Wine Walk Tickets on Sale August 15th Sponsorships Available Now

The 11th Annual Constable Program fundraiser, the Garden Oaks Wine Walk, is scheduled for Saturday, October 19th from 4 to 6:30 pm. Both event tickets and Wine Pull tickets will go on sale on Eventbrite on August 15th: <https://2019ww.eventbrite.com>. We only sell 200 event tickets, so make sure you get your tickets early!

For those who may be new to the neighborhood, the Wine Walk is one of our most anticipated happenings. It's a wine/beer and food tasting extravaganza held in a huge and lavishly landscaped yard here in Garden Oaks. Eleven different tables are stationed all around the yard, each serving a different wine (and a Plonk! beer tasting tent), along with foods. The tables are hosted by GO residents and nearby businesses, all of whom have been long time supporters. Table hosts provide the libations and foods at their own expense. We are very fortunate that all the table hosts are returning from last year! These folks are the backbone of the event – without them, we'd have no Wine Walk.

All funds raised go directly to GOCC to pay for our two Harris County Precinct One deputies. The Constable Program is funded entirely by contributions from residents. Each contract costs about \$75,000 annually. Residents have not contributed enough to cover the cost, so hence, the annual fundraiser. Last year's Wine Walk generated some \$36,000.

Wine Walk revenues come mainly from cash sponsorships paid by area residents and businesses. This year sponsorships are available at the \$300, \$500, \$1000, \$1500, and \$2500 levels. Please check out the sponsor benefits detailed inside the back cover of the *Gazette*. Sponsorships may be purchased online at gardenoaks.org. It's a great way to visibly support our neighborhood! Our first paid sponsor this year is Terry Jeanes – RE/Max Metro at the \$1000 level. Thank you, Terry!

Fall for Crepe Myrtles

Thinking of crepe myrtles brings to mind an array of beautiful colored blooms. But look at these classic trees in fall and the brilliant blooms will be replaced by orange, red, and yellow foliage. Leaves emerge in the spring and, as the weather warms, the foliage hardens off and turns dark green. Then, when the temperatures drop in the fall, leaves gradually transform from green to sparkling fall hues. The chart below will assist in choosing a tree by its fall foliage.

SELECTION	SIZE	FALL COLOR	BLOOM
Acoma	10 feet	purple-red	white
Centennial Spirit	20 feet	red-orange	dark red
Chickasaw	3 to 5 feet	bronze-red	pink-lavender
Dynamite	20+ feet	red-orange	cherry red
Hopi	7 feet	orange-red to dark red	pink
Natchez	30 feet	orange-red	pure white
Tuscarora	25 feet	red-orange	dark pink
Tuskegee	20 feet	bright orange-red	deep pink to red
Victor	3 feet	reddish yellow	dark red
Yuma	15 feet	yellowish to brownish red	medium lavender
Zuni	9 feet	orange-red to dark red	medium lavender

Crepe myrtles need full sun to perform their best. They will grow in shade, but blooms will be sparse, and plants will get leggy. These hardy trees have few pest or disease problems, and they require little water and fertilizer once they are established.

Crepe myrtles need minimal pruning. Some gardeners top them annually, but this ruins their natural shape and beauty. Remove the sucker growth that sometimes appears around the base. Only prune to shape trees or to remove any cross branching.

New attendees, Brad and Lacy, introduced themselves. Audience members shared their varied experiences about living in Garden Oaks.

Mark Flores, candidate for Texas' 18th Congressional District, spoke briefly. Mark was invited to return and speak at the GOCC candidates' forum scheduled for September/October.

Guest Speaker: Jay Tatum, Garden Oaks resident and recent past board member of Houston First Corp, was guest speaker. Houston First, formed in 2011, promotes the Houston region as a world-renowned convention, trade show, and performance arts center. Houston First is responsible for the daily operations, maintenance and licensing of 10 city-owned buildings, including the George R. Brown Convention Center, Jones Hall, Wortham Center, and Miller Outdoor Theatre. Additionally, it manages parking for the Theatre District and Toyota Center.

