GARDEN OAKS CIVIC CLUB MEETING MINUTES

March 3, 2015

Location: Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet School, 901 Sue Barnett

Welcome: Vice-President Chris Lindsay called the meeting to order at 7:06 p.m. and welcomed those in attendance.

A motion was made and seconded to approve the February 2015 minutes as published in the *Gazette*. Copies of the minutes were available at the meeting. The motion passed.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Jerry Butler reported on the Civic Club's current finances and had copies of the Profit and Loss statement and the Balance Sheet available at the meeting. Mr. Butler also explained that Chase Bank had automatically flipped the GOCC account into a high-end business account, resulting in charges for privileges not used by the GOCC. Mr. Butler subsequently moved the account to Wells Fargo Bank.

Speaker: Brenda de Alba introduced Robert "Skip" Richter, Harris County AgriLife Extension Agent, whose presentation topic was "Spring Gardening and the Landscape". Signed copies of Mr. Richter's book, *Texas Month-by-Month Gardening*, were also available for purchase.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Government Affairs Standing

Committee: Mark Klein described the need for financial support to send 22 Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet students to the Montessori Model United Nations Midwestern Conference. He made a motion for the GOCC to donate \$600 toward funding the trip and event in Fort Wayne, Indiana. Brenda de Alba moved to increase the donation to \$4000, the amount still needed to fully fund the trip. The motion was seconded and passed.

Mr. Klein also praised the community for their efforts in voicing concerns over the proposed high-speed rail routes but cautioned everyone to remain vigilant and aware until a final decision is made.

Constable Program: Program Chair Terry Jeanes reported on a change in the patrol schedules of the deputies participating in the Garden Oaks Constable Program. She also mentioned recent actions taken by some of the Constables and urged everyone to keep an eye out for and report any suspicious activity.

Membership: Dian Austin had no report. The winner of the raffle drawing was Sandy Altman, who won a signed copy of *Texas Month-by-Month Gardening* by guest speaker Robert "Skip" Richter.

Garden Oaks Citizens' Patrol:

Committee Chair Carl Waters, Jr. reported on recent crimes in and around the neighborhood. He encouraged participation in the Citizens' Patrol Program to help keep the neighborhood safe.

Gazette: Editor Jenny Espeseth was not in attendance. President Briones announced the submission deadline for the *Gazette* is the 15th of each month.

Garden Oaks Website: Webmaster Joe Muscara had no report.

Beautification: Committee Chair Gary Harmon announced plans to prepare the gardens and parks for spring. The lawns have been fertilized, with the addition of mulch and flowers to follow.

Committee member Pam Parks had no report. A letter from Council Member Ellen Cohen to City of Houston Public Works and Engineering Director Dale Rudick addressing the results of the neighborhood survey on street design will appear in the March 2015 *Gazette*.





smattering of vegetables, all conventionally grown. The second is virtually the same with the exception that all the ingredients are pastureraised and locally sourced, and therein lies the problem. Many chefs within this movement want to cherrypick the best of what we have to offer and leave us with the challenge of finding a market for the rest. Joel Salatin, the father of the "beyond organic" movement, was once approached by a high-profile chef from New York to sell him only the choicest cuts from his pastured cattle. He responded by saying, "do you know how much hamburger that is?", explaining that he would not sell him the best parts, but that

he sold only half or whole sides of beef. Dan Barber embraces this way of thinking and in describing a "third plate", he includes not only nose to tail cooking, but all the other items a farmer/rancher has to raise in order to bring that clean meat to the table. Incidentally, this third plate is a little less meat-centric, and also in line with what Farmer Cathy, the Nawara family, and Blackwood Bounty bring to our market each and every week. I, of course, handle the protein for the meal, chicken from Bryan Farms and sausage from Harrison Hog Farm.

As always, come soon, come often, and maybe I should start a book club.

