Pre-sale tickets for the 1998 Garden Oaks Home and Garden Tour are available at 5 locations this year, making it easier for area residents to purchase tickets. The two Garden Oaks locations are: The Frame Shop at 3444 Ella and Jim's Corner at Wakefield and Alba. Kaplan's in the Heights at 2125 Yale is again selling tickets for us. Two new locations are also selling tickets this year: in the Memorial area at Coldwell Baker United, 9313 Katy Freeway at Echo Lane and in River Oaks at Smith & Hawken at 3935 San Felipe. Committee members will be selling tickets in front of Kroger's on 43rd on weekends, too. Pre-sale tickets purchased by May 16th are \$8.00. Tickets purchased at the shuttle base station at the Garden Oaks Shopping Center will be \$10.00 for the full tour and \$3.00 for an individual home or garden.

Committee Reports

Membership and Welcoming - Tom Stell revealed that our Civic Club currently has 400 member households (28.5%) with a \$21.56 average contribution.

Home and Garden Tour - Judi Morawski discussed ticket sales for the 1998 Tour. Volunteers are needed to act as docents, transportation assistants, and ticket takers. Beautification- Brenda de Alba detailed the recent work days on the Esplanade project. A sign and benches will be installed in the coming months. The meeting attendees gave Brenda a loud round of applause for her hard work on this project.

Garden Club- Brenda de Alba announced the upcoming meeting and mentioned that potted Pentas are available for sale.

Garden Oaks Citizens on Patrol- Carl Waters, Jr. reported that five crimes had occurred including various reports of potted plants being stolen from resident's front yards or porches. "National Night Out" will be the 1st Tuesday in August.

Finance- Report was distributed.

Ed de Alba appealed to and reminded the Civic Club members in attendance that all exterior construction plans must be passed by the Garden Oaks Board of Trustees Architectural Review Committee. According to de Alba, starting a project that violates deed restrictions can cause the property owner to have to tear down at the owner's cost. Ed also indicated that the Board of Trustees is very serious about deed restriction enforcement.

Houston Homeowners Association. Victoria Frazier from Houston Homeowners Association spoke regarding a vote before the city council regarding the location of cell towers. We were urged to contact Council Member Bruce Tatro to support Council Member Martha Wong's 425 foot residential distance proposal. Citizen's Patrol

Occasionally, I am asked for the source of the crime statistics that appear in my monthly articles. They come from the HPD Crime Bulletin for our They can be patrol district which is District 3. obtained by visiting the North Division Command Center or by participating in a monthly program called Positive Interaction Program, or PIP for short, which is held on the third Thursday of each month at 7:00 pm at St. Matthew's Methodist Church located at 43rd and Shepherd. These meetings are supervised by Captain Jerry Defoor of the North Division Command and chaired by citizens from our area. In addition to getting the scoop on district happenings, there is a monthly speaker from different units with HPD or other public service agencies like the fire department, HL&P, and the Better Business Bureau. meetings are open to all and Captain Defoor encourages his officers to attend the meetings so you can meet them in a positive light.

In February COP patrollers recorded 71 1/4 hours. One member interrupted his patrol to aid a possum which was giving birth in the middle of 42nd Street.

HPD reported five crimes in our neighborhood for February. They were: an assault in the 700 block of West 42nd on 2/5/98 at 7:30 am; two burglaries: one in the 300 block of West 34 on 2/13/98 at 3:30 pm and the other in the 900 block of West 41st on 2/24/98 at 12:15 pm. An auto theft occurred in the 600 block of West 34th Street on 2/21/98 at 7:00 pm and a DWI arrest occurred in the 700 block of West 43rd Street on 2/3/98 at 11:20 pm.

An Important Message to Parents - Learn Gun Safety

A lot of children are home alone during the summer months, and statistics show that gun accidents occur mostly during the summer. Please

take the time to educate yourself and your children about gun safety.

- "Stop" and "Don't Touch" are the most important messages for children to learn if they see a gun.
- "Leave the Area" should be taught to mean leave the room or immediate area in which the gun is found. Do not stress to children to leave their home without adult supervision.
- "Tell an Adult" emphasizes that children should seek out a trust-worthy adult, such as a neighbor, police officer, or teacher, if a parent or guardian is not immediately available.

If your home is like half of those in our nation, your home has a gun. I encourage parents to reinforce these ideas by repeating the message:

STOP DON'T TOUCH LEAVE THE AREA TELL AN ADULT

Make sure all guns you may have cannot be reached by anyone who should not use them, especially children.

Keep your ammunition securely stored where a child or other unauthorized person cannot reach it.

Talk to your children about guns, their uses and history. Answer any questions honestly. by removing the mystery about guns, your child will be less curious and more likely to follow gun safety rules.

Explain the difference between a toy gun and a real gun. Explain that the guns that children see on television are not real.

