The final preparations are in full swing for this year's Home & Garden Tour, which will take place on Sunday, April 27th from 12:00 noon until 6:00 p.m.

This year's featured homes and gardens represent the great variety that Garden Oaks has to offer: original footprints creatively restored, renovations designed to meet the needs of growing families, and new construction incorporating favorite elements of the past. The six homes, three gardens, and the gardens at Garden Oaks Montessori allow visitors a glimpse of the wide diversity of homes and gardens in our area. The owners of the featured properties are themselves an eclectic mix, including a romance writer, architect, photographer, interior designer, and landscape designer.

The event promises to have something of interest for everyone. We hope to see all of our Garden Oaks neighbors come out with their friends and family to support the community's largest fundraiser that promotes neighborhood security, beautification of our green spaces, and other community improvements.

The Tour weekend will kick off with a VIP Party, Dinner, and Auction on Saturday, April 26th in honor of this year's sponsors and tour owners. CITIZENS' PATROL UPDATE

Last month I erroneously reported that an assault occurred in the 200 block of W. 30th Street. Upon subsequent research of the Houston Police Department's online database, I found that the incident is now listed as a robbery which occurred on January 2 around 10:00 a.m. on a "public street or sidewalk".

This month's review of crimes recorded on the HPD online database indicated two crimes in the neighborhood in February, which means our year-to-date total is still less than the 10 crimes reported in the month of February alone last year.

The 1836 Fest held at Cottonwood on March 8 prompted many complaints on the neighborhood online message boards. If you are impacted by excessive noise during future events at Cottonwood, please contact HPD at 713-884-3131 to register your complaint. Tell the call taker that you are calling about loud noise at 3422 N. Shepherd Drive and ask thatthey send an officer with a decibel meter to your home. Be prepared to answer a series of questions and be aware that loudnoise is considered a low priority issue, so it may be a while before an officer is able to respond.

Welcome: President Sheila Briones called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. A motion was made and seconded to approve the February 2014 minutes as published in the *Gazette*.

PRESIDENT'S ANNOUNCEMENTS

President Briones announced the Board's decision to arrange for on-site childcare during civic club meetings beginning with the April meeting. Two caregivers from the YMCA will be available from 6:30 – 8:30 p.m. at a cost to parents of \$1.00 per child.

A volunteer appreciation event will take place on Sunday, October 26, 2014. More information will be provided as the date approaches.

In response to Mayor Annise Parker's recent Executive Order outlining her Complete Streets and Transportation Plan, a motion was made and seconded to send a letter on behalf of the civic club to the Mayor, City Council Member Ellen Cohen, and our At-Large Council Members asking that sidewalk variances be allowed in Garden Oaks. The motion passed.

Civic club member Ed de Alba moved to initiate a mail campaign with similar letters by offering a sample letter as an insert in the Gazette. The motion was seconded. After discussion and recommendation by Government Affairs Committee Chair Mark Klein to use the mail campaign if needed as a follow-up to the initial letter, Mr. de Alba moved to table his original motion.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Jerry Butler reported on the civic club's current finances and had copies of the current profit and loss statement and balance sheet available for meeting attendees.

Program: John Gardner, garden advisor from Buchanan's Native Plants, presented ideas on how to prepare our lawns and gardens for the spring home tour. John explained the use of worm castings and other organic products and displayed examples of plants recommended for their use in adding instant color. STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

Government Affairs: Committee Chair Mark Klein announced the City's Capital Improvements Plan meeting to be held March 5 at the West Gray Metropolitan Multi-Purpose Center. Following a brief discussion of the proposed Storm Water Drainage Project on Alba Road, civic club member Lori Kennedy moved for the creation of an ad hoc committee for the purpose of evaluating the proposal's impact and forming recommendations for the civic club's response to the project. The motion was seconded and passed. Pam Parks volunteered to chair the committee, with Lori Kennedy, Chris Lindsey, and Julie Maddox volunteering to serve on the committee as well.

Civic club member John Goodman, an employee of the City of Houston Public Works and Engineering Department, reported that the Capital Improvement Project will open for bids in November or December of 2014.

Beautification: Gary Harmon was not present.

Garden Oaks Citizens' Patrol: Carl Waters reported two crimes for the month of February.

