The Wine Walk, an annual fundraiser for our Constable Patrol Program, is a winetasting held in the gorgeous backyard of Ed and Brenda de Alba. The theme of this year's event is "Old World Vines", a celebration of European wines. Thirteen generous neighborhood and area business groups will be hosting tables, each pouring a different wine and offering foods as well. It doesn't get much better than having a fun afternoon, sipping wines, visiting with friends and neighbors, strolling through the lush landscaping, and raising money for our Constable program. We all benefit!

Tickets are \$85 each (adults only), and include admission to the event, and a raffle ticket. Additional raffle tickets may be purchased separately for \$10 each. You do not have to attend the Wine Walk to purchase a raffle ticket, but you have to be at least 21 years of age. You do not need to be present to win!


The **Odinets** headed to Alabama to enjoy some beach time with their extended family.

GARDEN OAKS CIVIC CLUB MEETING MINUTES

Location: Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet School, 901 Sue Barnett Drive

Welcome: President Sheila Briones called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. and welcomed those in attendance.

A motion was made and seconded to approve the July 2015 minutes as they appeared in the *Gazette*. Copies of the minutes were available at the meeting. The motion passed.

Announcements: Ms. Briones announced that a mayoral forum, with all seven Houston mayoral candidates attending, will be held at Grace Church Garden Oaks (3754 N. Shepherd) in lieu of a September Civic Club meeting on September 1, 2015. GOCC will be one of the forum's sponsors, along with The Leader newspaper and Super Neighborhood 12. The event will begin at 6:15 p.m. with a candidate meet & greet and the forum will begin at 6:45 p.m.

National Night Out is Tuesday, October 6, 2015. There will be no civic club meeting that evening; instead, neighbors are encouraged to hold block gatherings and socialize with one another. Ms. Briones stressed the importance of neighbors watching out for each other. There will be a registration form to fill out on the GOCC website for those who intend to host block parties to inform Constables and HPD who may stop by.

The 2015 Wine Walk Constable Fundraiser will be held October 17th from 4:00-6:30 p.m. with tickets going on sale September 1st.

Mikayla Canales was in attendance representing Council Member Ellen Cohen's office.



Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Jerry Butler had copies of the Profit and Loss statement and the Balance Sheet available at the meeting.

Speaker: Joe Muscara introduced Salise Shuttlesworth, J.D., Executive Director of Friends for Life, No-Kill Animal Adoption & Rescue Center. Information about Friends for Life will be posted on the GOCC website.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Membership: Committee Chair Dian Austin had no report. The winner of the raffle drawing was Tina Nieto, who won a Lowes gift certificate.

Citizens' Patrol: Committee Chair Carl Waters, Jr. reported on recent crimes in and around the neighborhood. Mr. Waters also encouraged neighbor participation for National Night Out on October 6th and asked neighbors to contact Terry Jeanes or himself if they are planning to host a block party.

Gazette: Editor Jenny Espeseth was not in attendance.

Website: Webmaster Joe Muscara reported that the gardenoaks.org website had recently been cleaned up and reorganized.

Beautification: Committee Chair Joan Harmon reported recent activities centered around keeping the parks watered and making repairs to damaged sprinkler heads. A mowing contract has been added to maintain the property between the Randall Berm and Loop 610 on the west side of Durham.

Constable Program: Program Chair Terry Jeanes was not in attendance.

Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet School: Principal Lindsey Pollock announced announced teachers would be returning to work August 10th and the first day of school is August 24th. She announced that GOMM had reached their student capacity based on the State of Texas classroom size of 22 students per teacher. Overflow students, zoned to GOMM but who were not registered in time, will be sent to Durham Elementary. Dr. Pollock also announced the installation of the shade structure in the Rick Englert Spark Park and thanked GOCC for its contribution to the cost of the shade structure.

OTHER BUSINESS

President Briones reported that, while the GOCC carries liability insurance, GOCC does not currently carry Errors & Omissions (E&O) insurance which would provide liability coverage for GOCC officers and committee chairs. She has received a bid of \$800 from State Farm for \$1,000,000 in E&O insurance. Suzanne Debien made a motion for the GOCC to purchase the E&O insurance from State Farm. Sandy Altman seconded the motion. A vote was taken from attending members and the motion was approved.

Student representatives and leaders from the Waltrip High School Ram Band thanked the GOCC for helping

achieve the monetary goal making it possible for them to represent Houston in the July 4th Parade in Washington, D.C. The students spoke about their experiences and how much the trip meant to the band. A picture montage poster was presented to President Briones.

