
HERE COMES SANTA CLAUS!

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
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CITIZENS' PATROL

- Use checks, debit cards, or credit cards to avoid carrying large amounts of cash. Keep your purse close to your body or your wallet in your front pocket to make them harder to steal.
- Keep an eye on your purchases when you stop to eat.
- Avoid carrying large numbers of packages; use a package pickup service when you can.
- Have your keys out before you leave the store. Place packages in

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GARDEN OAKS CIVIC CLUB MEETING MINUTES

Location: Garden Oaks Montessori School, formerly known as Garden Oaks Elementary School

Welcome: President Mark Klein called the meeting to order at 7:08 p.m.

A motion was made and carried to accept the September 2013 minutes as published in the Gazette.

PRESIDENT'S ANNOUNCEMENTS

\$1.75MM City of Houston Storm Water Project: President Klein announced that design work has started on this project with construction slated for 2015. A representative from Councilwoman Ellen Cohen's office and a representative from the City of Houston Public Works & Engineering will be available at January's meeting to discuss the project. The impacted area is from Brinkman down Alba and will relieve flooding. Side streets are not impacted but intersections will be as they are hooked into the lines. The project is slated to build to current city specifications which would mean wider streets along the impacted areas. Additional details can be found on the Rebuild Houston website.

GOCC Holiday Gathering: Brian O'Leary and George Appling are hosting the December meeting and holiday potluck at their home. Ham and turkey will be provided by the GOCC. Please bring your favorite dish. We will vote on the 2014 budget and board of directors positions.

GO Gazette Help: Volunteer(s) are needed to be editor(s) of the Gazette. The responsibilities could be a shared function. Please contact gazette@gardenoaks.org to discuss.

Central Northwest Super Neighborhood Update: 33 Candidates attended the CNWSN Council's first candidate forum to speak to the neighborhood voters.

Nominations will be accepted from the floor at the December 3, 2013 GOCC meeting.

Wine Walk: Dian Austin announced that the two-hour wine tasting fundraiser in the backyard of Ed and Brenda de Alba's home was a success. There was initial concern about the weather but the day cleared. With the increased sponsorship, 200 tickets, and 13 hosts, over \$17,300 was raised to support the Constable Program. Twelve of the 13 hosts have already agreed to sponsor again next year. A special thank you to the de Albas for once again providing a wonderful venue

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Phil Ramirez reported that the Constable program has been funded for 2013. The Gazette has remained cash flow positive for the year. Copies of the 2014 proposed budget are available for review. The proposed budget will be published in the December 2013 Gazette, and voted on in the December 2013 meeting.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

Membership: Dian Austin awarded a Starbucks gift card to a meeting attendee. Mailers will go out in November for the membership drive. Neighbors can also sign up easily online to support the Civic Club. Dues are among the lowest of any neighborhood in the City.

GO Citizens Patrol: Carl Waters reported five crimes on the HPD website – 2 burglaries, 1 theft, and 2 auto-thefts. There have been fewer crimes overall this year than last year. Volunteers are needed for Citizens Patrol. You must be 18 years old and able to pass a background check. During the holidays, remember to shop safely. Pay attention to your surroundings, shop during the day, and hide your purchases.

Constable Program: Terry Jeanes announced that we have a new team of deputies, all with prior experience. She also reported that the Constable Program will no longer be accepting donations via bank draft. An issue with the drafting process was identified and anyone who was donating via monthly draft will be contacted to determine how to handle future donations. Anyone can donate securely online at gardenoaks.org via Paypal or credit card. Fundraiser mailers will also be going to every home in the neighborhood by Thanksgiving. As the holiday season approaches, use the GOCC Constable vacation watch so that the deputies can keep an eye on your home. If you walk or run in the area, please be aware that in Oak Forest a man in a silver Toyota has been exposing himself to female joggers. There have been multiple cats killed in the area, potentially by loose dogs. Please bring animals in at night.

Beautification: Gary Harmon reported that he is focusing on restoring the parks to a well-maintained state to prepare for spring. Dr. Pollock's 7th grade class has adopted Garden Oaks Boulevard to provide plants and other beautification.

GO Gazette: Chavonne Slovak announced that she will be stepping down as editor. Serving as Editor of the *Gazette* is a great way to be involved and meet people in the community.