WE ARE THE WORLD! By Lindsey Pollock, Ed.D., Principal, Garden Oaks Montessori

Students from Garden Oaks Montessori School returned late Sunday night, March 15th, from an adventure of a lifetime, thanks to the generosity of the Garden Oaks Civic Club! Twenty-three 7th and 8th grade students and four adult chaperones left Houston on Thursday March 12th to travel to Fort Wayne, Indiana for the Montessori Model United Nations (MMUN), Midwest Conference. The students had prepared for this event by selling popcorn and pickles throughout the year and working hard on research projects that they would present to other students at the event. Requirements for participation were passing grades, appropriate school behavior, good attendance, and completion of the projects associated with the event.

The MMUN is an annual event that provides students an opportunity to expand their perspectives about the world and realize their potential to change the world. The MMUN's mission statement reads as follows:

Our goal is to inspire youth. MMUN students formulate, present, debate, and revise positions on current issues that are affecting people of the world. By assuming the perspectives of a citizen of their selected countries, MMUN students not only develop an understanding of the needs and rights of others, but also learn [to] respect the cultures, the political views, and the belief systems of others.

Taking on their ambassadorial roles in a Model UN simulation, students research the issue that their UN committees will address. Model UN participants learn how the international community acts on its concerns about topics, including peace and security, human rights, the rights of the child, child labor, the environment, food and hunger, economic development and globalization.

Students from Garden Oaks were assigned to represent Chile, Bolivia, China, Azerbaijan, and Non-Governmental Organizations (NGO). Additionally, students were instructed to focus on the topics of Refugee Children, Universal Primary Education, Climate Change, Situation in Ukraine, and Situation in Syria. Our students prepared poster boards for display to other representatives at the conference, and studied Robert's Rules of Order in preparation for the proceedings.

The conference began with a flag ceremony with students marching into the ballroom carrying flags of their countries. An inspirational keynote speaker and environmental activist, Bremley Lyngdoh, challenged the students to change the course of the world and work

together to develop peaceful, equitable solutions to the problems our world is facing. Students then divided into committee sessions to debate positions and draft resolutions for change. The students' committees were Security Council, Social, Humanitarian and Cultural Affairs Committee (SOCHUM), United Nations Development Program (UNDP), United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), and NGOs, where they worked on solutions based on their background knowledge of the countries they represented.

After two days of committee meetings and debates, the students read the draft resolutions to the general assembly that was gathered in the large ballroom. Countries voted to adopt the resolutions and celebrated the hope these ideas represented. The final draft resolution was produced by the NGO group who created a non-profit organization called Blueprint. This effort was designed by the students to develop chapters of student MMUNs across the country. They asked the students present to take the idea forward and asked for an initial donation of \$100 from the audience which was immediately made and matched by the chairperson of the event. Our Garden Oaks students were ecstatic to watch their ideas become reality!

This year was the first time a public Montessori school had ever participated in the Montessori Model United Nations event. It was also the first time many of our students had left Houston, ridden an airplane, or seen snow! Having the opportunity to work with students from all over the United States gave our students a broader view of the possibilities that lie ahead of them as they prepare for college and career opportunities in the very near future. As one Garden Oaks student stated, "I am so grateful to have this opportunity – the world is real and I am going to be ready to do my part!" 

Mini-Splits: Making Comfort Possible One Room at a Time, Part One

Everyone wants to get the best use out of their home. Maybe you want to convert an unused space in your home or over your garage into an office, mother-in-law suite or hobby room. No matter what you have in mind, mini-splits offer the ideal comfort solution.

The History of Mini-Splits

At the end of World War II, Americans introduced ducted, central air conditioning systems and window units to Japan. These proved unsuitable because of limited interior space and the close proximity of buildings to each other. With Japan's densely populated urban areas, a more compact, noiseless A/C system was required. Additionally, they had to be very efficient since energy costs about 5 times as much there as it does in the United States. Japan's solution was a split-type, ductless system which is quiet, powerful and space conscious. This form of air conditioning provided an energy-efficient way to cool or heat a home one room at a time. In 1954, Mitsubishi Electric began producing air conditioners and in 1968, after extensive engineering and marketing research, it introduced the wall mounted, split-type ductless design known now as Mr. Slim.