President Briones circulated a volunteer sign-up sheet for the September 1st mayoral forum.

Pizza was generously provided by Brother's Pizza located at 3820 N. Shepherd in the Garden Oaks Shopping Center.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:15 pm.





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

You, yes you, are cordially invited to join your Garden Oaks neighbors in celebration of the **32nd annual National Night Out** on **Tuesday, October 6, 2015.** Any time or location in the neighborhood is appropriate, although the suggested time is in the 7:00-10:00 p.m. range and most people generally meet outside, somewhere on their block.

How to participate? Volunteer your front yard or driveway as a place for your neighbors to gather. Lock your door and turn on your porch light as you get together outside to catch up with old friends and meet new ones. see something suspicious.

National Night Out is sponsored by the National Association of Town Watch. It was started in 1981 in a Philadelphia suburb when neighbors became tired of increasing criminal activity. The goal of the program is to promote police/community partnerships and neighborhood camaraderie. Nationally 38 million neighbors participate in the program in over 16,000 communities.

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WHY WE NEED THE WINE WALK, A CONSTABLE PROGRAM FUNDRAISER

For seven years now, we have had the Wine Walk to raise monies for the Constable Program. And here's why...

Garden Oaks is fortunate to have three (3) separate Constable Patrol contracts. These Constable patrols give us almost 24/7 coverage, and include all 5 sections of the neighborhood. Constant Constable coverage comes at a cost of about \$77,000 per contract annually.

For a number of years, the Garden Oaks Maintenance Organization (GOMO) has paid for two of the three patrol contracts from their surplus funds. Annually, GOMO members vote on proposed spending of those funds and have voted to fund two of the contracts.

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The third Constable contract is paid for by the residents of Garden Oaks. Unfortunately, **fewer than 25% of our residents** choose to contribute to the Constable supporter program of \$200 annually, so this third resident-supported contract is woefully short of funds. This lack of resident participation is why we have the annual Wine Walk fundraiser to raise money for our Constable program. So there you have it!

You can support the Constable program in several ways. First, become a Constable Program Supporter. The form is in the *Gazette* each and every month. Secondly, buy a ticket to the Wine Walk. Encourage your friends and neighbors to do so as well.

The annual meeting of the Garden Oaks Maintenance Organization (GOMO) will be held at **7:00 p.m.** on **Wednesday, October 21**, at **Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet School** located at **901 Sue Barnett Drive**. All Section 1, 2, 3, and 5 homeowners ("Members") are welcome to attend the business meeting. Election of several Directors and voting on disbursement of surplus funds are on the agenda. If you are interested in serving as a Director, please contact any of the current GOMO Directors listed here in the *Gazette* or on the GOMO web page: <u>GardenOaks.org/gomo</u>.

Director Positions Open

The following Director positions will be filled at the annual meeting; the current term of each will end October 31 and the new term of each will end in October of 2018:

Section 1

Mark Saranie is standing for re-election to the position he currently holds.

Section 2

The position currently held by Gale Gorman is open for election.

Section 3

Dea Larson is standing for re-election to the position she currently holds.

Section 5

The position currently held by David Garver is open for election.

To serve as a Director, a Member must satisfy the following requirements:

- Must be 18 years or older.
- Must own property and live within the Garden Oaks Section corresponding to the position for which the Member is standing for election.
- If no Member residing in the Section stands for election, then a Member who owns property in that Section but lives in another Section may stand for election as a "Non-Section Director" whose term is one year.

GOMO Review Meetings

take place at 6:30 p.m. prior to Civic Club meetings on the first Tuesday and at 7:00 p.m. on the third Wednesday of each month.

Meetings are open to anyone interested in attending.

Property owners in Sections 1, 2, 3 and 5 are all members of GOMO.

Surplus Funds

GOMO traditionally uses surplus funds to support neighborhood projects that are endorsed by a majority vote of its membership. GOMO has surplus funds available for disbursement for the upcoming fiscal year.

GOMO currently supports two Constable Patrols in Garden Oaks as well as maintenance of neighborhood green spaces.

There is a single funding proposal for disbursal of surplus funds:

Proposal 1. To provide funds for continuing coverage by two constable patrols of Garden Oaks, 40 hours per week each, for the period January 1, 2016 until February 28, 2017. These two constable patrols are meant to supplement the current patrol already provided by the Garden Oaks Civic Club and Garden Oaks residents. Garden Oaks Maintenance Organization will pay for the service and the Garden Oaks Civic Club will be in charge of scheduling. Anticipated cost for renewal of the two constable patrols is \$160,000 for the year.