In 2017, Hurricane Harvey caused catastrophic damage to several Houston First properties, mainly the Wortham Center and Jones Hall. George R Brown Convention center hosted thousands of unexpected evacuees. Members and numerous volunteers worked for months to aid the city's recovery. Visit www.houstonfirst.com for more details.

Business Meeting

Membership: Dian Austin was absent. No report.

GOMM: Dr Pollock reported that summer school will end July 3. She projects that ~900 students will enroll for the 2019-2020 school year. The first day of school is August 26, 2019.

Government Affairs / GO CIP: Tonya Knauth was absent. No report.

Section 1 Commercial Development: Carrie Arnett said that the property sale has closed and the declaration of restrictions has been accepted. As per the new owner, permitting continues, with construction to start late in August. Leasing continues.

New Business: Candelario Cervantez, nearby resident, announced that he is running for City Council, District C. He thanked meeting attendees for their civic encouragement. Candelario was invited to speak at the upcoming candidates' forum.

The next GOCC meeting will be held on August 6, 7 pm, at GOMM.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:14 pm.

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26th Annual Garden Oaks Montessori Pancake Breakfast Silent Auction and Carnival MOVES to the FALL – October 5th

One of our community's most popular traditions and annual gatherings is **moving to the first Saturday in October!** HISD's **Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet is moving the annual Pancake Breakfast and Silent Auction to October 5th.** This is the extravaganza where volunteers serve up thousands of free pancakes each year. The carnival returns again after the tremendous reviews received from attendees last year. Join us from 8:00-10:30 am Saturday, October 5th, at 901 Sue Barnett Drive.

Volunteer dads and granddads will fire up the griddle while hot Katz's coffee will be poured and thousands of dollars' worth of donated goods and services will be auctioned off – all to support a public school with a lengthy waiting list. Prospective student applications have surged immensely since the school became an all-

campus Montessori magnet program serving Pre-Kindergarten through eighth grade.

In addition to **free** pancakes, syrup, sausage and coffee, a carnival amusement park will be ready for children that will include bounce houses, an obstacle course, rock wall, craft stations, potato sack races, ping pong and much, much more! Wristbands will be pre-sold for \$10, and \$15 at the door.

While the kids are having fun, attendees are encouraged to bid on auction items as GOMM depends upon the generous donations and participation in the silent auction as well as sales from the carnival to raise money for the school. These funds are essential to the success of the Montessori program. PBSA is an annual community event and a neighborhood tradition. "It is wonderful to

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see the generosity of neighbors, parents and donors in making this event a success year after year," explains Amabelle Cowan, PTO President. Sponsored by the GOMM Parent Teacher Organization (PTO), the pancake breakfast helps cover school initiatives such as fine arts residencies and technology upgrades as well as resurfacing the walking track in the Spark Park, a space enjoyed by so many members of the community. Other key priorities among the school's needs are scholarships for three-year-old Pre-K students, Montessori teacher training, field trips, as well as outdoor classrooms such as the newly installed pond facing Sue Barnett.

"We will be celebrating with the community the completion of construction and the growth of our diverse, public Montessori program. Dr. Maria Montessori wrote about maximizing each child's unique abilities, and that's what we strive to do at GOMM every day," explains Principal Pollock. Enrollment this year tops 900 students attending Garden Oaks, up from 575 in 2011 when a \$3 million U.S. Department of Education grant paved the transition to an All-Montessori Magnet with an emphasis on environmental sciences. More than 1,000 applicants already fill the waiting list for 2019-2020 school year.

Tradition of fellowship for 26 years!

During the breakfast and before the popular auction ends, entertainment and kids' activities fill the school grounds, while parents and community members give guided tours of classrooms and gardens that include vegetable, herb, and native beds sprinkled throughout the tree-lined campus.

"It's truly a wonderful tradition of fellowship – one that brings out volunteers, parents, school neighbors, and elected officials to celebrate a rare public Montessori institution that serves a diverse socioeconomic student body," explained Mark Klein, a parent at the school. "The success of the breakfast says a lot about the local community. They believe in the power of a public Montessori school choice. And their generosity and support has helped make Garden Oaks Montessori one of HISD's most popular schools, drawing families from all walks of life."

