Let There Be Peace on Earth and Let it Begin With Me

Do you recognize these familiar words? I learned them more than 50 years ago in grade school and they seem just as relevant today. As we focus on our New Year's resolutions for 2020, peace continues to be a universal resolution from which we all benefit.

Peace education is a fundamental part of Montessori education. Dr. Montessori lived through both World Wars and was troubled by all the suffering and human loss she saw. When it became obvious that Mussolini did not want her to educate children for peace but instead wanted to use them to help spread terror, she and her son fled Italy to the safety of India. She spent years sharing her message of education for all children with her efforts recognized by nominations for the Nobel Peace Prize three separate years.

How can we share her hope and mission for a peaceful world today? In the Montessori classroom, peace tables are a part of the classroom curriculum. If children disagree, the two children are ushered to the peace table where they discuss the cause of the issue and ways to solve it peacefully. Peace tables include a vase and a rose to represent the beauty and tranquility found in nature that is available to everyone. Further, Montessori classrooms emphasize the uniqueness and value of every person and their cultural background. Lessons in the cultural studies area are woven into daily group meetings, with students encouraged to share their families' histories and personal stories. Children stay together for three years in a multi-age setting, allowing for a deeper understanding and connections to others and the awareness of the humanity we all share.

At GOMM, we provide peaceful learning opportunities for all children. We incorporate Restorative Justice techniques, community circles, peer mediation, and mental health training to ensure teachers are equipped to embrace the changing societal demands on our

children and families. Some of our efforts include partnering with the Human Rights Campaign Family Project to becoming a pilot school for the Welcoming Schools Program, supporting family diversity, gender expansion, and peaceful school communities (www.welcomingschools.org). We also work with the Center for Healing Racism here in Houston, hosting the national Montessori for Social Justice Conference and sending teachers and staff to continuing education through the Anti-Violence Project (AVP). We teach mindfulness, meditation, and yoga to help children be aware of the mind-body connection and the importance of staying in control of big emotions that could otherwise overflow and harm others. Much has changed since the time of Dr. Montessori, but her message continues to ring clear. We are building a better, more peaceful future when we teach peace to our children. By promoting peace at school and in our homes, we can be the difference that creates peace for our communities and our world.

Business Meeting

A quest representing Harris County Flood Control listened to various comments about recent neighborhood flooding during heavy rain events. He will communicate concerns to Harris County.

A motion to approve November's minutes was made and seconded. Minutes were approved.

Election of 2020 GOCC Board Members

Joe Casarez, Teresa Coleman, and Helen Sestak will rotate off the board in 2020. A motion to approve the new candidate slate was made, seconded, and approved. No additional names from the floor were proposed. Congratulations to our newly-elected officers!

Treasurer's Report: Teresa Coleman presented the proposed 2020 budget that was posted in the most-recent *Gazette*. Tonya Knauth and Teresa had meticulously reviewed the budget, which is a deficit-spending, ultimately unsustainable long-term one. Some discussion followed. A suggestion was made to approach local businesses and Harris County to help fund the Constable Program, a leading budget item. A motion to approve 2020's proposed budget was made, seconded, and approved.

Committee Reports

Constable Patrol: Terry Jeanes reported that we are still awaiting the \$25,000 donation promised by Patrick Berry of the Gulf Coast Commercial Group.

Funding of the Constable Patrol is always a concern. Some discussion about checking into TIRZ funding (Tax Increment Reinvestment Zones), adding

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businesses to the Program and expanding the perimeter area followed. Are you interested in exploring the details of a possible expansion? Checking into TIRZ? Call Terry.

Terry will update the neighborhood signs. Watch that red rise!

Beautification: Joan Harmon reported that the section 1A berm has been cleaned up and trees cut. It needs much additional work. Volunteers? Conversations related to the recently-donated swing and its installation in the Gazebo Park followed. A motion to authorize \$500 to install swing supports and reinstall a 'Welcome to Garden Oaks' sign was tabled.

GOMO: No report.

Membership: Dian Austin reported that she has received many membership checks for 2020 and is currently processing them.

Gazette: Joe Muscara reminded all that January articles are due December 15, 2019. Send submissions to gazette@gardenoaks.org.

Garden Oaks Montessori Magnet School: Dr. Pollock shared that the holiday extravaganza featuring GOMM entertainers will be held at the River Oaks Barnes and Noble, December 7 and 8. A portion of all weekend sales benefit the school. Last year's effort resulted in ~\$10,000 for the school.

Magnet program applications for all HISD schools are due by December 6th.

The GOCC donated \$1000 to the GOMM PTO for use of the school and cafeteria for GOCC events in 2019.