The disbursal proposal and Bylaw Amendments require a majority vote for approval at the October 21 meeting. Proxy ballots are being mailed to homeowners in Sections 1, 2, 3, and 5. The mailing also includes additional information about the Garden Oaks Maintenance Organization and its activities.

Legal Changes Prompt Adoption of New Policies

During its 2011, 2013, and 2015 sessions, the Texas Legislature made a number of changes to Homeowners Association (HOA) law. These changes have prompted the adoption of four new GOMO policies: Payment Plan (for unpaid Transfer Fees), Document Retention, Document Production & Copying, and Rainwater Recovery Systems.

An Open Invitation to Our Meetings

All GOMO Members are invited to attend our meetings. Democracy works best in an open environment – and that is as true at the neighborhood level as it is at the federal and state levels. There is no better way for the people of our community to see for themselves how we evaluate the building plans brought to us and how we reach consensus. GOMO is currently working to add more information to our website and building capability for email communication with members.

Attending a GOMO meeting is also the best way to get your questions answered. The GOMO Board is made up of 12 people and the Board doesn't have an "opinion" about a topic unless a majority of a quorum forms a consensus view. So, no one Board Member is able to tell you what GOMO "thinks" about an issue or idea until we have an opportunity to deliberate and form a collective opinion. The formation of GOMO policy and opinion takes place at 7:00 p.m. every third Wednesday of the month at our business meeting held at the GOMO Office located in the Garden Oaks Professional Building at 4001 N. Shepherd, Suite 216. You are very welcome to attend, make suggestions, propose ideas, ask questions, clarify rumors, or simply observe the process.

AIR CONDITIONING TIPS FOR THE FALL

From AFUE to Ton: Understanding **Basic Air Conditioning Terminology**

When it comes to purchasing an HVAC (heating, ventilation, and air conditioning) system, cost is one of the biggest concerns. Finding the right A/C system can be a bit intimidating with the industry jargon, acronyms and numerous rating systems. Fortunately, knowing what it all means will help you get the most for your money. For most rating systems, keep in mind that the higher the number, the higher the energy efficiency and the higher the lifespan of the system.

AFUE (Annual Fuel Utilization Efficiency) - AFUE is a measure of a gas furnace's efficiency in converting fuel to energy. The higher the AFUE, the greater is the furnace's energy efficiency. If your system is more than 15 years old, an AFUE rating may not be available. You can obtain it by

finding the furnace's serial number and contacting the manufacturer.

BTU (British Thermal Unit) - BTU represents the amount of heat that is required to raise or lower the temperature of one pound of water by one degree Fahrenheit. Most air conditioners are measured using BTUs. For example, 12,000 BTUs equals one ton, 24,000 BTUs equal two tons, etc.

SEER (Seasonal Energy Efficiency Ratio) - SEER is calculated by dividing the amount of cooling supplied by an A/C system with the electricity consumed by the system under specific seasonal conditions.

SEER ratings are determined in a laboratory where specific indoor and outdoor conditions are determined by the U.S. Department of Energy. Because A/C systems are evaluated using the identical conditions, they can be compared to each other using the SEER rating. The higher the number, the better the efficiency. According to American Standard, one of the leading A/C manufacturers in the U.S., 14 SEER is the lowest rating while 20 SEER is the highest rating.

Higher SEER ratings are usually achieved by manufacturers using the latest technology in their equipment. That, in turn, can influence the cost of the equipment. You may pay more for the latest and greatest, but you'll get increased efficiency and therefore lowered electricity bills in return.

Most A/C systems installed prior to 2006 have a 10 SEER rating or less. Installing a new 14 SEER system with its superior technology can save you 28% on your electricity bill, a 15 SEER can save you 38% and a 16 SEER can save you 47%. Finally, a 20 SEER system can save you a whopping

Ton - A unit of measurement used for determining cooling capacity. One ton is the equivalent of 12,000 BTUs per hour. A 2,000 square-foot house typically requires a five-ton system.

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SCHOOL BUDGETS 101

Most of us pay our property taxes knowing that a portion of our money goes to support our local school district. But few people know that the amount of money a school receives is based on the attendance of the children who are registered at each campus. Let's take a look at how school budgets work and the impact on our neighborhood school, Garden Oaks Montessori.

