
GARDEN CLUB NEWS

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CRITTER CORNER

Did you notice the awesome termite swarm around the first of May? It was over before it began, but what entomological glory while it lasted! I was sitting out back on a bright sunny day when a few winged insects began to appear, then a few more, then a horde, then a veritable cloud of six-legged home-eaters. It covered Section Five of Garden Oaks, and probably went a lot further. The swarm extended vertically for as far as the eye could see, maybe hundreds of feet.

Birds were going nuts trying to see how many of the termites they could eat. I never realized termites were that tasty. Those little green lizards we have were also in a frenzy (we call them chameleons but they are not true chameleons but rather anoles, but of course I don't need to tell you that), chasing the termites on the ground and flicking them down with their prehensile tongues. The lizards became so involved in eating termites that they lost all normal fear of me, also of my cat, who took advantage of the situation to torment several before I could stop her.

I had never seen a termite swarm before then. In about three hours it was all over with, and hardly a termite to be seen anywhere. What worries me is this: where did they go? Doesn't that make you a little uneasy? It does me.

To change the subject, there are a lot of owl sightings lately. Practically everyone I know has owls in their yard or their neighbor's yard. Lots of the nesting boxes have owls in them, and mine has two fuzzy-headed babies peering out the hole in the evenings. Marshall Lighter on Gardenia reports that his box has been shunned by the owls so he walks three houses down the block to watch the owls in his neighbor's box.

Danese McWhorter gave a good tongue-lashing to the boys at Garden Oaks Elementary who knocked down a bird nest containing three tiny babies. Then she valiantly administered CPR to the trio of nestlings, only to lose one right away. The other two accepted a little ground beef from her and seemed reasonably all-right so she returned the nest to its original position under a window awning and hopes for the best. Shouldn't we be giving out awards to people like her?

Now we turn to a subject which I suppose relates indirectly to critters, namely, setting out household trash for the garbagemen to pick up. On my street they pick up trash on Tuesday and Friday. Invariably, someone will inexplicably put out garbage on Saturday or Sunday, which means it sits there for everyone to admire while the sun ripens it. Then along comes a dog and does what comes naturally, decorating the street and adjacent yards with household garbage, and whatever was too small for the dog proves just right for Mama Rat and Pappa Rat on Monday night. So by the next pickup time, there's not much left to be picked up. Wouldn't it be better to set out trash the same day as the pickup, or maybe the night before? Rats are one critter I prefer not to encourage.

Somebody said why don't I talk about proper techniques for trimming trees, so I will, although I don't know what it has to do with critters. You already know that a big healthy tree adds thousands of dollars to your property value. What you may not know is that you can introduce diseases into the tree's system by sloppy trimming, and hasten the tree's demise. The worst thing in the world you can do to a tree is saw off a limb and leave a short stump. Cut that stump off flush with the trunk of the tree, or nearly flush, so the tree can grow tissue over the wound. Otherwise it becomes an entryway for bugs and disease. Savvy?