Like many other dads, Klein has been cooking pancakes for the event since his daughter, now in high school,

started at the school in Pre-K 3, back when only a few classrooms featured Montessori education.

An orientation session for parents and community members interested in Montessori education will be held at 9:00 am in the gymnasium. Bidding for the silent auction closes at 10:30 am. 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

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
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Montessori Education and Social Justice

This month we celebrate the birth of Dr. Maria Montessori. She was born on August 31, 1879. It is thanks to her that we practice Montessori at Garden Oaks today. One of the core tenets of Montessori education is founded on Dr. Montessori's belief in social justice. Her vision of justice was always a vision of a future just world, brought about by a change in our relations to children. She said, "The child is both the hope and promise of mankind." While she was a visionary, she made it her mission to make changes that would benefit the world for years to come.

Maria Montessori fought for social justice from the very beginning. Before the first Casa dei Bambini in 1907, Montessori was already widely known as an advocate for social reform and the rights of children, and as an early feminist, speaking at national and international women's

conferences in 1896, 1899, and 1908. She spoke about and advocated for equal pay, equal social status, and voting rights for women, and for the rights of all children, but especially children with disabilities. Her book *Education and Peace* collects a career's worth of speeches and writings about education as a force for social change which could bring about a more peaceful world, with just relations throughout humanity.

As a parent, you may ask, what can I do to support social justice with my children? Here are a few ideas:

1. Encourage your children to make a difference. Children at all ages need to know that they matter! Regardless of age, everyone can do something to help make the world a better place. Here is a website that provides examples of children who are making a difference: <https://www.thebarefootmommy.com/2018/03/marley-dias-lessons-kid-activists/>
2. Talk about current events with your children. There is a great deal of news that is stressful and hard to understand for young people. Talk to the children in your life about the news and brainstorm ways to help people who are faced with challenges and injustice.

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3. Connect with organizations that are helping others. Currently, there are many groups working to assist with the humanitarian issues at our borders. Find out how you can help those who are suffering.
4. Read stories with your children about activists around the world and ways that people are helping others. Talk to your children about peace and compassion. Help them understand the promise of negotiation and working together with others to find solutions.
5. Remember that everyday reflections and conversations make indelible marks on your child(ren). Take time to talk together, eat together and share uninterrupted time together!

In 1961, Pope Paul VI made an urgent appeal: "If you want peace, work for justice." And today, the social justice movement says, "if you want justice, why not start today?" Celebrate the birth of Dr. Maria Montessori by making a difference in the world around you!

Choosing a Home Generator: Portable vs. Stand-by (Part 1 of 3)

During every hurricane season, many people want to know my thoughts on purchasing a generator.

Home generators are designed to handle power outages. They run on fuels such as gasoline, diesel, natural gas, and propane. At the very least, the generator should have enough capacity to run your refrigerator, a couple of lamps and fans, plus any special medical equipment required.

A portable generator may be the answer

The most economical way to supply emergency electricity is via a portable generator. The smallest generator for household use should supply at least 4,000 watts (4 kilowatts) of power. It could probably run a refrigerator, a fan, one light, and perhaps your TV.

Portable generators are powered by gasoline or a propane tank – the same type used for large outdoor grills. Propane can be a good choice because gas stations are often closed

immediately after a hurricane, and you have to use a fuel stabilizer to help maintain stored gasoline. Propane is much more stable and does not require any additives.

A portable generator is a lot like a lawn mower – it is started by pulling a cord. One very important consideration is who in your household has the strength to start it. Portable generators also produce pollution – both air and noise.

Please note that **no** portable generator should be operated inside or near windows, doors, or any other area that could allow deadly fumes such as carbon monoxide to seep into your home. A suggested safe distance is at least 10 feet away. Heavy-duty extension cords will have to run from the generator into the house for appliances.

Prices range from about \$350 for an economical, no-name model that produces 4,000-watts to \$2,000 for an 8,000-watt, top-end unit. They can be purchased online – many with free shipping – or at any big-box hardware store.
