Despite rainy skies, hundreds of people, with their umbrellas and wearing smiles, visited the narrow streets of Garden Oaks riding trolleys and shuttle buses, in cars, on bicycles, and on foot to tour six wonderful homes and three unique gardens in the starring roles for the Tour. It was the supporting actors who may have stolen the show, as dozens of volunteers became neighborhood ambassadors, greeting visitors enthusiastically and causing many to proclaim newfound love for Garden Oaks.

The rainy afternoon definitely affected our overall attendance and ticket sales; however, over \$36,000 profit was still raised from generous sponsor support, a successful auction during Saturday's VIP Preview Party gala, and through tour ticket sales to support the Garden Oaks Civic Club (\$23,000) and Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet Middle School (\$13,200).

Over 140 volunteers came together – many working for almost a year to make the tour one that numerous visitors called their favorite and the best-run home tour they'd been to recently. Tour volunteers worked the home and garden tour locations; rode the trolleys as docents; ran the Command Center; put up posters all over town; organized ticket pre-sale locations; hung banners and dug in signs; hauled tables, chairs and sponsor signs to each location;

managed the VIP Preview Party at Whitney Oaks Hall; collected a bevy of auction items and ran the auction; obtained magnificent, donated floral arrangements for each home; brought water to every location; pitched the story to local media; wrote copy and designed printed materials; spread the word in social media and on GardenOaks. org; recruited volunteers; published articles in the Gazette; and got sponsors on board. No question about it: the volunteers for our home and garden tour were a dedicated, resourceful, and remarkable lot. Lastly, a big thank-you to Joan and Gary Harmon for their hard work and efforts to have the neighborhood parks and common areas looking wonderful by tour time.

The featured home and garden owners were an amazing group. By opening their homes and gardens – and a part of their lives – to everyone, they helped make 2016 a special tour. It's no easy commitment to be on a home tour. The home and garden owners spent weeks meticulously preparing their homes and gardens as shining stars for hundreds of visitors to admire.

Sponsor support was incredible this year as area businesses invested back into the community they serve to make this fundraising effort possible. The Garden Oaks neighbors who support and champion our sponsors are encouraging future donations.

GARDEN OAKS CIVIC CLUB MEETING MINUTES

Location: Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet School (GOMM), 901 Sue Barnett

Welcome: President Sheila Briones called the meeting to order at 7:05 p.m. and welcomed those in attendance. A motion was made and seconded to approve the April 2016 minutes as published in the *Gazette*. A hard copy of the April minutes was available at the meeting. President Briones also reported on behalf of the Committee Chairs for the Membership and the Home and Garden Tour Committees; see committee reports below.

Guest Speaker: Government
Affairs Committee Chair Mark Klein
introduced Amanda K. Edwards, who
serves as the Houston City Council
Member in the At-Large Position
4. Ms. Edwards currently serves as
Vice Chair of the Budget and Fiscal
Affairs Committee and also serves
on the Economic Development and
Transportation, Technology and
Infrastructure Committees. She is a
native Houstonian with a passion for
public service.

Amanda spoke about her role on the Houston City Council and her involvement in several committees. Amanda highlighted the current City of Houston (CoH) \$160 million budget shortfall and that a strategic plan to rectify the shortfall has been developed with a forecasted approval of May 2016. She stated the city is doing its best to avoid layoffs, with a focus of improving the CoH credit rating. Amanda also discussed the importance of economic development to attract people and businesses into the city limits and

of having a cohesive transportation system. She also mentioned that Mayor Turner will be appointing a czar to manage the city's drainage issues and help allocate appropriate drainage funding. Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Jerry Butler provided copies of the Profit and Loss statement and the Balance Sheet for attendees. Actual Home Tour revenues will be reported in June; however, the preliminary net revenue to the GOCC was reported at \$24K.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Membership: President Briones stated the current lists of paid civic club members and constable program contributors are available on the website at gardenoaks.org/GOCivicClub/civicclub-member.html.

