

Dear Neighbors:

It has been a frustrating, extremely demanding year both professionally and as President of your civic club and, if it had not been for the moral support and assistance of neighbors I could not have done it. But you, each one of you have helped too; by coming out of your own private worlds and getting to know your neighbors. Not just next door and across the street but from 2 and 3 blocks away. Think back, how many of you at the start of the year without the Gazette or your civic club meetings would wave, or stop and talk to your neighbors as you do now. There have

also been other advantages to you increased pride in your community.
Our original residents and those who
have lived here a long while are
excited, they are seeing new growth,
babies, young children and homes being

So can we but, it can not be done by 1 or 2 or 10 or 30. There are 1500 homes in Garden Oaks and each one of you must become involved. That old excuse - It's not my job has got to be removed from your vocabulary because it is your job! If each and every one of you would just do one little thing and get actively involved in your civic club all that would be taken out of your life would be a couple of hours a month. Can you deliver Gazettes, either to your neighbors or to local businesses which surround us? Or, can you act as a distributor of the Gazette for your section - both 1 hour a month. Can you take charge of a committee which sees that our weeds along Sehpherd get kept cut? That would, once the connection is made, take 1 phone call a month. Can you get 1 local business to advertise for \$10/month in our Gazette? This newsletter is

not being printed free and with support from our local business community will cost us less leaving money for other things which we as a community and as a civic club need. Or, can you help us by doing the necessary paper work for us to become a non-profit organization? We aren't and that too is costing you lots of dollars. There is so very much that each of you coud be doing and a lot of you already are.

When I took office in January, a lot of people felt I was reaching too high in my expectations of what could be accomplished. Well you've done it - I've only tried to show you the way. For a long time you were afraid to stand up and run but you did it. You can't stop though because you are only getting started and you still have so very far to go. But do I think we can do it - YOU BET - I KNOW WE CAN!



You see, many of us still believe we can work together to find a solution.

I ofen think I've chosen the wrong path. Crime is still increasing and each day the law of averages closes in on us. Its like Russian Roulette.
