Creativity

How is creativity being impacted in our children in an increasingly digital world? Rachael Rettner recently wrote an article on the Live Science.com website stating, "It sounds like the complaint of a jaded adult: Kids these days are narrow-minded and just not as creative as they used to be."

But researchers say they are finding exactly that. In a 2010 study of about 300,000 creativity tests going back to the 1970s, Kyung Hee Kim, a creativity researcher at the College of William and Mary, found creativity has decreased among American children in recent years. Since 1990, children have become less able to produce unique and unusual ideas. They are also less humorous, less imaginative, and less able to elaborate on ideas.

"It's not that creativity can necessarily disappear," said Ron Beghetto, an education psychologist at the University of Oregon, "but it can be suppressed in particular contexts." Children today have less exposure to free play, exploration outside, or creating games and toys to play with as urbanization, factory made toys, and technology have rapidly replaced these opportunities for children to create their own entertainment. Additionally, children spend less time in conversation and in exchanging ideas with others as tablets have replaced these interactions. But all is not lost, as experts agree that it is possible to cultivate creativity. Here are a few ideas to use at home from PsychCentral https://psychcentral.com/blog/9-ways-to-support-your-childs-creativity/.

- Designate a space for creating.
- Keep it simple.
- · Allow for "free time".
- Help your kids activate their senses.
- · Discuss creativity.
- Cultivate creative critical thinking.
- Avoid managing (non-judgmental feedback or comments).
- Help kids find and pursue their passions.

If you are interested in learning more, you may find the book *Cup* a valuable resource as the authors expand on the subject of cultivating children's creativity. The book covers the work of two educators who studied children and the multitudes of innovative projects that could be built around simple plastic cups. "The story of the children, the families, and the cups embodies the conviction that education both requires and nurtures imagination, determination, vision, humility, experimentation, relationships, and listening," write Ann Pelo and Margie Carter in the foreword to the book.

Enjoy your creative side with your child and watch them blossom. In the words of Albert Einstein, "Creativity is contagious. Pass it on."

Citizen Patrol

Relatively few crimes were reported for July and August. What has increased around our area are the number of physical assaults being reported. While most of these are called "simple" assaults, they are assaults all the same, and many times can be crimes of opportunity. Jogging or walking along, totally focused on your progress and tunes leaves little room for you to notice what is going on around you, so please be aware. The same goes for getting in or out of your vehicle at home, at work, etc. It takes just a few seconds to look around and assess your surroundings. Doing so increases your awareness, and being aware is a deterrent.

During June the city saw a rash of vehicle break-ins particularly in parking garages. These types of incidents are normally ones of opportunity as well. The best way to protect yourself from this if you park your car on the street or in your driveway (and this goes for visitors too) is to completely remove or conceal anything that may be of interest. When I go to the post office, grocery store, etc., it amazes me to see all the tempting stuff left visible in parked cars. The same thing goes for recycling — break down those electronics boxes and put them inside your green recycling bin. The less "advertising" left in front of your house, the safer you are.

Our neighborhood watch group is always in need of patrollers. To sign up, download the application from gardenoaks.org (under the "security" tab), fill it out, and send to gocop@gardenoaks.org. I will forward this to the officer in charge and advise you of any upcoming training. As long as you are at least 18 years of age, have a valid driver's license, live in Garden Oaks, and can pass a background check, you qualify.



Choosing a Home Generator: Portable vs. Stand-by (Part 3 of 3)

This is our final column on portable vs. stand-by generators. Let's compare them in several crucial areas.

Initial Purchase Price

A portable generator is definitely the less expensive of the two. For under \$600 you can buy one that generates 4,000 watts of electricity, enough to run your refrigerator, some lights, and a fan.

A stand-by generator that can supply 10,000 watts starts around \$6,000. Depending on the size of your home, you may be able to run one of its A/C systems.

Fuel Usage

With a portable generator, there are a variety of potential fuels, propane and gasoline being the most convenient. However, you will have to go out and purchase fuel. This can be a problem after a major natural disaster, assuming the fuel is even available.

A stand-by generator is attached to your home's natural gas or liquid propane (LP) gas supply, which is immediately available.

Convenience

A portable generator requires constant monitoring and refilling of fuel.

A stand-by generator automatically supplies power to your home within seconds of an electrical outage and then shuts off by itself when no longer needed.

Noise and Air Pollution Levels

A portable generator creates a lot of noise and fumes.

A stand-by generator does make noise, similar to your central A/C system's outside condenser, but if properly maintained, there are very little, if any, fumes.

Economy

What you save in the initial purchase of a portable generator is quickly consumed in fuel costs.



A stand-by generator is very economical, running on natural gas or LP.

Air Conditioning

With a portable generator, you'll need one that can provide at least 10,000 watts to keep you cool as well as run your refrigerator and a couple of lights.

The stand-by generator is definitely the better choice because of its superior capacity to produce the necessary wattage.

In summary, if you can afford it, get yourself a stand-by generator. But realistically, be ready to spend \$12,000 for 20,000 watts of power. You'll never regret it.