Garden Oaks Home Tour 2014:

Jane Ann Roberts reported that the venue for the Preview Party has been secured. Details will be announced in January. Photos have been taken of all the GOHT 2014 homes. Donations are in progress. Two \$2,500 donations have already been received. The GOHT is marketing to larger companies this year and asking for larger donations. If anyone has connections, the Home Tour committee would like corporate sponsors for the event, the preview party, and transportation. The GOHT also needs a volunteer coordinator; please contact hometour@gardenoaks.org to volunteer or suggest a volunteer coordinator.

Garden Oaks Elementary School:

Stephanie Acosta, Parent Engagement Officer for Garden Oaks
Elementary, announced that the school will be changing its name to Garden Oaks Montessori since the student population will span Pre-K through 8th grade. Magnet Awareness Week is this week with daily tours at 9:30 a.m. Tours will continue to be available through April. 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GROW YOUR BRAIN!

There has been a great deal of research conducted in the last few years about the importance of having a "growth" mindset, but philosophers and educators have known for centuries that making mistakes and learning from them are fundamental to success! In the words of Chinese philosopher Yan-Ming Wang, "The sages do not consider that making no mistakes is a blessing. They believe, rather, that the great virtue of man lies in his ability to correct his mistakes and continually to make a new man of himself." Neuroscientists have discovered that the brain continues to develop (even in adults) when a person makes mistakes. During the learning process, neural pathways continue to develop and the brain's healthy plasticity is maintained. This is one of many reasons researchers are also finding that continued learning throughout life helps stave off degenerative brain conditions such as Alzheimer's. Not only is having a "growth" mindset good for us physically, it is a fundamental trait for success in today's rapidly changing world. Gone are the days when a skill or body of knowledge was mastered and remained virtually the same throughout a person's career. In today's world, change is the norm and the ability to adapt and innovate are key, both of which require a willingness to take a certain degree of risk and try new things. But maintaining this healthy "growth" mindset is a struggle. In early childhood, children are driven to succeed. Think of a child learning to walk, they fall down but never give up! As children grow, however, they become more anxious about getting the "right" answer and may be reluctant to ask questions. What can we do to support our children's mindset and develop a growth mindset of our own?

Dr. Maria Montessori recognized that children enjoy a challenge and actually prefer an assignment that will stretch their abilities as long as they have the support and guidance to work in a balance of independence and collaboration. The teacher in the Montessori classroom is a "quide" or resource to students should they request help; however, this guidance is intended to be that of a coach as opposed to a problem-solver or critic. In a Montessori environment, children self-monitor and develop the ability to persevere at a task and self-check for quality. Finding a learning environment that supports inquiry and innovation through a non-threatening, nurturing philosophy is one step a parent can take to ensure your child is working in a "growth" environment.

At home, parents can create a learning environment to enhance children's willingness to take risks and innovate:

- Show don't tell work together with your child and try new things! Learn to play an instrument or take Tae Kwon Do classes together. Sharing a new endeavor and modeling perseverance (practicing) can encourage a child to keep trying!
- Go on family field trips children are fascinated by the way the world works around them. For example, Igloo Corporation has a factory on the west side of town schedule a tour and talk to your child about innovations in manufacturing and design. Create a mock-up together of your ideal cooler including color and purpose.
- Take things apart do you have items that don't work anymore? Allow your child to deconstruct it! You can also find items at garage sales or resale shops that are inexpensive but will provide hours of entertainment

for your child. Provide a set of small screwdrivers or hand tools to support your child's inquisitive nature. (If it is an electronic item remove the cord and stress to your child that you must ensure safety even in innovation!)

- Take a class there are many free, online courses now offered through major universities! One of my favorite sources is Open Culture www.open-culture.com/freeonlinecourses. While your children work on their homework, you can learn, too, and model the importance of life-long learning!
- Set goals In Cal Newport's latest book, So Good They Can't Ignore You, he emphasizes that setting goals for learning is also an important component for learning. Children ask "why" non-stop when they are exploring the world. Setting goals for your family and with your child can help them develop a sense of responsibility and power in navigating the world. Most importantly, having a "growth" mindset is intertwined with a determination to do your best and to take a degree of risk. In the words of Colonel C.E. Wheat from the West Point Cadet's prayer, "Make us to choose the harder right instead of the easier wrong and never to be content with a half truth when the whole can be won." Enjoy the adventure and grow your brain!

