This "Century-Built" Home is one of four designed in Houston, with its name indicating how long concrete-block homes were expected to last. Designed by Houston architect Allen R. Williams, Jr. in 1942, this home is one of three still remaining. Its walls are made of hollow, lightweight concrete tiles, the slabs have grade beams and piers, the windows are metal, and the roofs are concrete panels insulated with fiberglass boards. Renovated in 2013 with homage to the original design, this mid-century home has a modern kitchen with state-of-the-art appliances and modern bathrooms filled with luxurious spa amenities.

737 Sue Barnett - Abigail's Garden

Abigail's Garden is a residential garden that became more personal when the homeowner began butterfly gardening in remembrance of her lost twin daughter, Abigail. The owner's background in wildlife and environmental sciences quickly led the butterfly garden to expand to wildscape gardening for all wildlife, with native and well-adapted plants. By providing year-round, adequate and varied food, water, shelter and space, *Abigail's Garden* attracts and supports an abundance of urban wildlife, all on a 1/3-acre lot. *Abigail's Garden* has been through a major overhaul this past winter to better provide for the wildlife, and allows visitors to see that a wildscape garden can be thoughtfully designed, planted and maintained in a residential setting.

Location: Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet School (GOMM), 901 Sue Barnett

GOMM Bond Renovation:

GOMM Principal Dr. Lindsey Pollock introduced District I Trustee Anna Eastman of the Houston Independent School District (HISD) Board of Education, Senior Project Manager Spencer Wingate of Rice & Gardner Consultants, Architect Sam Swart of Hill Swart Chu Architects, and construction firm Balfour Beatty/ B3Ci's Project Manager to present the design and discuss the construction process and timeline with community stakeholders from 7:00-7:45 p.m.

Welcome: Following the school renovation presentation, President Sheila Briones called the business portion of the civic club meeting to order at 7:56 p.m. and introduced the 2016 Secretary, Luke Sustr.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Jerry Butler was not present at the meeting; however, hard copies of the Profit and Loss statement and the Balance Sheet were available to attendees.

A motion was made and seconded to approve the January 2016 minutes as published in the *Gazette*, and the vote passed by a majority of civic club members present.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Membership: No report.

Garden Oaks Citizens' Patrol: No report.

Gazette: The February issue of the *Gazette* is available online at gardenoaks.org. Hard copies will be delivered to Section Delivery Coordinators on February 3, 2016 for home delivery. No further report.

Garden Oaks Website: Webmaster Joe Muscara had no report.

Beautification: No report.

Home Tour: Brenda de Alba reported \$19,000 in sponsorships to date. The Home Tour is scheduled for Sunday, April 24, 2016.

Constable Program: Program Chair Terry Jeanes introduced Garden **Oaks Patrol Deputy Corey Greer** who discussed a recent burglary in 3100 block of Lawrence Street in Section 1. Two suspects wearing ski masks kicked in the back door of the home and stole several items. The surrounding streets were blocked off and the suspects were later taken into custody. Officers were able to recover stolen items. Firearms were recovered the following day in a yard two blocks away from where the offense occurred. Officers are currently working to determine if the firearms belonged to the suspects.



Deputy Greer also reported that a postal worker was held up at gunpoint at the Garden Oaks Post Office on January 28 at approximately 11:30 a.m. with video evidence of the incident. The suspect has been identified and a reward offered by the U.S. Postal Service for information leading to his arrest. *[Editor's note: The suspect was arrested on Friday, February 5. See Citizens' Patrol Program Update on page 10 for more information.]*

Ad Hoc In-Line Storm Water Detention Project Committee:

Committee member Mark Klein reported that construction of the Garden Oaks/Shepherd Park Plaza storm water project along Alba Road will begin in Garden Oaks this year. There are three phases to this project; phase three designs for Sue Barnett have not begun. Civic Club members asked if there would be sidewalks constructed on Sue Barnett around the school. Mr. Klein responded that because Sue Barnett serves a school that sidewalks should become part of the project. He reiterated that the City wants sidewalks for all of its street rebuild projects, but that the Garden Oaks community voted not to have sidewalks along Alba and Golf.

