Over 850 Visitors Tour Garden Oaks' Homes and Gardens

On a beautiful sunny day six homes and three gardens were toured by a record crowd of over 850 visitors. During peak hours in the early afternoon when the lines at tour locations were the longest, patrons declared the wait well worth it. Visitors also enjoyed a tour of the Garden Oaks Boulevard esplanade escorted by June 2 - Civic Club Mtg Brenda de Alba and Keiji Asakura; this beautification project received some proceeds from the 1997 tour.

Traffic congestion this year was minimal due to the free buses taking patrons quickly from location to location with only a short wait between buses. Patrons agreed that it was much more convenient to be dropped off at the door and not have to walk from a distant parking place.

As of Sunday evening, May 17, total receipts from sponsorships, ticket sales, raffle sales and T-shirt sales were over \$18,000, with some receipts still to be collected. Both receipts and profits are expected to exceed last year's. 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President's Letter

Last month, I discussed briefly an issue involving a homeowner in Section 1A. The HL&P easement was not being maintained at all, according to the resident. Since then, I discussed this issue with Maurie Walker who is HL&P community liaison for our general area. He has made it to two of our Civic Club meetings and indicated that he plans to come about every other month. Maurie's job is to listen and work with residents in the area about issues relating to HL&P. If you don't catch him at a meeting, he can be reached by phone at 696-5377. He is going to look into the easement.

Did you find a blue tag on your door notifying of the change in trash pickup? We learned at the meeting that while your garbage pickup may occur on Tuesdays instead of Thursdays beginning May 19th, the <u>recycling pickup will not change</u>. Don't get this mixed up. Speaking of recycling, don't forget, that the recycling guys don't take cardboard.

I'd like to thank the several members of the Garden Oaks Board of Trustees who came to the Civic Club meeting. Hopefully, next time we can get some of the trustees who could not attend. The work of the trustees is very important to maintaining the vision of Garden Oaks. Their work is critical to stopping those who either intentionally of unintentionally want to break the terms of the deed restrictions—usually in the form of setback violations. The Board of Trustees needs, in my opinion, the maintain a higher level of visibility. The members need to be dedicated to the purpose of the Board. If they lose interest, they should step aside and allow the space to be refilled. There is a limit to the number of trustees who represent each section—I think it's three. But there are often vacancies on the Board. If you want to dedicate some time to protecting and maintaining the deed restrictions, let the Board's president (currently Megan Berry Bartlow) know. All board members are listed with phone numbers on the back of each Gazette. They meet monthly and I am encouraging them to write more articles in the Gazettes. They have the power to force someone to tear down new construction and remodeling work that does not comply with deed restrictions, even if the work is complete. Older violations are a little more complicated but I do understand that older violations cannot not be rebuilt or improved. For example, if someone has a carport that violates the side setback distance (usually 15 feet) and the carport fall down, it cannot be replaced if it's replacement violates any restrictions. It is a good idea to check with the Board prior to any work on your home or garage.

Likewise, if you think someone is violating deed restrictions intentionally or unintentionally, contact a board member. Like most of us, the board members have regular full time jobs and don't really have time to constantly patrol the streets to enforce the restrictions. They need you to help be their eyes and ears. Garden Oaks Civic Club Minutes

Ed de Alba volunteered to act as Secretary and record the minutes. Minutes from the March meeting were approved by acclamation.

Committee Reports

Home Tour. Judi Morawski made a call for additional volunteers. Ticket costs for volunteers are \$5; they also receive a nice T-shirt for their 3-hour shift. Ticket sales are off to a slow start but raffle sales are encouraging. And there are some great raffle prizes. Seven complimentary shuttle buses will be available during the peak hours of the show to minimize vehicular traffic on the day of the show and potential damage to street-side lawns.

Beautification. Ed de Alba reported that irrigation in the Triangle Park at the intersection of Alba & Azalea was completed three weeks ago. Many thanks to David and Andrew Bell, Tina Nieto, Rolf Sheffler and John Sommers for their hard and rain soaked work.