Constable Program: Terry Jeanes was not present but sent a report that a new deputy will begin patrolling Saturday. The constables are aware of and following up on the reported pack of dogs in Section 1. Residents are asked to report any solicitors to the Constable.

Gazette: Editor Jenny Espeseth was not in attendance; however, President Briones reminded all of the deadline to submit articles.

Website: Joe Muscara had no report.

2014 Home Tour: Chair Brenda de Alba reported a record total of \$27,000 in sponsorships to date and her hopes to get more. Tickets have gone on sale for the VIP Party; only 300 tickets will be sold.

Garden Oaks Montessori: Principal Lindsey Pollock was not present at the meeting.

President Briones adjourned the meeting at 8:10 p.m.



One of the basic tenets of Montessori education is building global citizens through peace education, connection to the earth, and to one another; otherwise referred to as the "cosmic" strand of the Montessori curriculum. At Garden Oaks, this strand of Montessori education is realized in many ways including leadership development in students, parent involvement, as well as community and business partnerships.

Children at Garden Oaks Montessori benefit from the opportunity to work toward individual goals through differentiated, individualized work plans, which allows them a balance of choice in learning assignments prepared by the teacher as well as participating in individual and group lessons. Students develop a sense of community by staying with a group of children for three years in a multi-age classroom. Further, they are responsible for the school environment both in the classroom (learning materials, plants, and pets) and outside (gardens and grounds). These activities along with our campus-wide implementation of FranklinCovey's 7 Habits/The Leader In Me and the Human Rights Campaign Foundation's Welcoming Schools programs provide students with a ubiquitous practice of caring for others and themselves. They participate in community service on campus by mentoring each other in the classroom, serving as reading buddies for younger students in other classes, helping in the library, and serving on the student leadership team. Off-campus, our students participate in area clean-up days and our seventh graders have made a long-term commitment to maintain the esplanade along Garden Oaks Boulevard.

Parents and grandparents are also very involved at our school. On any given day you will find parents volunteering on campus in ways such as reading to and listening to children read aloud, helping in the library, working in the front office and assisting teachers with administrative tasks, and facilitating gardening lessons. Garden Oaks currently has over 600 parents and community members who have officially registered with the school district in the VIPS (Volunteers in Public Schools) system and cleared a background check to serve on campus to support our students.

Finally, community and business partnerships are essential to the sustainability of the program at Garden Oaks Montessori. We are fortunate to have many partners who support the unique learning environment at the school. The Garden Oaks Civic Club supports the school by featuring the campus in the Home and Garden tour, including us in the monthly civic club agenda, and donating funds to the school and to numerous Eagle Scout projects that benefit our campus. We also have neighbors who collect Box Tops for Education for our school. Kids Hope mentors from St. Rose of Lima work with our children on a weekly basis. Business partners provide underwriting and support for major events, such as the Shindig parents' night out fundraising event which was generously hosted by Haven restaurant and our annual Pancake Breakfast and Silent Auction. By donating auction items, dozens of business sponsors have made it possible for us to have the Writers in the Schools (WITS) program schoolwide and to replace Montessori materials as needed. We also have

business partnerships through the Greater Heights Chamber of Commerce, including Members Trust Credit Union which provided field day t-shirts for our students, Adolf Hoepfl Garage which underwrites our annual Constitution Day activities, and the School of American Leadership (SOAL), among many others.

Volunteers are essential to our school and to our society. Building a community in which children learn to care for their environment and for one another is one way in which we will build a sustainable future for a global society. If you are interested in participating in our school community, we welcome you. Opportunities abound at Garden Oaks, from listening to children read, assisting them with homework, helping with morning drop-off or afternoon pick-up, working in the gardens, laminating materials for the classrooms, or being available for special projects. 
TIPS FOR SENIORS

The Bathroom: The Great Escape? Or an Accident Waiting to Happen?

Your parent's bathroom may be a refuge from daily pressures ... it can also be a dangerous room for seniors. Here are some tips for keeping this room safe:

- Keep the hot water heater set at 120 degrees Fahrenheit or less.
- Ensure the room is adequately lit at night.
- Add safety fixtures such as grab bars and bath benches.
- Minimize the risk of slipping by applying adhesive grip material to the floor. (Mom's fuzzy pink throw rug on the slick tile floor may have to go!)
- Have someone within earshot and ensure outside access (disable door's locking function or keep key handy and visible) in case someone inside needs help and can't open the door.