Government Affairs Standing

Committee: Committee Chair Mark Klein reported that the City of Houston is rapidly repairing street potholes and urges all residents to download the city's 3-1-1 application to our smartphones in order to send snapshot reports of potholes we encounter. The city has committed to rectifying reported potholes within 48 hours of being reported. Mr. Klein also reported that the city is considering a "texting while driving" ordinance.

OTHER BUSINESS

President Briones announced the next regular meeting scheduled Tuesday, March 1, 2016 with Suzanne Debien, President and CEO of Central City Air, as the featured speaker.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:10 p.m. with 31 members in attendance.

GOMO funded two shifts of the Constable Program for the month at a cost of \$12,794.

An election for a Section 5 director is scheduled for the April 20, 2016 business meeting at 7:00 p.m. The director's term will run through October 31, 2018. Members wishing to stand for this position should contact any of the GOMO directors listed in the *Gazette* or on the GOMO web page.

The requirements for the position are:

- Must be 18 years or older.
- Must own property and live within Garden Oaks Section 5.
 If no Member residing in the section stands for election, then a Member who owns property in that section but lives in another section may stand for election as a "non-section director" whose term is one year.
- Must sign a statement attesting to meeting the requirements above.

The GOMO website has been updated this month to include:

- Quarterly fiscal year financials (Balance Sheet and P&L)
- Guidelines regarding appraised values and calculating the transfer fee
- A request form where members can ask questions and request a time to address the Board

Garden Oaks is a deed-restricted community of 1400 homes. The Garden Oaks Maintenance Organization is entrusted by homeowners and property owners (members) of Sections 1, 2, 3 and 5 to ensure compliance with deed restrictions. The directors of GOMO are member-elected volunteers.

GOMO news, director and office contact information, and meeting times and locations are published monthly in the Garden Oaks *Gazette*, delivered by volunteers to all homes in Garden Oaks.



CITIZENS' PATROL UPDATE

From the United States Attorney's Office, Southern District of Texas:

Houston Man Charged in Garden Oaks Post Office Robbery

A 40-year-old man has been arrested following the filing of a criminal complaint alleging he robbed a post office and brandished a firearm during a crime of violence, according to U.S. Attorney Kenneth Magidson.

Joe Robert Martinez, of Houston, was taken into custody Friday, [February 5] and expected to make his initial appearance before U.S. Magistrate Judge Nancy Johnson [on Monday, February 8].

Martinez is charged with robbing the post office in Garden Oaks, located at 3816 North Shepherd in Houston on Jan. 28, 2016. The criminal complaint alleges he entered the post office and inquired about tracking a package. He then exited the building, but soon returned with a gun and allegedly

demanded the clerk open the cash drawer and give him money. He ordered her to her knees, then he left with the currency, according to the allegations.

If convicted, he faces up to 25 years in prison for the robbery in addition to mandatory minimum of seven years for the firearms charge.

The charges are the result of an investigation conducted by the U.S. Postal Inspection Service in cooperation with the Houston Police Department. Assistant U.S. Attorneys Joe Porto and Heather Winter are prosecuting the case.

AIR CONDITIONING TIPS FOR THE SPRING By Mitch Weigand

The 50% Rule Regarding A/C Replacement Plus American Standard Ranks #1

While enjoying the wonderful springtime weather, we can almost forget we live in Houston. Yeah almost. No one is thinking about their A/C system because who needs it now? However, it's virtually impossible to ignore in summer when indoor temperatures hover around 90 degrees with 90% humidity because your system isn't working. What do you do?

Fixing a decade-old A/C system is like putting a new \$3,500 transmission into a 10-year-old car that has over 400,000 miles on it. Yes, you now have a car that works but it is still 10 years old with over 400,000 miles on the odometer. It's just not worth it.

New equipment equals improved efficiency

An A/C system that's approaching the end of its life expectancy will be much less energy efficient than today's new equipment. Typically, a 10-year-old system will have an 6-10 SEER*. Compare that to a new system whose SEER can be as high as 20.

Also, keep in mind the savings on your monthly energy bills. Consider the energy consumption of your old unit versus a new one and the potential savings over its lifetime. If your old A/C system has a 10 SEER, a brand-new system with a 15 SEER can save you 47% every month in energy bills. It's time to get it replaced.

American Standard ranks #1

In the February 2016 special edition issue of Consumer Reports which focuses on home improvement, American Standard (my favorite brand and the only one I install) ranks #1. The consumer advocacy organization based this ranking on an extensive customer survey which showed American Standard needed the fewest repairs overall. This impressive ranking applies to the company's residential air conditioning systems, heat pumps and furnaces.

