Let's Get The Red To Rise in our Constable Supporter Thermometers.

We are only at the contribution level for one deputy, rather than the current two deputies we now have patrolling the neighborhood and surrounding areas. As we go to print, residents have contributed \$83,508 for 2019. Each contract with Harris County Precinct One costs about \$75,000 annually. We have a long way to go two cover two deputies. Each contract provides a professional law enforcement deputy who patrols our neighborhood and its perimeter 40 hours per week.

## School Safety Tips

It is back to school time and that means school zones will be in effect! Garden Oaks Montessori (GOMM) serves children three years old to 8th grade. Our school hours for the 2019-20 school year are 8:30 am - 3:50 pm, Monday thru Friday.

The following are some safety reminders for driving in school zones from the National Safety Council:

- Put away your cell phone. Cell phone use is banned in active school zones, and violators face fines of up to \$200 in school zones where signs are posted.
- Don't block the crosswalk when stopped at a red light or waiting to make a turn, forcing pedestrians to go around you; this could put them in the path of moving traffic.
- In a school zone when flashers are blinking, stop and yield to pedestrians crossing the crosswalk or intersection.
- Always stop for a crossing guard holding up a stop sign. Note that there are five crossing guards for our school.
  - 1. Sue Barnett and W. 43rd
  - 2. Sue Barnett and W. 41st
  - 3. Sue Barnett and Garden Oaks Blvd.
  - 4. Sue Barnett and W. 39th
  - 5. Sue Barnett and W. 38th
- Take extra care to look out for children in school zones, near playgrounds and parks, and in all residential areas.
- Don't honk or rev your engine to scare a pedestrian, even if you have the right of way.
- Never pass a vehicle stopped for pedestrians.
- Always use extreme caution to avoid striking pedestrians wherever they may be, no matter who has the right of way.
- If you're driving behind a bus, allow a greater following distance than if you were driving behind a car. It will give you more time to stop once the yellow lights start flashing. It is illegal in all 50 states to pass a school bus that is stopped to load or unload children. Although GOMM does not have

- many buses, there are many in our area!
- Never pass a bus from either direction if you're on an undivided road – if it is stopped to load or unload children.
- If the yellow or red lights are flashing and the stop arm is extended, traffic must stop.
- The area 10 feet around a school bus is the most dangerous for children; stop far enough back to allow them space to safely enter and exit the bus.
- Be alert; children often are unpredictable, and they tend to ignore hazards and take risks.

On most roads, bicyclists have the same rights and responsibilities as vehicles, but bikes can be hard to see. Children riding bikes create special problems for drivers because usually they are not able to properly determine traffic conditions. The most common cause of collision is a driver turning left in front of a bicyclist.

- When passing a bicyclist, proceed in the same direction slowly, and leave 3 feet between your car and the cyclist.
- When turning left and a bicyclist is approaching in the opposite direction, wait for the rider to pass.
- If you're turning right and a bicyclist is approaching from behind on the right, let the rider go through the intersection first, and always use your turn signals.
- Watch for bike riders turning in front of you without looking or signaling; children especially have a tendency to do this.
- Be extra vigilant in school zones and residential neighborhoods.
- Watch for bikes coming from driveways or behind parked cars.
- Check side mirrors before opening your door.

By exercising a little extra care and caution, drivers and pedestrians can co-exist safely in school zones.

## Garden Oaks Civic Club Meeting Minutes

August 6, 2019

**Location**: Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet (GOMM)

Tonya Knauth, GOCC Vice President, called the meeting to order at 7:05 pm.

New attendee, Section 3 resident Jean Valka, introduced herself.

District C City Council candidates Shelley Kennedy, Mary Jane Smith, Candelario Cervantez, and Greg Meyers presented short summaries of their concerns and issues. They were invited to participate in the October candidate forum.

Audia Jones, a candidate for Harris County DA, briefly summarized her platform.

**Guest Speaker**: Randy Odinet, Garden Oaks resident and project director with the Memorial Park Conservancy, was guest speaker. He gave an update on the many happenings in the park.

In 2015, Memorial Park Conservancy, along with the city of Houston, instituted a 10-year Master Plan to enhance, restore, and maintain the park. This multi-million dollar initiative provided a framework to re-purpose and ecologically restore many areas that were devastated during the 2011 drought and subsequent pine beetle infestation.

The Master Plan includes three capital improvement areas: the Eastern Glades, a multi-use sports complex, and a new land bridge.

Eastern Glades development was undertaken first. Wetlands and lake construction continues, but visitors can currently enjoy new picnic gathering areas, pavilions, restrooms, and an updated running track in this ~100 acre area in the SE part of the park.

The sports fields, currently based in the south part of the park, will be relocated to the park's NE corner, near I10.

This second plan component will begin in 2020. Several multi-use fields and courts, including parking, will be established.

The third and final phase, the land bridge over Memorial Drive, will connect the north and south sides of the park. Additional wetlands and prairie habitats will be reintroduced to the area. Anticipated completion is late 2022.

Both paid and free parking is implemented. Patrons use paid parking (\$1 for three hours), at "convenience" spots, such as the tennis and golf parking areas.