PK3 - PK4


- Birth Certificate

- HISD PK application


Kindergarten - 8th Grade

Notification of applicants' acceptance into the program or placement on our waiting list will be sent to parents on March 28, 2014. Parents of accepted applicants must then notify the school of their intent to accept or decline the offer of enrollment in the program as soon as possible and no later than April 11, 2014.





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MISTLETOE

Most people have heard of mistletoe, particularly at Christmas time. It is a parasitic plant which often grows on other trees and shrubs. The white berries are full of a sticky juice and are poisonous.

In ancient times the Druids believed that mistletoe would bring good luck and good health and it was used to treat certain ailments. In the Middle Ages mistletoe was hung from ceilings or placed above stable and house doors to drive off evil spirits and to insure fertility.

The most fully developed myth regarding mistletoe comes from the Norse mythology of the Vikings. Mistletoe's curative powers and the belief that it can raise humans from the dead relates to the resurrection of the Norse god Baldar.

The story goes as follows: Baldar, the Norse god of the summer sun, saw in

a dream his death. Frigga, his mother and the goddess of beauty and love — and from whom we get the name Friday — compelled the elements, plants and animals not to kill Baldar. She neglected to extract this same promise from the unique mistletoe. The mischief god Loki, realizing that mistletoe grows on trees and has no roots in the ground, fashioned a poisoned dart from mistletoe and, with the aid of Baldar's blind brother Hoder, shot the mistletoe missile to kill Baldar. His death brought winter and his mother's lamentation.

Frigga's tears over her son changed the red mistletoe berries to white and raised Baldar from the dead. From her gratitude she blessed with a kiss everyone who walked beneath mistletoe, declaring that the mistletoe must forever after bring love rather that death into the world.

Jobs and a low cost-of-living are important, but we must also be able to offer a high quality of life if we are to keep Houston attractive for the future.

One area we will see progress on during my last term in office is the Bayou Greenways 2020 initiative. This voter-approved program will create a continuous network parks and hike a bike trails along our bayous.

Rich and Nancy Kinder, through their family foundation The Kinder Foundation, recently announced plans to donate \$50 million to the nonprofit Houston Parks Board to help fund the project. Their donation is the largest in the history of Houston's park system and one of the largest grants to a public greenspace in the United States.

I love this project not only because of the impact it will have on our parks system, but also because it will complete the 100-year-old vision of city planner Arthur Comey and many like-minded leaders who saw the potential benefits of integrating Houston's waterways into our recreational system. The Kinders have made a major gift to the citizens of Houston and I am thankful for their generosity and commitment to the future of our city.

In November 2012, voters approved a bond referendum allowing the City of Houston to fund \$100 million to complete the project. The Houston Parks Board has committed to raising a matching \$115 million. So far, more than \$70 million has been raised in private donations.

The Houston Parks Board is managing the private fundraising, design and construction. In addition, the organization will be responsible for maintaining approximately 4,000 acres of existing and new parklands in the completed Bayou Greenways 2020 project.

Project segments along the bayous will be announced in phases and will be complete by 2020 creating ample opportunities for neighborhoods and communities to connect and explore both the existing trails and the new ones to come. Overall the project is projected to generate \$70 million annually in benefits which includes \$10 million in economic health benefits; another \$10 million in environmental health benefits; and, finally, \$50 million in physical and mental health benefits.

The creation of parkland, trails and natural areas along our major bayous will help protect and preserve water quality, natural habitat and native wildlife while at the same time promoting the overall health and welfare of the city. Once Bayou Greenways 2020 is complete, Houston will have the largest offstreet shared use path system in the nation. This project will put six out of every 10 Houstonians within a mile and half of a bayou park or trail and help Houston retain its current position as the best place to live, work and raise a family for generations to come.



Critters 101: Puppy Thoughts

Christmas is coming and puppies will be arriving as gifts, so here are some "puppy thoughts" to ponder.

Vaccines: Do your research and ask your veterinarian questions. Educate yourself so you do not over vaccinate your new puppy. Understand each vaccine you choose and decide whether they should get certain vaccines as a group or spread them out individually. There might even be some vaccines you choose not to get for your puppy.