*SEER: Stands for Seasonal Energy Efficiency Ratio. A rating that denotes the efficiency of air conditioning equipment. It is the amount of cooling your equipment delivers for every dollar spent on electricity. The higher the SEER, the more efficient the unit and the lower the operating cost.



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
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HABITAT GARDENING TIPS By Kim Ellis

Well, Punxsutawney Phil says that spring will come early this year, and weather gurus say that our last frost in Houston should have been back in mid-February, so everyone should be getting excited about getting out in the garden. One of my favorite parts of early spring is finding the dormant plants that are popping up in the garden. March is that transitional month where we play the game of too cold and just right for throwing out seeds, transplanting, fertilizing and watering. March is also the start of WEEDING season, so start doing your stretches.

Any of the rainy, chilly rodeo weather days can be spent finishing up planning your garden layout and visiting your local garden centers to see what's coming in from the growers. When planning, think about the plants you want to put in the same areas, and make sure they have the same water and sun requirements. It's helpful to keep a garden journal, reminding you of what plants did good and where. If you feel that Phil might have gotten it wrong, spend the first part of the month prepping your beds for seeds and transplants, with a nice layer of organic compost around the yard and in beds to feed your new garden additions as well as your established plants. It's also a great time to have your sprinkler system audited, and to switch your flower bed zones to drip irrigation.

In the garden, your fall planted annuals will really start to put on a show. If you need an instant pop of color in the garden to welcome spring, buy some snapdragons, violets or dianthus to get you through early May when the perennials will take the lead. Deadheading the spent flowers will help them look prim and proper. You can continue dividing and transplanting established ornamental grasses, fall blooming bulbs, perennials, shrubs and trees, but finish up quickly to eliminate the need for more pampering if done after the heat picks up. Most bare root roses should be in the garden by now, but if you still have one to plant, get it in ASAP. You'll need to prune all established roses as soon as possible, as late pruning equals late blooming. If you're feeling lucky, direct seed warm season perennials, veggies, and herbs, but cover if temps fall into the mid 30s or below. March is the last ideal month to plant a new tree, before temperatures rise. You can also plant vines, groundcover, ornamental grasses, and herbs. It looks great to mix your vegetables and herbs into your garden beds. Established shrubs, perennials and herbs can be pruned to encourage fuller growth unless frost damage has occurred, and then wait for new growth to show before trimming. For lawns you can lay sod, but don't seed until April. Mulching will help prevent weed seeds from germinating, but you may need to pull the weeds if they are in your lawn.

With temperatures still being mild, you should only need to water newly transplanted plants, seedlings or plants showing stress from low water.

For the wildlife, it is still most important to provide a safe and clean water source. Herbs are a great way to attract many of the swallowtail butterflies. Bronze fennel, dill, parsley and carrot tops are host plants for the swallowtails, where you can watch the entire life cycle from egg to emerged butterfly.

Sustainable Gardening Tips for March

- start a compost pile in your yard with fallen leaves, newspaper and scrap veggies from your kitchen
- use that compost as a natural fertilizer to amend your soils
- mulch your beds for weed control and better water retention
- learn about native and well adapted plants in our area, and strive to replace an exotic/ invasive plant in your yard with their native alternative
- clean bird feeders and water sources often



Plant of the Month: Texas Bluebonnet (*Lupinus texensis*)

This Texas lupine has light-green, velvety, leaves, usually with five leaflets. They can grow up to about 2' and are topped with clusters of up to 50 fragrant, blue, pea-like flowers. The tip of the cluster is conspicuously white. They require low water and full sun. There are six Lupinus species which are the official state flower of Texas.

It is used by bees, and is the larval host plant for the Hairstreak butterfly and Elfin butterfly.

The best time to throw bluebonnet seeds out in the garden is in early winter, but many growers and nurseries are now carrying bluebonnets that we can put directly into our yards as 4" plants. Look for them at your local neighborhood nursery. If you leave these plants in your garden beds, the seeds will drop and more bluebonnets will grow next spring for you. You can also find seeds for white, pink, and Aggie Maroon bluebonnets.


on the fly. From the feedback I've received so far, it appears everyone thoroughly enjoyed the evening.