On April 26 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) will give the public its eighth opportunity in three years to prevent pill abuse and theft by ridding their homes of potentially dangerous expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs. Bring your pills for disposal to drop-off locations listed at www.dea.gov. (The DEA cannot accept liquids or needles or sharps, only pills or patches.) The service is free and anonymous, no questions asked.

Last October, Americans turned in 324 tons (over 647,000 pounds) of prescription drugs at over 4,114 sites operated by the DEA and its thousands of state and local law enforcement partners. When those results are combined with what was collected in its seven previous Take Back events, DEA and its partners have taken in over 3.4 million pounds more than 1,700 tons—of pills.

AIR CONDITIONING TIPS FOR THE SPRING

Pre-Summer A/C Maintenance Checklist

Although temperatures are very mild and pleasant now, our humid Houston summer is just around the corner. We depend on our A/C systems to keep us comfortable in the summer, so before the demand for cool air kicks into serious overdrive, take a look at this spring A/C checklist. A little preventive maintenance now will go a long way toward keeping your system running smoothly and efficiently all summer long.

1. Schedule a spring tune-up.

This is the single most important tip of all. During the tune-up, your A/C service technician will perform numerous maintenance tasks such as checking freon levels, adjusting belts, and examining the wiring and connections. A tune-up will help catch most small problems before they become big ones so that your cooling system maintains its peak operating efficiency.

2. Examine your filter every month and replace as needed.

While your A/C system's filter is designed to protect it from dust and other airborne contaminants, a clogged filter can do more harm than good. It forces your air handler to work much harder and allows particles to build up on your system's components. This can shorten its lifespan and force you to replace it much earlier than necessary.

3. Be realistic regarding your thermostat settings.

The lower you set your thermostat, the harder your A/C system has to work. Ease the load on your system

and your wallet by setting the thermostat to the highest temperature at which you are comfortable. Use other devices such as ceiling fans and programmable thermostats to help you keep yourself cool.

4. Keep your thermostat at a normal setting.

Thinking it will cool them off more quickly, some people crank their thermostats down to the lowest possible setting when they first arrive home. This puts undue stress on the air conditioner. Instead, keep your thermostat at a normal setting whenever you turn it on.

5. Change your thermostat's batteries.

Spring is the perfect time to replace the batteries in your digital thermostat so that it functions properly throughout the year.


6. Keep the area surrounding the outside condenser free of debris.

Throughout the year, overgrown plants, shrubbery, and leaves can build up around your outside condenser. For optimal airflow, it needs approximately three to five feet of clear space surrounding it. You can use your garden hose to wash away the accumulated dirt and grime coating the condenser's fins.

7. Call your A/C technician as soon as you suspect a problem.

While these preventive measures can significantly reduce potential problems with your A/C system, there's still a chance that something can go wrong. Get a professional opinion right away so that a small problem doesn't end up being a big, expensive one.

Critters 101: Bones - Are they safe for my dog or cat?

Cooked bones eaten by your pet can splinter and cause potentially fatal internal injuries. Raw (uncooked) bones, however, are okay for most dogs and cats and they love them! Raw bones are great for alleviating boredom, keeping teeth clean, maintaining healthy gums, and they are a good source of calcium for your pet. Here are some tips for safely (and neatly) administering these tasty treats:

- Soft centered bones are completely edible.
- Hard larger bones such as knuckles and soup bones are more for enjoying for a short time.
- For dogs, you can freeze your bones to make them less messy and they will last a little longer.
- Never leave a pet unattended with a bone.
- You might want to put your pet in a place away from your carpet and furniture such as a crate with a towel while chewing on bones.
- Many pets will get aggressive when it comes to fresh raw bones and meats, so it is always a good idea to separate your pets and give them their own space to enjoy their treat.
- Never cook the bones.
- If your pet is outside, they might be decide to bury the bone, so be ready.
- Some pets have been known to chip or break a tooth when chewing on hard bones for too long, so check your pet's teeth often.

Do your research and find good natural healthy ways to let your pet be an animal. We have to remember that we have only been feeding processed bags of dog food for about 60 years. Bring back a little natural food into your pet's diet. Have a safe and happy April!