School budgets run from July 1st to June 30th each year. Principals start planning with their staff and community based on a projection of the number of students they will have enroll on their campus. This projection is based on the capacity of the school and the trends over time that the principal has identified for enrollment, such as the number of people moving into a neighborhood and/or the number of magnet applications for the school. These projections are developed with HISD budgeting each spring to determine how many teachers to hire and to plan for materials needed the next school year. In the case of magnet schools, principals must project the number of spaces to reserve for incoming zoned students based on the number of children enrolled in past years.

When reviewing a school budget, there are three budget revenue sources. The first is local property taxes which comprise 72.6% of the budget. Schools don't receive any funding from sales taxes – homeowners and business owners pay property taxes to support our schools. Secondly, the Texas Education Agency oversees the distribution of tax dollars that are distributed to schools or about 23.4% of HISD's overall budget. Finally,

grants and donations to the district make up the final 4% of the total school budget.

How is the money distributed to the school? In Houston ISD, budgets are decentralized, meaning the principal and the members of the school community decide the spending priorities for each campus. At Garden Oaks Montessori, our emphasis is placed on ensuring that our program is delivering an authentic public Montessori education which includes a part-time teaching assistant in every classroom along with materials and professional development specific to the program design. Additionally, our focus on Environmental Sciences drives our spending as we consider educational experiences and curricula to support our learning goals.

In Houston ISD, the overall 2015-16 budget per student is broken down into six categories – 1. Debt service (\$1,326), 2. District operations (\$1,932), 3. Central Administration (\$174), 4. Instructional Support (\$1,076), 5. Instruction (\$5,088), and 6. Other Functions (\$615) for a total of \$10,211 annually.

Why is this projected budget process important? Because school budgets are based on the number of children enrolled at a school and the percentage of days that students attend school. Principals are responsible for managing approximately \$4,000 per student at the campus level. The exact amount is based on the student attendance for the school from the year before. In the case of Garden Oaks, we are entering the 2015-16 school year with a loss of \$65,000 based on last year's student attendance. Each day a child attends school, it is a credit to the school of about \$25. When a child misses school, that money is deducted from the budget for the next school year. Of course no one

expects a child with a fever to come to school, but when there is a choice of whether or not to attend school, the obvious choice is to COME TO SCHOOL!

There are many levels to school funding. The overview provided here covers an explanation of the basic allotment that is provided to the school which varies slightly year-toyear. Remember that property taxes are the driver for revenues collected each year. This basic allotment is fully allocated starting at the kindergarten level, while only half of the basic allotment is allocated for 4 year old pre-kindergarten students and no allotment is provided for 3 year olds. This is a major consideration for public Montessori campuses where the formal curriculum begins at 3 years old in Children's House classes! In order to fund this program, some tuition is charged for students who don't qualify for the subsidized PK program. The tuition is based on the rate of the basic allotment from the state which is \$4,770 this year not the full cost of educating each student as outlined in the budget breakdown.

Where does that lead us when planning for our school operations? Number one, we must focus on ensuring that all children who are healthy attend school every day! Of course, the emphasis here is that children who miss school, even a part of the day, are missing valuable instruction and the opportunity to benefit from the Montessori environment that is unique to Garden Oaks. Additionally, attendance supports our school operations as we plan for educational opportunities and staffing on the campus. Secondly, our parent-teacher organization or PTO is actively pursuing fundraising through grants and donations to ensure that our schoolchildren

Parents will need to accept or decline their spots by April 8.

**Garden Oaks Montessori encourages parents of zoned K-5 grade students who wish to enroll for the 2016-2017 school year to complete the online application. This will give us an idea of how many spots we have for our lottery for each grade level.

All Pre-K students are entered into the lottery.

All 6th-8th grade students are entered into the lottery and must have current Montessori experience.

continue to benefit from educational extensions and enrichment activities. such as resident artists who provide our children opportunities, Writers in the Schools, Houston Boys' Choir and other performing and visual artists who facilitate clubs on campus during the school day. This fundraising serves to fill any funding gap that may arise and helps to ensure that authentic public Montessori education flourishes in our neighborhood! This is a unique opportunity for our children as there are only about 400 public Montessori schools in the United States. The majority of Montessori schools are private with an average annual tuition rate of \$14,000/student. You can see why the exceptionality of

our program has resulted in nearly 1,000 applications this year for only 70 spaces!

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FIND FOCUS...FAST!

Pop quiz!

What is the ONE thing that everyone on the planet struggles with from time to time?

