ROBERT ECKELS TO SPEAK ON HIGH-SPEED RAIL AT FEBRUARY MEETING

At our February 3rd Civic Club meeting, Robert Eckels (bio next page) will discuss his company's proposed high-speed rail route along the current BNSF freight line. The Houston-Dallas high-speed rail project would construct an elevated track 40-50 feet tall cutting through Garden Oaks, Oak Forest, Independence Heights, and Lindale. Residents will be allowed to ask questions, learn more about the project, and find out how to communicate their positions by submitting comments to the Federal Railway Administration and the dallashoustonhsr.com website.



An elevated high-speed rail is proposed above the BNSF railroad tracks along 34th Street, running right through Garden Oaks and other long-established neighborhoods.

FEBRUARY CIVIC CLUB SPEAKER: ROBERT ECKELS, PRESIDENT, TEXAS CENTRAL RAILWAY


Judge Eckels served as County Judge for Harris County, Texas from 1995 until 2007, a role in which he oversaw executive, legislative, and judicial functions of a county that is home to nearly four million residents. He had previously been elected to the Texas Legislature while in his 20s, where he served six terms as a State Representative.

As County Judge, Eckels chaired both the Houston-Galveston Area Council Transportation Planning Council and the Harris County Toll Road Authority, a 500-lane-mile toll road system that is the only county-owned toll road system in the nation, and a pioneer in inter-agency partnerships and applying technology for efficient operations.

In the immediate aftermath of Hurricane Katrina, Eckels successfully transformed the Astrodome—in less than one day—into a combined emergency field hospital, mental health screening center, short-term shelter, and processing hub for over 27,000 desperate evacuees. His leadership during the crisis won international acclaim, with Esquire magazine describing it as "an island of competence in the face of catastrophe, a demonstration of how government ought to work."

In addition to serving on numerous state transportation finance and planning commissions and committees, from 2002 to 2010 Eckels was the founding chairman of the Texas High-Speed Rail and Transportation Corporation, a coalition of local governments, educational institutions, and the private sector working to bring highspeed rail to Texas.

After leaving public office, Eckels joined the international law firm of Fulbright & Jaworski, LLP as a Partner focused on Transportation and Infrastructure, Public Finance, Homeland Security and Disaster Law, Government Relations, and Public Law. Judge Eckels has operated his own independent legal practice and is today a Member of the Texas-based law firm, Gray Reed & McGraw, P.C.

GARDEN OAKS CIVIC CLUB MEETING MINUTES

January 6, 2015

Location: Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet School, 901 Sue Barnett Drive

Welcome: President Sheila Briones called the meeting to order at 7:03 p.m. and introduced the officers present: Chris Lindsay, Vice President, Jerry Butler, Treasurer, and Cindy Bartos, Secretary.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Jerry Butler reported on the Civic Club's current finances and had copies of the Profit and Loss statement and the Balance Sheet available at the meeting.

A motion was made and seconded to approve the December 2014 minutes as published in the *Gazette*. The motion passed.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Membership: Dian Austin had no report and held the raffle drawing at the close of the meeting.

Garden Oaks Citizens' Patrol:

Committee Chair Carl Waters, Jr. reported on recent crimes in and around the neighborhood. He encouraged participation in the Garden Oaks Citizens' Patrol Program to help keep the neighborhood safe.

Gazette: Editor Jenny Espeseth was not in attendance.

Garden Oaks Website: Webmaster Joe Muscara had no report.

President Briones announced that comment forms and copies of submitted comments pertaining to Texas Central Railway's Dallas to Houston High-Speed Rail Project, as well as our community's elected officials' contact information, would be available on the Garden Oaks website, <u>GardenOaks.org</u>.

Resident Tony Padon summarized Texas Central Railway's presentation about the project at the Super Neighborhood #12 meeting on January 5, 2015. He encouraged residents to write comment letters to the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA).

