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Save Our Swales Joe Muscara, Gazette Editor

In a previous editorial, I talked about our rural, park-like design in Garden Oaks. Part of that design is our swales (don't call them ditches). I think they are an important part of what makes Garden Oaks so appealing. If we had curbs and gutters, the rainwater would just go down the drain. Instead, the swales provide additional watering for our plants and trees, and the water gets a sort of filtering before it goes away. Also, it has been recently realized that in many cases, our city's bayous did better having some retention capability and curves instead of trying to flow the water quickly out of the area. Our swales can perform similarly.

Another nice aspect of the swales is that our streets aren't part of the drainage system in the same way that they are in other parts of Houston, except as a very last resort. Note how they lowered Alba to be part of the drainage system. While I can't say if the overall capacity of the system from lowering Alba and replacing the drains underground is more or less (I believe the overall capacity did increase), Alba is now distinctly part of the drainage system and might be more likely to flood during intense events. Golf will be next.

Yes, the streets can get messy like it has been this past winter with the rains we had as well as all the construction. But my observation has been that when things grow back in spring, things get cleaned up. The mess is only temporary. The other problem is that in some places, the height of the street is lower than the grass and dirt on the side, which prevents some of the water from draining off the street surface and into the swale. This issue can be fixed without digging out the swale itself, especially if the problem is at the shallow end of the swale. The swales are supposed to be deepest at the drains and shallowest around the midpoint between the drains. That's why the City's requirement for 24" culverts under the driveways is wrong for us. It's created spots in our swales where water pools and doesn't drain "downstream" properly. If all the swales are dug out to meet this 24" requirement, then we will end up with swales that don't drain because they are the same depth their entire length. We should have fought that requirement before the City implemented it.

But my favorite aspect of the swales is how they, along with the easements, make our neighborhood look greener and much more park-like.

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Garden Oaks Civic Club Meeting Minutes

March 5, 2019

Location: Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet (GOMM)

Joe Casarez, GOCC President, called the meeting to order at 7:06 pm.

New attendee Linda Kelly introduced herself. She is a principal intern, working with Dr. Pollock at GOMM. She stated that the dedication of the new campus is scheduled for 10am, April 4.

Guest Speaker: Tonya Knauth, attorney, gave an informative presentation entitled "Planning for Incapacity and Death". She emphasized the financial and emotional importance of planning for future incapacity and estate administration at death.

It is critical to have a legal will, so that assets can be transferred to intended beneficiaries at death. The executor(s) should be named, along with a guardian and trustee for minor children. Without a will, the court will appoint a guardian for minor children and the estate will go to the closest living relative(s) as defined by Texas law. The court will also appoint an administrator. Tonya estimates that costs incurred for settling an estate without a will are approximately three times those incurred with a will. Know your estate net worth. Review your will every five years. An interesting Q&A session followed.

Business Meeting

A motion to approve last month's minutes was made and seconded. The minutes were approved.

Committee Reports

GOMO: Kip Noser reported that property owners in Sections 1,2,3 and 5, and those who paid transfer fees should have received hardcopy bankruptcy plans via USPS, along with a voting ballot. If you did not receive a packet, download one from gardenoaks.org or contact Johnie Patterson. Johnie must receive your vote by noon, April 1, 2019 to be valid. A GOMO Town Hall meeting is scheduled for March 20 at 7 pm at GOMM to answer questions. Deed restriction questions can also be emailed to drs@gardenoaks.org.

Treasurer: Teresa Coleman presented a hardcopy of her treasurer's report. Comparison of Jan/Feb 2018 vs 2019 showed that 2019 constable and civic club income is down. Expenses are also lower.

Constable Patrol: No report.

Beautification: No report.

Garden Oaks Website: Pam Parks reported that the site is updated daily. Check www.gardenoaks.org for GOMO bankruptcy as well as current and proposed deed restriction documents.

Citizen Patrol: Mark Saranie reported that no incidents were recorded for February! We need more patrollers. Please volunteer if you can.

Membership: Brenda de Alba said there are 212 civic club members and 224 constable supporters signed up to date in 2019. Gazette: Joe Casarez reported that delivery of the March *Gazette* was delayed due to printing errors. April articles are due by Friday, March 15, 2019.

Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet School: Joe Casarez re-emphasized that the GOMM dedication is scheduled for April 4 at 10 am.

