NO HIGH-SPEED RAIL THROUGH GARDEN OAKS

In case you haven't heard by now, it was announced on February 17 by several news sources (e.g. The Leader newspaper and the Dallas Morning News) that the high-speed train will not cut through the middle of Garden Oaks, Independence Heights, Lindale Park, or Oak Forest. Texas Central Railway (TCR) is recommending an alternative route to the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) that runs along Washington Avenue and Hempstead Highway, following the Union Pacific rail line rather than the BNSF rail that runs through our neighborhood.

Here is the full release from TCR:

Texas Central High-Speed Railway (TCR) today informed the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) that it recommends narrowing the consideration of potential high-speed rail corridors between Houston and Dallas to a single preferred corridor known generally as the Utility Corridor. TCR has concluded the Utility Corridor is best suited to satisfy the goals of the project to provide reliable, safe and economically viable high-speed rail service between Dallas and Houston using the N700-I Bullet System technology.

TCR has spent several years identifying potential corridors for high-speed rail service between Dallas and Houston. To that end, TCR expended significant effort looking for solutions to engineering, construction and economic challenges associated with building high-speed rail in or along the existing Freight Corridor, and believes the Utility Corridor to be the superior alternative. Additionally, as TCR examines the various alternative alignments, one of the company's goals is to reduce the project's impact on communities and landowners to the extent practicable by using existing rights of way. TCR will recommend inclusion of an alternative involving the I-10 corridor as a potential approach to downtown Houston and looks forward to working with the City of Houston to evaluate this option.

TCR will now focus on potential alternatives keyed to the Utility Corridor that meet the business, environmental and connectivity priorities of the project and will submit additional information to the FRA for further detailed analysis during subsequent phases of the environmental review process.

GARDEN OAKS CIVIC CLUB MEETING MINUTES

February 3, 2015

Location: Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet School, 901 Sue Barnett

Welcome: President Sheila Briones called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. and welcomed those present. A motion was made and seconded to approve the January 2015 minutes as published in the *Gazette*. The motion passed.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Jerry Butler had copies of the Profit and Loss statement and the Balance Sheet available at the meeting.

President Briones welcomed Houston City Council Member Stephen Costello and representatives from Council Member Cohen's office and the office of Congressman Al Green. On behalf of Council Member Cohen, President Briones announced that the next Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) meeting will take place Wednesday, March 5 at the Metropolitan Multi-Service Center (Gymnasium),1475 W. Gray.



Speaker: President Briones introduced Robert Eckels, President Texas Central Railway. Mr. Eckels' PowerPoint presentation outlined reasons for having a high-speed rail system between Houston and Dallas, showed representations of trains currently in operation in Japan, and displayed maps of the various route options being considered. Mr. Eckels' presentation was followed by a question and answer period. Questions were submitted to GOCC Vice President Chris Lindsay and Government Affairs Committee Chair Mark Klein to screen and present to Mr. Eckels. Some of the guestions asked pertained to the physical size of the completed railway (minimum width of 38 feet, height unknown until plan is complete),

compensation to homeowners for loss of property value, alternative route options, and concerns over safety factors (in response, Mr. Eckels cited the perfect safety record of the Tokyo trains currently in operation). Mr. Eckels remained after the close of the meeting to address individual's questions. Mr. Eckels' PowerPoint presentation is available for viewing on the Garden Oaks website, www.gardenoaks.org.

The meeting adjourned at 8:20 p.m.



Andrew Mireles was our February speaker, with a presentation on tree pruning. He is the owner of My Trees Houston and a Garden Oaks resident.



He initially explained the primary reasons for pruning: health and safety, aesthetics, and, in the case of fruit and nut trees, production. For health and safety reasons, pruning typically involves removing dead, damaged, and diseased wood (the 3 Ds) and some extra thinning as needed to help minimize the potential for wind damage. He explained that in addition to issues noted during an initial "ground-up" inspection, "topdown" problems such as cracked branches that are not visible from below may be noted once up in the tree. Issues related to root zone fertilization, optimal growth and production, timing, construction effects, other stressors, wound compartmentalization, and age effects were also covered.



SPRING INTO SAFETY!

Spring Break is a time for fun and family! As we spend more time together both indoors and outdoors, this is a perfect time to review some basic safety systems and routines to keep your family safe!

At home, check your smoke detectors – are the batteries fresh? Be sure that your children know what to do if the alarm sounds. Have you reviewed your evacuation plan? Practice crawling out and staying low in case of fire and have a place to meet. Do you have a fire extinguisher in the kitchen and have you checked to be sure it is ready for use?

Technology is a wonderful tool when used with caution! Be sure to talk to your children about stranger danger on the internet – never give out personal information including address, phone numbers or photographs to someone you don't know. Remind your children that if people are telling them to keep conversations "secret" that this is a danger sign! Review the browser history on your family's computers and set the parameters for parental controls in order to restrict access to adult sites.

Be sure your children know to walk in groups even in your neighborhood. If they are walking home from a friend's house, a call home to let you know they are on the way is a great strategy.

Have a safety word that your family knows is a signal. This can be used to communicate to you that a child is uncomfortable. For example, when my daughter was a teenager, she could call me on the phone with friends within earshot and let me know there were "alligators in Texas". This was our signal that I should come and pick her up!

Bicycles are great fun! Be sure that your child knows the rules of the road. They should ride with traffic and signal their turns. Helmets are essential and required by city ordinance. While bicyclists may have the right of way, defensive riding is the best safety tip of all! WATCH for cars – they may not see you!

Pools are always a favorite gathering place. Be sure that you know who is monitoring the activity in the pool and that your child knows to NEVER go into a pool alone or without an adult supervising.

Children MUST know how to contact a parent/guardian in case of emergency. Practice phone numbers and addresses with your children so they can contact you! Review 9-1-1 procedures to be sure your child knows what to do if you are not available.

Being prepared is the best strategy to keeping your family safe! Enjoy spring break and your time together!



AIR CONDITIONING TIPS FOR THE SPRING

- Check all wiring and connections
- Check condensing coils

- Check voltage and amperage to all motors with meters
- Check air temperature drop across the evaporator coil
- Check secondary drain pan
- · Lubricate all moving parts
- Check and adjust thermostat
- Check filters

Finally, if your A/C check up takes place in the spring, you'll beat the long waits and higher prices which always come with peak-season summer inspections.





As the Houston City Council Member representing District C, which includes the Garden Oaks neighborhood, I am pleased to submit this letter of support recommending that the results of a recent community survey be utilized in the design of the Garden Oaks and Shepherd Forest Area Drainage and Paving Capital Improvement Project (M-000285).

The Garden Oaks Civic Club performed a survey of its residents in October 2014 to establish the community's preferences regarding the street width and potential inclusion of sidewalks along Alba St. and Golf Dr, which are the main targets of this project. The results were as follows:

- 81% of respondents were in favor of a 23' street width
 - Of respondents that own property directly adjacent to Alba Rd and Golf Dr, 90% were in favor of a 23' street width
- 64% of respondents were opposed to the inclusion of sidewalks

Based on the Garden Oaks Civic Club's formal endorsement for these specifications, I would like to request that, within the project design scope, the street be built no wider than 23' and that sidewalks not be included on this project.

I would also like to thank you and your departmental staff for your ongoing assistance and flexibility with this project. My constituents and I greatly appreciate your openness to hearing and utilizing community input and we look forward to continuing a strong working relationship as this project moves forward.






