nile Virus and, perhaps most importantly, help minimize adverse drainage (i.e. flood) and water quality (i.e. pollutant) impacts to downstream waterways.

Cathy Wahren, a local resident and land development engineer, will present "Looking Back on Lowtech Drainage and Circulation Techniques of the Future" to the Civic Club at the July 2 meeting. She will provide information regarding these old-fashioned, yet state-of-theart design features and associated challenges, using Garden Oaks as a living, breathing, on-the-ground example. Don't miss this interesting look at something many take for granted. Come out to the next Garden Oaks Civic Club meeting to hear something new and share your thoughts. Join us 7 p.m. Tuesday, July 2, at the Garden Oaks Elementary School, 901 Sue Barnett.

Planning for our 5th Annual Garden Oaks Wine Walk is underway. For those of you who may be new to the neighborhood, the Wine Walk is a wine tasting fundraiser for our constable program that we hold in the fall right here in our own great neighborhood. 

TEXTING AND DRIVING; IT CAN WAIT!

The days between Memorial Day and Labor Day are the 100 deadliest days for teen drivers. 30 percent of teen driver deaths occur during this timeframe. Sadly, many of these deaths will occur because they and others are texting while driving.

The city of Houston is coordinating an anti-texting and driving public awareness campaign called *It Can Wait, Houston*. Our local initiative is an extension of AT&T's successful It Can Wait nationwide effort.

I've enlisted the support of a broadbased task force consisting of local law enforcement, government, educational, corporate, medical, professional and faith-based organizations. The task force members have agreed to not only help get the word out, but also consider developing company or institutional policies that prohibit texting while driving, if they don't already have them.

Several entities, including the Houston Texans, Dynamo, Rockets, and Comcast have agreed to broadcast public service announcements in support of this effort. Local rapper Bun B is helping with this part of the effort by appearing with me in the PSA.


Recent Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) data shows that 13 percent of traffic fatalities in 2011 were related to texting while driving. Just as troubling, new research from AT&T indicates that 43 percent of commuters admit to a "habit" of texting while driving, even though they are aware of the risks. Previous studies have confirmed that those who text while driving are 23 times more likely to be in a crash. Our goal should be the same type of societal change that we saw from the public awareness campaigns that taught us the safety benefits of seat belts and the dangers of drinking and driving.



MIDDLE SCHOOL AT GARDEN OAKS? By Lindsey Pollock

Yes, it is true, we are expanding our Montessori program through 7th grade in the 2013-14 school year with plans to continue to expand the school through 8th grade by 2014-15. Garden Oaks Elementary has been structured for many years to end the Montessori program in 6th grade. Classes in Montessori are multi-age to support the three-year cycle of community building and leadership as children stay with their classroom guide (teacher) for three years. The Montessori structure is Children's House (PK3 - Kindergarten); Lower Elementary (First – Third Grade); and Upper Elementary (Fourth – Sixth Grade).

Historically, students in the Upper Elementary classrooms often left Garden Oaks after 5th grade to begin traditional 6th – 8th grade programs. While parents and students reported success in the transition to traditional programs, the Montessori cycle of education was interrupted and the full benefit of a three-year cycle learning community was only minimally realized. With the addition of 7th grade at Garden Oaks, we anticipate that students who remain in the Montessori program will achieve academic gains, leadership experiences and an expanded sense of community as they continue their education at Garden Oaks. Not only does Montessori philosophy support this PK - 8th grade configuration as beneficial to children, a growing body of educational research also supports this strategy.

The Southwest Education Development Laboratory (SEDL) located in Austin, TX has amassed a body of research on the benefits of K – 8 schools. While researchers acknowledged that middle schools are able to focus solely on the developmental needs of adolescents, K-8 schools are able to build a sense of continuity and community especially for students who stay at the campus for the majority of their school experience. Additional benefits cited for students in K – 8 schools included increased sense of safety and significantly fewer discipline problems. Schools that reported gains in these areas also reported that they saw significant increases in academic outcomes, too. Of course there are challenges including sports and extracurricular options such as band or orchestra that are not feasible when a small group of middle school students exist on a campus. In HISD, however, students enrolled at magnet middle schools may participate in sports at their "zoned" middle school.

