Volunteer Positions Available

- 1. **Home Floater** This is a position assigned to each home. You will stay in one of the homes on the tour and fill in as needed. You could be taking tickets, directing people through the home, or greeting people as they come to the tour. Some are speaking positions; others are not.
- 2. **Home Ticket Taker** You will be taking tickets at the front door of the home in which you are stationed.
- 3. **Home Greeter** You will greet visitors at the front door of your assigned home and give them a little background information (provided by the home owner). This is a speaking role, but no training is necessary you will have all the notes you need.
- 4. **Home Docent** You will be stationed in one area of the home and direct people along their way. You will be told how to route the tour-goers, and if there are any areas off-limits.
- 5. Command Center Volunteer You will work at the command center, the primary staging area for the tour where tickets are sold and where the trolleys pick up new customers. You will be selling tickets and other items. This is a fun task as you will see most of the people attending the tour. There is currently only one early shift left. The rest will be the later shifts.
- 6. **Garden Volunteers** Both ticket takers and docents are needed for the gardens. The docents will be provided with information on the gardens to share with visitors.

With the Home Tour upon us on April 29th, I want to share some details about the homes you will be able to see on the tour.

207 W 32nd Street

This home is a recently built soft modern by Rob Ryan Construction and has been given the name "Casa Blanca." The sophisticated styling of the tuxedo kitchen is achieved with dark cabinetry against light counters and touches of gold in the finishes. The home delivers a glamorous feel throughout.

224 W 30th Street

This recent construction by Harry James Building + Design has contemporary, clean lines, and a few rustic touches. The interior perfectly brings bright finishes and the owner's elegantly eclectic style together. The layout delivers a formal setting of living and dining spaces then leads to the back of the home and a more casual family room anchored by a warm fireplace.

874 W 42nd Street

This beautiful Craftsman style home has a warm, inviting feel as soon as you step through the door. The well-appointed interior features recent renovations with classic style. The backyard is the ideal place to entertain with an exceptional covered patio facing the pool.

938 W 41st Street

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Outdoor Children

In the midst of the city of Houston, we enjoy the beauty of nature in the wonderful enclave of Garden Oaks. So many of our children in Houston are ultimately urban dwellers. Even though we enjoy the beautiful parks and green space just off Texas State Highway Spur 261 also known as North Shepherd Drive, many children hesitate to play outside with sticks, rocks, and even that Texas soil we lovingly refer to as "gumbo." Schools in Britain are recognizing that children are losing a sense of adventure and even the opportunity of "risk" in exploring the environment.

In decades past, being outdoors was to answer the call of the wild, to be an explorer of uncharted territories, or to discover new species. All of these endeavors included a level of risk taking, adventure, and hardship. How do we encourage our children to have an adventure in the world, to be explorers, and to experience the thrill of trying something new, even if it doesn't necessarily work out just the way we planned? While we want to keep our children safe from serious harm, the question remains, what can we do to build resilience and a growth mindset while also connecting to the great outdoors? What can we do to ensure that our children develop connections to nature and respect for our place in the cosmos and the responsibility we bear to ensure a sustainable world?

Some of the strategies being used by schools and parks in Britain include allowing grass to grow tall, in some places higher than the top of a child's head! Parks are being designed with climbing towers, willow wands, and expanses of sand. Tim Gill talks about the benefits of risk in his 2007 book, "No Fear: Growing Up in a Risk Averse Society," where he details the differences in litigation in various societies that impede risk taking in some settings. He points out that risk taking is beneficial in the long run as adults who are willing to try new strategies are more often rewarded than rule followers.

Here in the states, we can support our children's development and connection to nature by ensuring that our children spend time outdoors. Outdoors in our yards, on our playgrounds, in our local and state parks, we provide our children the opportunity to learn from the many lessons nature has to offer. Climb trees, build lean-tos, wade in a creek, or campout in an unfamiliar park. Spend time together with your child observing the natural world. From the ant between your sidewalk cracks, to the longhorns, to the big tree registry, Texas has flora and fauna to inspire your child's wonder of nature.

Keep a naturalist "kit" in your car or on your bike for your outings. An inexpensive pair of binoculars, plastic zipper baggies, a measuring tape, magnifying lens, phone camera, pencil, nature journal, and sunscreen will keep you prepared for an afternoon adventure. Plan a trip to Waugh Street

bridge to see the bat colony at sunset, walk the bayou along Allen Parkway, take the boat ride in the Ship Channel, or visit the Houston Arboretum and Nature Center in Memorial Park. Plant a garden, visit a farmer's market, or watch the stars at night at Bayou Bend Conservatory. Whatever, wherever you choose to go, share the wonder of nature with your child and nurture a spirit of curiosity and innovation for years to come!

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Garden Oaks Civic Club Meeting Minutes

March 6, 2018

Location: Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet (GOMM)

President Matt Gannon welcomed attendees and called the meeting to order at 7:07 pm.

Guest Speaker: Bobby Vasek, construction manager for ARKK Engineering, along with colleagues Tim and Kostas, gave an update on the Garden Oaks/Alba storm water drainage project.

The Alba project's end date was originally slated to be January, 2018 but has been moved back to October, 2018. All underground work should be completed in June/July 2018; the construction south of 43rd is done but continues north of 43rd. An additional crew, located on Brinkman, was added to keep the project's timing in line with the new completion date.