Traffic. Susan Garman said that sidewalks in the 700 block of West 43rd between Shepherd and Sue Barnett are out for bid. She is looking for block captains on 43rd to champion sidewalks on the 800, 900, and 1000 blocks. Also putting efforts forward to reduce the street rating from Major Thoroughfare to Residential. This will reduce posted speeds to 30 mph. City measured traffic speed on 43rd found average speed to be 35 mph and using some profound logic then raised the posted speed to 35. Now the average speed is 45! Traffic Control in Section 1A-Traffic Counters are back. Questions exist as to when the permanent barriers will be erected. Temporary barriers were put in place on January 17th. Speed Humps on 38th-working to get them replaced. This may not be done until the leaking sewer work is repaired. (The city stopped payment on the work because of the leaks and the contractor stopped work because the city stopped paying them.)

Citizens on Patrol. Carl Waters reported that seven crimes occurred, however one may be a duplicate. Captain DeFoor has been promoted and is now Assistant Chief of Police for Patrols. He has 5 areas plus the airport and Garden Oaks is still under his watchful eye. We wish him the best in his new position.

Treasurer's Report. Shelly Immel reported that we have \$27,000 in the bank. Constable Patrol has \$3000 which is better than last month.

Garden Oaks Elementary has won the HISD Northwest District Outstanding Volunteer Program Award! We received special honors at the HISD Volunteer Award Program on May 14.

Our volunteer program at Garden Oaks continues to grow by leaps and bounds. We have had well over 100 new parents or volunteers this year. Our PTA and Volunteers in Public Schools (VIPS) Coordinator have done a fantastic job. They deserve much of the credit for this award.

Garden Oaks also enjoys the benefits of its partnerships with Memorial Hospital Northwest and McCoy, Inc. We also are partnered with many smaller businesses and churches in the area, including Chassy's, the Oak Forest Branch Library, and the Northwest YMCA. 

Speakers: Garden Oaks Board of Trustees

Megan Barlow, President, introduced board members attending the Civic Club meeting. They were: Ed de Alba, Section 1 & Secretary; Bennett Bartlett, Section 1; Herb Kellner, Section 3 & Architectural Review Chairman; Harry James, Section 4; and Helen Sestak, Section 5. Section 2 was not represented. Copies of Deed Restrictions are available from the board (see back of *Gazette* for phone numbers). The deed restrictions are unique to each section of the neighborhood.

The Board has the same interest as the people attending the meeting - to keep the neighborhood looking good through oversight of the property setbacks. Herb asked for assistance from the neighborhood with people reporting

building and/or violations that they notice. This will save someone the expense of having to tear down an illegal structure.

Education will nip problems in the bud - before they come up. The board's aim is to protect property values and maintain continuity. The board has no control over taste or architectural style.

Q: How is membership in the Board decided?

A: Membership is specified in the Deed Restrictions and the Bylaws of the Board. We need people on the Board especially from Section 4 & 5.

Q: What is the process for building approval?

A: Deed Restriction pamphlets are available for free. To review we need a copy of the plans and a site plan. We are enforcing set back requirements. On approval Board will write a letter that says improvements met deed restrictions. A \$15.00 fee is collected if plans are approved. If plans are not approved you can get an "at risk" permit which you will sign stating that you comply with all deed restrictions.

Plants of the Esplanade

Two varieties of Louisiana Iris have been planted on the Esplanade: Clyde Redmond (white) and Marie Delores (Blue). Louisiana irises are native to the Gulf Coast, where the soil is rich and there is plenty of humidity and moisture. Unlike most other iris family members, Louisianas actually thrive in boggy conditions, even when partially inundated for long periods. they do not, however, require these conditions and grow well in most any good garden soil. Moist conditions during winter and early spring are usually sufficient.

Louisiana irises like rich, highly organic soil. The evergreen foliage is tall and handsome. Flowers occur in spring and work well at the rear of a perennial border or at the edge of a garden pond. Fall, winter, and spring are their primary growing seasons. Hot, dry conditions will induce a dormancy that seems to cause little, if any, harm to the plants. Dividing the plants in the fall every 3 or 4 years is a helpful cultivation practice and is also the major means of propagating the plants.