Government Affairs / GO CIP: Tonya Knauth and Dr. Pollock have met with CoH engineers concerning timely construction of a sidewalk from 43rd to the school along Sue Barnett. Conversations are ongoing. Additional discussion related to bike routes, pedestrian crosswalks, and traffic studies followed.

Section 1 Commercial Development: Carrie Arnett reported via email that we are awaiting the Gulf Coast Development contribution to the Constable Patrol.

New Business: Visit Santa on December 7 at 2 pm at 1018 Althea, the home of Missy Alwais and Jeremy Robinson. Enjoy cookies and milk and donate a toy to Constable Patrol drive! Or, drop off a toy at Dr. Gleem on December 9. You have another opportunity to see Santa and his elves at the Gazebo Park on December 11 and 12.

The next GOCC meeting will be held on January 7 at 7 pm, at Garden Oaks Montessori School.

The meeting was adjourned at 9 pm.



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Citizen Patrol

I hope everyone had a great Christmas and a Happy New Year celebration. As we move into 2020, please be sure to report a crime you experience, no matter how insignificant you believe it might be. Doing so gives more information to our constable deputies.

Garden Oaks experienced an uptick in crimes in October and November and we need your help. The GOCOP effort needs volunteers to bolster the few hardy souls that make up our group. Visibility is key and thwarts a wrongdoer's plans when they see a car with "CITIZEN PATROL" cruising by.

Training takes place at the North Station, 9455 West Montgomery, Houston, TX, 77088, 6 – 9 pm. When the next training date is confirmed, I will post it on the GO Facebook pages. Download the application from gardenoaks.org, fill it out, and forward to me for submission to HPD. This volunteer activity has no set requirements for how often you patrol. The important thing is that patrolling takes place. You must be a GO resident, be at least 18 years of age, and pass a background check.

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Constable Program Supporter Fees Are Due, Deputies in Action

Please pay your 2020 Constable Supporter dues to be eligible for the \$100 El Tiempo, Laurenzo's, and Tony Mandola gift certificates. The winners will be drawn at the February Civic Club meeting. You must donate at the minimum \$250 annual requested level to be entered in the drawing.

Your Constable Supporter donation is crucial for keeping two deputy patrollers on the streets of Garden Oaks and surrounding area. Each contract provides a professional law enforcement deputy who patrols our neighborhood and its perimeter 40 hours per week. Each contract deputy costs approximately \$83,000 annually.

Constable Investigator Joe Bowden and Corporal Santos Torres returned two stolen bikes to Garden Oaks neighbors following effective investigative work and action. This is one example among several cases where stolen property was returned to our neighbors. (See photo below)

Currently, we are still awaiting the contribution from Gulf Coast Commercial Group, the purchaser of the parking lot to the north of Gabby's on N. Shepherd. The parcel sale was closed mid-May and a large contribution to the Constable program is promised..


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Calorie Counting *Does Not Work*!

Keeping a food journal or tracking your daily food intake on apps like My Fitness Pal can be great for holding you accountable and conscious of what you are actually putting into your mouth every day. These methods may help you lose a few pounds in the beginning but for most people, long term, it just doesn't work.


How many people do you know who have been counting calories or doing something like My Fitness Pal or Weight Watchers forever, and they are still struggling with their weight? 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How to Prevent Carbon Monoxide Poisoning in Your Home

Carbon monoxide is an odorless, colorless gas that's the result of incomplete combustion of organic substances. This includes both natural gas and propane used to heat homes in the winter.

It's dangerous because it interferes with your body's normal oxygen intake. Red blood cells pick it up more readily than oxygen. With every breath, oxygen in the blood is replaced with carbon monoxide, thus depleting oxygen within the body. This can damage tissues and even result in death. Symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning include headaches, dizziness, tiredness, and nausea that may lead to impaired judgment, memory, and coordination.

Each year, the US Consumer Product Safety Commission estimates that 8,000 to 15,000 people are sent to hospitals for carbon monoxide poisoning, and it is responsible for an estimated 500 deaths.

Simple measures to protect you and your family

Carbon monoxide can build up to dangerous concentrations indoors when fuel-burning devices are not properly used, vented, or maintained. It is strongly recommended that you have your gas furnace cleaned and inspected every year. All gas furnaces produce some carbon monoxide, which is carried away from your home through the furnace's venting. However, a defective furnace can be deadly.

While new gas furnaces will shut off when problems are detected, older furnaces have no such devices. Over time, a furnace can develop small cracks in its combustion chamber that may not be visible to the naked eye. An A/C service technician has tools that detect these cracks and leaks.

The US Consumer Product Safety Commission recommends installing at least one carbon monoxide detector per household. It should be located near where you sleep and, if possible, close to the A/C system's return air vent. That way, it can monitor all your home's returning air at the same time. Also, be sure to choose an Underwriters Laboratories Inc. (UL) listed detector that emits an audible alarm and has a digital display.
