Randall Berm – Durham at West 30th


Esplanade – Garden Oaks Blvd. between Shepherd and Sue Barnett



Location: Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet School 901 Sue Barnett

Welcome: President Sheila Briones called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. President Briones introduced herself and the other officers present: Victor Seghers, Vice President, and Cindy Bartos, Secretary. Treasurer Jerry Butler was not present.

A motion was made and carried to approve the December 2013 minutes as published in the *Gazette*.

In recognition and thanks for their service, President Briones awarded former Civic Club officers Mark Klein, Phil Ramirez, and Heather Leverett with certificates of appreciation and gift tokens from Plonk Bistro Wine Bar and Restaurant.

PRESIDENT'S ANNOUNCEMENTS

President Briones announced the creation of the new Government Affairs Standing Committee and appointed Mark Klein as its Chair. As such, Mark will act as the Garden Oaks representative on Super Neighborhood Council 12 (Oak Forest/Garden Oaks) to ensure that the City Departments and City Council are being responsive to the Garden Oaks community in delivering city services and needed improvements. The Chair will develop relationships with key legislators and their staffs to channel the goals and desires of the Civic Club and its members as well as to track and report on any city/state/federal

activities that may affect the Civic Club and its membership.

Mark Klein noted a correction to his article on the Garden Oaks Drainage Project as it appeared in the January Gazette. The dollar amount should read \$17.5 million.

Councilwoman Ellen Cohen wished everyone a happy and healthy new year and mentioned pension reform, the Pay Day Ordinance, and health insurance for city workers as some of the topics to be addressed in the new session. There will be a Capital Improvement Projects meeting soon with a date and location to be announced.

Treasurer's report:

In Jerry Butler's absence, President Briones presented the proposed 2014 Annual Budget for approval by the members. Brenda de Alba suggested two revisions: reducing the expenses for the Wine Walk from the proposed \$4500 to \$1000 and adding a line item for a donation to Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet with an expense of \$1000. The motion was made and carried to accept the proposed Budget with the revisions.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

Beautification: Gary Harmon will put together teams to work on the pocket parks prior to the Garden Oaks Home Tour. He also announced that a representative from Buchanan's Native Plants will be the guest speaker at the March Civic Club meeting. The Houston Chronicle's Kathy Huber will be available at the April meeting to answer questions concerning spring planting.

Garden Oaks Citizens' Patrol: Carl Waters reported 7 crimes for the month of December. The number of reported crimes in 2013 reflects a 13% reduction from 2012.

Constable Program: Terry Jeanes gave a summary of recent crimes in the area. She suggested residents call the Constable when door-to-door solicitors are in the neighborhood.



HARRIS COUNTY MASTER **GARDENERS**

Master Gardeners are volunteers for Texas AgriLife Extension Service. They are trained by Texas A&M AgriLife Extension to bring relevant, researchbased information in horticulture to the public.

The Texas Master Gardener program had its beginnings in 1978 in an extension horticulture training program at Texas A&M University. At that time, county agents in the Texas Agricultural Extension Service were experiencing overwhelming demands for horticulture information.

Today, Harris County Master Gardeners answer gardening questions on their free hotline. They also maintain testing and demonstration gardens at the AgriLife Extension office located in Bear Creek Park. The Master Gardeners at Precinct 2, a satellite group of Harris County Master Gardeners, maintain the Genoa Friendship Garden, a production and demonstration garden located at the Harris County Precinct 2 Road Camp located in Pasadena, Texas.

Master Gardeners hold six plant sales a year in Harris County to raise funds to assist AgriLife Extension in its educational mission. The next sale will be the Tomato & Pepper Sale on March 1. Tomato and pepper varieties will be sold, as well as other vegetables and herbs suited to our summer growing season.

The funds raised are used to support the school Cylinder Gardening program that teaches youth to raise their own vegetables, to promote the Junior Master Gardener program in Harris County, to maintain the gardens at both locations, and to provide educational workshops and informational displays to the public and a variety of other educational activities.

THE IMPORTANCE OF EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION

Montessori education in HISD public schools begins at age three, which is different than most other public schools where pre-kindergarten students enroll at four years of age. This difference is based in the Montessori curriculum which was designed to maximize the natural learning cycles of children. Dr. Montessori observed patterns of learning behaviors that she divided into four planes of development, each spanning approximately 6 years: ages 0-6 years, 6-12 years, 12-18 years, and 18 years-adulthood.

Within each of these planes of development she described sensitive periods of learning consisting of three-year time frames. In our public Montessori schools here in Houston, we adhere to Montessori's work by establishing classrooms for a threeyear age span of students. In early childhood classes, this means we have 3, 4 and 5-year-olds learning together in the same classroom community. Students who begin in the classroom as a 3-year-old stay with the same teacher and assistant for three years before moving to the next level, known as Lower Elementary.