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TOAD ABODES

(Information compiled from internet sources)

Unfortunately, toads often receive a bad rap. They are frequently considered ugly and avoided due to the myth that toads can transmit warts.

There are many species of toads that live across the world in almost every habitat imaginable, devouring insects like plump, bottomless pits. A toad's diet is comprised of animals considered by many to be pests, such as slugs, mosquitoes, roaches, ants, etc. One adult toad can eat as many as 10,000 insect pests during the summer months. Even the tadpoles that develop from eggs laid by female toads in water feed on countless mosquito larvae.

You can entice these "round-the-clock" insect terminators to work in your backyard by making a toad abode. They are easy to build and a fun project to do with children. Half-bury a large flowerpot on its side in a shady spot or, take the same pot, drill holes at the rim in the shape of a door, tap gently with a hammer to remove the chip, invert, and decorate to your heart's content (nontoxic paints, please). Another option is to arrange flat rocks with a toad-sized space underneath.

The best location for your toad abode is an area of damp dirt usually covered by shade during the day. Areas that are frequently watered by sprinklers, near gutter downspouts, or dripping drains on air conditioning units will work great. The moisture and shade will create a nice environment for your new neighbor, and the toad will use the dirt to customize its own bed.

After you have placed the toad abode in your yard, with a little extra care, you can transform your abode into a castle fit for a king. The first step is adding leaf litter to the inside of the abode. This will give the toad something to hide under when temperatures become too hot during the day. Next, take a shallow saucer (at least 6 inches across and 2 inches deep) with gently sloping sides, push it firmly into the dirt until the sides of the saucer are covered, and fill it with water. Now your toad abode has its very own wading pool! This will be a fine place for your abode's future resident to soak. Just be sure to keep the bowl clean, and filled with water during the spring, summer, and fall.

Now that you have placed the toad abode in your yard, try not to move it too much. You may spook any toads interested in making the abode their home. You will also want to avoid toxic chemicals that are occasionally





sprayed on lawns. Toads, like all other amphibians, have very porous skin, and such chemicals can cause harm. If you are fortunate enough to have one of these little insect-eaters make your toad abode its own, your time spent outdoors will be more enjoyable, with fewer pesky insects and the relaxing and amusing sounds of your amphibian friend!

- It reduces joint pain and inflammation due to the chondroitin sulphates, glucosamine, and other compounds extracted from the boiled-down cartilage.
- It promotes strong, healthy bones: bone broth contains high amounts of calcium, magnesium, and other nutrients that play an important role in healthy bone formation.
- Bone broth promotes healthy hair and nail growth, thanks to the gelatin in the broth.
- Making your own bone broth is very cost effective and easy, as you can make use of leftover carcass bones that would otherwise be thrown away.

Medical scientists have long known that your overall health is dependent on the health of your intestinal tract. Many of our modern diseases are rooted in an unbalanced mix of microorganisms in your digestive system, courtesy of an inappropriate and unbalanced diet that is too high in sugars and too low in healthful fats and beneficial bacteria. Broth plays an important role in healing as it is easily digestible, helps heal the lining of your gut, and contains valuable nutrients. Abnormalities within the immune system are common when a person's diet is not healthy and such immune abnormalities can then allow for the development of virtually any degenerative disease.

Making Your Own Broth:

It is very quick and easy to make your own bone broth at home. It needs to be homemade or come from a health food store or restaurant that makes its own bone broth. Prepackaged broth is not the same and does not hold any of the above-mentioned health benefits.

There are a couple of ways that you can make your broth depending on how much time you have to put into it.

Bare Bones Fast Recipe:

- 12 chicken breast bones, 1-2 whole chicken carcasses, or 2 pounds of beef bones (make sure all bones are from grass-fed or pasture-raised animals)
- 1 gallon of pure water
- 1 inch of raw ginger root
- 2 tablespoons raw apple cider vinegar

Place all ingredients in a crock pot or stock pot and cook on high for 12 hours, low for 6-12 hours. The longer it cooks the more nutrients are extracted. Let it cool and remove all of the bones. Strain the broth through a cheese cloth and store the liquid in the fridge or freezer. This will make about 3 quarts. I put it in mason jars and put 2 in the fridge and one in the freezer. Use at least 1 cup a day in cooking or just warm to drink.
