AN 18-FOOT TALL HIGH SPEED RAIL RUNNING THROUGH GARDEN OAKS?

An elevated high-speed rail is being proposed above the BNSF railroad tracks along 34th Street, *running right through Garden Oaks* and other long-established neighborhoods in the area including Inwood, Magnum Manor, Oak Forest, Independence Heights, Lindale, and others.

Proposed by the private, for-profit Central Texas Railway, the bullet train would ferry passengers between Houston and Dallas at 200 mph every 30 minutes from 5:30 a.m. to 11:00 p.m.

The Garden Oaks BNSF line is one of two "preferred" routes being considered by the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) in conjunction with the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT). The other route would also bisect highly populated neighborhoods along the Union Pacific rail line through the Washington Avenue corridor.

JANUARY CIVIC CLUB SPEAKER VINCE RYAN, HARRIS COUNTY ATTORNEY

Vince Ryan has served as Harris County Attorney since 2009. The Harris County Attorney is the civil lawyer for Harris County, related governmental entities and their officials. But the ultimate clients are the people of Harris County.

A Houston native, Vince served in the ROTC while attending the University of Houston. Upon graduation he became an active duty officer in the United States Army, first serving in Europe and then volunteering for service in Vietnam. He returned to active duty for Operation Just Cause which ousted the dictator of Panama in 1990. After his service in Vietnam, Vince left active duty and attended the University of Houston Law School. While practicing law, Vince attended Rice University and received a Master's Degree in History. He also remained in the Army Reserve and retired as a Lieutenant Colonel.

Vince first began working in the County Attorney's Office under Mike Driscoll and served as an Assistant County Attorney and First Assistant County Attorney from 1981 to 1987. He left to begin three terms on Houston City Council in 1988. Following his Council service, Vince was appointed to the Board of the Panama Canal Commission which oversaw the Canal and its historic transition to Panama on December 31, 1999. During and following his service on the Panama Canal Commission, Vince was associated with several prominent Houston law firms and continued his community involvement, serving on various boards.

Vince is married to Pam Rodriguez; they have three sons. Vince is and has been involved in many community and non-profit organizations.





Many, many thanks to the volunteers who gave their time last year to support the *Citizens' Patrol* program; without their participation this program would not exist. Our program could use more volunteers. If your New Year's resolution is to become more active in the Garden Oaks community, our program could use your help. It takes just a few simple steps to become a member. First, you need to contact me by telephone at 713-864-1992, by email at GOCOP77018@AOL.com or through the Garden Oaks web site GardenOaks.org. Once you have signed up, you will need to complete a one-hour training class and pass a criminal background check conducted by the Houston Police Department. The program is open to all Garden Oaks residents 18 years of age or older.

In November I had a brief conversation with the Captain of HPD's North Division. He informed me that he has some crime reduction plans for the Garden Oaks-Oaks Forest area which include the use of bike patrols as a stealth approach to combat the residential kick-in burglars.




GAZEBO SANTA RIDES AGAIN!



DESIGNING A WORLD-CLASS MONTESSORI CAMPUS By Lindsey Pollock, Ed.D., Principal, Garden Oaks Montessori

The planning has begun for our campus transformation into a space where world-class Montessori education will be housed in a building designed for our needs. As you may remember, Garden Oaks was a designated recipient of nearly \$27 million in the 2012 bond election. These funds are targeted to create a physical space where our work as a Montessori school will be supported. Currently we have been meeting as a Project Advisory Team (PAT) to discuss the needs of the campus. The team is made up of Garden Oaks' residents, parents and teachers who meet with school district personnel who are coordinating the construction project. So far, the PAT has participated in the selection of the architectural firm and the development of the guiding principles that define the program goals of our school (Montessori education with an emphasis on Environmental Sciences). We have toured schools in Cypress Fairbanks to see some of the new buildings constructed there as well as private Montessori schools in the Houston area.