Why start at age three? Montessori found that this sensitive period of development is characterized by the acquisition of language, an interest in small objects, order in the environment, sensory refinement, and social behavior. The Montessori classroom is rich with opportunities for children to construct meaning from hands-on, self-directed learning. The Montessori classroom is a busy, interactive learning environment where children are

encouraged to move and explore the materials on the shelves under the guidance and direction of the teacher or "guide," who is not only certified to teach by the State of Texas, but also Montessori-credentialed (upon completion of a 12-18 month course of study including internship). Additionally, peace education is emphasized in the Montessori classroom, with the curriculum including lessons on grace, courtesy, and the importance of working together to solve problems that arise. At Garden Oaks Montessori, children at all levels also receive lessons through the ubiquitous implementation of the The Leader In Me, a transformational model for elementary school-aged children adapted from Steven Covey's The Seven Habits of Highly Effective People.

Recent research about the long-term impact of early childhood education has shown that these efforts are a good investment in the future. A child who receives a solid foundation in early childhood will continue to benefit well into adulthood. Harvard economist Raj Chetty wrote a New York Times article, "The Case for the \$320,000 Kindergarten Teacher", in which he described his research on the long-term effects of early childhood education. Of the 12,000 adults he studied, he found that those who received effective early childhood instruction were earning an average of \$1,000 more annually at age 27, but even more importantly, they were happier and healthier. In his words, "We don't really care about test scores. We care about adult outcomes." Early childhood education in public schools encompasses both academic indicators as well as social and emotional well-being. Effective early childhood education has longlasting, positive ramifications for our children and our society.



AIR CONDITIONING TIPS FOR THE WINTER

Preventive Maintenance Agreements: "I Just Love Paying for that Pound of Cure"... Said No One Ever!

It's an ounce of prevention in the form of a Preventive Maintenance Agreement (PMA) that's worth every penny. PMAs are the best way to ensure that your home's A/C system and furnace operate smoothly and efficiently, and will decrease the risk of costly breakdowns.



Critters 101: Help! My Pet is Lost!

It will happen to the most protective and responsible of us all. One day you will be looking for your pet. The first steps you take can make the difference in whether you see your baby again. Unfortunately, some pets are intentionally stolen or get injured or killed, but in the age of social media, more lost pets seem to be getting back home safely and quickly.


Immediate First Steps:

- Post on your personal Facebook page, HOA web pages, and lost pet pages in your area.
- Post on Craigslist. Be wary of scammers.
- Quickly gather a search party together with awesome treats, friendly dogs, and leashes.
- If your pet is micro-chipped, report the loss to the registry and make sure they have your current contact information.
- Print flyers or postcards to distribute door-to-door and at nearby veterinarians' offices and pet facilities.
- Pray for your pet's safe return.
- Have someone else walk through your home and look in case your baby is just hiding from you.

I have witnessed many instances where lost pets are reunited with their guardians thanks to information shared via social media. So, be sure to post your lost pet online as soon as possible and ask others to forward the information for you. Having a pet go missing is a stressful situation, but the above steps can help you and your four-legged child find each other again.

FIX FELIX FOR FREE

Houston's pet overpopulation problem isn't new, and it isn't going to be "fixed" overnight. To truly win the war on pet overpopulation, it is imperative for pet owners to act, starting with spaying and neutering their pets. As an added bonus, studies show that altered pets live longer, healthier lives and have a lower risk of developing certain types of cancer. Spaying or neutering pets can also have a positive impact on their behavior. It often reduces or eliminates unwanted actions such as marking territory, roaming, and aggression.

Spaying and neutering is so important that Houston Humane Society has created an annual event called "Fix Felix for Free" to help local cat lovers have their male cats neutered for free. On Wednesday, February 19, 2014, Houston Humane Society will neuter 700 male cats

free of charge at the HHS Animal Wellness Clinic. The success of this undertaking will require the efforts of the entire HHS staff, many dedicated volunteers, and the staff of All Cats Veterinary Clinic.



Cat owners must have an appointment and may bring a maximum of five cats per household for surgery. Both domesticated and feral cats qualify; for the health and safety of everyone involved, each feline must be contained in a separate plastic crate or carrier. (Carriers will be available for purchase at the clinic for \$10.00 each.) Feral cats may be presented in official metal wire humane traps.

A current rabies vaccination is required by law. Pet owners must show proof of current rabies vaccination, or they may purchase a rabies vaccine for their cat at the event for a discounted rate of \$5.00, which includes a rabies tag and certificate. Optional services available at the time of surgery are the feline leukemia vaccine for \$20.00, FVRCP (feline viral rhinotracheitis) vaccine for \$15.00, and pain medication for \$10.00 (a 3-day oral regimen or a single injection to last 24 hours post-surgery).




