Constable Program Update

Starting March 1, we are now utilizing two constable patrols to help keep our neighborhood safer, rather than the three patrols that we have had for many years. This is a direct result of GOMO no longer being able to fund the Constable Program at this time. The Garden Oaks Civic Club has signed new contracts for the two deputies to patrol our streets, but we need increased contributions and additional participants to keep those two contracts in effect, as they are paid monthly. We do not currently have enough funds to pay for both of these contracts for the entire year.

Increased participation in the Constable Program is crucial to maintaining the safety and security of the neighborhood. We need your financial support to keep these two deputies patrolling. It is up to the residents of Garden Oaks to pay for the constables. Each contract costs about \$77,000 per year.

Donating to the Constable Program can be done via the form in this month's *Gazette*, or online at gardenoaks.org. You can pay in one lump sum for the year or monthly. There are many options online if you want to pay beyond the suggested \$225 annual minimum. We really do need your support!

As we go to press, only 283 households out of the 1430 homes in Garden Oaks are contributing at least the \$225 suggested minimum annual donation in 2017. That means only 20% of all households in Garden Oaks financially support the Constable Program. We still need more participation and funding in order to keep the Constable Program viable. The Constable Program benefits every single resident in the neighborhood, so please support the program. An updated supporter roster can be found at gardenoaks.org.


Two Constable Program fundraisers are on the calendar in hopes of raising additional monies:

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Talk to Each Other

This past winter break, my son and I embarked on a 10 day, 4,200 mile trek from Texas to New Jersey, Minnesota, Nebraska, and back to Texas. Over the course of those miles, I was reminded of the days when I would pick up the kids from school and ask them, "How was your day?" Inevitably, the answer would result in a sigh or a giggle followed by "fine" to which I would ask, "What did you learn today?" followed by an equally vague or evasive "I don't remember"! As the miles rolled on I remembered some of the conversation starters that had saved me those many years ago in the car, and together my son and I reminisced about those seemingly absurd questions or statements that would spark conversations and keep us engaged all the way home at the end of the day. Here are a few of them to try with your children or friends.

I'm certain I saw a shooting star last night. What wish do you think I should make?

What would you do if we had all the money in the world?

Who is the best pancake maker (or any favorite food) you know?

What should we do if there's a lion on the road on our way home?

If a space ship landed in our backyard what would it look like?

What's your favorite spot in your classroom?

These types of questions initiated discussions with my children that put them at ease at the end of the day and assured them that I was there to listen to them without judgment. Knowing that helped us establish communication without an expectation of right or wrong. The biggest deficits I see in children today are vocabulary and the ability to express themselves both orally and in writing. This is connected to limited interactions with language and I believe this may be attributable to heavy use of technology in our society. Everywhere I turn, I see both adults and children sitting side by side with devices in their hands totally engrossed in the technology instead of each other. Take time to connect with the people around you. Make up your own questions together or use resources online. Parents Together is one such site that offers you a question each day for free: http://www.q4kidz.org/. Positive Parenting online is another resource: http://www.positiveparentingconnection.net/40-questions-that-get-kids-talking/.

Take time to connect with your children no matter what age! As my 31-year-old son and I rolled along the countryside, we laughed and shared the stories we remembered. It is a memory I will cherish for the rest of my life. Have fun with the people who surround you and make your memories last a lifetime!




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

Garden Oaks Civic Club Meeting Minutes

February 7, 2017

Location: Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet School (GOMM), 901 Sue Barnett

Welcome and Introduction:

President Matt Gannon welcomed those in attendance and called the meeting to order at 7:08 p.m. A motion was made and passed to accept the January 2017 minutes as published in the *Gazette*.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Teresa Coleman had hard copies of the organization's revised format of the current profit and loss statement and balance sheet available to attendees. Ms. Coleman explained that in the past the budget and finances for both the Constable program and the Civic Club had been combined when in reality the Constable budget and funding are tracked separately from the Civic Club budget and funding. The two programs were separated into different balance sheets to allow for more transparency and better ease of reading and understanding.

Guest Speaker: John Beddow introduced the guest speaker, Jim Noteware. Mr. Noteware gave an informative and eye-opening presentation about the City of Houston's (CoH) budgetary and financial health. Mr. Noteware has written a series of op-ed articles regarding the CoH financial issues in the Houston Business Journal. (These articles can be found on the Houston Business Journal website.)