Feeding: Don't just feed your dog a food because it says PUPPY on the bag. Educate yourself on nutrition. Whether you choose canned food, kibble or a raw diet, feel confident you are doing the best you see fit for your puppy. If you are not feeding a raw diet, ensure your puppy does get some fresh protein in his diet. You can boil eggs for 4 minutes, then crush them up, shell and all and feed them with your food. You can add some cottage cheese to his meal or lightly cook some chicken and toss it in the food. Make feeding time fun for you and your puppy. It is also a good idea to feed your puppy 3-4 small meals a day instead of letting him gorge once or twice a day. It is better for the digestive system and will allow the body to better utilize the food.

Local Farmers' Market

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FRESH FROM THE MARKET-EGGPLANT

Buying vegetables from your local farmers means learning about varieties that are never found in the store. A wonderful example of this is eggplant (aubergine), as the great big black things in the vegetable bins are probably the least useful example of a range of berry varieties that numbers in the hundreds.

The reputation for soaking up oil got them into the book *One Thousand and One Arabian Nights*, and their occasional bitterness has led to myths about there being a male and a female fruit, and that you must be able to tell which sex they are to avoid the one with the seeds. Tall tales aside, they can be challenging for many people. There are some simple methods of making them palatable, and this is especially easy if you start with the thin skinned Indian and Asian varieties that you will find at the local farmer market.

The best way to bring out the flavors is to slice the berry about ½ an inch thick, and roast in the oven at high heat until the surface begins to caramelize slightly. Then the eggplant can be incorporated into your vegetable dishes, ratatouille being one of the more popular, where it will impart a richness and depth of flavor that can be startling.

This week's recipe is a Mediterranean staple, and in Greek known as melitzanosalata, which really just means eggplant salad, but every country around the Mediterranean Sea has its own variant. To change it into baba ganoush (Turkish) version, add cumin and sesame seed paste (tahini), or you can add paprika, cumin and tomatoes for the Moroccan style - they are all excellent.

Melitzanosalata: Eggplant Dip

1lb eggplants 3 tablespoons fresh lemon juice 3 medium-cloves garlic, chopped 1/2 cup Extra virgin olive oil 1/2 cup Italian parsley, chopped salt & pepper to taste

Preheat the oven to 400 F. Slice the eggplants across about ½ an inch thick, discarding the stem end. Put them on a baking sheet and bake for 15-20 minutes, turning once about halfway through. Remove and cool on a paper towel or wire rack. When they are cool, remove the skin; with the soft skin varieties you can leave it on if you want.

Put the eggplant into a food processor and add the garlic and lemon juice. Pulse a few times to combine. Continue to pulse while adding a steady stream of olive oil. After the oil is added, put in the parsley, taste to judge how much salt and pepper to add, and pulse again to combine. Serve with crusty bread or fresh tortilla chips.

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SUPERIOR INDOOR AIR QUALITY COMES WITH CLEAN DUCTWORK

Last month, we talked about the importance of your A/C system's ductwork. It should be correctly sized and in good condition (no leaks or blockages) in order to function well. However, what about the condition of the ductwork's interior?

Mold, mildew and microbes, oh my

Houston's warm temperatures and humidity create the perfect breeding ground for airborne irritants such as mold, mildew, microbes and pollen. Along with rat feces, dust mites, animal dander and hair, these particles build up in your ductwork over the months and years. Many illnesses such as asthma are caused or aggravated by contaminated indoor air. For allergy sufferers, it can create genuine discomfort as well.

Whenever your air conditioning or furnace is running, these built-up irritants are spread throughout the home. Take a moment to look at your home's vents (those are where the air comes out in the ceiling). If the vents are dirty, your ductwork definitely needs to be inspected and cleaned.

Breathe in the benefits

Clean ductwork creates a variety of benefits for you and your home:

- Improved indoor air quality with fewer allergy-provoking irritants
- Better energy-efficient operation
- Less wear on the A/C system along with the potential for increased lifespan

Regular ductwork cleaning is a crucial part of HVAC maintenance. I recommend having this done by trained technicians once every five years. They attach a large suction tube to one of the vents and run a fringed tether through the duct. By spinning vigorously, it dislodges

the accumulated debris which coats the duct's interior. This debris is then sucked through the tube and into their van outside, never contaminating your home. The technicians proceed to each vent throughout your home until all of the ductwork has been cleaned.

Along with the ductwork, they should also clean the following:

- Supply and return grilles
- Plenum
- Heat exchanger
- Blower motor, assembly and housing
- Evaporator coil, drain and drain pan

As you can see, your entire A/C system will benefit from this cleaning. This leaves your home's air healthy and clean.