Answer: Focus

It will never cease to amaze me that despite my best intentions, there were (and sometimes still are) moments, days, even weeks when I simply cannot get or stay focused.

In these moments I remember my loyal, old friend, The Pomodoro Technique®, a time management strategy developed by Francesco Cirillo that relies on a short burst of hyper-focus on a single activity.

Getting started is easy. All you need is a timer and a task or a series of tasks that you've been putting off. Next remove all distractions and give your SIT (superimportant task) the attention it deserves. Turn off all ringers, dingers, and buzzers. Go to the bathroom and get a sip of water. Once the timer starts its time to get to work.

Set your timer for 25 minutes and go! That's right, sit with your SIT. You can do this. It's only 25 minutes.

After the timer dings, stop working, put a check mark next to your completed task and throw a tiny celebration during your well-deserved, five-minute break. You have successfully finished your first Pomodoro®.

Still have more SITs to do? Set the timer and start again. After a series of 4 Pomodoros®, indulge in a longer thirtyminute break.

The Pomodoro Technique® is a fantastic way to train your brain and increase your attention span. Check out

Here's to getting stuff done!

Parenting Tip: This method works wonders for toddlers, kids, tweens, and teens! When implementing this strategy with younger kiddos you may want to start with 5 or 10 minutes andwork up to 25.



We at Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet (GOMM) believe that great schools and great neighborhoods go hand in hand. In the 75 years since our founding, we have worked to be an integral part of the Garden Oaks community and to develop outstanding high school and college-ready students. To help achieve this goal we started a Montessori school-within-aschool in 1994 that has grown steadily until, today, it is one of only two all-Montessori public elementary schools in HISD. Your support has been essential to our success.

GOMM delivers private school-quality education in a public school setting through adherence to an authentic Montessori educational system. Our school enables students to learn in a hands-on environment that emphasizes learning by doing rather than by rote memorization; a method that is effective in helping students of all learning styles achieve their potential. Additionally, GOMM offers its students a variety of important ancillary and after-school programs. The end result is a well-rounded student who is prepared for the challenges of high school and college.

The benefits of an authentic Montessori education are many and our school's rankings, growth, and popularity are evidence of our success - but that success has an associated cost. Although the administrators do well at keeping our operating costs near the lowest in the district, to run GOMM at the level our students deserve results in a \$400,000 gap between the local, state and federal funding received and the expenditures necessary to run the school. This gap comes from such things as Montessori training for our teachers, quality afterschool programs, educational fieldtrips, ancillary in-school programs such as Model UN, Urban Harvest or Writers in the Schools, or due to funding lost through HISD's student absence policy.

The Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet Parent Teacher Organization, a registered 501(c)3 non-profit organization, assists the school by raising funds through our annual <u>Stuff the Bus</u> campaign that help offset the gap between our funding and our expenditures. Our goal for this year's campaign is \$25,000, and if we reach our objective, a benefactor has generously offered to match the donations up to this level. By the Numbers

\$400,000 The annual funding gap between resources provided by local, state, and federal agencies and the actual cost to run Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet, an authentic Montessori public school program.

\$10,000 The annual cost per child for the Pre-Kindergarten Age 3 (Pre-K3) educational program at Garden Oaks, none of which is covered by local, state, or federal funding. Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet covers tuition costs for approximately 25 students each year who cannot afford it as well as a dozen more in Pre-K4.

\$8,000 The average cost for a teacher to earn a Montessori Certification (in addition to their Texas public school certification). Our school provides a few grants to cover this cost each year, but it is typically borne by the teachers themselves.

900 Families applied for 70 open enrollment slots in 2015, an indication of the high demand for authentic Montessori instruction in our public schools, and the success of this program.

100 Percent of our teachers are TEA and Gifted and Talented certified. Nearly all of them are Montessori certified or in the process of obtaining their certification. Seventy-five

percent of our teachers are certified as English as a Second Language (ESL) educators. Four of our teachers have their Masters degree, and two have earned Doctorate degrees.

53 Percent of our students are classified as low-income for the purpose of child nutrition assistance.

8th Grade classes were added in 2014 making our school one of only two Pre-K – 8 Montessori programs in HISD, and one of only four in HISD to offer Pre-K3 and Pre-K4 classes.

5 Of the most prestigious high schools in Houston (HSPVA, Carnegie Vanguard, East Early College High School, and the DeBakey High School for Health Professions) have enrolled our graduates.

4 New classrooms were added in 2015 to accommodate students already in the school (not new students) at a cost of \$23,000 each.