Government Affairs / GO CIP: Tonya Knauth reported that neighborhood infrastructure issues, such as street repairs, can be reported to Ellen Cohen's office. Tonya also mentioned that the GOCC September candidate forum will be open to all.

Section 1 Commercial Development: Carrie Arnett said that the Gulf Coast Commercial Group has obtained the required number of Section 1 signatures to allow commercial building on the GOBC parking lot between Gabby's and Chase Bank, with a Declaration of Restrictions. Montessori and Exceptionalities

Dr. Maria Montessori developed her educational methodology working with special needs students in the most impoverished conditions of Bergamo, Italy. There she founded the Casa de Bambini where the advancement of the children became renowned in Italy and around the world. Today, at Garden Oaks Montessori, we serve a diverse student population including children with learning differences included alongside typical students.

If you suspect that your child may have an exceptionality that is impacting their success at school, meet with your child's teacher and express your concern(s). Work together with the teacher to develop a plan of action in the classroom. If you continue to see your child struggle in school, ask to speak with the intervention chairperson at the school or a school administrator. At the meeting, review the causes for your concerns. As a parent, you may request an evaluation or screening to address the causes of your child's challenges. Challenges at school may include academic and behavioral challenges that are impeding typical development. In fact, you may also request evaluation if your child is 3 years of age but not vet enrolled in school. You can find out more about that free service called Child Find at the Houston ISD website https://www.houstonisd.org/Page/167796. Depending on the results of your request and evaluation, your child may be identified for Special Education or 504 services or may not qualify for services.

It is in this process that many parents ask about the difference between 504 and Special Education. Both avenues provide free support and services at school. Generally, if your child qualifies for special education, they will receive services through the Special Education department at the campus. These services may include special classes/support either inside or outside of the classroom during the school day. Students qualifying for support through 504 services are covered by different legal parameters and may also qualify for services such as Dyslexia classes at school. I recommend this website that compares the two programs side-by-side: https:// www.understood.org/en/school-learning/specialservices/504-plan/the-difference-between-ieps-and-504plans. The accommodations under both programs are free at school and are available in all academic settings including college and graduate school. In fact, one of my family members attending medical school received accommodations and graduated with honors. There is no need to think that having a learning difference is something to "overcome" or "grow out of". By recognizing exceptionalities and providing support for children early, it is more likely that students will develop healthy strategies to be successful at school. By working together, schools and families can intervene early and help students realize their full potential.

Dr. Montessori designed her educational methodology with students' exceptionalities in mind. She found that her method of observing students and responding to their individualities supported the development of creativity, problem-solving, critical thinking, time management skills and care for one another and the environment. All of these appealed to childrens' various learning preferences and provided various opportunities to access the material in different ways. Students create meaning through real-world applications/projects and hands-on materials in a calm and inviting environment that emphasizes grace and courtesy to one another and to our environment. These can be very helpful aspects of education for a child with a learning difference. Additionally, "brain breaks" and the opportunity to access healthy snacks during the day can also help children with learning differences. Understanding Air Filters

Air filters come in the following three categories:

(1) Paper/fibrous material air filters

These are the most familiar. They are constructed of heavyweight paper with fiberglass interiors and can be purchased at big box hardware stores. On the low end they each cost about \$1.00, and are only good for collecting large particles such as pet hair.

In the mid-range are ones costing around \$3.00 apiece. Some have loose — not tight — pleating and are great at collecting a variety of contaminates including dust, pollen, spores, pet hair and dander, etc. These are the ones I recommend, especially for homeowners who are willing to change their own filters once a month.

There are some fibrous filters on the market that have thick, very tightly pleated media and cost about \$17.00 each. Stay away from these filters! Proper air flow is absolutely essential, and thick media means restricted air flow. This can cause all sorts of problems including diminished efficiency, higher utility bills, and shortened lifespan of the system's compressor.


(2) Electrostatic air filters

These are commonly found in both free-standing room units or incorporated within a central AC system. They are one-inch thick, washable air filters. Though washable, they will never become completely clean. Long-term usage and repeated unsuccessful cleanings result in a clogged filter that prevents needed air flow. I do not recommend these either.

(3) Electronic air filters

In electronic filtering, the particles receive a physical charge and are removed by being attracted to the opposite charge within a contained system. The collected dust and particles must still be removed, and some designs include canisters that are emptied and cleaned. This can be done by your service technician.