Speaker: President Briones introduced speaker Vince Ryan, Harris County Attorney. Mr. Ryan detailed the workings of the office of County Attorney and provided examples of some of the cases he handles.

COMMITTEE REPORTS (continued)

Beautification: Committee Chair Gary Harmon announced the placement of an ornamental plant next to Charlie's Chair in Triangle Park. President Briones acknowledged Mr. Harmon's and wife Joan's diligence in restoring the original sponsor bricks and plaque in Gazebo Park. Mr. Harmon is currently preparing the irrigation systems for the predicted cold weather, but will be looking for workers/volunteers when the weather warms.

Constable Program: Program Chair Terry Jeanes reported on recent wheel/rim theft in the neighborhood and suggested that neighbors take precautions such as using wheel locks, parking closer to the house, or parking in the garage, if possible.

Ms. Jeanes also thanked everyone for the many donations of toys to the Constable's Holiday Toy Drive.

Asked about the house in disrepair on the corner of 42nd and Shepherd, Ms. Jeanes said she will look further into the possible problem of title ownership and check the current payment status of property taxes.

Ad Hoc In-Line Storm Water Detention Project Committee:

Committee members Pam Parks and Mark Klein reported turning in the neighborhood survey results in the middle of November to the City of Houston with no response to date.

Government Affairs Standing Committee: Mark Klein reported on the Super Neighborhood #12 meeting on January 5, 2015 where Robert Eckels, President of Texas Central Railway, appeared and responded to questions pertaining to his company's Dallas to Houston High-Speed Rail project. An estimated 400 people attended, asking questions and voicing their concerns about the project and proposed route that would follow the BNSF (Burlington Northern Santa Fe) rail line along 34th Street. Mr. Klein stressed the importance of residents sending their comments to the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA), with copies to our elected officials. Public comments will be accepted throughout the **Environmental Impact Study process** and those received by January 9, 2015 will be included in the scoping report to be published in the Federal Register. Comments received after January 9 will be considered as part of and included in the Draft **Environmental Impact Statement,** also to be published in the Federal Register. More information about the project status can be found at dallashoustonhsr.com.

Terry Jeanes moved for a letter to be sent to the FRA and elected officials on behalf of the residents of Garden Oaks expressing our opposition to the use of the BNSF route extending into the dense urban core of the city, with concern over the impact the railway would have on the quality of life for our community, schools, churches, and parks. The motion was seconded.

GARDEN OAKS

Following discussion, Ms Jeanes amended her motion to read: The Garden Oaks Civic Club officers will send a letter to the FRA, with copies to our elected officials, stating that the residents of Garden Oaks oppose the proposed Dallas to Houston High-Speed Rail route following the current BNSF rail line, specifically along the 34th Street corridor, due to the negative impact the route would have on the quality of life for our community, schools, churches, and areas of recreation. The motion was passed as amended.

Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet School: Principal Lindsey Pollock announced that enrollment for the 2015-2016 school year will increase to approximately 800 students, which will require three additional upper elementary and two additional middle school classrooms. Principal Pollock invited all to attend and support the school's annual Pancake Breakfast and Silent Auction on February 7, 2015.

OTHER BUSINESS

Pam Parks was the lucky winner of the raffle drawing.

President Briones announced the next regular meeting scheduled Tuesday, February 3, 2015 with Robert Eckels, President of Texas Central Railway, as the featured speaker.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:40 p.m.

CREATING A CAMPUS CULTURE OF KINDNESS By Lindsey Pollock, Ed.D.,

Principal, Garden Oaks Montessori

Educators all over the country are working diligently to ensure that students are supported in engaging classroom environments. Public demand for accountability has turned our collective attention to results on standardized assessments in the core academic subjects of reading, writing, math, social studies and science. With all this attention on academics, why does the concept of kindness matter?

Researchers around the world are recognizing the vital connection between kindness and a nurturing environment on the learning outcomes in children. It is now accepted that children who feel safe and secure are more motivated to attend school, interact with others in social settings, and attempt more difficult assignments in school. Additionally, they are more resilient and learn from their "mistakes" instead of perceiving them as failures.

