November 7th Showdown For City Elections

There are several city races that affect Garden Oaks residents. The most widely known race, of course, is the one for Mayor of Houston. The candidates include Fred Hofheinz, Claude Jones, James Lee Kelley, Shelby B. Oringderff, Gregg Rosenberg, Rosie Walker and Kathy Whitmire, incumbent.

In Council District A the candidates are Stanley Casey, Helen Huey and Larry McKaskle, incumbent. For Council At-Large Position 1 the candidates are Beverly Clark, Charles George and Jim Westmoreland, incumbent. Lon P. Arnett, Joe A. Perez and incumbent Eleanor Tinsley are candidates for Council At-Large Position 2. Jim Greenwood, incumbent, and Curtis Perry, III are running for Council At-Large Position 3. For Council At-Large Position 4 vacated by Anthony Hall the candidates are Jamie Bray, Leonel Castillo, Freddie Jackson,

Shelia Jackson Lee, Dr. Ronald Lepow, and Tom Zakes. The incumbent from Council At-Large Position 5, Judson Robinson, Jr. is running unopposed.

In addition to city races, District 1 in the Houston Independent School District is up for election. The candidates are Paula Arnold and Ginia Wray Wright, incumbent. For the first time voters will have a chance to elect members of the board of Houston Community College. The HCC board was previously appointed with this election beginning a transition to elected board members. The HCC system is divided into districts congruent to the boundaries of HISD. Based on populations, the boundaries for both systems will probably change after the next national census in 1990. The incumbent for District 1, Roland Smith is running unopposed.

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

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
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Critter Corner

I got a call this week from a very excited woman. She had been watching a pair of redbellied woodpeckers cavort in her front yard, and wanted to know if I had ever seen that type of bird here. I reluctantly admitted that the redbelly is fairly common around here, which shouldn't take anything away from her excitement and pleasure in identifying them. The lady's name was Anita Scherer.

Anybody seen any geese yet? Here it is almost the middle of October and I have yet to hear a single honk from above.

On the subject of our recycling program: on a Monday night walk down my street I saw several people setting out newspapers with their garbage bags (trash pick-up is Tuesday morning). Guess what they said when I politely asked them why they didn't save their papers for our once-a-month recycling effort? Answers next month.

I have changed my mind about people who steal from the Recycling

committee. Back when we started this neighborhood recycling project, we predicted that we would lose a few bags of aluminum cans each month to opportunistic "cruisers," people who would learn to get up early and beat the regular volunteers to the curbside treasures. The mental picture we had of such a person was this: an unemployed father with four kids to feed, driving a beat-up old car with a plastic trashbag taped over a busted-out window. At the time most of us felt pretty magnanimous towards such an unfortunate soul, and said we would't mind if we lost a few cans to the poor and homeless.

What changed my mind was this: neighbors reported to me that a nice clean-cut white lady in a new van went down my street ahead of the volunteer recyclers, picking up all the aluminum and most of the paper. I need someone to tell me how that is any different from someone coming into a civic club meeting and reaching into Mr. Mills' cashbox while no one is looking and making off with twenty or thirty bucks. Either way we are getting robbed, and it brings out some relatively unChristian feelings in me.

Elsewhere in this issue you can read how to protect your recyclables from "unauthorized pickup" by thieves: green "Garden Oaks Recycling" T-shirts and magnetic stickers on the official trucks. And please, if you see someone other than the recycling volunteers picking up material on your street, take down the license number and call Pam Parks, 868-5223. The police will help us put a stop to this practice.

October 6, 1989: Mother Nature has been playing mean tricks on the plants in the garden over the past month or so. Toward the middle of September, along comes a long-awaited cold front to tease us with daytime highs in the comfortable 70's and nighttime lows in the cool (maybe even crisp?) 50's.

After two or three days of this, the okra had started to shut down production, the tomatoes were wondering if they really wanted to bloom, and the cabbage had just about decided to put on a serious growth spurt. But summer wasn't finished with us yet. Here we are a couple of weeks later and the temperature is back up in the 90's again. So all of the veggies had to do a quick "about-face" and either swing back into growth gear or retreat and wait for the next cool snap.

Fortunately, plants are exceptionally resilient. It amazes me how much abuse a plant can withstand and still survive. For example, a few days after setting out our small tomato seedlings this fall, I came by the garden and found that one of the new plants had had its stem snapped almost completely in half, leaving the upper half of the plant barely attached to the lower half. I didn't have another plant to replace it though, so I decided to leave it alone.

That poor little tomato plant, which should by all rights have withered away, has not only managed to survive but is now setting fruit. Don't you wish that we humans had the same regenerative abilities? If you don't believe it, come by and see this spunky little tomato plant for yourself. It's the crooked but happy fellow at the end of the row of tomato cages farthest away from the school buildings. See you at the garden!

This still does not insure compliance, so please take down names, times, truck numbers, etc. and report it. *Miscellaneous paper figure is from the first load of paper donated to the Civic Club from R.A.G. Printing (the printer of the Gazette). Additional paper has been picked up and will be reported in next month's figures.

#Plate glass figure is from the first load of glass donated to the Civic Club by **Robert** and **Debble Swift** from their place of business. Additional loads will be picked up later this month and reported in next month's figures.

The automated glass crushers made their debut October 14 at the Graham Park recycle headquarters. This will save us time, space, and several backaches. Glass used to be crushed by hand into barrels for transporting to the recycler. The motorized glass crushers will crush the glass into much smaller pieces, thereby taking up less space in the barrels.

The Recycling Committee volunteers can now be identified by green "Garden Oaks Recycling" T-shirts and matching magnetic signs on all "official" recycling vehicles. Anyone picking up your recyclables on Garden Oaks Recycle Pick-up Day without these distinguishing items should be reported. Take down their license number and call **Pam Parks** at **868-5223**.

Be aware: several bottlers of soft drink companies are using steel cans instead of aluminum. Use the magnet test if you are not sure. (A magnet will not stick to aluminum.) Also please remove lids from glass containers before placing out to recycle. If you don't do it, we do, and it really slows our progress down. The labels can be left on. Newspapers should be bundled, tied, or placed in paper grocery sacks. Please try to avoid plastic bags.

The next pick-up date will be **Saturday, November 11**. Remember to set out your articles by 8am. You can also personally drop off your recyclables at Graham Park on the Recycle Pick-up day from 8am until the volunteers go home (hopefully around 11 am). If you will be out-of town on the pick-up day or need special help with setting your items out on the curb, call **Sammle Broadrick** at **686-1684** or Pam Parks.
