What if it rains on May 17th, will the tour go on? You bet, rain or shine the tour goes on! The committee is planning well in advance for this possibility. Tarp covering will be provided at homes without natural shelter, and tour attendees may be asked to step out of their shoes and leave dripping umbrellas outside. These items will be delivered to them as they exit homes.

Last year there was quite a wait for shuttle buses during peak times, what can I expect this year? The number of buses will increase to 7 from only 2 last year. Most of the buses will be larger, accommodating 28 passengers versus the 12-passenger vans last year. The shuttle bus station will again be at the Garden Oaks Shopping Center. We're encouraging all attendees to take advantage of the free shuttle buses. Please be a good neighbor, don't park in the streets as this delays the buses and destroys lawns!

The "Welcoming Package" committee had its first official meeting in February. I'm very enthusiastic about this project. Hopefully, soon, we can give new residents of Garden Oaks a package of information that will be useful and help them learn about the neighborhood. The budget was approved unanimously at the March meeting of the Civic Club. The budget calls for total revenues of approximately \$28,000 and total expenses of around \$30,000. The two largest expenses would be 1) to add more pages to the Gazette and, 2) for beautification projects. We can't tell Ed and Brenda de Alba enough how much we appreciate their generous contribution of time in organizing the many successful beautification projects.

Vehicle Safety

- · Keep vehicle doors locked and windows up
- Keep purses, wallets, cameras and other valuables under the seat or in the trunk if they must stay in your vehicle
- Keep your vehicle registration form with you, not in the car
- Drive in the center lane when possible, to make it harder for car-jackers
- Never lower your window to talk to anyone who approaches your car
- · Keep your vehicle in good repair
- When shopping, park as close to the store entrance and in a well-lit area
- Have your keys ready when returning to your vehicle and check the back seat and look inside
- · Lock your doors as soon as you are in your vehicle
- When leaving your vehicle at a parking garage or repair shop, only leave your vehicle key

Home Security

- Don't leave ladders, yard tools or other equipment outside to be used for climbing or prying windows open
- · Fenced yards should have locked gates!
- Economical, high-pressure sodium lights can be an effective deterrent to a burglar. Motion lights are also great
- Vary your schedule and routes to and from your home
- While on vacation, have someone pick up mail and newspaper-DO NOT have these things stopped!
- Keep garage doors closed and locked. Automatic garage doors: Remove the rope from the disconnect bar while away on vacation
- Install door-reinforcers in the lock area of doors, which is the weakest part of the door
- Get to know your neighbors and arrange to watch each other's house
- Keep shrubbery and trees trimmed and thinned so no one can hide behind them
- · Windows should be closed and locked
- Mark all the major items in your home and garage with your driver's license number. Keep photos and serial numbers of major items.

- · User timer switches in different rooms when gone
- Make sure you have large numbers on your home and mailbox so police and other emergency vehicles can locate your home
- Never hide keys outside the house. Arrange to leave them with neighbors or friends
- If it appears that someone has broken into your home, do not enter the home. Leave and call police
- While working in the yard or even relaxing in your home, keep all doors and windows locked

Citizen's Patrol

In reviewing last year's crime information, I noticed the majority of the incidents in the neighborhood were property crimes (Auto Theft, Burglary, Burglary of a Motor Vehicle). Here are safety tips to help protect you and your property.

- 1. Away from home be aware of persons who are hanging around doorways and parking lots.
- 2. Walk with a purposeful stride. Criminals watch for people with a "victim's posture" (head lowered) or not paying attention to their surroundings.
- 3. At home be aware of strange persons or vehicles near your residence.
- 4. Keep shrubs and bushes around your windows low to reduce hiding places for criminals.
- 5. Place lights around the exterior of your home to reduce shadows and hiding places for criminals.
- 6. Spend time getting to know your neighbors. People are more likely to get involved when they know you.

The January crime stats listed seven crimes in the neighborhood. There were five burglaries, one robbery and one auto theft. The burglaries occurred in the 600 block of West 30th on 1/16/98 at 8:47 pm, 700 block of West 43rd on 1/19/98 at 7:15 am, 800 block of West 30th on 12/31/97 at 7:00 pm, 900 block of Lamonte on 1/22/98 at 12:30 am, and 3000 block of Randall on 1/3/98 at 5:00 pm. The robbery occurred on 1/2/98 in the 900 block of Gardenia and the auto theft occurred 1/4/98 in the 700 block of West 42nd.

Patrollers and bases were in action for 79.5 hours during the month.

To round off our learning experience about Antique Beautification Report Roses, members headed up to Independence (near by Brenda de Alba Brenham) on Saturday for a field trip at the Antique Rose Emporium. Then, we stopped off in Tomball at the past month with the Bridal Wreath Spirea blooming, Ema Farms, and visited with owner and fellow Garden along with the azaleas and the Texas Redbuds. To have beautiful roses in arrangements, put a cut rose in a bucket of hot water and cut off (while under water) Esplanade is Saturday, April 4th beginning at 9 AM. around 1/2". Place bucket in refrigerator and chill We hope to see you there! overnight. Pull the rose straight out of the water, careful not to shake off the water droplet at the end. This will result in cut roses that last much longer!

Peanut Brittle

2 c. raw peanuts 1 tsp. soda 2/3 c. water 1/2 tsp. salt 2/3 c. Karo 1 Tsp. butter

1 1/2 c. sugar

Mix first 3 ingredients. Cover; let boil 3 min. Uncover; add nuts & butter. Let boil (stir often) until when tested in cold water it is brittle. Remove. Add soda & salt; stir until puffiness is gone. Pour out on buttered pan. As it cools, pull apart & break.

Needed: Security Director for very important, well organized program to purchase security patrol service. Someone <u>must</u> come forward to help. Call Craig Lee at 802-0079 if you are interested or have any questions. Also needed are volunteers to contact neighbors on their block to collect 1998 payments (\$230).

Speaking of, the contract payment this year is \$230. (Sorry about the inflation but it is still a good value). This payment should allow us to pay for the service through the year-end renewal of the contract and pay for shortfalls from the last two contract years. Please send your check today. If you feel this amount is too high, send what you feel is reasonable for your circumstances. But send something. For now, mail your payments directly to the Craig Lee, 212 West 34th Street, Houston, TX 77018. Paying the full amount up front works best for the program, but I realize it is not financially feasible for many of us. Options 1: pay \$120 April 15th and \$115 June 15th. Option 2: pay \$90 April 15th, \$75 June 15th and \$75 August 15th. Option 3: contribute whatever you can.



This Committee will verify when new construction is in compliance with our Deed Restrictions. All residents need to do is call one of the phone numbers listed on the back page of EVERY Gazette; we have someone to review building plans. By not having your plans reviewed prior to beginning construction you are violating the current Deed Restrictions.

Once a structure is in place, a resident can expect a visit from a member of the Garden Oaks Board of Trustees to help determine if the new construction is a violation. This can only occur if a Board of Trustees Member or other Garden Oaks resident notice a violation.

Save yourself some trouble and keep your stress level down- let the Garden Oaks Board of Trustees review your building plans BEFORE it is too late!