Mr. Noteware's presentation was very detailed and informative, focusing on CoH employee pension funds and how the CoH is attempting to fund them at the expense of other city services. Mr. Noteware also discussed how property tax revenues are up but that the areas of Garden Oaks, Oak Forest, Galleria and down I-10 to the Energy Corridor are actually funding the CoH budget while the rest of Houston is failing to maintain its property tax obligations to the city. Since 2010, the city has lost population and jobs due to corporations such as Schlumberger (Energy Corridor) and ExxonMobil (The Woodlands) moving their operations into the surrounding areas of Houston, and these tax revenues are not being replaced in the city.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Constable Program: Program Chair Terry Jeanes reported that beginning March 1, GO will have two constables instead of three patrolling the neighborhood. Patrolling hours will be reduced from 120 hours a week to 80 hours. Calls will also roll over to the adjoining neighborhood patrols from Shepherd Park and Heights. Both of these Harris County **Precinct One Constable contracts** will be funded entirely by contributions from GO residents. Since GOCC is committed to providing two constables, it is important to get as many households participating in this very beneficial program for the neighborhood. One can join the

Constable Program at www.gardenoaks.org.

Beautification: Committee Chair Joan Harmon reported that this month's focus will be on cleaning up the park areas and preparing them for spring. Irrigation systems will be checked and maintained as necessary. The drinking fountain at the Spark Park will be installed sometime this month.

Website: Pam Parks announced that several new updates will be operational this week. Information for Garden Oaks Maintenance Organization (GOMO) and the Garden Oaks Civic Club (GOCC) can be found at www.gardenoaks.org. The previous website is archived at the bottom of the home page.

Garden Oaks Citizens' Patrol:

Program Chair Carl Waters, Jr. was unable to attend but provided an update. There were 5 incidents reported for January 2017 on the website used by HPD to report information to the public (CrimeReports.com). Four of the five incidents occurred on N. Shepherd Drive: one burglary of a motor vehicle, one auto theft, and two thefts. More details will appear in the monthly article in the March Gazette. Mr. Waters also requested volunteers to help patrol the neighborhood and if interested, to please contact him via the GOCC website. One must be at least 18 years of age and able to pass a background check with the Houston Police Department.

Membership: Chairperson Dian Austin was unable to attend but provided an update. As of February 1st, there are 212 paid civic club members and 273 contributors to the Constable Program members. Sheila Briones handled the monthly raffle and Sue Schmidt was the lucky winner.

Gazette: Editor Joe Muscara thanked everyone for getting their submissions in on time for the February *Gazette* and reminded everyone that February 10th is the deadline to submit for the March *Gazette*.

Garden Oaks Montessori

Magnet: GOMM Principal Dr. Lindsey Pollock gave an update on the school's construction project which is going smoothly. A formal groundbreaking ceremony will occur February 17th at 9:30 AM. If you have an application in the Magnet lottery, you will be notified on March 20th as to the status of your application. If you know anyone who has moved into the neighborhood and has a child of kindergarten age or older, please have them contact the GOMM office as soon as possible if they plan to enroll this fall.

The pancake breakfast and silent auction that took place Saturday February 4th was a huge success. The Waltrip jazz band provided music at the event. Proceeds from the breakfast and auction netted \$26,470.


NEW BUSINESS:

Smoke 'n' Spirits: Chairperson Sheree' Peoples reported that the event will be held April 8th and the goal is to raise \$10,000 for the Constable Patrol Program. Ms. Peoples made a motion for \$500 in seed money for the event. The motion was amended to state that the seed money will be returned from the proceeds of event. Terry Jeanes seconded the motion. The motion passed.

Spring Fling: Chairperson Susan Kostelecky reported that the event will take place April 29th on the 1300 block of Sue Barnett, with a rain date for the following weekend, May 6th. The Spring Fling will feature front yard gardens, food, and drinks provided by residents, donors, sponsors, and area restaurants. Fairy houses, yard art, and curated vendors with yard and garden related items will be the highlight of the event. Both adults and children are invited to attend. The cost to attend the event is still being determined. A Facebook event page has been created. Frances Schwartz made a motion that the event be GOCCsanctioned with proceeds benefitting any beautification projects that fall outside the normal maintenance routine. Sue Schmidt seconded the motion. The motion passed.

The next meeting is scheduled for March 7th. The guest speaker will be Susan Kostelecky.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:45 p.m. Pizzas were graciously donated by Brother's Pizzeria.

Weed-and-Feed Fertilizers Kill Trees and Shrubs

Garden Oaks is known for its many beautiful mature trees. If your desire is to keep your trees and shrubs as healthy as possible, DO NOT USE GRANULAR WEED-AND-FEED FERTILIZERS!

Marketed under many different brand names, these chemicallybased herbicides are some of the most toxic substances that are still legal to buy. Most granular weedand-feed fertilizers contain atrazine, an herbicide used to prevent broadleaf weeds.