No Duct Work Needed

Mini-splits are perfect for spaces where duct work is impossible to install or noisy window units are not practical. The term "ductless" simply means that no duct work is involved. The system is comprised of two units - a lightweight, slim-line outdoor condenser and an indoor air handler. The condenser supplies freon to the air handler through lines which run through a 3" opening in the wall and into the back of the unit. The air handler draws in air from the room through a grill at the top and disperses newly-conditioned air back into the room through the bottom

grill. Some models provide special filters which promote additional humidity control and filtration.







After twenty years of dedication to Boy Scouting, Marc Roberts is retiring from his position as Scout Master of Troop 20, which is sponsored by St. Matthew's United Methodist Church. Marc views serving others as a privilege and wishes to thank everyone for the opportunities afforded him over the past two decades.

Marc's scouting journey started one fall evening in 1994 when his wife, Jane Ann, announced that she had enrolled their oldest son, Chris, in Cub Scouts at St. Rose of Lima, and that she had also signed Marc up as one of the Cub Scout leaders! And so it began – all the pinewood derbies, camping trips, badges, blue and gold banquets. When his second son, Steven, joined cub scouts a couple of years later, Marc expanded his involvement as Assistant Cub Scout Leader to two dens.

When Chris advanced to Boy Scouts and chose Troop 20, Marc went with him. Marc soon became one of Troop 20's Assistant Scout Masters, working alongside Scout Masters Chris Leavitt and John Barrett. In 2005, Marc officially became Scout Master of Troop 20. During his tenure as Scout Master, he has had the privilege of helping 30 boys fly as Eagle Scouts, including his sons, Chris and Steven. Last year, the Skyline District saw 20 young men achieve the rank of Eagle, nine of whom were from Troop 20 alone! This an incredible accomplishment for these boys, as only five percent of those who enter boy scouting go on to become Eagle Scouts.

Under Marc's tutelage and the incredible support of the wonderful assistant leaders and parents, Troop 20 has grown from only 5 boys to its current roster of 40 boys enjoying the experiences of scouting today. Marc has had so many scouting experiences he holds dear to his heart, especially the camping trips.

Marc feels that the camping trips are an integral part or the "sizzle" of scouting. Marc was a Cub Scout himself for only one year in Saudi Arabia where his father worked. His only childhood memory of scouting then was a camping trip in the desert. Today, when his sons and their friends talk about scouting, their conversations, laughter, and excitement revolve around the memories and experiences they all had on their many campouts. Probably the most memorable for Marc is the Cavalcade trip in which he, his sons, and 6 others spent a summer week on horseback in the Fort Davis Mountains in West Texas, camping primitively along the trail.



Over the last 20 years, Marc figures he has attended over 850 meetings and has gone on about 90 camping trips, nine of which were week-long summer camps. He has watched boys become men. He has watched them set goals and achieve them. He has watched them stumble and helped them get up to face a new day and new situations. He has guided so many into helping their community on so many levels. And, as the boys have done, Marc has developed lifelong friendships with the many terrific parents and boys involved in scouting. As his son Chris, who is now 26, once said at an Eagle Scout ceremony, "We may not remember how to tie a certain knot or remember some of the specifics of the badges we earned. The main things you receive from scouting are the memories and lifelong friendships you make while having those experiences." This has definitely been the case between the young men and adults that Marc has had the pleasure of spending time with along this journey.

Troop 20 will continue the fine traditions that Chris Leavitt, John Barrett, and Marc Roberts instilled and passed on to Troop 20's new Scout Master Todd Guerra, who now has the privilege of watching his own sons and others experience the world of scouting.

In passing the torch, Marc would like to say, "Thanks for the memories!"
