The Civic Club recently began a program to develop and beautify the public areas of our neighborhood. We will consider landscaping and other developments for Garden Oaks Boulevard, Shepherd Drive, the neighborhood circles and parks, and other areas. These efforts will add greatly to the value and attractiveness of our community. I strongly encourage anyone who would like to assist in the planning and implementation of this project to contact Lee Ann Kean at 699-8303. We need your contributions.

Some of these areas have been landscaped in the past, but as you can see, the plants and improvements have largely disappeared, primarily because of inadequate maintenance. If we make the considerable investment of new landscaping, we should be prepared to provide ongoing maintenance of these areas. The best way to accomplish this is to provide a reliable source of maintenance funding through the Civic Club.

I believe we should initiate a deed restriction that institutes a small monthly fee (less than \$5.00) for all residents who buy houses in Garden Oaks after the restiction is passed. A fee of this sort is very common in other major Houston neighborhoods, and is generally collected through the homeowner's mortgage company. Senior citizens should be exempt from this fee.

This suggestion will be discussed at the June meeting, so anyone interested please come and make your opinion known. We also need a community leader to coordinate this effort.

HEARD UNDER THE OAK TREE