As we work together in our PAT meetings, our goal is to enhance and enrich the physical structure of our school to ensure that our focus is on the work of our children's academic and social/emotional development. Working with our architects, we will be moving into the next phase of planning which will include decisions regarding the "footprint" of the building. Our firm, Swart and Hill, is comprised of individuals who are very familiar with our community needs and challenges (one is a Garden Oaks resident). As we make progress, I will continue to communicate through the Garden Oaks Civic Club meetings and the *Gazette* to be sure you have opportunities for input and feedback. As we consider our school space, we are especially committed to enhancing connections to the outdoor world and to the inclusion of wonder and excitement about learning.

As such, we are reviewing documents and resources that guide current building and design practices for exemplary school designs such as the following resource from the World Forum Foundation.

Michelle Pratt, author of Design and Nature: Designing Inspiring and Effective Spaces for Children, wrote in an article, "The Element of Surprise in Environmental Design":

"The outdoor environment has many places where elements of surprise can be incorporated and developed. The trickling of water, that place to hide and snuggle into, items that blow in the wind, shadows that appear on the ground, the leaves that fall from a tree, these can all surprise. Those spirited places satisfy children's souls. They possess a wholeness that makes the heart sing, the soul rejoice, the body feel safe and at rest. It is the spirit of a place that makes

it memorable, that expands our sense of possibility, and puts us in touch with what is most loving, creative, and human about ourselves.

Elements of surprise are all around us. It's not just about architecture and design; it is also about what we do and what we provide. We are surrounded by natural resources — materials like stone, wood, metal — textured items to name a few. It is about elements that appear to be heavy but are light, items that are soft but are hard. It is in the planning of our environments; all we need to do is to work out how we incorporate these into daily center life. My challenge to vou is to think and plan more carefully, reconsidering what it is like to see things from the eyes of the child." 

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HIGH-SPEED RAIL Continued from Page 1

Imagine an elevated freeway ramp running above our neighborhood along W. 34th Street and you get the idea.

Texas Central Railway would move the BNSF tracks over, then build an 18-foot tall rail structure, topped by another 18 feet or more of power lines.

This BNSF route is preferred for a couple of reasons. First, it would require very little "taking" of property, using existing BNSF easements. Second, it provides a route into downtown Houston.

Robert Eckels, president of Central Texas Railway, told the Central Northwest Super Neighborhood Council (CNWSN) on November 19 that Mayor Annise Parker wants the bullet train coming downtown. There are far greater reasons to support a rail terminus outside of IH-610, within reach of Houston's large employment centers including The Energy Corridor, Uptown, Westchase, and Memorial City.

The passengers who would take the bullet train now go to Hobby Airport or Bush Intercontinental for flights; traveling to a station near IH-10 and 610 or along 290 would be little different - and could impact urban neighborhoods far less.

CNWSN Council Members have been working with Council Member Ellen Cohen's office, who attended the CNWSN Council meeting, and contacting political state representatives, as well as the FRA, about the high-speed rail and its effect on neighborhoods. Council Member Cohen says while she supports high-speed rail as a transit

option, she opposes locating the route withing close proximity to residential neighborhoods.

The Houston Chronicle has come out in support of the project, as have some City of Houston Council Members.

The Federal Railway Administration (FRA) and the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) are taking comments through January 9, 2015.

According to the FRA, comments should be specific, explaining "the why." Detailed concerns could include: harming the character of long-established neighborhoods; taking of property; impact on property values; long-term survivability of the project (what happens to the elevated tracks if the bullet train goes under); running next to schools, churches and parks; concerns with noise and vibration; cutting off access to streets, neighborhood services and emergency vehicles, etc. In addition, comments on alternate routes will be taken into consideration.

Because so few public scoping meetings were held in Houston, the **CNWSN Council is hosting a Town** Hall Forum. Texas Central Railway officials are expected to attend and invitations have been sent to area government representatives. Guidance will be provided on making comments to the FRA.

Several neighborhood associations are joining the Town Hall effort, including the Central Northwest Super Neighborhood Council (SN12), Super Neighborhood #51, Bayou Bend Community Improvement Association, Chateau Forest Community Improvement Association and Inwood Forest Community Improvement Association.
