# CRITTER CORNER by David Horsley

And just in case I didn't fully comprehend, the next message was this: "Hi, this is Doug Wilson (Anita's hubbie). I guess you heard about our owl. What should we put out for them to build their nest with?" I imagined that Doug would be handing out cigars soon...

Anyway congrats to Anita and Doug, whose owl box has been up for a couple of months. At the March meeting of the Civic Club, more owl boxes were given to Tim Pagel, Joann Stone and Joan Harmon. Come to the April meeting if you don't yet have a box, and we'll fix you up. If you already have one, better get it cleaned out: The owls have arrived!

While we're on the subject of cleaning out the owlbox, here is a description of How NOT To Clean Out An Owlbox, Part Two: the reader may recall that last year I wrote about finding a medium size rat in my owlbox, which luckily was lying on the ground at the time.
