

For some of us with fairly new roots in the neighborhood, we love Garden Oaks so much that we want to plant deeper roots wherever and whenever we can. What better way to deepen those roots than with the memory of loved ones.

At the intersection of 34th and Lawrence in Section One is a pocket park with no name, and little identity other than it serves as a traffic roundabout in the neighborhood. Yet it has the makings of a quiet point of interest. There are several good oak and pine trees, a cluster of crepe myrtles around the entrance sign, and an open area ideal for roses.

Between now and the end of the year, we will be bringing new life to this pocket part with plantings and an irrigation system. Among the bed of azaleas and lantana, most noteworthy will be a bed of memorial roses.

Eight different roses have been chosen for this garden based on their age, beauty, history and hardiness. All are popular in Texas, and, once established, are sure to be steady bloomers for years to come.

President's Letter

It's already September. That means it's time for the Civic Club to start meeting again. Depending on when you read this *Gazette*, we may have already had our September 1st meeting. On the agenda, some of the things being addressed in September, we still need a secretary to finish out the year—that means only four more months. We **REALLY** need the help. Additionally, we will be reconvening our standing nominations committee. Their job will be to identify and/or solicit candidates to fill the term of offices for 1999. I am hopeful that potential leaders in our community can quickly be identified and urged to contribute some of their time for Garden Oaks.

I can't recall how many times someone has commented, "what would really have been helpful when we moved in would have been some kind of orientation or welcoming kit." Everyone sees the need for this but no one wants to put it together. No one other than the four or five individuals who have faithfully volunteered and worked on a welcoming package many days already this year. But their time and resources are too limited to keep the project on track. (I say this with a great deal of appreciation for the work done so far and for those individuals who have donated their time and talents). What is currently needed—as I understand it—is for one or more bodies to take the information obtained so far and retype it so it can be digitally stored. From there it will be transferred into the final brochures, information sheets, web pages, etc.. At the September Civic Club meeting, I will request more volunteers to help finish our new welcoming package's development.

Garden Oaks Elementary School is doing something different this year. The school is joining the rapidly growing list of HISD schools that now require their students to wear school uniforms. I was surprised to learn that HISD is close to 100% uniformed now. (Each individual school makes the determination to require uniforms and what they will be). Speaking for myself, I support the uniform policy; but now I don't know what to do with all those t-shirts we have.

I'm still trying collect artifacts from Garden Oaks past...mostly documents that are part of past presidencies, memorabilia and photographs. Give me a call sometime if you think you might have something to share.

On Saturday, September 12th at the University of Houston will be the second annual "Neighborhood Connections" conference. The conference, which lasts until about 3 p.m., covers many topics of interest and use to Houston neighborhoods. It is also a good opportunity to network. I invite anyone interested in attending to contact me.

A water fountain was recently completed in the SPARK Park. The Civic Club membership voted to fund a portion of the cost of the fountain. Fortunately, thanks to kind donations, and the assistance of state representative Ken Yarbrough, the total cost to the Civic Club is expected to be much less than originally anticipated.

Please give consideration to serving as one of the Civic Club's officers during the coming calendar year. The five positions are President; VP-Membership and Welcoming; VP-Gazette editor; Treasurer and Secretary. I anticipate the Civic Club will need someone to fill each of those positions.

A reminder, our October Civic Club meeting will be an opportunity to ask questions of some of the candidates who will be running in the November elections and whose eventual election could somehow affect you. Please plan to attend that meeting to ask questions and share your concerns. Find out what they are going to promise to do for you.

Meter Reader Problems

An HL&P meter reader was recently observed beating my two dogs, in my yard, without provocation. He was also observed beating a neighbor's dog, again without provocation. HL&P removed the person from the neighborhood, that day, after learning about the incident. Our Deputy Constable also filed an incident report with the county.

When I discussed the situation with an HL&P representative, he apologized and agreed to pay the vet examination bills. (Fortunately, there were no physical injuries). However, he refused to tell me whether the man had been fired. So, this man could still be reading HL&P meters in Garden Oaks.