They do not handle disputes between you and your neighbor. They do not enforce city ordinances. They are not a "historical commission." And they are not affiliated with the Civic Club. It's the Civic Club's purpose to work with the neighborhood to maintain and improve everything else not covered by the deed restrictions. The board's duty is to enforce the rules that Garden Oaks was built upon. If you want to know more, contact one of them. Also, contact a member if you want a copy of the deed restrictions for your section.

The Education IRA is Good News for College Savers

Beginning in 1998, there is a new way to save money for college costs -- the "Education IRA." Unlike the Individual Retirement Account (IRA), the Education IRA has nothing to do with retirement. However, the concept is similar.

The Taxpayer Relief Act of 1997, which created the Education IRA, allows eligible individuals to contribute up to \$500 each calendar year on behalf of any child under age 18. Any earnings will then grow on a tax-deferred basis. When money is taken out of an Education IRA, the distribution is tax-free as long as it does not exceed the child's qualified higher education expenses (including tuition, fees, books, and basic room and board).

How the Education IRA Works

In 1998, single taxpayers with adjusted gross income (AGI) less than \$95,000, or couples filing jointly with AGI less than \$150,000, are eligible to make the maximum contribution to an Education IRA. The permissible contribution gradually phases out for single taxpayers as their AGI rises from \$95,000 to \$110,000 and for couples jointly filing as their income rises from \$150,000 to \$160,000. Parents may establish an Education IRA for each of their children. Grandparents, other relatives, or friends may also establish an Education IRA for a child. In fact, anyone, including the child, who meets the income elibility requirements may contribute to help a child build a nest egg for college. Keep in mind, however, that \$500 per child per year is the maximum aggregate amount that may be contributed from all contributors.

If a child does not need or use the Education IRA for college, the account balance may be rolled over to the Education IRA of certain family members who may use it for their qualified higher education expenses. The child himself or herself may also withdraw funds; however, the portion of the distribution that represents earnings accumulated in the account generally is subject to income taxes. The taxable portion of the withdrawal is also subject to a 10% premature distribution tax penalty, unless an exception applies.

With the rising cost of higher education, now may be the time to look into opening an Education IRA for each of your children or grandchildren. If you would like to learn more, please call Tom Stell at 713-966-5946.

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Developer Plans to Build 32 Room Motel in Garden Oaks

The Garden Oaks Board of Trustees received plans in the last month from developer Chandu Patel for a 32 room Scottish Inn Motel to be built at the intersection of Yale and 30th Street. The motel would be on the three empty lots opposite the Exxon station along 30th Street. Drawings of the motel are on the back of this insert. The Southern Elevation is a view of the motel from across 30th street and the Western Elevation is the view from Yale. Also on the back of this insert is a view of the motel from above. Currently, the plan also includes a 42-foot tall, 160 square foot sign, a resident manager's apartment, and parking for 34 vehicles.

This is the same developer whose plans for a 22 room motel in Arbor Oaks at the corner of Antoine and Cypress Grove were profiled in the May 21st edition of the Leader. Residents there overwhelmingly oppose the introduction of this type of business into their neighborhood.

The Board of Trustees and the Civic Club Leadership have several concerns with the placement of a motel in Section 1:

- Out of character with the neighborhood Garden Oaks is a residential neighborhood.
- Nature of the business These are inexpensive motel rooms, (\$30 for the Scottish Inn on Antoine) far from major sites or business centers in the city.
- Signage The planned sign is too large for a residential neighborhood.
- Sewage The addition of 34 toilets at the top of the 30th/31st street sewer line will significantly impact the capacity of the line.
- Parking Insufficient parking. Overflow parking will be along 30th Street.
- Traffic Yet more traffic for 30th Street.

Meeting Planned for June 2nd at Garden Oaks Elementary: The next Civic Club meeting will be devoted to this issue. District A Council Member Bruce Tatro will attend. Also, we have invited representatives from City Planning, Signage, Public Works, Traffic, and HPD and hope they will attend and hear citizen concerns.

We invite all members of the neighborhood to attend this civic club meeting and voice their concerns. This is not just a "Section 1 problem" but one that may affect home values in the entire neighborhood. Please join us at the meeting.

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