I learned early on in my master gardener training that atrazine moves quickly through soil, often contaminating ground water. I was also surprised to learn that applying atrazine near the drip line of trees and shrubs can gradually weaken and kill the plants over a period of time. A tree's drip line is the area defined by the outermost circumference of a tree canopy where water drips from the tree onto the ground. Take a minute to think how wide the canopies are for most of our mature trees and how far the root systems extend under our lawns. If you broadly distribute the granules, I can guarantee you are affecting the roots of your larger, woody plants.

According to a risk assessment released by the Environmental Protection Agency, the amount of the atrazine released into the environment in the United States is likely harming most species of

plants and animals, including mammals, birds, amphibians, and reptiles.

What can be used instead of granular weed-and-feed fertilizers? I recommend organic solutions if possible. I only use liquid forms of broadleaf control that do not contain atrazine and allow me to spot treat for weeds. If convenience is what you seek, there are some new granular products considered environmentally safe replacements for the atrazine-based weed-andfeeds and they can be used at any time of the year. Fertilome's is called Dollarweed Control Plus, and Greenlight's is a granular version of Wipe Out.



Which Foods to Purchase Organically

There is much talk about the cleanliness of our food and how that has a direct effect on our health. One of the main areas of concern is the use of the chemical glyphosate, which is found in Round-Up and other chemical fertilizers and weed killers. Glyphosate has been linked to ailments such as digestive conditions and diseases, cardiovascular diseases, allergies, depression, obesity, cancer, infertility, and neurological disorders such as Parkinson's, MS and Alzheimers, to name a few. Eating organically cuts down significantly on the amount of chemicals that you and your family are exposed to. Organic foods are held to high regulatory standards and to maintain their certified organic status, farmers are not allowed to use chemicals on the foods they grow. In other words, they are grown the old fashioned way as nature intended.

If you cannot purchase all your produce organically the Environmental Working Group has produced a list that will help you to lessen your chemical exposure by purchasing organic versions of foods on the "Dirty Dozen" (should be called the "Dirty Baker's Dozen") list and conventional foods on the "Clean 15" list. In general, foods where you eat the skin and/or that have a thinner skin need to be purchased organically.

Say bye-bye to food cravings, excess weight, mood swings, aches and pains, fatigue, hormonal imbalances, poor sleep, bad skin and digestive issues!

Although not sprayed directly with herbicides, pesticides and other chemicals, sweet potatoes/yams, onions, and other root vegetables do absorb a ton of these pollutants as they seep into the soil and basically marinate the vegetables in a chemical concoction. I recommend purchasing all root vegetables organically.

Houston Humidity and Its Effect on Your Indoor Comfort

As you know, Houston's over-thetop humidity can make you feel pretty steamy during the summer. But did you know it can affect your comfort throughout the year?

Too much or too little equals discomfort

During the cooler months, have you ever noticed when it's both cold and humid outside? High humidity makes it feel like the heat is being sucked right out of you. Low humidity causes its own problems too. It can make your home feel a lot chillier than it actually is as well as cause

annoying problems like static electricity.

Your home's thermostat should be set between 71 and 77 degrees. This is ideal when it comes to comfort and cost. However, this range won't feel comfortable if humidity levels fall below 50 percent. No matter how warm you keep your home, it will feel too cool to you and your family.


The best way to correct low indoor humidity is with a humidifier. This appliance can be installed as part of your HVAC system and it adds needed moisture in the air that is distributed throughout your home via the ducts. This keeps the relative humidity above 50 percent

which makes the apparent temperature feel a lot more comfortable. We usually don't have this problem in Houston.

How excess humidity affects air conditioning

During the summer, your A/C system cools your home by removing excess heat and moisture from the air. When the humidity level is high and the equipment doesn't have sufficient cooling capacity, your home may never feel truly comfortable.

Here are some common signs of excessive indoor humidity:



- Your skin feels clammy to the touch.
- Your home's windows fog and collect moisture on the inside.
- A musty odor becomes present caused by dampness which can eventually lead to mold, an even worse problem.

Too much is too much

People often assume that the larger and more powerful their home's A/C system is, the more effective it will be. This is not true. Since it won't need to run very long in order to lower the temperature, the system won't get a chance to remove sufficient moisture from the air. The result is cold, clammy air. This is why it's essential to buy a system that's the correct size for your home,

approximately one ton per 500 square feet.

Dehumidifiers

The best way to contend with indoor humidity is have a dehumidifier installed on your HVAC system. When humidity levels are kept in check during the summer, the system is able to do its job much more effectively. You will feel cooler and more refreshed as well as notice a nice drop in your energy bill. That's because your air conditioner won't have to work as hard while keeping you comfortable. Problems such as foggy windows, musty odors and clammy air should disappear too.

As always, "Come soon, come often and come love on a baby goat or two."






The Pancake Breakfast and Silent Auction is an event that
