Back-to-School 2020

Houston ISD students and teachers will continue online learning through mid-October. All students will begin the school year virtually when classes begin September 8. Online instruction will continue for six weeks through October 16, according to Interim Superintendent Dr. Lathan. If a parent has chosen to enroll their child in the PK tuition program, services will also be provided online for the first six weeks of the school year. Tuition may be sent via online payment or sent by check to the school address (901 Sue Barnett, Houston, TX 77018). If your family's economic status has changed, please email to complete new paperwork to possibly qualify for the free, subsidized PK program.

How does online instruction work? Students work on the computer with teachers in real-time, face-to-face lessons for part of the day. These lessons are recorded and stored for students to access should they wish to revisit the lesson or if they are not able to attend the session at the scheduled time. Students are expected to participate in the lesson when they are in the face-to-face session and do have assignments to complete independently. Lessons are delivered via Microsoft Teams within the HISD secure platform. Students log-in with their unique student ID and submit their assignments through HISD's HUB - another secure platform where teachers are able to access the submissions and provide feedback to students. Additionally, online resources are provided to students to extend learning including Imagine Learning for reading and math, Khan Academy, Vocabulary.com, and Nessy for students identified with Dyslexia and reading challenges.

Parents and supportive adults are essential to students' success! While the parent-child-school partnership has always been important, the current online learning platform relies heavily on home involvement and support. HISD has developed courses for parents to enhance this partnership and to ensure that parents are able to navigate the online platforms and resources. Log on to the HISD website at houstonisd.org and register for the sessions in the language of your choice.

At Garden Oaks, we will have work underway in the Spark Park while students are away. We are very fortunate to receive a re-SPARK project approval! This will include soccer goals, a new net on the tennis court, additional fencing near the generator, relocation and upgrade of the backstop, walking path resurfacing and re-routing, drainage remediation and additional benches. Thanks to Ms. Ownby of the City of Houston Spark Park program that partners with local schools to provide substantial funding and to our parents and staff of the Garden Oaks PTO who have raised \$15,000 for this project!

Until we meet again face-to-face, stay healthy and happy!!!

Reminder: We now have one full time deputy patroller for 40 hours of dedicated patrol per week.

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Beautification

Good things started happening on Garden Oaks Boulevard earlier this summer when one of the neighbors took on the job of power washing about 200 bollards that line both sides of the esplanade. Section 2 neighbors kicked in \$450 for mulching and for work on the bollards. In mid-July, members of the Tatum family made a hard push to reset the downed bollards, and they made several new ones to fill in gaps. Over the next few weeks the power washing will be completed, and a coat of sealer/stain will be applied. These bollards have given good service for many years but are probably in the last few years of serviceable life. This project both improves the looks but also will postpone the need to completely replace them.

The irrigation system has also gotten some attention. There has been replacement of broken heads, installation of head collars, and a reset of timings. We are going to replace a portion of a main supply line which was damaged when one of the trees fell.

Near term, our park captains Shana Tatum and Jonathan Morgan are planning for a work day in the September/ October time frame for pruning and weeding.

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

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
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Mickey's Minute

I have purchased enough tablecloths to change them out three times between seatings of close-knit family groups in the hopes of allowing y'all to linger awhile. Although with the August heat, you may not want to linger too long, but that option will be available.

I've had numerous requests from prepared food vendors wanting to come to our market and I'm going to set up a rotating booth that will change weekly if they are agreeable. Also by the time of this article, Monica and Michael of Russo and Sons Artisan Pasta and Sauce will have rejoined the line up along with Mariana and Carlos of 109 Coffee.

Since we're at least two months from the end of summer on the Texas Gulf Coast, I'm thinking of adding another cold beverage option, non-alcoholic of course. A few years back I paired up with a local kombucha maker and am wondering if they're still around. If not, I'll seek out another. Although I'd love to think beer and wine are great at rehydrating us, I know from experience that's not true. And I wouldn't want to take any business away from neighbors on the street who have struggled through these trying times.

Meanwhile at the farm, Cathy's egg producers (the hens) have probably succumbed to the heat, and egg production will have dropped, so please bear with her if the supply runs out early in the day. August is always an interesting time as summer crops begin to play out with the exception of okra, peppers, and a few others. Fall crops are just beginning to be planted and very dependent on just the right conditions to prosper, including a little rain, but not a lot.

If I haven't said it enough, let me thank y'all once again for your continued support during the shutdown; and to those who discovered our little market during this time, a hearty welcome to the club is due. With all of your help, we shall continue and come week after week and serve the surrounding neighborhoods.

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Keep Your Cool

Now that high temperatures are the norm, we depend on A/C systems to keep us comfortable. Here are some tips to help keep your home system running smoothly.

- (1) Schedule an A/C check-up now, if you haven't already done so. This is the most important tip I can offer. During a check-up, the freon level, drain pan, compressor, condensing coil, evaporator coil, filter, thermostat, and wiring will all be inspected and any minor mechanical issues will be fixed. This helps prevent most problems and maintains your A/C system at its peak operating efficiency.
- (2) Replace your A/C filter every month. A clean air filter protects from dust, pollen, and other airborne contaminants. A clogged filter makes the compressor work much harder and shortens its lifespan.
- (3) Have realistic expectations for your indoor temperature. The standard in the HVAC industry is 20 degrees maximum difference between outdoor and indoor temperatures. When it's 95 degrees outside, probably the coolest your house will get is 75 degrees.

You are lucky if your system can lower it more.

- (4) Purchase a programmable thermostat and use it! Program the thermostat to raise your home's temperature after you leave and lower the temperature before you return. You can ease the load on the A/C system by setting the thermostat to the highest temperature that you're comfortable with and rely on other fans. They help keep you cool by evaporating moisture on your skin.
- (5) Keep the outside condenser unit clear of debris. Plants and lawn debris can build up around the outdoor condenser unit, restricting airflow. Use your garden hose to spray about six inches from the condenser's fins to clear them of dust and leaves. This will help keep your condenser running efficiently.
- (6) Finally, call an A/C service technician as soon as you suspect a problem. Although these tips will greatly reduce the possibility of A/C issues this summer, something else can always go wrong. If you suspect a problem, contact your technician immediately before the problem gets worse.