#### **Business Meeting**

A motion to approve last month's minutes was made and seconded. The minutes were approved.

**Treasurers Report**: Teresa Coleman provided copies of her report. She reiterated that her Constable Patrol income reflects funds received in 2019. This is different from the neighborhood thermometers that report Constable funds raised for 2019, some of which was received in 2018.

#### **Committee Reports**

Constable Patrol: Terry Jeanes reported that to date \$82,208 has been raised for the 2019 Constable Program. The Gulf Coast Development Group has pledged a \$25,000 one-time donation toward this effort. Local businesses benefit greatly from the Constable patrol.

Be vigilant. A neighbor living in the 800 block of W. 41st woke up to his wheel-less truck last month. Early morning walkers witnessed the thieves in action but thought they were construction workers.

National Night Out is Tuesday, Oct 1.

Nikki Martin, paid Constable supporter, won a \$100 El Tiempo gift card, generously donated by Missy Alwais.

Terry introduced Deputy Desiree Pesina and Cpl Santos Torres. They encouraged everyone to sign up for vacation watch, to be vigilant in school zones, and to report suspicious activity. They are aware of issues with transients near Garden Oaks.

Five thermometer-type signs throughout the neighborhood show current fund-raising levels.

**Beautification**: Joan Harmon was absent. Teresa Coleman mentioned a volunteer workday in Gazebo Park scheduled for Saturday August 10.

**Garden Oaks Website**: Pam Parks reported that all is good. Teresa emphasized that GOCC will cover hosting and security costs for the www.gardenoaks.org website for the next 12 months. Anticipated costs are about \$600.

**Citizen Patrol**: Mark Saranie was absent. Tonya reminded all to volunteer if possible. Check www.gardenoaks.org for information on the VIP program.

**Membership:** Dian Austin reported 246 paid Civic club members and 300 Constable supporters. Wine Walk tickets (proceeds benefit the Constable patrol) are on sale now. Sponsorships are available! To date, seven sponsors have stepped up.

*Gazette*: Joe Muscara was absent. Tonya reminded all that September articles are due August 15, 2019. Send submissions to gazette@gardenoaks.org.

**GOMM**: Dr Pollock reported that 2019-2020 school enrollment is at capacity. The first day of school is August 26, 2019. Teachers report August 12. Traffic during pickup and drop-off times is expected to be high. Avoid the area around Sue Barnett between 38th and 41st until smooth traffic patterns are in place once school is underway.

School buildings are getting new roofs.

The pancake breakfast and silent auction is scheduled for October 5 and sponsorships are available.

**Government Affairs / GO CIP**: Tonya Knauth did not have any new information.

**Section 1 Commercial Development**: The parking lot is now owned by Gulf Coast Development Corp.

**New Business:** Brenda de Alba reported that there will not be a 2020 Home and Garden Tour. Volunteer support has waned. If you were a previous tour sponsor and love

Garden Oaks, please consider a sponsorship to the Wine Walk, scheduled for October 19, from 4 to 6:30 pm. Thanks to Ed and Brenda de Alba for once again hosting the Wine Walk in their beautiful yard.

If you have new neighborhood fundraising ideas, we'd like to hear them.

The Civic Club, in coordination with Super Neighborhood 12, will host two candidate forums. A mayoral forum is scheduled for September 3rd at 7 pm in the GOMM gym. All candidates have confirmed their attendance.

The second forum will be held for City Council District C candidates on Wednesday October 2 at 7 pm in the GOMM gym.

A hearty shout out to Brothers Pizzeria for their continued, generous monthly pizza donations to our meeting attendees! Twenty-three people went home with full stomachs. Support local businesses. We all benefit.

The next GOCC meeting will be the City of Houston Mayoral Candidate Forum and will be held on September 3rd, 7 pm, at Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet School in the gym.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:16 pm.





## Choosing a Home Generator: Portable vs. Stand-by (Part 2 of 3)

One of the main benefits in choosing a portable generator is that it's portable, so you can use it while camping, operating power tools outside, or after a weather emergency when electricity is temporarily unavailable. Another plus is that portable generators use a variety of fuels, with propane being the most convenient and easiest to obtain.

The cons include that it creates a lot of noise while running and the fumes can be toxic. A portable generator also requires constant monitoring and fuel refilling.

#### Another choice — Automatic Stand-by Generator

An automatic stand-by generator is a back-up electrical system that operates whether you are home or away. It's ready and within seconds of an electrical outage, automatically supplies power directly to your home's circuit breaker box. Once electricity is restored, the

generator shuts itself off and waits for the next outage.

Stand-by generators operate on natural gas or liquid propane (LP) gas and sit in the yard just like your central A/C system's outside condenser.

The American Red Cross recommends the stand-by generator over a portable generator as the superior method to provide back-up power to your home for several reasons. First, when installed correctly, it leaves your home free of potentially deadly carbon monoxide, unlike a portable generator. Also, it's less expensive to run via natural gas than using gasoline for a portable generator. It eliminates the hassle of hauling a portable generator outside or running extension cords throughout your home. And finally, a stand-by generator starts automatically after a power outage, whether you are home or not, and turns itself off when utility power is restored.