Home and Garden Tour: President Briones reported a total of 350 to 380 people toured the homes and gardens during the VIP Tour Saturday evening, April 23 and during event day on Sunday, April 24th. The VIP Dinner & Auction, "Mi Casa Es Su Casa" held April 23, raised \$13K from the auction and had about 200 attendees. All proceeds benefited GOMM. The VIP Dinner & Auction was a success thanks to the many volunteers from GOMM who coordinated, operated, and managed the auction.

President Briones thanked the home and garden owners for opening up their properties for the tour, all the many volunteers, Gary and Joan Harmon of the Beautification Committee for cleaning up the green spaces, and extended a special

thanks to Brenda de Alba for all of her hard work as Committee Chair. All of these neighbors and friends made the biennial 2016 Garden Oaks Home & Garden Tour a success!

Garden Oaks Website: Webmaster Joe Muscara confirmed the website is operating as expected.

Beautification: Committee Chair Joan Harmon announced plans to take a hiatus from new projects during May due to the amount of effort placed into readying all green spaces for the Home and Garden Tour. Joan thanked Ace Tree Specialist for their contribution to help beautify the neighborhood for the tour.

Garden Oaks Citizens' Patrol: No report.

Constable Program: Committee Chair Terry Jeanes was present at the meeting with Garden Oaks Patrol Deputy Bowden who discussed several incidents in the neighborhood. A "knock and talk" disturbance was reported and "tailgate thefts" were reported to be occurring between 9:00 a.m.-12:00 p.m. in the neighborhood. Residents were asked to be vigilant of tailgate thefts and not to leave any items in vehicles. A question was raised regarding past "magazine scam" solicitations and Deputy Bowden commented they should no longer occur as offenders have been advised not to return. Residents were also warned about "alarm scam" solicitors in the area; solicitors must have a valid Texas permit on file to sell products/services door-to-door. Residents were reminded to fill out the Vacation Watch form at www. gardenoaks.org and to fax or email prior to leaving for vacation.

Government Affairs Standing

Committee: Committee Chair Mark Klein reported on recent efforts by the City of Houston and others to bring high-speed rail downtown despite the objections of longestablished neighborhoods. The City is now pursuing a feasibility study to evaluate bringing high-speed rail downtown. Mr. Klein, a member of Houston High-Speed Rail Watch, said the group continues to monitor the progress of the project by Texas Central Railway, which has agreed with strong neighborhood comments to stop the rail line in the IH-610/ IH-10 area, one closer to four of Houston's top employment centers. However, while the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) rejected two proposed routes that would go

through either Garden Oaks or the Washington Corridor, strong political pressure remains to bring high-speed rail downtown. The FRA will release its Environmental Impact Study (EIS) later this summer or early fall, when residents may and should comment. Please visit houstonhsrwatch.org for up-to-date information.

Mr. Klein also mentioned that a lawsuit has been filed against Texas Central Railway by people in rural counties who are worried about eminent domain, ranchland and homesteads being bifurcated, road closures, and the environmental intrusion that running bullet trains 18 hours a day might cause. The project cost is an estimated \$11 billion. It was noted there the project is not commuter rail and thus there would be no stations in Garden Oaks, as the project is designed to serve business commuters between Houston and Dallas.



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Mr. Klein requested volunteers to advocate for the 34th Street Quiet Zone project, which is being promoted by Super Neighborhood 12. He is seeking volunteers for a committee that would work with Super Neighborhood 12. He noted that neighborhoods have benefited from Quiet Zones and anticipated improved property values along Quiet Zone corridors.

President Briones announced the next regular meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, June 7, 2016 with Cary Duval, Development Director for Literacy Advance of Houston, as the featured speaker.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:09 p.m.





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AIR CONDITIONING TIPS FOR THE SUMMER

Air Conditioning 101: How Your A/C System Actually Works

Have you ever sat and wondered how your air conditioner does its job? It's important to be aware that an A/C system focuses less on supplying cool air and more about removing hot, humid air from your home. While there are a wide range of choices available for your home (central A/C systems, heat pumps, ductless/mini splits, window units, etc.), they all basically work the same way.