HL&P did install (at no charge) a radio frequency meter which does not require a meter reader to enter a customer's yard. At my request, Entex also installed the same type of equipment (again at no charge).

I encourage each resident to watch the actions of the HL&P meter reader and to consider requesting the radio frequency meters from HL&P & Entex.

From the reports I received August's National Night Out was a big success. Our block party had about 40 persons attend and rumors were floating around that 200 people attended a party in the 500 block of West 32nd. Hope you all took advantage to get out and meet your neighbors new and old.

Home security is always a concern. One way to make your home safer is lighting the exterior at night and placing large numbers on the front of your residence which can be read at night by emergency crews.

The remaining reported crimes were Burglaries of Motor Vehicles occuring 6/15/98 in the 700 block of Garden Oaks Blvd at 1:00 pm; 6/19/98 in the 900 block of W. 42nd at 10:30 am; and 6/30/98 in the 1000 block of W. 41st at 12:11 am.


We are beginning this year with some notable accomplishments that will benefit our community. With our dedicated faculty, staff and parents, we are ranked "Recognized" by the State of Texas, and "Exemplary" again by HISD. Our students make us very proud.

Thanks to our Civic Club, State Representative Ken Yarbrough, and Gary and Joan Harmon . . . the neighborhood now has a drinking fountain in the SPARK Park.

At the end of last year, our school won the "Outstanding School Volunteer Program" for the Northwest District. We have super volunteers from both the school and the community helping again this year on our campus!

In addition, we wrote an Academics 2000 grant and included eight other elementary schools and the Magnet School for Teaching Professions. We won! The grant will provide us with the Waterford Program for early reading intervention in kindergarten and first grades. With this program, we will use technology and books to help us reach our goal: to have all students reading on grade level by the end of third grade. Students from the magnet program and from the University of Houston Graduate School of Education will be assisting with this grant. It will also provide us with teacher training and help with our Family Reading Nights.

Finally, we again accepted School Choice transfers this year. We received so many that HISD turned down many requests to attend our school. They tell me we have a reputation around the district for being a great school. We couldn't do it without your support!

WATER AT THE PARK

On August 4, dedication of the first drinking fountain at SPARK Park at GO Elementary took place. In attendance were, GO Principal Eugenia Daniels; Director of the SPARK Park Program, Kathleen Ownby, State Rep. Ken Yarbrough; and our very own Craig Lee, Joan Harmon, and Gary Harmon.

At the June Civic Club meeting Joan Harmon outlined the project and requested the funding. The motion passed and the project began. After obtaining approval from the HISD Schools, Grounds Maintenance Dept., Plumbing Dept., the City Parks and Rec. Dept., Public Works, etc., Gary Harmon also supervised the installation. Ms. Ownby, head of the SPARK Program, was very familiar with our neighborhood and the park. She had read the Leader's May article about "The Principal's Oaks" planting (another Harmon project) and really liked it. She offered to help cover part of the cost with funds from the SPARK Park Program.

Four hose bibs, recessed in locking valve boxes, have been strategically located to provide irrigation. The drinking fountain was placed near the picnic tables and playground equipment. When problems arose locating the parts for the fountain, State Representative Ken Yarbrough was called in to help. Ken attended the June Civic Club meeting and was a master plumber by trade. He made a few calls to the City on our behalf. Not only was the problem solved, but we received expert assistance on the installation from the Parks Dept.

Mrs. Harmon has almost finalized the total cost and is submitting copies of invoices to Ms. Ownby for reimbursement to the Civic Club. The preliminary estimate is, after reimbursement, a total cost to Garden Oaks of \$60. We owe Joan and Gary a standing ovation for their determination and perseverance in completing this wonderful improvement to our neighborhood.

I'd like to thank Janice Walden & Sheila Briones for developing the plan and for championing the work on the proposed "Rose Garden" in the entrance park on W. 34th. Please be sure to read Janice's article discussing their plans. Once an irrigation system is installed this fall, we need volunteers to mow the park on a regular basis. The City will no longer provide that service for fear of damaging sprinkler heads. Please get in touch with Janice (869-6534) to be involved.