Recently, I heard the founder of Ben's Bells speak about kindness at the School Reform Initiative conference in Tucson, Arizona. She started her organization after the unexpected death of her two-year-old son. Ben's Bells is a non-profit organization wherein people across the city of Tucson collaborate to create wind chimes that are hung all over the city and given away free to people who "find" them. This collective effort has been embraced by schools, support groups, and everyday people who want to give back to the community in a positive way. Through her work on the importance of kindness in recovery, her organization's research has found that genuine kindness is more than the traditional perception of warm and fuzzy interactions, and that genuine, purposeful kindness can create structural changes in the brain's chemistry leading to increased mental and physical health. She proposed that kindness is a skill that can be taught through intentional lessons with children and through the everyday interactions we model to our children. Awareness of the importance is essential as she explained our brains have a negativity "bias" based on our biological need for safety. Our reptilian brain (basic instincts such as our need for food and water) interprets negativity as a threat to our safety and security. Therefore, although we might have had the most amazing day, one negative encounter sticks with us and can overshadow the day. Likewise, the idea of "one bad apple" threatens the safety and security of an entire organization.

In order to help our children build resilience to those negative "threats" they encounter, we can help them build a mindset both mentally and physically wherein their focus is on the positive. Intentional and repeated kindness helps shape the physical structure of the brain to enhance mental function past the reptilian and mammalian portions of the brain and move into functioning at the neo-cortex level where reasoning

occurs. By expressing and modeling kindness to our children through firm and consistent interactions, daily acts of thoughtfulness (opening a door for someone carrying a box, picking up dropped keys, throwing a neighbor's paper onto their steps, etc.), volunteering, or simply listening and supporting a person who is having a difficult time, we are modeling healthy, kind interactions for our children. As you extend your purposeful habits of kindness, these reflective questions may help:

- Is my home a place of kindness?
- How do we support one another in our family if someone is struggling with an issue?
- To whom do I turn for support and how do I show them kindness?
- In what ways do I embed kindness in my everyday routines?

21ST ANNUAL GARDEN OAKS MONTESSORI PANCAKE BREAKFAST & SILENT AUCTION FEBRUARY 7

On Saturday, February 7, 2015, volunteer dads and granddads will flip thousands of free pancakes, serve up Katz's hot coffee, and auction off donated merchandise worth thousands of dollars. The Garden Oaks Montessori Annual Pancake Breakfast and Silent Auction (PBSA), is now a 21-year tradition. Having the community come together each year to celebrate with free pancakes, fun activities and fellowship has helped set Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet School (GOMM) apart as an exceptional and diverse learning community.

This year's event theme is based on Eric Carle's beloved children's book *A Very Hungry Caterpillar*. The connection to transformation is a nod toward significant changes on campus resulting from a \$3M grant from the U.S. Department of Education in 2011. The grant paved the way for Garden Oaks Elementary to transition to an all-Montessori Magnet with an emphasis on Environmental Sciences. The student body has increased from 550 students in 2011 to a current enrollment of 710 students ranging from pre-kindergarten to 8th grade.

Orchestrated by the GOMM Parent Teacher Organization (GO PTO) and underwritten by several sponsors (see right), the event helps cover funding gaps now that the grant has expired. Key among the school community's needs are scholarships for the tuition-based pre-kindergarten program, Montessori teacher training, field trips, and student art and enrichment programs.

"The Pancake Breakfast and Silent Auction (PBSA) is an event that demonstrates what a community we truly are. We have volunteers that gleefully run the entire event. There are the dads making and serving breakfast, teachers donating time for service auction items, students preparing classroom projects for the auction, and our GO community businesses giving in-kind donations and sponsoring the school wholeheartedly. The event strikes a great balance between a family-style breakfast and a fundraising event that can position us for a future rich in opportunities for our students. For the event to be a true success we need pancake suppliers, pancake flippers, and pancake eaters," said Barbie Atkinson, PTO president.