The Freon

Most home A/C systems use freon, a chemical that easily changes from a liquid to a gas and back to a liquid. Also known as refrigerant, when liquid freon converts into a gas, it absorbs heat that's present. This process is called phase transition and is essential for the A/C system to move hot air from within your home to the outside.

The Compressor

With central A/C systems, both the compressor and condenser are housed in the outdoor unit. That's the box-shaped element that sits in the yard next to your house. Freon is compressed into a liquid by the compressor. This liquid freon enters your home and travels up into the attic via freon lines to where the evaporator is located. When it enters the evaporator, the liquid freon expands to a gas, and in this process, picks up heat from your home that is being sucked up through the return air. The return air is the place where your air filter is located. The compressor then pushes the freon along (now fully gorged with heat) to the outside condenser.

The Condenser

The condenser is a series of copper coils through which the heated freon, in a gaseous state, travels. While moving through these coils, the heat dissipates into the air outside, aided by an exterior fan. You can feel this heat being dispersed while standing next to your outdoor unit. At the

end of the condenser, the freon has now lost most of its heat and is compressed back down to a liquid state again. It is then sent back to your attic to pick up more heat that's blowing across the inside of your evaporator coil.

The Evaporator

Now that the liquid freon is reentering your home, it does so a little at a time in a controlled process. It is reintroduced to the interior coils and begins to evaporate rapidly within the coils. Placed over the evaporator coils are a series of metal fins which become very cold. At this point, the blower motor of your furnace is being used by your A/C system to blow hot air from inside your home across the cold fins. The resulting cooled air is now spread throughout your home via the air ducts in every room. This process repeats itself until the desired temperature set on the thermostat is attained. Simple!

Oh, by the way, this is essentially how your refrigerator works too!

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

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HABITAT GARDENING TIPS By Kim Ellis

June really kicks up the heat and leads us into summer. The May rains may have spoiled us with our watering routine, but periods of no precipitation will start to show in the gardens more quickly now. In June it's important to start thinking about your safety when heading outside to work in your yard. First, if you can work outside in the early morning or early evening hours, you will be the most comfortable. It's good to build these habits before we get into the depths of summer. Protective clothing, sunscreen, and drinking lots of water will also keep you safe and your skin happy. It's a very colorful time in garden beds and local nurseries, and there are a lot of new plants to try if you have a spot that opens up. Keep notes in your journal of which annuals need to be refreshed early, and consider replacing with a perennial that will come back year after year.

There is still time to sow seeds, and to plant or transplant as long as you're willing to take the extra responsibility of additional watering. Hot summer vegetables like okra, southern peas, sweet potato slips, peppers, and hardy herbs can be planted, along with many native and well-adapted perennials. Remember to check potted plants from the nurseries to make sure they are not root bound by pulling back the plant's container to make sure that the roots are not wrapping around the growing medium. It's best to keep newly sown seeds or plants' soil moist, but not wet. June is a great month for seeding or sodding your lawn, as the soil temperatures are warm enough to encourage growth. Again, water in the grass as needed for it to take root.

Maintaining plants in June includes deadheading as needed for leftover spring annuals, perennials, and roses.

You can shear back fall blooming shrubs by 1/3 to keep compact and encourage more blooms in the fall. You should also complete your trimming of spring blooming shrubs and trees as they will start putting their energy back into bud building for the following spring. Also, remember to check tree limbs before hurricane season for limbs that might be dead, broken, or rubbing against another limb or the roof of your house.

Plant pests and disease ramp up with the higher temperatures, so check your plants often to catch issues early and treat quickly. Again, inviting or introducing beneficial insects in your garden will give the best overall treatment plan, but sometimes we need help from other treatment options. The more organic the option, the better for your entire yard and garden. All pest issues can be easily searched on the internet, but for more local and professional advice ask your local county extension agent or check with your local independent garden center. Remember to take an affected leaf, pest, or picture of the pest with you for review.

Water is the most important resource for garden wildlife during the hot months. If possible, it's best to have a variety of water sources as different species needs vary. A birdbath, a pond, a fountain or bird mister will all help birds in different ways. And make sure that you ask a neighbor to fill water sources and water your plants as needed over summer vacation.