The blooms just keep coming with each month bringing something new to enjoy on the Esplanade! Four more tree varieties have put forth their spring flowers: the Halesia Diptera (Silverbell), the Chinese Fringe, the Native Fringe, and the Sinojackia. One of our more unusual shrubs, the Florida Anise, has also been blooming with its showy, cranberry colored starshaped flowers and its wonderfully aromatic leaves.

Our last two workdays (March 21 and April 4) were once again very successful! Many thanks to the wonderful volunteers who showed up to help each day...your sore muscles will be all but forgotten when you drive down the Esplanade feeling proud that you contributed to its new found beauty! On March 21, we built flowerbeds by incorporating 20 cubic yards of leaf mold compost into the existing Esplanade soil. On April 4, we planted over 640 purchased plants along with a large number of plants donated from Garden Oaks residents. We also spread another 20 cubic yards of hardwood mulch. The total product of our work is simply AMAZING!! Below is an abbreviated list of some of the plants you'll find as you take a stroll down the path:

2 Tbsp. olive oil


1 Tbsp. lemon juice

Director, Donna Archer. Deputy Constable Ana Herrera was in attendance at the meeting.

Historical Garden Oaks Documents. Craig reminded the Civic Club that he is looking for historical neighborhood documents.

Driveway Replacement. The issue of "inferior" driveway replacement by the city on West 41st and West 42nd Streets was discussed. Several members discussed concerns over the city's "lack of" responsiveness to this issue.

Graham Park. It was reported that the lights at Graham Park appear to be working properly once again. New Business.

Sewer Line. The problem of a leaking sewer line on West 38th Street was discussed. The city has stopped paying the contractor who in turn has stopped working. Residents there had their street torn up for a year. David Polansky in Bruce Tatro's office was cited as a person to contact regarding this matter.

Garden Oaks Boulevard Traffic Light. Craig asked Ms. Daniels from Garden Oaks Elementary School if she had contacted the city regarding changing the timing of the traffic light at Garden Oaks Blvd. and Shepherd to facilitate morning drop-off of children. She had contacted the city but they have not responded (after several months). Craig indicated that he would attempt to help put pressure on them to make the changes.

Home and Garden Tour Volunteers. Brenda de Alba asked Ms. Daniels if she could assist in getting school parents to volunteer for the Home and Garden Tour. Ms. Daniels agreed to help.

Guest Speakers/Presentation.

Allison Smith, Community Liaison from Northwest Memorial Hospital, and George Gaston, Director of Spiritual Development and Community Outreach for Memorial Hermann Hospital System, discussed their community centered programs covering the "Greater Heights Area".

Following their informative presentation, the meeting was adjourned by Craig.



Garden Tips for May

- * Allow foliage of spring-flowering bulbs to mature and yellow before removing because it enables them to store up enough energy to bloom next year.
- * Replace or replenish mulch materials in flowerbeds and shrub borders to conserve moisture and reduce weed growth.
- * Pinch back terminal growth on newly planted annuals and perennial plants to encourage more compact, better-branched plants and more flowers.
- * Brighten a shaded area of the garden with pentas, begonias, caladiums, and impatiens.



Cell Tower Ordinance

City Council acts to protect Houston neighborhoods!

Dear Craig:

I would like to thank you for your correspondence regarding the new cellular tower ordinance. Your opinion is important to me and I have given it every consideration in making the best decision for District A and the City of Houston.

I am pleased to say that City Council approved a new cellular tower ordinance that will provide stronger protection for Houston neighborhoods, as well as allow the cellular communication industry to meet the growing consumer demand it faces here in Houston. Included below are some of the added benefits of this ordinance, over the previous ordinance:

- The surrounding area that is required to receive advance written notification of "request for permit" has been increased to 1000 feet.
- · Residential Test areas have been established at 375 feet for any tower between 60 and 100 feet tall, 600 feet for any tower between 100 and 150 feet, and 800 feet for any tower over 150 feet tall. This represents an increase in distance of, on average, 250% from the previous ordinance.
 - · The amount of signage required near a proposed tower sight has been increased.
- · Affected residents and property owners will have the right and the advance warning to request a public hearing on the issue.
- · Areas classified as Historic Districts will receive additional protection from encroachment by cell towers. This includes additional regulations pertaining to the location and camouflage of said tower.
- · Any tower permit granted in an Historic District will have to receive approval from the Houston Archeological and Historical Commission (HAHC).
- · No tower permit will be approved for a tower structure within the boundaries of a scenic district (unless so waived by the HAHC).
- For future site evaluations, apartments will be included as residential tracts and given proper weight in determining the classification of an area as "residential" or "commercial".
- The method for determining a proposed site area's classification as either "residential" or "commercial" will be based solely on the number of tracts and their usage, not by square footage of usage as the industry requested (3 residential tracts, 2 commercial tracts = residential area).
 - · Any abandoned cell tower site must now be removed from the area (formerly not required).
 - · Additional restrictions have been included regarding sign placement and lighting on cell tower sites.
- · Tower Permit Commission will be created with provisions to employ a telecommunications expert as the neighborhoods have requested.