What does this mean for Garden Oaks? First, our name is changing! No longer considered an elementary, we are now Garden Oaks Montessori. We are nearing the end of our transition to an all-campus Montessori magnet school with only two traditional classrooms remaining for the 2013-14 school year. During the upcoming year, all campus faculty will complete their Montessori certification and our environmental sciences strand is continuing to be developed. Our school enrollment is nearing 700 children and our student attrition rates are at an all-time low. Children and families who come to Garden Oaks stay at Garden Oaks and soon through the 8th grade!

Before the Storm

General Preparedness through the Season

-Keep your vehicle gas tank above ½ full. -Test run generators monthly with a load to insure proper working order.

-Consider the purchase of flood insurance, even if outside of a floodplain.

-Have cash on hand in small denominations.

-Maintain portable battery powered AM radio.

-Contact 2-1-1 to register if you need transportation assistance to evacuate.

Home Preparedness

-Board up your windows or close storm shutters. -Trim the trees and shrubs around your home.

-Clear loose and clogged downspouts and gutters. -Perform an inventory of home contents (electronics, jewelry, appliances, clothing, etc.) and store in safe place.

-Take detailed photos(s)/videos(s) of home property and contents (internal and external) and store in safe place.

-Secure or remove all items outside your home (grill, hanging plants, potted plants, etc.).

-Tie down small or young trees to prevent uprooting. -Store all important documents (insurance papers, etc) in a waterproof container and in a secure location.

-Prepare your evacuation kit using the pertinent -items in the attached *Emergency Essentials Kit* checklist.

-Turn off propane tanks.

-Fill the bathtub and other large containers with water for sanitary purposes (cleaning, flushing toilets, etc.)

If you Plan to Evacuate

-Are you located in an evacuation area in the evacuation map?

-Where are you evacuating to?

-Who is your contact at your destination?

-What is their contact information?

-What is your backup evacuation location?

-Take a copy of all important documents and store in a waterproof container and in a secure location. -Top off your vehicle gas tank before hitting the road.

If you Plan to Stay

-Listen to the radio (AM 740 KTRH) or TV for information.

-If you have gas items you need to operate after the storm (generator, chainsaw, etc); fill gas storage container(s). -Prepare your hurricane kit using the *Emergency Essentials Kit* checklist on the web site listed above.

During the Storm

-Listen to the radio (AM 740 KTRH) or TV for information. -Turn the refrigerator and freezer to its coldest setting and keep its doors closed.

-Avoid using the phone except for emergencies.

-Stay indoors and away from windows and glass doors.

-Close all interior doors.

-Keep curtains and blinds closed.

-Take refuge in a small interior room, closet, or hallway on the lowest level of your home.

After the Storm

If you are Returning from Evacuation

-Return only after the all clear is given for your area.

-Do not venture on to roads until you have been advised they are passable and safe.

-Carefully inspect your home and perform an exterior assessment for safety issues.

-Check for downed power lines and avoid if identified.

-If any safety issues are present, do not enter your home (gas smell, flood waters, fire damage, etc.).

-If any safety issues are present, have your home inspected by a qualified building inspector or engineer.

If your dog is mainly indoors and you are having an issue with excessive shedding, it might be something enjoyable for you. Whether your dog is mainly indoors or outdoors, shaved or not shaved, you need to pay attention to overheating. Many smashed faced breeds, such as English Bulldogs, cannot regulate their body temperature and can get over heated in less than ten minutes.