Surface paving material will be asphalt, 2" depth, as per the original plan. It will extend 100-200' on E/W streets. The contractor is reviewing costs to extend the asphalt. N/S streets will also have a 2" asphalt surface, with concrete curbs on both sides. All final asphalt overlays will be done near the end of the project.

Two additional storm water drainage projects are planned. One involves reconstruction of Wakefield, Sue Barnett, and parts of 43rd into Shepherd Park Plaza. This phase will start on completion of the Alba work. The third and final phase will affect Golf, and the project's design is 90% complete. More information can be found at gardenoaks.org.

Business Meeting

A motion to approve the February minutes was made and seconded. The minutes were approved. There were several new attendees who introduced themselves.

Home Tour: Heidi Lozano, Home Tour Auction co-chair (along with Stephanie Acosta) reported that the VIP preview party and silent/live auction will be Saturday night, April 28, at Berryhill Baja Grill & Cantina on 43rd.

Many nice auction items, including restaurant gift cards, and stays in a French chalet and in a Frio River resort, have been donated. All proceeds will benefit the GOMM middle school.

Katy Hall Wyly said that volunteers are still needed in most areas for the Sunday April 29th Home and Garden Tour. All volunteers receive a free t-shirt and a ticket to the tour. Six homes and several outdoor gardens will be showcased. Tickets will go on sale soon. The Command Center will be located in the Garden Oaks Baptist Church parking lot on the west side of Shepherd (between Chase bank and Gabby's) and will be the central staging area for ticket purchases and the trolleys. As of March 6, \$15,500 had been donated by generous sponsors.

Committee Reports

Treasurer: Teresa Coleman indicated that all bills are paid and all money deposited. Her report was not final at meeting time.

GOMO: Kip Noser addressed discussions with developer Gulf Coast Commercial Group Inc., regarding the proposed change in use of the parking lot on the west side of N Shepherd near W. 34th. Gulf Coast has approached GOMO to confirm that their process of soliciting approval of revised deed restrictions for the parking lot is valid and that GOMO would not contest if Section 1 owners were to approve the revisions. GOMO is currently reviewing the proposed process. Questions were raised regarding whether both commercial and residential owners have standing in the approval of the proposed amendment. GOMO agreed to forward these concerns to the neighborhood attorney prior to responding to Gulf Coast.

Constable Report: Terry Jeanes reports that Joe Bowden is back as our daytime deputy! Several nearby commercial entities have shown an interest in joining in the Constable Program.

Yard signs, which will be the property of the civic club, have been ordered for dues-paying residents. They are a visible reminder to support the program and to encourage membership. The signs were underwritten by Murphy & Vickers PC (Section 4 residents Patrick and Brooke Murphy). Thank you!

Larger 'thermometer' boards will be posted near the entrances to the neighborhood to show the progress

toward increased Constable Program participation. Scouts from Troop 40 may construct them as a service project in late spring. Otherwise, materials and costs may be subsidized by a generous underwriter.

Volunteers are needed to make phone calls to previous contributors who have not paid yet this year. We also need section captains to help deliver signs. Contact Terry Jeanes if interested.

Other news: Two bikes were stolen from the 400 block of 33rd. Be aware that a panhandler at Yale and 610 is 'on the run.' Take advantage of vacation watch when you are out of town.

Beautification: Joan Harmon reported that cleanup of some outdoor spaces is set to begin prior to the Home and Garden Tour. A motion was made to spend \$10600 of the Spring Fling proceeds to clean up, mulch, add colorful flowers, and repair/maintain beds. \$6950 of the \$10600 will go towards Art Park restoration. The remaining \$3650 will be allocated to Garden Oaks Boulevard beautification (including irrigation system repair) and other designated green spaces (Gazebo Park, rose garden). The motion was seconded and approved.

Garden Oaks Website: Pam Parks reported that the website was upgraded to the more secure https. Home Tour information has been updated and both home tour and party tickets will be available online shortly.

Membership: Dian Austin reported that as of March 1, the Civic Club has 220 members and 227 Constable Program supporters. Tim Pagel won a \$25 Amazon gift card in the raffle drawing.

Citizen Patrol: Carl Waters reported nine February crimes. Most were property crimes, specifically burglary of vehicles. Lock your doors, hide your valuables, and secure your vehicle behind a gate if possible. Anyone who lives in GO, is 18 years or older, passes a criminal background check and completes one hour of training can volunteer for GO CP. Carl is stepping down at the end of 2018.

Gazette: Joe Muscara stated that the deadline for April *Gazette* articles is March 15. Two block delivery captains are still needed, one for the 4100-4200 block of Apollo and one for the 400-500 block of W. 30th. Please volunteer if you can.

Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet School: Dr. Lindsey Pollock, school principal, stated that HISD budget talks continue, with no decisions finalized. The recent resignation of the HISD superintendent may complicate the process.

GOMM will continue to serve our community as magnet and Montessori programs for the foreseeable future. The lottery and zoned system continues into next school year.

Completion and move-in to the new three-story building is slated for Spring Break. Every classroom will change locations. Pavers, available for a minimum of \$50, will be installed in the new courtyard over the summer. The next GOCC meeting may be held in the gym.

New Business

Join the Garden Oaks Home Tour FB page and share it to help publicize the tour.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:40 pm. The next meeting is scheduled for April 3 at 7pm. We will have two guest speakers. Jason Virgadamo will discuss property tax protests. Zeph Capo will provide an update about the the HCC campus at Pinemont and Ella.

Deputy Joe Bowden is back!