Sustainable gardening tips for June include:

 as you lose cool season vegetables, fill the area with your homemade compost and cover with fallen leaves; this will prepare the site for fall vegetable planting


- mulch your beds for weed control and better water retention
- use muscle power to work in the garden, lessening the use of hydrocarbons and their emissions
- properly dispose of unwanted garden chemicals and fertilizers during your community's household hazardous waste collection days



Plant of the Month: Conoclinium greggii -Gregg's Mistflower

Gregg's Mistflower is a native perennial reaching about two feet tall, with small, purplish-blue flowers clustered together to form puffy, two-inch, cushion-like flower heads. It has a tendency to sprawl, and works great as a groundcover between larger perennials or out on its own. Depending on the winter, it can go dormant, but will pop back up in early spring. I've seen it flower from April through frost, with its peak display in the fall, coinciding with the fall Monarch migration. Gregg's Mistflower is frequently found covered with butterflies.

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
GO GARDEN CLUB UPDATE

GARDEN OAKS MONTESSORI RECOGNIZED AS NATIONAL MAGNET SCHOOL OF DISTINCTION

Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet School (GOMM) was recently recognized by the Magnet Schools of America (MSA) as a National Magnet School of Distinction. MSA is the national association for magnet and theme-based schools which determined the recipients of its 2016 national merit awards. These 258 public magnet schools and programs located in 19 states are recognized for their commitment to high academic standards, school diversity, specialized curricula and instruction, family engagement, and community partnerships. This year, 371 schools applied for national merit awards. making 2016 the most competitive year in the award program's history.

"The announcement of our national merit awards is an extraordinary time for the magnet school community," said MSA Executive Director,
Todd Mann. "This is a way for our association to recognize the most accomplished magnet schools in the country. These schools are making a lasting, positive impact on the lives of children. They are preparing them for the challenges of the future by providing them with unique learning experiences that give them the critical skills needed to be workforce and college ready."

To receive a national merit award, MSA member schools must submit a detailed application that is scored by a panel of educators. These schools are judged on their demonstrated ability to raise student academic achievement, promote racial and socioeconomic diversity, provide integrated curricula and instruction, and create community partnerships that enhance the school's theme.



There are two categories of merit awards: (1) Magnet Schools of Excellence, the top merit award given to a select group of magnet schools and (2) Magnet Schools of Distinction, the second highest award of recognition. GOMM Principal Lindsey Pollock and Magnet Coordinator Laura Aasletten attended the awards ceremony held at the 34th National Conference on Magnet Schools in Miami, Florida May 3-7, 2016. They were joined by the Director of Houston Independent School District's School Choice Office, Noelia Longoria. They toured outstanding magnet schools in the Miami-Dade County school system and worked with other magnet school teachers and administrators to develop strategies for continued success!

Magnet Schools of America (MSA) was founded in 1986 and authorized as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit education association in 1994. It sponsors a national awards program, hosts professional development activities, and provides technical assistance through the National Institute for Magnet School Leadership (NIMSL). MSA supports the leaders and teachers of magnet and themebased schools, while promoting the development of new magnet programs and public schools of choice. Fruit Pizza

1/2 cup pecans 6 dates

1 cup walnuts 1/8 teaspoon Himalayan sea salt

1 teaspoon cinnamon 1 vanilla bean

Blend nuts and cinnamon in your food processor with the S blade until all the nuts are very finely chopped. Add the rest of the ingredients and process until everything is well blended. Press the crust into the bottom of a cookie sheet.

1 cup raw cashew butter

1/2 cup canned or homemade full-fat coconut milk

3 tablespoons raw coconut oil

2 tablespoons raw honey

1 tablespoon vanilla extract

Beat the five ingredients above with an electric mixer until creamy and smooth.

2-3 cups of fruit for topping your pizza:

Blueberries Pineapple Strawberries Raspberries Kiwi Blackberries

Avocado The sky is the limit!

Press the walnut crust evenly across a large cookie sheet, top with the cashew cream "cheeze" and then top with the fruit. Serve immediately or store covered in the fridge until you are ready to serve.