We've had great success with the plantings at the Triangle Park on Azalea and Alba because of the diligent watering of the residents. The purple plumed grass has been a real standout and the grass has remained green for the first time in years!

The ends of the Esplanade on Garden Oaks Blvd. look great but the middle is suffering because of inconsistent watering. Trees & shrubs that looked good a month ago look as though they may not make it, and we won't know for sure until next spring. A battery controlled timer will be installed in the fall but until then, we've got to keep watering as often as possible. If you live on the Boulevard, and you become aware of a broken or malfunctioning head, PLEASE call us so we can get it fixed (694-5934)! If we do lose trees & shrubs, the fatalities will not be replaced.

D. J.'s Lawn Service has been diligently mowing the Gazebo Park once a month. That park could also use more water. Turning the irrigation system on is very easy, so if you are interested in helping keep it watered, please call and we'll be happy to show you how.

THE CITY PAYS FOR ALL THE WATER IN THE PARKS, SO FUNDS ARE NOT USED OUT OF THE CIVIC CLUB'S BUDGET.



Thanks to those who called after seeing my plea for pine needles to use as mulch in the parks throughout the neighborhood. I need to clarify some points:

- The pine needles are not being obtained for my personal use, but for the beds in the parks to keep the weed production down.
- When we purchase pine straw commercially, it comes in bales. Putting it in bags is PERFECTLY acceptable and easier for us to handle. Even though we have a small pickup, we cannot accept the pine straw loose...it needs to be bagged.
- The need for pine straw will be ongoing year round, so PLEASE call us at 694-5934. We will come get the bags!

Roses are distinguished by age and type. Examples of types of roses are: Teas, Chinas, Bourbons, and Floribundas. Ages are described below, and referenced beside the name of each rose offered here for the **34th Street Memorial Rose Garden**.

Antique Roses predate end of the Civii War (1867). They have stood the test of time, and developed as hardy, commonly pest and maintenance-free roses. Some are ideally suited for Texas, having been introduced to the terra firma of Central Texas by the early German immigrants.

Victorian Roses generally dating between 1867 and 1927.

Modern Roses generally dating after 1927.



1. Old Blush (1752)

This fragrant china rose is considered a common old rose that grows to a height of between 3-6 feet. A repeat bloomer, Old Blush blooms too quickly and often to cut. Lilac pink blooms in loose clusters turn darker.

2. Mrs. B.R. Cant (1901)

Named for the wife of rose breeder and nurseryman Benjamin Cant, this fragrant, repeat-blooming tea rose has a cabbagey flower of medium pink. Ranging in size from 5-8 feet, Mrs. B.R. Cant is a steady bloomer, and makes a superb cut flower.

3. Archduke Charles (predates 1837)

This repeat-blooming, fragrant antique rose is "as changeable as a chameleon". Its pink buds open up to crimson blooms. A neat, erect bush growing to 3-5 feet.

4. Le Vesuve (1825)

This fragrant, repeat-blooming china rose bears large, fully double flowers of lilac pink. A vigorous grower that will easily grow between 3-5 feet.

5. Belinda's Dream (1992)

"The perfect rose", according to Margaret Sharpe of the Texas Rose Rustlers. A modern, medium-pink, fragrant repeat-bloomer that grows as an upright, sturdy shrub of 3-6 feet in size.

6. York & Lancaster (pre-dates 1629)

This old European Rose is related to the red and white Tudor Rose of the famous "War of the Roses". Like the Tudor, York & Lancaster symbolizes the union of two feuding families in marriage. The result is a bicolored rose of a luscious light pink that is fragrant and blooms in spring (when else for romance?). A grand, old garden rose growing 6-8 feet in size.

7. Mlle. Franziska Kruger (1880)

A popular Victorian tea rose with apricot/yellow flowers. A prolific repeat bloomer. Fragrant. Shrub grows 3-5 feet.

8. **Valentine** (1951)

Imagine Ava Gardner in a swirled red velvet dress, and you have "Valentine", a rich scarlet rose born of the '50's. Established in several gardens in Garden Oaks, this popular red rose is tolerant of heat, humidity, insects and disease. A love with few thorns.