Last year's Pancake Breakfast and Silent Auction raised more than \$29,817. This year's event will take place on **Saturday February 7th**, from **8:00-10:30 a.m.** at Garden Oaks Montessori School, 901 Sue Barnett, Houston, Texas 77018.



The surgery and office visit for Fix Felix is free. Limit of 5 cats per household. A current rabies vaccination is required by law. You must show proof of a valid rabies certificate, or you will be required to purchase the vaccine at the time of surgery. HH5 is offering a special discounted rabies vaccine rate of \$5 for the Fix Felix event (includes rabies tag & certificate). Additional "optional" services offered at the time of surgery include: Feline Leukemia vaccine - \$20;

FVRCP - \$15; pain medication (3 day oral regimen - \$8 or injection at the time of surgery (lasts 24 hours) - \$10. For the health and safety of all cats, as well as our staff, each feline must be in a plastic crate/carrier. Due to the large volume of clients, we cannot accept patients in any other type of carrier or confinement. Please plan ahead. If you do not have a plastic carrier you may purchase one at the door for \$10. No towels or blankets in carriers. Feral cats may be brought in an official humane cat trap.

THE CITY OF HOUSTON NOW ACCEPTING POLYSTYRENE FOAM (STYROFOAM) AT THE WESTPARK RECYCLING CENTER & THE ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICE CENTER (ESC) SOUTH

The Solid Waste Management Department accepts polystyrene foam at the Westpark Recycling Center, 5900 Westpark, Houston, TX 77057 and the Environmental Service Center South (ESC), 11500 South Post Oak Road, Houston, TX 77035. The material is condensed at a 40–to-1 ratio which allows for maximized shipping to facilities where further processing may take place. Here are some common questions we anticipate regarding this new service. If you do not find your answer here, please contact 3-1-1 or visit the City of Houston Solid Waste Management website at www.houstonsolidwaste.org.



It is a common misconception that styrofoam belongs in our curbside recycling bins.

What is polystyrene foam?

Polystyrene foam is used in thousands of homes by individuals and businesses around Houston and provides superior performance in packaging and food applications. Also commonly known as Styrofoam, it is widely used to keep electronics and other fragile items safe for transportation.

Will the polystyrene foam be collected curbside?

No. Polystyrene foam will not be collected curbside due to bulkiness.

What kind of polystyrene foam is collected and recycled?

Clean, white block type and polystyrene foam packaging is accepted. Polystyrene foam cups, plates and clamshell containers are also accepted but they must be free of all food residue.

Is polystyrene foam with food waste accepted?

No. Only clean packaging that is free of food contaminants, debris and foreign objects such as tape or plastics is accepted.

Where should I take the polystyrene foam?

The Westpark Recycling Center and the ESC South both accept polystyrene packaging.

What happens to the material after it's processed at Westpark?

Once the polystyrene foam packaging is compacted and densified at the Westpark Recycling Center, a recycling vendor collects the material and brokers it to end market users.

Are businesses able to drop-off polystyrene foam?

No. The Westpark Recycling Center and the ESC will not accept polystyrene foam packaging from businesses.

Am I able to drop off "packing peanuts"?

No. Polystyrene packing peanuts are not accepted at either facility. [Editor's Note: Many retail shipping stores will accept packing peanuts for reuse.]


What kinds of polystyrene foam cannot be recycled?

Polystyrene packaging that has food or chemical particulates on it or has plastic or metal attached to it cannot be used in the recycling process.

What is the market for recycled polystyrene foam?

Almost half of the polystyrene foam packaging recycled is remanufactured into new packaging. Other applications for recycled polystyrene foam packaging include building applications such as siding and deck board, ceiling texture, molding, electronic products, auto products, agricultural products, office supplies, egg cartons, and beanbag filler. Markets for non-foam polystyrene include coat hangers, picture frames, waste baskets, videocassettes, flowerpots, and nursery trays.