These are the filters you know best. Constructed of heavyweight paper with fiberglass interiors, they can be purchased virtually anywhere. The ones I recommend are the mid-range filters which cost around \$3 each. They have loose - not tight - pleating and are great at collecting a variety of airborne particles while still allowing

proper air flow.

In this category, there are some air filters on the market which have thick, very tightly pleated media and cost about \$17 each. Do not use these! Proper air flow is absolutely essential for your A/C system. These filters severely restrict air flow which can cause all sorts of problems including diminished efficiency, higher utility bills and shorten the life of your system's compressor.

Electrostatic air filters: These

one-inch thick, washable air filters. are commonly found in both freestanding room units or incorporated within a central air conditioning system. Yes, you can wash them but these filters will never become completely free of debris. Long-term usage and repeated unsuccessful cleanings result in a clogged filter which prevents needed air flow. Not recommended.

Electronic air filters: With electronic filtering, the air-borne contaminates

receive a physical charge and are removed by attraction to the opposite charge within a contained system. The collected dust and particles must still be removed. This can be done when your service technician performs spring and fall A/C check-ups. Electronic air filters are OK but not my favorite.

My FAVORITE air filter ever!

The dust lock integration or DLI filter, made locally by H&B Filters, allows air to flow freely through (absolutely essential to a properly functioning A/C system) plus traps up to 90% of airborne contaminants including dust, pollen, spores, pet hair and dander. DLI filters are about one-inch thick and custom cut to fit your A/C system. They are held in place with a wire grid which can be installed for only \$30. The replaceable filters are a very reasonable \$5 each and come in a box of 12.

But to me, the best new addition has to be the farmers' market on Saturday mornings. What a wonderful place to buy local products, meet other neighborhood residents, and eat a delicious breakfast taco.

The market was gracious enough to allow me to have a stand in June to sell my Italian cookbook, *Graziella's Tuscan Kitchen*. If you purchased a copy then you know that many of the ingredients for the recipes are available at the market. To inspire you to take advantage of the local produce, I would like to share a very simple and recipe for Grilled vegetables, Tuscan style, found in the book.

large eggplant
 zucchini
 red or yellow bell pepper
 tbs chopped fresh parsley
 clove minced garlic (optional)
 Extra virgin olive oil

1. Cut the eggplant and zucchini in ¹/₄ inch slices lengthwise

2. Cut pepper in half and take out inner seeds, then cut into fourths

3. Either on an outdoor grill or grill pan, cook the vegetables until soft, then sprinkle with parsley and garlic

4. Drizzle olive oil over the vegetables just before serving. They can be served warm or cold.

FRESH FROM THE FARMERS' MARKET-PURSLANE

One of the ironies of modern farming is the amount of money spent on herbicides trying to kill plants like purslane when they are often more nutritious and tasty than the crops being grown. Purslane is one of the few green vegetables to thrive in the Texas heat.

First thought to be cultivated in the Indus Valley civilization, purslane spread across the ancient world, and was often considered to be a superfood with healing properties. They may have been correct, as purslane has more omega-3 fatty acids than any other vegetable, plus vitamin A, B vitamins 1, 2, 3, 6, 9, vitamin C and the minerals calcium, iron, magnesium, manganese, phosphorus, potassium and zinc. It also has a high amount of mucilage, so it eases irritated membranes and upset



stomachs and the crushed leaves can be used as a poultice for minor burns. As the vitamin C in purslane is oxalate in form, people with a propensity for kidney stones may not want to consume it regularly.

Ingredients:

8 oz Purslane leaves, well washed 1 Small onion, coarsely chopped 2 tablespoons Olive oil 2 fluid oz Sweet wine or vermouth Salt and pepper to taste Sauté the onion for two minutes over very high heat. Throw in the purslane and toss well to coat it with oil. When it starts to wilt, add the sweet wine and cover reducing the heat to very low and cook for 5 more minutes. You can turn the heat off, and let it sit for a while before serving if you are busy with other things. Stores one-- day in fridge.
